Venice, Novemb. 11.

THE Prince *Antonio Ottoboni* parted from hence on Monday last for *Rome*. We have an Account by an Express, That the Pope has made *Don Pietro Ottoboni* a Cardinal: It's said that the French have restored *Avignon* to the Pope.

Vienna, Novemb. 10. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 27th past give an account That after the Surrender of that Castle on the 19th Prince *Louis of Baden* decamped from thence, and having passed the *Danube* at a place called *Widflau*, marched towards *Valachia*, to settle the Winter Quarters which that Country is required to furnish for the Imperial Troops. At the same time *Generall Piccolomini* was erecting a Magazine at *Preecopia*, and had sent a Detachment under the Command of a Prince of *Holstein*, to secure the País at *Liscowa*. The news they had of the *Türks*, was, That the *Seraskier* lay with the Remains of their Army at *Soplika*, but that the Troops were in so ill a condition, and under such a Discouragement, that the least notice of the Approach of the Imperialists would in all probability disperse them.

Francfort, Nov. 16. We hear from *Suisserland*, That the Protestant Cantons have unanimously forbid their Subjects to engage themselves in the French Service, upon pain of death. Of the Troops of *Saxony* 5 Regiments are to have their Winter Quarters in the *Bergstract*, and the rest will return home.

Cologne, Nov. 22. There are now 1500 *Brandenburgers* in *Garilon* here; and 25 Companies of Foot, and 2 Troops of Horse are quartered in the *Lower Diocels*, their head Quarter being at *Trier*. The French do fortifie *Trier*; they have put 4000 Men into the place; and four Battalions more, with two Regiments of Dragoons, are daily expected there, so that the *Burgers* will be forced to lodge 20 or 30 Men in every house. The Elector of *Rhin* is on his Journey towards *Amburg*.

Aix-la-Chapelle, Nov. 23. On Thursday last arrived here 1500 *Brandenburgers*, 10 whereof are the Elector's Highness's Guards, and yet the rest are Troops of Horse and Dragoons. They shall have a *Garilon* here this Winter of 1000 men.

Munich, Novemb. 15. Their Electoral Highness's Troops arrived the 8th instant at *Spa-*

ving. The Electors went from thence the next day towards *Hanover*. On the 10th the Elector received the Homage of the County of *Ravensberg*. The 11th his Electoral Highness came to *Herward*, and the 12th to this place, where he received the Homage the day following; and yesterday his Electoral Highness parted from hence for *Berlin*.

Hamburg, Novemb. 15. The King of *Denmark* is sending the Heer *Van Lelienkroon* in the quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Emperor, to finish the Negotiation about the 6000 Dancs that are to enter into his Imperial Majesties Service; as well as to treat about other important matters. The *Lunenburgers* continue to fortifie *Ratzburg*, *Mollex*, and *Lawenburg*. The new Fortifications that are making by Order of the Duke of *Holstein Gotorp* at *Tonningen*, are advanced considerably.

Brussels, Novemb. 18. There has been Published, since my last, a Placet; by which, All Persons, of what Degree or Quality soever, are forbid to bring, or cause to be brought into these Countreys, by Sea or Land, any Wines, Brandy, Vinegar, Oyl, Salt, Prunns, or any other Commodities of the Growth of France, or the Countreys at present under its Dominion, on pain, That all those that shall bring in or receive the same into their Houses, Cellars, or Warehouses, shall, besides the Forfeiture of the Goods, together with the Ships, Boats, Wagons and Horses employed in the Importation thereof, pay 600 Guilders for every Piece of Wine, Vinegar, or Brandy, and every Tun of Oyl; 12 Guilders for every Flash, and four times the value of Salt and all other things of the Growth of France: One Third to be to the Informer, another Third to the Officer prosecuting the same, and the other to the King. All Wine-Merchants, Factors and Vintners, are, within eight days after Publication hereof, to declare in Writing, and upon Oath, to the Magistrates of the place where they reside, what Wines, &c. they have at that time in their Possession, or belonging to them (which they may sell, or otherwise dispose of) upon the Penalties above-mentioned. After the Expiration of the said eight days, the Magistrates and other Officers shall Visit the Houses, Cellars and Warehouses of the said Merchants, Factors and Vintners, to see whether the Quantity and Quality of the Wines, &c. they find there do agree with their said Declaration. The Wines, &c. that shall be brought in or found, contrary to this Prohibition, shall over and above the foresaid Penalties be seized and destroyed. All Persons that are offending in the bringing in or concealing of Wines, &c. shall be exemplarily punished. And Search shall be made, upon any Information, as well in Religious Houses and Abbeys, as others.

All persons are likewise forbid to bring in from France any Manufactures of Gold, Silver, Silk, Hair, Wool, Thread, or Cotton; as likewise any sort of Gloves, Hats, Fans, Paper, Ribbons, &c. upon pain of forfeiting the same, and paying, as well by the Importers, as Receivers, four times the Value of the said Manufactures and Merchandises. All Merchants, Factors, and Shopkeepers, shall within 10 days declare to the Magistrates, what Manufactures they have in their possession, and what they are imported, upon pain of forfeiting four times

time the value, over and above the Confiscation thereof: which Goods shall have a Mark put upon them, and may be afterwards sold. And because several Persons make it their Business to bring in the said Goods by Night, and by private ways, the King Commands that all such Persons, with those that aid and assist them, shall be punished as publick Thieves, and with forfeiture of all their Goods. And that such as shall buy or receive the same shall be punished according as the case deserves: And the said Commodities shall be publickly burnt. But because some Merchants may have sent for French Wines, &c. before they knew of this Prohibition, which may be already on their way hither, 180000 are allowed them after the Publication hereof to import the same. If any person shall inform of any French Commodities, his Name shall be concealed, and his Proportion of the Forfeiture punctually paid him. All the King's Officers are required to see this Place act strictly executed. Dated at Brussels, Novemb. 5. 1689.

Brussels, No. 21. We have an account from Mons that a Trooper of that Garison had set Fire to the great Magazine of Forage the French had provided at Cambray, consisting of 150000 Rations, which was all destroyed; after this he made his escape to Mons, where he was rewarded by the Governor with a Sum of Money, and a Lieutnant's Place, of Horse. A Spanish Party of Seventy Five Men belonging to the Garison of Ghent, had, some days ago, a Rencounter with 120 French, of whom they killed 17 upon the Place, and put the rest to Flight. The French are repairing their Line or Intrenchments from Menin to Pont-Esperies, and Monsieur Calvo is posted with a small Body of Men to cover the Workmen. The Marschal d'Humieres went on the 15th instant to view the Works, and returned the next day towards Lisle.

Hague, Novemb. 25. The States of Holland met yesterday for the first time since their last Adjournment; and have now before them a Project of fixing a time for the Consumption of all French Wines and Brandies; to which Rotterdam has already consented. The Queen of Spain is still at Dove, where the Deputies of this State do likewise continue to attend Her Majesty. The Business of Saxe-Lawenburg is towards an Accommodation.

Falmouth, Novemb. 28. Yesterday came in here the Malaga Merchant of London, William Morgan Master, in 22 days from Maleg: And the Thomas and Susanna of London, Thomas Everard Master from Maryland. By the latter we hear that the Desford Ketch was cast away there; She overset, and the Commander, who was sick in his Cabin, and 5 or 6 more, were drowned.

Plymouth, Novemb. 19. The Elizabeth, James Saunders Master, is arrived here since my last from Virginia.

Weymouth, Novemb. 20. Yesterday was brought into Portland Road a French Vessel laden with Fish from Newfoundland, which was taken the last Week by a Dutch Privateer.

Whitehall, Novemb. 19. His Majesty has been Graciously pleased to appoint Hugh Broughton Esq; to be his Consul at Venice.

Whitehall Novemb. 22. This day were presented to His Majesty three very Loyal Addresses from the Grand-Juries of the several Counties of Anglesey, Carnarvon, and Merioneth; by Thomas Burton and John Hooke Esquires, Justices of the great Sessions for North-Wales; which His Majesty received very Graciously.

Whitehall, Nov. 24. This day the Heer Hop, Comfessor and Pensionary of Amsterdam, and Envoy Extraordinary from the States-Generall of the United Provinces, had his publick Audience of Their Majesties, being conducted by Sir Charles Greville, with the usual Ceremonies.
