(10.) So much of the parish of Castle Donington, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway company's line from Treut to Melbourne, the highway from Castle Donington to King's Mills, the river Trent and Stud brook, and a bridle-road from Park-lane to G. T. Eaton's Bottom farm.

(11.) The whole of the parish of East Lang-

ton, in the county of Leicester.

(12.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Leicester turnpike-road on the west, the Union Canal on the north, the road from Harborough to Great Bowden on the east, and thence northwards to the point where the canal crosses the road leading from Great Bowden to the Leicester turnpike, and the northern boundary of the parish of Little Bowden on the south.

(13.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland and the London and North-Western lines on the east and west, and boundary of the parish of Thorpe Langton on the north, and the road from Great Bowden to Langton on the south.

(14.) All lands in the parish of Welham, in the county of Leicester, lying west of the village of Welham and in the occupation of Messrs.

Hayres and King.

(15.) So much of the parish of Foxton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpikeroad from Harborough to Leicester on the west. the Midland railway line on the north, the road from Bowden Inn to Church Langton on the east, and the road from Leicester turnpike to Langton station on the south.

(16.) So much of the parish of Glooston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Gartreeroad on the south, Stouten Wood on the west, two ploughed fields and Bush meadow in the occupation of Mr. Rudkin on the north, and

Goadby-road on the east.

(17.) The whole of the parish of Blaston, and so much of the parish of Holt as lies on the east side of Blaston and bounded by five ploughed fields in the occupation of Mr. Burton, in the county of Leicester.

(18.) So much of the township of Kibworth-Harcourt, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Kibworth to Wistow on the west, Wistow brook on the north, and the Midland railway on the east and south.
(19.) The whole of the parish of West Langton,

in the county of Leicester.

(20.) So much of the parish of Allexton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Uppingham turnpike-road on the north, East Norton station, railway, and bridle-road leading to Horninghold on the west, and Allextonroad leading to Hallaton on the east and south.

(21.) So much of the parish of Noseley, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Noseleyroad and brook on the south and east, Rollestone Wood and Village road leading to New Inn and Noseley on the north and west.

(22.) At Burbage, in the parish of Aston Flamville, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Thomas Gilbert's farm on the north, the Hinckley and Lutterworth turnpike-road on

the south, Soar brook on the east, and Jibbett'slane on the west.

(23.) So much of the parishes and townships of Measham, Willesley, Oakthorpe, Strettonen-le-Fields, Appleby, and Snarestone, in the counties of Derby and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Gallows Gate along Gallows-lane to junction with the Bosworth-road, to left down Bosworth-road to the bridge over the Snarestone brook, to right along the brook course (the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester) to Pepper Bridge, to the left along the Atherstone and Measham-road by Snarestone Church to point opposite Snarestone railway station, thence to the right under the railway bridge and along the Snarestone-road to Appleby, turning to the right by Black Horse Inn along Stoney-lane to junction with Heath-lane, to the right along Heath-lane to junction with Measham and Tamworth-road at point opposite Manor House Gate, to the right down Tamworth-road to Measham Tape Mill, thence to the left along the river Mease to the foot-bridge, thence to the right along the Stretton-en-le-Fields and Oakthorpe foot-road to the Burton and Measham main-road, crossing it and up Pickering-lane by Jent's brickyard up the hill by the Shoulder of Mutton Inn. through Oakthorpe Village to the Gin Stablelane End, thence to the left along Gin Stablelane crossing the Moira and Measham turnpikeroad, along the Oakthorpe Colliery-road and occupation-road by Pastures farm to Willesleylane, and to the right along Willesley-lane to Gallows Gate aforesaid.

(24.) So much of the parishes of Market Harborough, Great Bowden, and Lubenham, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by the Canal and a line drawn therefrom eastward to Highfield House on the road from the railway station to Great Bowden all in the parish of Great Bowden, from Highfield House to the river Welland on the east, on the south by the river Welland, and on the west by a line drawn from the river Welland at Plowman's Nursery Grounds northwards to its junction with the Canal as it circles Hill Crest House, the fields in the west boundary being partly in the parish of Great Bowden and partly in the parish of Lubenham.

(25.) So much of the parish of Great Bowden, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Bowden to Thorpe Langton on the east, Langton brook on the north, Mr. Walker's big field on the south, and Mr. J. W.

Walker's Far Close on the west.

(26.) So much of the parish of Foston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turn-pike-road from Countesthorpe to Kilby, the turnpike-road from Leicester to Welford, plough land belonging to and occupied by the Reverend Wing, and the bye-road from Foston to Peatling.

(27.) So much of the lands in the county of Leicester as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Medbourne to Welham on the north, and so much of the lands in the county of Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east and south, and so much of the lands in the counties of Leicester and Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from
