Her Majesty's State Trumpeters were stationed at the West Entrance of the Chapel, and announced, by a Flourish of Trumpets, as each Procession moved from the Entrance to the Chapel.

A March by Sir G. Elvey was played as the Procession moved up the Chapel.

The Royal Family and Royal Guests were conducted to the seats prepared for them upon the Haut Pas, and the other Members of the Procession were shown to the places appointed for them in the Choir by Her Majesty's Gentlemen Ushers.

The Gentlemen at Arms and Yeomen of the Guard remained in the Nave. The Lord Steward, with The Treasurer and Comptroller of the Household and The Vice-Chamberlain, returned to the West Entrance to await The Queen's arrival.
