ENGLAND AND WALES, MOVEMENT INTO DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1882.

A T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 18th day of May, 1882.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT:

Lord Privy Seal. Mr. Mundella,

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honournble Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Revocation.

1. The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Movement into District) Order of 1881 is hereby from and after the commencement of this Order revoked: Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order of 1881 before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order.

Saving for Regulations in force.

2. All regulations made by a Local Authority under The Foot-and-Mouth Disease (Movement into District) Order of 1881 and in force at the commencement of this Order shall, as far as the same are not inconsistent with this Order, unless altered or revoked by the Local Authority, remain in force for such time and in such manner as if this Order had not been made.

Regulations by Local Authorities in England and Wales.

3.—(a.) Notwithstanding anything in The Foot-and-Mouth Disease No. 2 Order of 1881, any Local Authority in England or Wales may, with the view of preventing the introduction of foot-and-mouth disease into their district, make regulations for prohibiting or regulating the movement by land or water of animals into their district from the district of any other Local Authority in England or Wales or Scotland:

(o.) Provided, as follows:

- (i.) This Order does not authorize a Local Authority to make a regulation affecting movement of animals into an infected area; and
- (ii.) Any regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order shall not restrict movement of animals by railway through the district of that Local Authority.

Offences.

4. If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, or of a regulation of a Local Authority thereunder, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person or company moving or conveying the animal, and the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in which it is moved, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his or their own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Commencement.

5. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twenty-first day

of May, one thousand eight hundred and eightytwo; and words in this Order have the same meaning as in The Foot-and-Mouth Disease No. 2 Order of 1881.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as THE ENGLAND AND WALES, MOVEMENT INTO DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1882.
