

(3.) so much of the hamlet of Whittington, in the parish of Grendon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the parish of Atherstone on the east and south, the London and North-Western railway on the west, and the lane leading from Alder Mill to the Merevale Crossing on the north, and (4.) so much of the parish of Chilvers Coton, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Astley to Stockingford on the west, the road to Temple House on the north, Park Wood on the east, and High Park Wood on the south,—which were declared by Orders of Council to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

**T**HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the seventeenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following area (namely),—so much of the townships of Newton, Slaidburn, and Easington, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east side commencing at Slaidburn Bridge, then along the Slaidburn and Settle highway to Whiteholme Gate, then by boundary fence on bottom of Poor Part to Whiteholme Barn, in the township of Slaidburn, then by fence on the east side of Rough pasture to Easington-road, then on the south side along the said road to township boundary in the township of Easington, then continuing by the said road to Newton Bridge, then along the Clitheroe and Slaidburn-road to Newton brook, then along the said brook to West Meadow (on the west side), then on the north-west and north side by the outside boundary fence of Bluebutts farm to Threap Hill plantation, then by boundary fence on top of Hull Meadow, then by fence on top of Simpson's field to the Slaidburn and Hornby-road, then by Shay plantation to the river Croasdale, then by the said river Croasdale to the river Hodder at Slaidburn Bridge aforesaid,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
