

SCHEDULE.

An area comprising so much of the townships of Hovingham, and Scackleton, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north Banks Wood and Hovingham-road from Hovingham Mill Wood to Wiggantheorpe Lodge in the township of Hovingham, on the east the Hovingham and Scackleton-road from Wiggantheorpe Lodge to Scackleton Moor Plantation, on the south Scackleton Moor Plantation and five fields known as High field in the occupation of William Mattison, Cow-house field and Melbourns in the occupation of William Foxton, Pasture field in the occupation of John Sootheran, and the Cooms in the occupation of George Ward, and Mill Beck to Colton Mill, and on the west by a stream known as Mill Beck, from Colton Mill to Hovingham Mill Wood, in the township of Scackleton.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the tenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two. *C. I. Peel.*

SCHEDULE.

An area comprising so much of the township of Weeton, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Castley Beck, the river Wharfe, Weeton Church-lane, Huby-lane, and the Harrogate and Oley-road past Castley-lane End as far as Castley Beck.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

THE following areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking) :—

Berwickshire.—An area in the parishes of Edrom, Swinton, Whitsome, Dunse, and Fogo, in the county of Berwick, comprising Bellshiel farm, Kimmerghame Mains farm, Kimmerghame Mill farm, Harcarse farm, Harcarse Hill farm, Crowfootbank farm, Greenrig farm, Whitsome South Laws farm, Greenknowe farm, Middlestots farm, Kimmerghame Policies and Parks, Mount Pleasant farm, Mungoswalls farm, Wedderburn Policies and Parks, Cairnhill farm, Nisbet Hill farm, Nisbet Mill farm, Nisbet Policies and Parks, Bogend farm, together with all roads, public and private, bounding or intersecting the same.

Cardiganshire.—So much of the county of Cardigan as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Neuadd-ddu Cross-roads on the north, along a bye-road running in a southerly direction to Bwlch-di-hewid on the

west, thence along the highway in an easterly direction as far as Bwlch-y-Person, thence following the same highway in a north-easterly direction to the village of Ystrad, and from thence along the turnpike-road to Neuadd-ddu before-mentioned.

Cheshire.—(1.) So much of the township of Hollingworth, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road, Green-lane, then the fence running to Widdows Croft, then the fence dividing Widdows Croft and Fields farm to Mill brook, then the brook to the Manchester and Saltersbrook turnpike-road aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the township of Chorlton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Newcastle-road, commencing at the Wybunbury-road at Hough to brook bridge near Weston Hall, then the said brook to the bridge in Weepit-lane, along Weepit-lane to the gateway leading to Mr. Hodgkiss's Gousley farm, then a straight line across fields to Enoch Ellison's farm, Hough Heath, then along the Hough and Wybunbury-road to Newcastle-road aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the township of Torkington, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Goyt on the north, an occupation-road leading to Torkington farm on the south, a plantation terminating near Dom Bank Toll Bar on the east, and by the fence forming the boundary of the township of Offerton and Bosden on the west.

(4.) So much of the township of Hooton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, New Chester-road commencing in the township of Hooton at the boundary of Hooton Hall farm and lands of J. Aspinall Tobin to Hooton Toll Gate, a lane known as Hooton Green to Hooton Cottages, the boundary fence between lands in the occupation of Richard Littler to Hooton Church, the boundary fence on the south side of Hooton Park dividing the Park from lands in the occupation of Joseph Howard and James Kellet to the river Mersey, and from the river Mersey the boundary fence of Hooton Park to Chester-road.

(5.) So much of the township of Siddington, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Siddington Old Toll Bar site along Congleton-road to and along Occupation-road by Enoch Massey's farm, Marton to Marton brook, the permanent fence between William Slack's and Thomas Adshead's farms, across Blackdair-lane to Old Mere Wood side to Congleton-road and Old Toll Bar aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the township of Norton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, by Norton-lane to Halton-lane, by Halton-lane to Halton, then by Norton Priory Park wall to Astmore Bridge, then by the Bridgewater Canal to Norton Town Bridge and Norton-lane aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the township of Ridley, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Mr. Hale's farm along the Nantwich-road by Mr. Shaw's farm to Harding's cottage, thence by fence by and including Ridley Wood by fence by Thorney field, thence by fence across the Tarporley and Whitchurch-road, thence by and including Ridley Hill farm-yard, thence by
