PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district within the diocese of such archbishop, or the diocese of such bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said archbishop or bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such bishop to be transmitted to the said archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said archbishop may

approve, and the said archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect; and such Order, being registered in the registry of the diocese, which the Registrar is hereby required to do, shall be forthwith binding on all persons whatsoever, including the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected thereby, if he or they shall have consented thereto in writing under his or their hands."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Salisbury hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Father in God Archibald Campbell by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan.

"I George by Divine permission Bishop of Salisbury do in pursuance of the 26th section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter 106 hereby represent to your Grace.

"That there is in the county of Wilts and my diocese of Salisbury the vicarage of Coombe Bissett the parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one (exclusively of the chapelry hereinafter mentioned) a population of three hundred and sixty-two.

"That there is belonging to the parish of Coombe Bissett aforesaid the parochial chapelry of West Harnham the boundaries whereof are well known and defined and which contains according to the said census a population of two hundred and eighty-eight.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of Coombe Bissett arising partly from the rent-charge in lieu of tithes and partly from glebe and partly from surplice fees is one hundred and forty-six pounds in addition to which the incumbent of Coombe Bissett aforesaid is entitled to receive from out of the endowment of the Prebend of Coombe and Harnham in the Cathedral Church of Salisbury the yearly pension of fifty pounds of which twenty pounds is receivable in respect of the parochial chapelry of West Harnham aforesaid.

"That there is a house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Coombe Bissett.

"That there is a chapel in the said parochial chapelry of West Harnham which is kept in good repair by the inhabitants of the same parochial chapelry and which affords sufficient accommodation for the said inhabitants of the said chapelry.

"That baptisms churchings marriages and burials have heretofore been and are now performed in the said chapel and the burial-ground thereto belonging.

"That the said chapel is distant from the parish church of Coombe Bissett by the nearest roadway two and a half miles or thereabouts.

"That it does not appear that any of the inhabitants of the said parochial chapelry have any right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the parish church of Coombe Bissett nor does it appear that any persons other than the inhabitants of the said parochial chapel have any right by faculty or otherwise to the exclusive use of any of the pews or sittings in the chapel of the said parochial chapelry.

"That in the same county and diocese is the vicarage of East Harnham the parish whereof adjoins the parochial chapelry of West Harnham aforesaid and contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one a population of five hundred and thirty including the inmates of a workhouse.

"That the chapel of the said parochial chapelry is distant from the parish church of East Harnham by the nearest roadway half a mile or thereabouts.

"That the net annual value of the benefice of East Harnham arising partly from rent-charges in lieu of tithes partly from a payment by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and partly from surplice fees is one hundred and three pounds or thereabouts.

"That there is no house of residence belonging to the benefice of East Harnham.

"That I the Bishop aforesaid am in right of my See the patron of the benefice of Coombe Bissett with West Harnham aforesaid and that the Reverend Arthur Philip Morris vicar of the vicarage of Britford in the county of Wilts and my diocese of Salisbury is the patron in right of his said vicarage of the benefice of East Harnham aforesaid.

"That the Reverend Henry Smith Pollard is the present incumbent of the benefice of Coombe Bissett with West Harnham and the Reverend Charles David Crawley is the present incumbent of the benefice of East Harnham.

"That it appears to me that the parochial chapelry of West Harnham aforesaid may under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd Victoria chapter 106 be advantageously separated from the said vicarage and parish of Coombe Bissett and annexed and united to the said vicarage and parish of East Harnham.

"That the Ecclesiastical Commissioners have expressed their willingness in the event of the said chapelry of West Harnham being separated from the said benefice of Coombe Bissett and annexed to the said benefice of East Harnham to raise the income of the benefice of East Harnham with the chapelry of West Harnham to three hundred pounds per annum and to secure to such benefice a grant of one thousand five hundred pounds for the purpose of providing a parsonage-house for the benefice. They have also expressed their willingness upon the chapelry of West Harnham being separated from the benefice of

Coombe Bissett and annexed and united to the benefice of East Harnham to take steps for securing to the benefice of Coombe Bissett a grant of twenty pounds a year from their common fund by way of compensation to the vicar of that benefice for the loss of income which the severance of West Harnham will entail upon him.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament I the said Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me the alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage may be made with justice to all parties interested.

"And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of the said several patrons and incumbents and in case you shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and the consents by your report to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this thirtieth day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"The SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Representation.

"That the parochial chapelry of West Harnham shall be separated from the parish of Coombe Bissett and be annexed and united for ecclesiastical purposes to the vicarage and parish of East Harnham.

"That the incumbent of the benefice of East Harnham shall have exclusive cure of souls within the said parochial chapelry and that all fees for marriages and burials and other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed at the chapel and burying-ground of West Harnham aforesaid shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent for the time being of the benefice of East Harnham aforesaid.

"That the yearly pension of twenty pounds now payable out of the endowment of the Prebend of Coombe and Harnham in the Cathedral Church of Salisbury to the incumbent of the benefice of Coombe Bissett with West Harnham for the performance of service at West Harnham shall henceforth be payable and paid to the incumbent for the time being of the benefice of East Harnham.

"That the inhabitants of the said parochial chapelry shall subject to the provisions of the Church Rates Abolition Act continue and be liable to the repairs and the maintenance of the chapel of West Harnham aforesaid and shall not be liable to contribute to the repairs and maintenance of the parish church of Coombe Bissett nor shall the inhabitants of the same parochial chapelry be entitled as inhabitants to any pews or sittings in the mother church of Coombe Bissett.

"That the said parochial chapelry shall henceforth be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction with the benefice of East Harnham aforesaid.

"That the patronage of or right of collation or presentation to the said benefice of East Harnham with the chapelry of West Harnham annexed shall belong to and be vested in the Bishop of Salisbury for the time being and the vicar of Britford for the time being as follows that is say the Bishop of Salisbury shall be entitled to one turn in every three turns commencing with the first or next turn and the vicar of Britford shall be entitled to the remaining two turns in every three turns.

"CONSENTS.

"We the Right Reverend George by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Salisbury the patron in right of the See of Salisbury the benefice of Coombe Bissett with West Harnham and the Reverend Henry Smith Pollard, Clerk the vicar of the said vicarage and the Reverend Arthur Philip Morres, Clerk vicar of the vicarage of Britford in the county of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury the patron in right of his said vicarage of the benefice of East Harnham and the Reverend Charles David Crawley, Clerk incumbent of the same benefice do hereby severally signify our consent to the scheme above proposed for separating the parochial chapelry of West Harnham from the said vicarage and parish church of Coombe Bissett and uniting the same for ecclesiastical purposes to the vicarage of East Harnham.

"In witness whereof we have hereunto set our hands this thirtieth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one,

And whereas the said Bishop of Salisbury hath transmitted the said scheme to the Archbishop of Canterbury for his consideration and the said Archbishop being satisfied with such scheme hath certified the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council dated the seventeenth day of August 1881: which report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend George Lord Bishop of Salisbury has represented unto us (amongst other things).

"That there is in the county of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury the vicarage of Coombe Bissett the parish whereof contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one (exclusively of the chapel hereinafter mentioned) a population of three hundred and sixty-two.

"That there is belonging to Coombe Bissett aforesaid the parochial chapelry of West Harnham the boundaries whereof are well-known and defined and which contains according to the said census a population of two hundred and eighty-eight.

"That there is in the said chapelry of West Harnham a church or chapel distant from the parish church of Coombe Bissett two and a half miles or thereabouts.

"That in the same county and diocese is the vicarage of East Harnham the parish whereof adjoins the parochial chapelry of West Harnham aforesaid and contains according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one a population of five hundred and thirty including the inmates of a workhouse.

"That the chapel of the said parochial chapelry is distant from the parish church of East Harnham by the nearest roadway half a mile or thereabouts.

"That the said Lord Bishop is in right of his see the patron of the benefice of Coombe Bissett with West Harnham aforesaid and that the Reverend Arthur Philip Morres Vicar of the vicarage of Britford in the county of Wilts and diocese of Salisbury is the patron in right of his

said vicarage of the benefice of East Harnham aforesaid.

"That the Reverend Henry Smith Pollard is the present incumbent of the benefice of Coombe Bissett with West Harnham and the Reverend Charles David Crawley is the present incumbent of the benefice of East Harnham.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry of West Harnham may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of your Majesty's reign cap. 106 be advantageously separated from the said vicarage and parish of Coombe Bissett and be annexed and united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said vicarage and parish of East Harnham.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alterations may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patrons and incumbents of the benefices to be affected has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the 1st and 2nd years of your Majesty's reign cap. 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this seventeenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered that the said scheme of the Lord Bishop of Salisbury be carried into effect.

“from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing; hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect.”

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled “An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,” it is, amongst other things, further enacted “That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid; but if such incumbent or incumbents shall not have so consented thereto, this last-mentioned provision shall not come into operation until the next avoidance of the benefice by the incumbent objecting thereto, or by the surviving incumbent objecting, if more than one shall object thereto, and in such case the last-mentioned provision shall forthwith after such avoidance come into operation, and shall be binding on all persons whatsoever.”

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Peterborough hath made a representation in writing to his Grace

the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

“I the Right Reverend William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Leicester and my diocese of Peterborough the rectory of Aylestone the parish whereof on account of its close proximity to the town of Leicester is becoming very thickly populated.

“That the gross annual income of the said rectory is £1,324 Os. Od. or thereabouts.

“That there is one church at Aylestone aforesaid but it is expected that if the scheme hereunto annexed is carried into effect a new church for the inhabitants of the proposed new district will be built upon a site which has been given for that purpose.

“That it appears to me the portion of the said parish of Aylestone coloured yellow upon the plan accompanying this representation which contains a population of 2,000 persons might under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her present Majesty cap. 106 and the 2nd and 3rd years of Her said Majesty cap. 49 be advantageously separated from the said parish of Aylestone and constituted a separate benefice by the name or style of ‘St. James’ Aylestone Park.

“That it also appears to me that the income of the said rectory of Aylestone should from the date upon which such separation takes effect be charged with the payment by equal half yearly payments of the net annual sum of three hundred pounds to the incumbent for the time being of the said newly constituted benefice.

“That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, patronage, and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do submit the same to your Grace with my consent in writing as patron of the said rectory of Aylestone to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consent to Her Majesty in Council.

“Given under my hand this first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

And whereas the scheme and consent referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

“SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Representation.

“It is proposed to separate the north-eastern portion of the said parish of Aylestone extending from the borough of Leicester on the north-east to the Aylestone glebe land on the south-west and from the lordship of Knighton on the south-east to the Leicester and Lutterworth turnpike-road for a part of its length and the River Scar for the remaining part on the north-west from the said parish of Aylestone and to constitute it a separate benefice and a perpetual curacy by the name or style of St. James Aylestone Park of which the church to be hereafter erected shall be the parish church.

“The benefice so proposed to be constituted will be bounded on the north-east by the parish

of St. Mary in the borough of Leicester and part of the lordship of Knighton on the south-east by part of the said lordship of Knighton and part of the parish of Wigston Magna on the south-west by the Aylestone glebe land and land belonging to the trustees of the late N. C. Stone and on the north-west by the centre of the Lutterworth and Leicester turnpike-road as far as the road from the turnpike-road to the watermill thence along the said private road in a north-westerly direction to the right bank of the River Soar and thence along the right bank of the said River Soar to the boundary of the borough of Leicester near to St. Mary's Mill which said proposed benefice and the boundaries thereof are more particularly described and delineated on the plan annexed hereto.

"That such perpetual curacy shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said rectory of Aylestone.

"That the income of the said rectory of Aylestone shall from the date upon which such separation takes effect be charged with the payment by equal half-yearly payments of the net annual sum of three hundred pounds to the incumbent for the time being of the said perpetual curacy, such charge to be made under the provisions of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her Majesty chapter 113 and of the Act of the 17th and 18th years of Her Majesty chapter 84.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages and all other ecclesiastical offices shall be performed in the church of the benefice so to be constituted and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of such benefice and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said newly constituted benefice and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the incumbent of the said proposed perpetual curacy.

"That the incumbent of the said proposed perpetual curacy shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits thereof.

"That the right of nominating a minister to the church of such perpetual curacy and benefice shall be vested in and exercised and enjoyed by the Bishop for the time being of the diocese of Peterborough.

"That the inhabitants of the proposed newly constituted parish shall not when this scheme takes effect be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Aylestone, except nevertheless any person or persons having a legal right by faculty or otherwise to the possession of any pew or seat in the parish church of Aylestone aforesaid and who may not be willing to relinquish or give up the same.

"That the pews or seats in the new church of St. James be all of them free and open.

"That if the proposed new church of St. James shall be then built the above scheme shall take effect immediately upon the next avoidance of the benefice of Aylestone but if the said church shall not be so built when such next avoidance takes place then the said scheme shall take effect upon the building and consecration of the said church.

"CONSENT."

"I William Connor Lord Bishop of the diocese of Peterborough the patron in full right by virtue of my Bishoprick of the rectory of Aylestone within mentioned do hereby signify my consent to the scheme hereinbefore recited and set forth and everything therein contained.

And whereas the said Bishop of Peterborough hath transmitted the said scheme to the Archbishop of Canterbury for his consideration and the said Archbishop being satisfied with such scheme hath certified the same and such consents as aforesaid by his report to Her Majesty in Council dated the seventeenth day of August 1881, which report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend William Connor Lord Bishop of Peterborough has represented unto us (amongst other things).

"That there is in the county of Leicester and diocese of Peterborough the rectory of Aylestone the parish whereof on account of its close proximity to the town of Leicester is becoming very thickly populated.

"That the gross annual income of the said rectory is one thousand three hundred and twenty-four pounds or thereabouts.

"That there is one church at Aylestone aforesaid but it is expected that if the scheme annexed to the said representation is carried into effect a new church for the inhabitants of the proposed new district will be built upon a site which has been given for that purpose.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the portion of the said parish of Aylestone coloured yellow upon the plan accompanying the said representation which contains a population of two thousand persons might under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter 106 and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter 49 be advantageously separated from the said parish of Aylestone and constituted a separate benefice by the name or style of 'Saint James' Aylestone Park.

"That it also appears to the said Lord Bishop that the income of the said rectory of Aylestone should from the date upon which such separation takes effect be charged with the payment by equal half yearly payments of the net annual sum of three hundred pounds to the Incumbent for the time being of the said newly constituted benefice.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may best be effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consent thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop as patron of the said rectory of Aylestone has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consent before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consent as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Sunbury in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Sunbury which is hereinafter more particularly mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the said parish of Sunbury have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts or of some of them and we have in respect of such hereditaments and premises agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly herein mentioned Act to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted so soon as a minister shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein mentioned Act and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the same Act then to the incumbent of such new parish a grant of thirty pounds per annum.

“And whereas by a certain deed or indenture bearing date the thirteenth day of June in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one and made or expressed to be made under the provisions of ‘The New Parishes Acts 1843, 1844 and 1856’ or some or one of them between the Reverend Henry Vigne Clerk in Holy Orders vicar of the vicarage and parish church of the said parish of Sunbury of the first part the Very Reverend Richard William Church Dean of the Cathedral

Church of Saint Paul in London and the Chapter of the same church the patrons of the said vicarage of Sunbury aforesaid of the second part the Right Honourable and Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of London of the third part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners of the fourth part (which deed or indenture is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said Henry Vigne did grant and confirm unto the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish (intended as is mentioned in the said deed or indenture to be named ‘The District of Saint Saviour, Upper Sunbury’) so soon as such minister or incumbent shall have been appointed and licensed as aforesaid one clear yearly rent-charge or net annual sum of one hundred pounds to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon the endowments of the vicarage of the parish of Sunbury aforesaid.

“And whereas the said yearly rent-charge or net annual sum of one hundred pounds has been so granted as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England should out of the common fund created by the hereinbefore firstly mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of twenty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence per annum and upon the further understanding and condition that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) we should recommend and propose to your Majesty in Council that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district or (as the case may be) new parish, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned to the said Henry Vigne as vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Sunbury aforesaid and to his successors vicars or incumbents of the same vicarage for ever.

“And whereas the said annual grants of thirty pounds and of twenty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence respectively will be made and secured by an instrument or instruments to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“Now therefore with the consent of the said John, Bishop of the diocese of London aforesaid (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Sunbury which is more particularly mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named ‘The District of Saint Saviour Upper Sunbury.’

“And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and when the said district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of the said new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may

from time to time be exercised by the said Henry Vigne as vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Sunbury and by his successors vicars or incumbents of the same vicarage for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

“The District of Saint Saviour Upper Sunbury, being:—

“All that parish of the parish of Sunbury in the county of Middlesex and in the diocese of London which is bounded upon part of the west upon the south and upon the east by an imaginary line commencing at the point in the middle of Windmill-road where the boundary which divides the parish of Ashford in the said county and diocese from the parish of Sunbury aforesaid, diverges from the said road in a north-westerly direction and extending thence southward along the middle of the same road for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts, thereby passing over the Thames Valley Line of the London and South-Western Railway to the junction of the same road with Nursery-road and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading from Sunbury to Feltham-hill and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the Thames Valley Line of the London and South-Western Railway aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of eleven and a quarter chains or thereabouts (thereby passing through Sunbury Railway Station) to the middle of the bridge which carries the road called or known as Sunbury Common over the same line of railway and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘U. S. St. S. D. 1881, No. 1’ and placed on the northern side of the said road at the point where the fence forming the western boundary of the Kempton Park Race Course leaves the same road and extending thence northward to such boundary-stone and continuing thence still northward along the middle of the said fence for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to a boundary-stone inscribed ‘U. S. St. S. D. 1881 No. 2’ and placed at the northern end of the last-described fence on the southern side of the said line of railway and continuing thence first northward to a point in the middle of the same line of railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of thirteen and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said parish of Sunbury from the parish of Hanworth in the county and diocese aforesaid. All which said hereinbefore described part of the parish of Sunbury aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than the part of the west, the south, and the east before-mentioned, that is to say upon the north-east, upon the north and upon the remaining part of the west, as follows, upon the north-east by the parish of Hanworth aforesaid, upon the north by the parish of Feltham in the county and diocese aforesaid,

and upon the remaining part of the west by the parish of Ashford aforesaid.”

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the parish of Sunbury, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patron and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme:

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London. *C. “We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting under the provisions of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme or representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Saint Paul Wood Green Wednesbury in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield.

“Whereas by the authority of an Order of your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of March in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five and published in the London Gazette upon the nineteenth day of the same month certain portions of the parish of Wednesbury and of the parish or parochial chapelry of West Bromwich both in the county and diocese aforesaid were assigned as a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Paul situate at Wood Green in the parish of Wednesbury aforesaid, and the same consolidated chapelry was called ‘The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury.’

“And whereas the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury has under the provisions of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty chapter one hundred and four become a new parish of the character contemplated by that Act, and by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty chapter thirty-seven, and by the said above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of your Majesty chapter ninety-four.

“And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury, should be altered by

way of extension, so that they shall include an additional portion of the said parish of Wednesbury and also a portion of the new parish of Pleck and Bescot in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Dalrymple Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme or representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent recommend and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme or representation the boundaries of the said new parish of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury shall be altered by way of extension so that they shall include all that portion of the said parish of Wednesbury and also all that portion of the said new parish of Pleck and Bescot, which said portions are described in the schedule hereunder written and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended and are thereon coloured respectively blue and pink, and that from and after the day of the same date and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the said portions of the parish of Wednesbury, and of the new parish of Pleck and Bescot, so to be included as aforesaid shall become and be and form part of the said new parish of Saint Paul Wood Green, Wednesbury.

"And we further represent recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory proposed to be annexed to the new parish of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury in the county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield, being :—

1. "All that contiguous portion of the parish of Wednesbury in the county and diocese aforesaid wherein the present incumbent of such parish now possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on part of the north and on the south-east by the new parish of Saint Paul Wood Green Wednesbury aforesaid and upon all other sides, that is to say upon the west and upon the remaining part of the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides such new parish from the parish of Wednesbury aforesaid at the point where Walsall-street is joined by Pritchard-street, and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with a street and footway connecting Pritchard-street aforesaid with Terrace-street and with Windmill-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said connecting street and footway for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to a boundary stone inscribed 'W. W. G. St. P. N. P., 1881, No. 1,' and placed at the south-eastern end of the wall forming the south-western boundary of the houses and premises situate on the south-western side of Terrace-street aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the said wall for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with the wall forming the north-western boundary of the house and premises called or known as No. 20 Terrace-street and extending thence north-eastward for a distance of about one chain along the

last-described wall to a boundary-stone inscribed 'W. W. G. St. P. N. P., 1881, No. 2,' and placed at the north-eastern end of the same wall and continuing thence still north-eastward and in a direct line across the present north-western end of Terrace-street aforesaid to a point at the south-western end of the footway which leads into Windmill-street aforesaid and continuing thence still north-eastward along the middle of the last-described footway for a distance of two chains or thereabouts to its junction with Windmill-street aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Vicarage-road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul Wood Green Wednesbury from the parish of Wednesbury as aforesaid.

"2. All that portion of the new parish of Pleck and Bescot in the said county of Stafford and in the diocese of Lichfield aforesaid, which is bounded on the south by the new parish of Saint Paul Wood Green Wednesbury aforesaid, or in other words by the old course of the River Tame, and on all other sides that is to say on the east, on the north and on the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the last-named new parish from the new parish of Pleck and Bescot aforesaid at the point where such boundary is crossed by the Bescot Branch of the London and North-Western Railway, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of twenty-eight chains or thereabouts to its junction with the main line of the London and North-Western Railway aforesaid; and extending thence northward along the middle of the said main line of railway for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses Wallows-lane, and extending thence first westward and then south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of twenty chains or thereabouts to its junction near Bescot Hall with the high road leading from Walsall to Wednesbury and extending thence southward along the middle of the said high road for a distance of fourteen and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with a certain private road belonging to the London and North-Western Railway Company and leading from the said high road to the line of the Grand Junction Railway and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said private road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to the middle of the level crossing over the line of the Grand Junction Railway aforesaid and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-named line of railway for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the high road leading from Walsall to Wednesbury as aforesaid over the said last-named line of railway and extending thence southward along the middle of the said high road for a distance of two and a quarter chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the bridge which carries the same high road over the River Tame, which boundary divides the said new parish of Pleck and Bescot from the new parish of Saint Paul, Wood Green, Wednesbury aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme or representation have been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such scheme or representation and such patrons

and incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said scheme or representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme or representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of your Majesty, chapter eighty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John the Divine situate at Thorpe in the parochial chapelry of Saint Peter Sowerby within the original limits of the parish of Halifax, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Peter, Sowerby, of the new parish of Saint Mary, Sowerby, also within the original limits of the said parish of Halifax, and of the district chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ripponden, also within the original limits of the same parish, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parochial chapelry new parish and district chapelry respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Peter, Sowerby, of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Sowerby, and of the said district chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ripponden, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Divine situate at Thorpe as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Robert Bishop of the said diocese of Ripon, as such Bishop, and also as one of the

alternate patrons (in right of his See) of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Sowerby, with the consent of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone, a Member of the Commons House of Parliament, First Lord of your Majesty's Treasury, acting as such on behalf of your Majesty as the other alternate patron (in right of the Crown) of the same vicarage and with the consent of the Reverend Francis Pigou, Doctor in Divinity the vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Halifax and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the perpetual curacy of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Peter Sowerby, and of the perpetual curacy of the said district chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ripponden (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Peter, Sowerby, of the said new parish of Saint Mary, Sowerby, and of the said district chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ripponden, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint John the Divine situate at Thorpe as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Divine, Thorpe.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint John the Divine Thorpe, being:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the parochial chapelry of Saint Peter Sowerby, of the new parish of Saint Mary Sowerby, and of the district chapelry of Saint Bartholomew Ripponden, all within the original limits of the parish of Halifax, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon which said portions of such cures are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point at Kebroyd Bridge which carries the Blackstone Edge trust-road over the stream which flows through the valley called or known as Lumb Clough into the River Ryburn at which point the boundary which divides the said parochial chapelry of Saint Peter Sowerby from the new parish of Saint Mary Sowerby aforesaid meets the boundary dividing the last-named cure from the district chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Ripponden aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward and then westward along the middle of the said stream for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the southern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the buildings and premises called or known as Dean House and extending thence northward to and along the said wall or fence for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to a boundary-stone inscribed 'T. St. J. C. C. 1881. No. 1' and placed at the northern end of the same wall or fence on the southern side of Dean-lane and extending thence generally north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of eight and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Oak-lane and extending thence eastward along the middle

of the last-named lane for a distance of six and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Mary Sowerby from the parochial chapelry of Saint Peter Sowerby aforesaid and extending thence first north-westward then westward and then again north-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts thereby passing to the north of the houses called or known respectively as Deer Play and as Spout Field to the point on the northern side of the last-named house at or near to the junction of Birks-lane, Helm-lane, and Bowood-lane and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'T. St. J. C. THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, and with reference especially to Article 16 of The Foot-and-Mouth Disease No. 2 Order of 1881, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as THE CUMBERLAND (MOVEMENT OF ANIMALS) NO. 2 ORDER OF 1881, AMENDMENT.

2. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the fourteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of an offence committed on or before that day.

3. Notwithstanding anything in Article 4 of The Cumberland (Movement of Animals) No. 2 Order of 1881, animals may be moved from the District of the Local Authority of the county of Northumberland into the District of the Local Authority of the county of Cumberland, as expressly authorized by this Order, but not otherwise.

4. Animals may be moved from the District of the Local Authority of the county of Northumberland into the District of the Local Authority of the county of Cumberland for purposes of exhibition at the Brampton Agricultural Society's Show to be held at Brampton in the county of Cumberland on the sixteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

5. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person or company moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been so moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) The whole of the parish of Marsworth, in the county of Buckingham.

Cambridgeshire.—The parishes of Waterbeach, Landbeach, and Cottenham, in the petty sessional division of Cambridge, in the county of Cambridge.

(*Liberty of the Isle of Ely.*)—The whole of the parish of Thorney, and that part of the parish of Wisbech, which is situate to the west of the Old South Eau Bank, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely.

Derbyshire.—(1.) The whole of the petty sessional division of Derby, in the county of Derby, and the borough of Derby.

(2.) The petty sessional divisions of Ashbourne, and Sudbury, in the county of Derby.

(3.) The parish of Crich, in the petty sessional division of Belper, in the county of Derby.

(4.) The petty sessional division of Swadlincote, in the county of Derby.

(5.) The petty sessional division of Repton and Gresley, in the county of Derby.

(6.) The park, grounds, and premises known as Egginton Hall, in the parish of Egginton, in the county of Derby.

Dorsetshire.—(1.) The parish of Overmoigne, in the petty sessional division of Dorchester, in the county of Dorset.

(2.) The tything and hamlet of Plush in the parish of Buckland Newton, and the higher tything of Piddletrenthide in the parish of Piddletrenthide, in the petty sessional division of Cerne, in the county of Dorset.

Hampshire.—(1.) Those portions of the parishes of North Stoneham, and South Stoneham, in the county of Southampton, which are bounded on the south-east by the river Itchen, on the south-west by the road leading from Wood Mill through Burger Street to the Upper Common Gate, on the west by the Winchester road as far as the lane opposite Messrs. Bull and Son's farm, and on the north and north-east by the road leading past the Bishopstoke railway station to the river Itchen.

(2.) THE following information has been received from Mr. J. Smith, commanding the British India Steam Navigation Company's steam vessel "Abyssinia," relative to change in the Bar of Inhambane River:—

The bar, nearly four miles from the shore, appears to have shifted southward of its former position.

On bringing the entrance to bear W.S.W., a white mark, locally known as the Pedestal, and resembling the front of a chapel, will be seen on the beach on Inalinga Peninsula, and beyond it on the summit of the hill are two isolated trees (the southern being the most remarkable) with a small white pillar between them, which shows clearly in the morning.

The Pedestal just open southward of the southernmost tree leads to the bar in the deepest water—on shoaling the water on the bar, bring the Pedestal about two points on the port bow, keeping it so until well open of the southern isolated tree, and nearly in line with a small double tree; then steer towards the Pedestal, with the marks in that position, which lead clear of the shoals on the south side of the Channel.

Vessels should keep well outside the bar until the leading marks are brought on, as the water shoals quickly; and should on no account proceed above the anchorage off the Pedestal without a pilot, on account of the numerous sand banks between it and the town of Inhambane.
