THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Rome enclosing a copy of a quarantine notice issued by the Italian Government, of which the following is a translation, viz. :-

1881. Ordinance of Maritime Health. No. 3.

The Minister of the Interior having ascertained that cholera exists in Aden and at Mecca, considering for ships devoted to the transport of travellers, the passage of the Suez Canal is forbidden if they have not undergone regular quarantine.

DECREES.

ART. 1. Ships which from this day forward shall arrive at the coasts of the kingdom coming from Ottoman ports and docks on the Red Sea, without having undergone a regular quarantine in Egypt or in some port of the Mediterranean, shall be subjected to a quarantine, to be kept for three days, in every case where they shall have made the passage safely, without cases of illness. If they shall have had cases of cholera on board, or have them at the time of arrival, they shall be subjected to a strict quarantine for ten days, to be explated in a plague house.

ART 2.-Merchandise carried by such ships coming from the above-mentioned place shall be treated in accordance with the rules of quarantine of the table of the 29th April, 1867, with the exception of rags, tatters, and old unwashed clothes, the importation of which is forbidden till further notice.

The Prefects of the maritime provinces are charged with the execution of this present Ordinance. For the Minister,

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Notice issued by the Greek Government, of which the following is a translation, viz. :-

21st September, 1881, o.s.

To the Nomarchs and Eparchs of the Kingdom.

Having heard the opinion of the Royal Medical Board, convoked to-day to an extraordinary sitting, it has been directed that, besides the quarantine of eleven full days imposed by the Royal Decree of the 10th instant, upon arrivals from Aden and from places on the Asiatic and African Coasts of the Red Sea where cholera

prevails, which have not performed quarantine in Egypt, all arrivals from the above-mentioned places, which have performed quarantine beyond the Isthmus of Suez, are to be subjected to five days quarantine of observation, and that all arrivals from Egypt be admitted to pratique after a medical examination.

You are hereby requested to notify the present to all the Sanitary Authorities within your district, and call their strict attention to its fulfilments. The Minister,
