And whereas the Board of Trade have, upon the application of the Local Authorities for the places named in Schedule A hereto annexed, represented to Her Majesty that it would be expedient to alter and add to the scale of fees taken in respect of such verification and stamping of weights and measures by the Inspectors of such Local Authorities in the manner set forth in Schedule B hereto annexed :

And whereas it has been made to appear that the alterations and additions contained in the last-mentioned schedule are reasonable and proper :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to alter and add to the fees heretofore taken by the Inspectors of the Local Authorities for the places named in Schedule A hereto annexed in the manner set forth in Schedule B hereto annexed ; and the fees specified in the last-mentioned schedule shall be taken accordingly in lieu of the fees specified in the Fifth Schedule to the said Act.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances, tithings, hamlets, chapeltries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapeltry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapeltry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing, under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," it is, amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Saint Davids hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan.

"I the Right Reverend William Basil Lord Bishop of Saint Davids do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Carmarthen and my diocese of Saint Davids the vicarage of Mydrim with the parochial chapelry of Llanfihangel Abercowin annexed also in the same county and diocese.

"That Mydrim is a distinct and separate parish for all civil purposes defined by well known metes and bounds the population whereof by the census of the year 1871 was 981 and having a parish church situate in the village of Mydrim in such parish.

"That Llanfihangel Abercowin is also a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes defined by well known metes and bounds and having a population which by the census of the year 1871 was 837.

"That the said parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin contains a church which is now a chapel of ease to the parish church of Mydrim aforesaid and is distant from that parish church three miles or thereabouts by the nearest road and affords sufficient accommodation for the church-going population of the said parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin. That baptisms churchings marriages and burials have heretofore been and are now performed in the said church or chapel of Llanfihangel Abercowin.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of Mydrim with Llanfihangel Abercowin is three hundred pounds besides an annual revocable grant from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of one hundred and twenty pounds conditional on the employment of an assistant curate that it appears to me that the whole of the said civil parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin may under

the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her present Majesty chapter 106 and the 2nd and 3rd years of Her said Majesty chapter 49 be advantageously separated for ecclesiastical purposes from the said parish of Mydrim and be constituted a separate parish and perpetual curacy.

"That I am informed that the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England will be prepared to endow the said new benefice so formed if and when the same shall be disunited from Mydrim by the grant of an annual sum of two hundred pounds to the incumbent of such new benefice during the incumbency of the present vicar of Mydrim and to augment the said vicarage of Mydrim during the same period with the further annual grant of one hundred pounds for an assistant curate for that benefice in lieu of the existing grant of one hundred and twenty pounds such two grants of two hundred pounds and one hundred pounds on the cesser of the present incumbency of Mydrim to be amalgamated and to form a perpetual endowment of three hundred pounds per annum for such new benefice of Llanfihangel Abercowin.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the 26th section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and now the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and other payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of myself as patron of the said vicarage of Mydrim with Llanfihangel Abercowin and of the Reverend Rhys Thomas Jenkins the present incumbent of the said vicarage to the scheme thus proposed for separating the parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin from the parish of Mydrim and for constituting the former parish a separate benefice and a perpetual curacy to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this nineteenth day of October one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME referred to in the foregoing Representation.

"It is proposed to separate the said parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin from the said parish of Mydrim and to constitute the former a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy of which the church belonging to the said parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin shall be the parish church.

"That such perpetual curacy shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Mydrim.

"That the present existing endowment of the said parish and benefice of Mydrim shall remain undiminished with the addition of the conditional grant of one hundred pounds in substitution for the present additional grant of one hundred and twenty pounds when made by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England. That the endowment of the said new benefice of Llanfihangel Abercowin shall be the annual grant of two hun-

dred pounds during the present incumbency of the benefice of Mydrim to be increased on the cesser of such present incumbency to three hundred pounds when such respective grants shall be made by the said Commissioners.

"That baptisms churchings marriages, and burials in respect of the inhabitants of the said civil parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin shall be performed in the church of the new benefice so constituted and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of the said benefice and all ecclesiastical dues offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said benefice and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent of the said intended perpetual curacy of Llanfihangel Abercowin.

"That the incumbent of the said intended perpetual curacy shall have cure of souls within the limits thereof. That the right of nominating a minister to the church of such perpetual curacy and benefice shall be for ever vested and be in the Lord Bishop of Saint Davids for the time being the patron of the said vicarage of Mydrim. That the inhabitants of the said parish of Llanfihangel Abercowin shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Mydrim or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in that parish but shall be exclusively liable to the repairs of the said church of Llanfihangel Abercowin.

"To the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"We William Basil Lord Bishop of Saint Davids and as such the patron or the person entitled to present to the benefice of Mydrim with Llanfihangel Abercowin in the county of Carmarthen and such diocese in case the same were now vacant and I the Reverend Rhys Thomas Jenkins Clerk incumbent of the said benefice do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our consent to the scheme above proposed for separating the parish of the Llanfihangel Abercowin from the parish of Mydrim and for constituting the said first named parish a separate benefice and perpetual curacy.

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend William Basil Lord Bishop of St. Davids has represented unto us (amongst other things).

"That there is in the county of Carmarthen and diocese of St. Davids the vicarage of Mydrim with the parochial chapelry of Llanfihangel Abercowin annexed also in the same county and diocese.

"That the said chapelry of Llanfihangel Abercowin is a separate and distinct parish for all civil purposes defined by well known metes and bounds and having a population which by the census of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-one was eight hundred and thirty-seven.

"That there is in the said parochial chapelry a church or chapel which is distant from the church of the said parish of Mydrim three miles or thereabouts.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said parochial chapelry of Llanfihangel Abercowin may be advantageously separated from the said vicarage and parish church of Mydrim and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of himself the said Lord Bishop as the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefice of Mydrim with Llanfihangel Abercowin in case the same were now vacant and of the Reverend Rhys Thomas Jenkins, Clerk the incumbent of the said benefice has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to your Majesty in Council to the intent that your Majesty in Council may in case your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Bangor hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend James Colquhoun by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Bangor do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county of Merioneth and within my diocese of Bangor the vicarage and parish church of Llanfihangel-y-pennant and that the said parish is bounded partly on one side by the parish of Towyn and partly on the other side by the parish of Talyllyn.

"That the portions of the said parishes of Towyn and Talyllyn which are contiguous and adjacent to said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant are remote from the said several parish churches of Towyn and Talyllyn and in consequence thereof the inhabitants of the said portions of the said parishes of Towyn and Talyllyn are in the habit of attending Divine service in the church of Saint Davids in the said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant the same being within easy access.

"That the portion of the said parish of Towyn contiguous to the said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant contains 150 inhabitants or thereabouts and is distant from the parish church of Towyn about from five to seven miles and is distant from the said church of Saint Davids in the parish of

Llanfihangel-y-pennant about some ten yards to two miles.

"That the portion of the said parish of Talyllyn contiguous to the said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant contains 150 inhabitants or thereabouts and is distant from the parish church of Talyllyn about from two to six miles and is distant from the said church of Saint Davids in the parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant about some two hundred yards to three miles.

"That the population of the said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant amounts to 750 persons and there is ample accommodation in the churches of the said parish as well for the inhabitants of Llanfihangel-y-pennant as also for the inhabitants of the said contiguous portions of the parishes of Towyn and Talyllyn.

"That it appears to me that the portions of the parishes of Towyn and Talyllyn severally mentioned and described in the schedule hereunder written and delineated in the map or plan hereunto annexed may under the provisions of the Act of Parliament passed in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six advantageously to the cause of religion be separated from the said respective parishes of Towyn and Talyllyn and annexed to the adjoining parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it occurs to me that the alteration above proposed may be effected and I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consents in writing of myself the patron in right of my See of the said parishes of Towyn Talyllyn and Llanfihangel-y-pennant together with the consents in writing of the Reverend Titus Lewis, B.D., vicar of Towyn the Reverend Joseph Hughes, vicar of Talyllyn and the Reverend Thomas Edwards, B.A., vicar of Llanfihangel-y-pennant respectively to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and enquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consents to Her Majesty in Council.

"Given under my hand this third day of September one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one.

"The SCHEDULE above referred to.

"On the north-east side to take in that portion of the parish of Talyllyn which is bounded by Mynydd Mariafal and the River Jaga till the said stream empties itself into the Talyllyn River. It thence follows the Talyllyn River to the confines of Mariafal Ganol, the boundaries of which tenement it follows to the top of Moel caer Berllan, there meeting the Llanfihangel-y-pennant parish.

"On the north-west to take in all that portion of the parish of Towyn which touches upon or adjoins the parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant from Rhiwerfa to the River Dysynni and the intended boundary to follow that river till Talyllyn parish (a detached portion) is again reached and to take in all that portion of Talyllyn also which touches the said River Dysynni.

"On the south-west it takes in all that part of Talyllyn parish marked 1, 2, 3, being Perfeddnant Llanerchgoediogisaf and Llanerchgoedioguchaf and which is bounded by the parish of Towyn till Nant-y-mynach in the parish of Towyn is reached thence it follows the Nant-y-mynach-lan till the said lane meets the Towyn and Abergynolwyn high-road which it follows to the corner

where such road meets the Dolgoch River and this river it follows to its source on the top of the mountain on the other side of the said high road.

"On the south-east it takes in the part of Towyn bounded by the parish of Pennal from Dolgoch River to its point of contact with Llanfihangel-y-pennant parish.

"In other places the present boundary of Llanfihangel-y-pennant parish to remain an outward boundary as heretofore."

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That the portions of the said parish of Towyn mentioned and described in the above schedule and in the annexed plan be separated from the said parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant and that such portions shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Llanfihangel-y-pennant.

"That the inhabitants of the said portions of the said parish of Towyn shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Towyn and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said parish church but shall be entitled to accommodation in the said parish church of Llanfihangel-y-pennant and the church of St. Davids aforesaid and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act 1868 to the repairs of the said parish church of Llanfihangel-y-pennant.

"That the incumbent of Llanfihangel-y-pennant shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the above-described portions of the parish of Towyn.

"That the portions of the said parish of Talyllyn mentioned and described in the above schedule and in the annexed plan be separated from the said parish and be united for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Llanfihangel-y-pennant and that such portions shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Llanfihangel-y-pennant.

"That the inhabitants of the said portions of the parish of Talyllyn shall not in future be entitled to any accommodation in the said parish church of Talyllyn and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the said parish church but shall be entitled to accommodation in the said parish church of Llanfihangel-y-pennant and the said church of St. Davids and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act 1868 to the repairs of the said church.

"That the incumbent of Llanfihangel-y-pennant shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the above-described portions of the parish of Talyllyn.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage of any of the benefices affected by this scheme nor shall the endowments of any of such benefices be in anywise affected.

“ Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edward Harold Bishop of the said diocese of Winchester (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said new parish of Christ Church, Sandown, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Lower Sandown as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint John the Evangelist, Lower Sandown.’

“ All that part of the new parish of Christ Church Sandown in the Isle of Wight and in the diocese of Winchester which is bounded on the south-east by the shore of Sandown Bay on the

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Carlton aforesaid.

“And with the like consent of the said William Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Carlton as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being Provided always that so long as the Reverend Henry Sadgrove Atkinson the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Roystone shall remain such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Carlton as aforesaid shall be paid by the incumbent of such church to the said Henry Sadgrove Atkinson. And provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

“We therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

“ And whereas no specific assignment of the whole or any part of the right of patronage and nomination of the minister of the said district or (as the case might be) of the perpetual curate of the said new parish as aforesaid was made by such Order and such right of patronage and nomination has hitherto continued to be exercised in accordance with the directions in that behalf contained in the said Act.

“ And whereas a capital sum of one thousand pounds sterling has been contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England by the Reverend Edward Penrose Hathaway of No. 11, Princes-buildings, Clifton, Bristol, in the county of Somerset, Clerk in Holy Orders, towards the augmentation of the endowment of the said new parish and for the benefit of the vicar or incumbent thereof, and we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, have in respect of the said sum agreed with the said Edward Penrose Hathaway and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half yearly payments on the first day of May and on the first day of November in each and every year to the vicar or incumbent of the said new parish (being duly licensed thereto) the yearly sum of thirty-three pounds six shillings and eight pence so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

“ And whereas the said sum of one thousand pounds sterling was so contributed and paid by the said Edward Penrose Hathaway as aforesaid upon the understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said new parish and of the nomination of the vicar or incumbent thereto should be assigned to the said Edward Penrose Hathaway and his heirs and assigns in the manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“ Now therefore we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said new parish of the Holy Trinity, Oxford, and of the nomination of the vicar or incumbent thereto shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the

same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette be assigned to and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Edward Penrose Hathaway and his heirs and assigns for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act: and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

In the parish churchyard of Twerton-on-Avon, in the county of Somerset, to the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

In the parish churchyard of Mathry, in the county of Pembroke, to the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

In the parish churchyard of Welton, in the county of York, to the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

In the parish churchyard of Mevagissey, in the county of Cornwall, to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

SETTLE.—Forthwith and entirely in Settle Church, in the county of York; and also in the churchyard except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or

disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

NEWBOROUGH.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Newborough, in the county of Anglesea; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, except as follows:

In partly walled graves now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relatives of those already interred therein, as can be buried at or below that depth.

A STATUTE FOR ST. JOHN'S COLLEGE CONCERNING AN EXHIBITION FUND.

1. A Fund shall be established, to be called "The Exhibition Fund," for the purpose of maintaining Exhibitions to be held by Undergraduate members of the College.

2. Into this Fund shall be paid such a yearly sum, not exceeding 300*l.*, from the general revenues of the College as the President and Fellows may, at any Stated General Meeting, from time to time determine.

3. The annual income of this Fund shall be applied in assisting such Undergraduate members of the College as the President and Fellows may deem to be in need of assistance at the University; or, as to so much thereof as may not be required for that purpose, in such manner as they may deem best for promoting study and improvement among the Undergraduate members of the College.

4. This Statute shall be deemed to be supplemental to the general Statutes made for the College by the University of Oxford Commissioners; and the provisions of those Statutes relating to charges or payments created or authorised by them shall extend and apply to the payment hereby directed or authorised in the same manner as if this Statute had been inserted in the said general Statutes.

This Statute is made wholly for St. John's College within the meaning of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, section 30.

(2.) The parish of Elkington, in the county of Northampton.

Staffordshire.—The petty sessional division of Elford, the township of Wichnor, in the petty sessional division of Burton-upon-Trent, the township of Curborough and Elmhurst, in the petty sessional division of Rugeley, the parishes of Hints, and Drayton Bassett, and the township of Fazeley, in the petty sessional division of Shenstone, in the county of Stafford, and the boroughs of Burton-upon-Trent, and Lichfield.

Warwickshire.—(1.) The parish of Kingsbury, in the petty sessional division of Atherstone, in the county of Warwick.

(2.) The parish of Seckington, in the petty sessional division of Atherstone, in the county of Warwick.

Wiltshire.—(1.) The parish of Pertwood; so much of the parishes of Chicklade and East Knoyle as lies to the north of the road from Chicklade to Willoughby Hedge; and so much of the several parishes of Hill Deverill, Brixton Deverill, and Monkton Deverill, as lies to the south-east of the Deverill River, in the county of Wilts,

(2.) So much of the parishes of Durrington, and Bulford, respectively, in the county of Wilts, as lies to the west of the River Avon; and so much of the parish of Amesbury, in the said county, as lies to the west of the said River and to the north of the northern boundary of the main road from Amesbury to Rollestone.

(3.) The parish of Great Somerford, and so much of the parish of Little Somerford as is in the occupation of Mr. Thomas Sloper, in the county of Wilts.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Brokenborough, Charlton, and Malmesbury St. Paul (exclusive of the Local Board District of Malmesbury), in the county of Wilts, as is comprised within the inner boundaries of the Fosse-road, the road from Malmesbury to Five Lanes, and the road from Five Lanes to Long Newton.

(5.) So much of the parish of Little Hinton, in the county of Wilts, as lies to the north of the road running from Wanborough to Bishopstone; so much of the parish of Bishopstone, in the said county, as lies to the west of the new road to Bourton and the Bishopstone old road; and so much of the parish of Wanborough, in the said county, as lies within the parish of Little Hinton aforesaid.
