

Oxford and Cambridge respectively, in the manner and under the conditions hereinafter mentioned. Such boys shall be recommended in writing by such Delegates or Syndics to the Head Master, as having passed such Local Examinations in a manner so creditable and satisfactory as to make them deserving of assistance at a Public School, for the purpose of qualifying them after receiving the education there afforded to proceed to one of the English Universities; provided that no such boy shall, at the time of being so recommended, be more than fifteen years old. The Head Master, on receiving any such recommendation, shall satisfy himself, by such means as he shall deem expedient, of the fitness of the boy so recommended to be admitted into the School as an Exhibitioner, and also that such arrangements can be made as will enable the boy at a time not later than the commencement of the Michaelmas Term next following to be entered and come into residence as a Commoner of the School. If the Head Master is so satisfied, he may elect such boy to any Exhibition tenable under this sub-section, which may either be then vacant, or be about to become vacant before the time arranged for such boy to be entered and come into residence as aforesaid. Every such election shall be conditional upon such boy being actually entered, and coming into residence within such period as aforesaid. The Exhibition shall commence and become payable from and after the day when he shall be so entered and come into residence; and shall thenceforth be tenable by such boy so long as he shall continue to be a Commoner receiving education in the School, but not further or otherwise.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the nineteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following areas (namely),—(1.) so much of the township of Chorlton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Newcastle-road, commencing at the Wybunbury-road at Hough to brook bridge near Weston Hall, then the said brook to the bridge in Weepit-lane, along Weepit-lane to the gateway leading to Mr. Hodgkiss's Gousley farm, then a straight line across fields to Enoch Ellison's farm, Hough Heath, then along the Hough and Wybunbury-road to Newcastle-road aforesaid, and (2.) so much of the township of Torkington, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Goyt on the north, an occupation-road leading to Torkington farm on the south, a plantation terminating near Dom Bank Toll Bar on the east, and by the fence forming the boundary of the township of Offerton

and Bosden on the west,—which were declared by Orders of Council dated respectively the twenty-fifth and thirty-first days of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

An area comprising so much of the parish of Royton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the townships of Royton and Crompton from Fir-lane to Spring Vale farm on the north, High Barn, High Barn-street, and Pickford-street on the east, High-street, Thorp-road, and Royton Cemetery on the south, and the boundary of the townships of Thornham and Royton from Lark Hill to Fir-lane on the west.

#### SCHEDULE.

An area comprising so much of the township of Branstone, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent from Drakelow Viaduct to Trent House Branstone, thence by the Flood Embankment to the Midland Railway leading from Burton-upon-Trent to Tamworth at Branstone village, thence by the said railway to Branstone Junction, and thence by the Birmingham Curve and the Burton-upon-Trent and Leicester line of railway to the river Trent at Drakelow Viaduct aforesaid.
