## REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

## PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

## PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the 33rd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, subject to the Provisions contained in the fifth part of that Act, it shall be lawful for every Pilotage authority, by bye-law made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council from time to time, to do within its Districts all or any of the things specified in that behalf in the said section, and to repeal or alter any bye-law made in exercise of the above powers, and to make a new bye-law in lieu thereof.

And whereas the Corporation of Trinity House, of Deptford Strond, being the Pilotage Authority under the said Act for the London and English Channel Districts, the limits whereof now are "the waters of the Thames and Medway as high as London Bridge and Rochester Bridge respectively, and also the seas and channels leading thereto or therefrom, as far as Orfordness to the North and Dungeness to the South, and the seas between Dungeness and the Isle of Wight," with the consent of Her Majesty, by Order in Council, dated the first day of November, 1862, made a bye-law fixing the rates to be paid to all Trinity House Pilots for all ships piloted within the limits of the London and English Channel Districts:

And whereas the said Corporation of Trinity House have submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the repeal, from and after the thirty-first day of May instant, of the above-mentioned bye-law and the substitution from and after the thirty-first day of May instant of a new bye-law, a copy of which is set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said bye-law is proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve and signify Her consent to the said bye-law as a bye-law of the said Trinity House with respect to the pilotage of the London and English Channel Districts in lieu of the bye-law herein-before mentioned.

From and after the thirty-first day of May instant there shall be paid for all ships navigating within the limits of the London and English Channel Districts to all Trinity House Pilots in respect of their pilotage services, such dues as are specified in the Table following:—

The several Rates and Prices specified above are subject to a reduction of one-fourth part, in respect of Vessels propelled by steam, and Vessels towed by Steam Vessels, provided that if any such Vessel shall be propelled by steam, or towed by a Steam Vessel for a part only of the distance for which any such Rate or Price may be payable, the reduction of one-fourth shall be made on such part only of the said Rate or Price as shall be proportionate to the distance so propelled or towed.

A Pilot taking charge of a Foreign Vessel, on board of which there may not be any individual qualified to interpret his orders, shall be authorized to employ a person to assist him as leadman or interpreter; provided it be distinctly understood that the necessity for the employment of such person shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Corporation of Trinity House, in which case only the following rates shall be chargeable in addition to the regular Pilotage, viz.:—

For the whole run from Sea to Gravesend .. ..	£2 10 0

The additional rate, for intermediate portions of a foot, in the draft to be regulated as follows, viz.:—

For three inches and under .. No addition.

For removing a Ship or Vessel from Moorings into a Dry or Wet Dock, or from one part of the River situated above Greenwich to another part of the River so situated; or for Mooring or unmooring a Vessel with two anchors; or for putting a Vessel alongside a Pier or Wharf and remaining while Cattle or Merchandise are being discharged or taken on board; or for Mooring Vessels laden with Petroleum in accordance with the Harbour Regulations;—or for attendance while adjusting Compasses, the following charge may be made in addition to the Pilotage, viz.:—

**T**HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following areas (namely),—(1.) so much of the township of Read, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south by the Padiham and Whalley-road commencing at Newtown, thence in a westerly direction to Dunkirk Gate, thence along a fence past Clough Side Wood to Cobkerr Nook, thence along a bye-lane to Newhall Gate, thence along the highway to Winns Quarry, thence by a footpath to Symonstone Old Toll Bar, and thence by the Padiham and Whalley-road to Newtown aforesaid, and (2.) at Lytham, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from the passenger railway station along the Preston and Wyre railway to the junction cabin, east from the junction cabin along East Cliff-street across the beach by Glengarry House to the shore, south from opposite Glengarry House along the shore to Charlies Mast, west from Charlies Mast along Queen-street, Hastings-place, to the passenger railway station aforesaid,—which were declared by Orders of Council dated respectively the sixteenth day of

March, and the twenty-first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

**Cambridgeshire (Isle of Ely).**—So much of the parish of Haddenham, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Catchwater Drain and Drove on the north and west, and the main-road to St. Ives on the south.

So much of the township of Siddington, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Siddington Old Toll Bar site along Congleton-road to and along Occupation-road by Enoch Massey's farm, Marton to Marton brook, the permanent fence between William Slack's and Thomas Adshend's farms, across Blacklair-lane to Old Mere Wood side to Congleton-road and Old Toll Bar aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the township of Norton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, by Norton-lane to Halton-lane, by Halton-lane to Halton, then by Norton Priory Park wall to Astmore Bridge, then by the Bridgewater Canal to Norton Town Bridge and Norton-lane aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the township of Ridley, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Mr. Hale's farm along the Nantwich-road by Mr. Shaw's farm to Harding's cottage, thence by fence by and including Ridley Wood by fence by Thorney field, thence by fence across

the Tarporley and Whitchurch-road, thence by and including Ridley Hill farm-yard, thence by fence by and including Ridley Hall farm-yard across Ridley Hall-road, thence by and including Ridley farm, thence by fence by and including Mr. Manley's farm Cholmondley, across Whitchurch-road by and including Mr. Anker's farm, thence by fence to Harding's cottage along Nantwich-road to Mr. Hale's farm aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the township of Thingwall, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary fences and stone wall round Arrowe Park on the east, north, and west sides, and the boundary fence between the townships of Thingwall and Landican to the farm in the occupation of Alfred Mackwall, the boundary fence of that farm to Prenton brook, the boundary between the township of Thingwall and the townships of Barnston, Storeton, and Irby to Arrowe Park aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the township of Thingwall, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Prenton brook from Barnston Bridge to Woodchurch-road, Woodchurch-road by Landican to Woodchurch Green, the Chester and Parkgate turnpike-road to Toll-gate, thence by Greasby-road to Arrowe brook, from Arrowe brook to Limbolane, Pensby-road, Irby-lane, Pensby-lane to Woodchurch-road, and by Woodchurch-road to Barnston Bridge aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the township of Bredbury, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Stockport-road to Bent's-lane End, thence along Bent's-lane to Red House-lane to George-lane, along George-lane to the turn leading to the Commercial Inn, and along the Hyde-road through Woodley village to the Railway Arch.

(9.) At Eaton, in the parish of Prestbury, in the county of Chester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Havannah Mill, along Havannah-lane to and along the Manchester-road to Cock Moss-lane End, by Cock Moss-lane to and along the Congleton-road, by Bank-lane and footpath to the river Dane, and by the Dane side to the Havannah Mill aforesaid.

(10.) At Eaton, in the parish of Prestbury, in the county of Chester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, three-road ends at Eaton, along the new-road to the Manchester-road, along the Manchester-road by the Waggon and Horses public-house to Cock Moss-lane in Marton, thence along Cock Moss-lane to the Congleton-road, along the Congleton-road to three-road ends at Eaton aforesaid.

**Cornwall.**—(1.) The parish of St. Gluvias, in the county of Cornwall.

(2.) The parish of Gwinear, in the county of Cornwall.

(3.) The parish of Budock, in the county of Cornwall.

(4.) The parish of Stithians, in the county of Cornwall.

(5.) The parish of Camborne, in the county of Cornwall.

(6.) The parish of St. Agnes, in the county of Cornwall.

**Derbyshire.**—(1.) So much of the parishes and townships of Measham, Willesley, Oakthorpe, Stretton-en-le-Fields, Appleby, and Snarestone, in the counties of Derby and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say,

the road from Gallows Gate along Gallows-lane to junction with the Bosworth-road, to left down Bosworth-road to the bridge over the Snarestone brook, to right along the brook course (the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester) to Pepper Bridge, to the left along the Atherstone and Measham-road by Snarestone Church to point opposite Snarestone railway station, thence to the right under the railway bridge and along the Snarestone-road to Appleby, turning to the right by Black Horse Inn along Stoney-lane to junction with Heath-lane, to the right along Heath-lane to junction with Measham and Tamworth-road at point opposite Manor House Gate, to the right down Tamworth-road to Measham Tape Mill, thence to the left along the river Mease to the foot-bridge, thence to the right along the Stretton-en-le-Fields and Oakthorpe foot-road to the Burton and Measham main-road, crossing it and up Pickering-lane by Jent's brickyard up the hill by the Shoulder of Mutton Inn, through Oakthorpe Village to the Gin Stable-lane End, thence to the left along Gin Stable-lane crossing the Moira and Measham turnpike-road, along the Oakthorpe Colliery-road and occupation-road by Pastures farm to Willesley-lane, and to the right along Willesley-lane to Gallows Gate aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the townships of Tideswell, and Wheston, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Monks Dale brook on the south and south-west from Millers Dale to Wormhill, and Tideswell-road as far as that point where the brook crosses the road at Bramwall Dale, and from thence on the west and north by Bramwall Dale-road to Summer Cross, and roads leading from that place known as Slancote-lane and Naylor's-lane to Millers Dale Old-road, and on the east by Millers Dale Old-road to Monks Dale brook at Millers Dale.

(3.) Within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent on the south from Barton Boat in the county of Nottingham to and including a field known as Curzens Meadow at Long Eaton in the county of Derby in the occupation of John Shepperd, by a fence to Long Meadow-lane crossing the Midland railway to Clays Works, and on the east side of the Erewash railway, on the west to a point where the railway crosses the river Erewash into the county of Nottingham, on an occupation-road by John Hallam's farm in the parish of Toton, on the north to the Stapleford and Toton-road by a stream of water to the Nottingham-road by Moor Wood, by a fence in Harlya Field, on the east to a road leading to Attenborough by a fence dividing Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Handburry's land and Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Morris's by a wire fence down to Barton Boat.

(4.) So much of the townships of Hazelwood, Farnah Green, Shottle and Postern, and Windley, in the parishes of Duffield, and Windley, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Cockshut Hill on the south along the highway known as Woodfall-lane by Mosseylee to George Fearn's farm, The Clouds, Windley, from thence along the brook course to the highway at Windley, and along the highway to Livermore's Beer House at Windley top on the west, from thence in a straight line to Postern Corn Mill, and along the foot-path to Shottle Gate on the north, and on the east from Shottle Gate along Hazelwood-lane to the Depth of Lumb,

and along the foot-path to Farnah Green, and along the highway to Hazelwood Hall, and to Hazelbrow coach-road gate, and from thence in a straight line to Farnah Hall, and across the Midland Railway to Cockshut Hill aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parish of Bolsover, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway on the east from Fidlers Bridge to Shuttlewood Four Lane Ends, thence by Buttermilk-lane on the south to Nunnery Plantation, on the west by a fence which divides Walter Henry Cox's and William John Nicholson's farms to Doe Lea brook, and on the north by Doe Lea brook to the Midland Railway, along the railway bank to a stream known as The Goyt, and along The Goyt side to Fidlers Bridge aforesaid.

(6.) At Chinley, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Owler-lane and Hull-lane on the north, from Owler-lane by Brownside-lane to Milton Bridge on the east, thence from Milton Bridge by Hockham brook to Owler brook on the south, and by Owler brook to Owler-lane on the west.

(7.) At Dethick Lea, and Holloway, in the petty sessional division of Wirksworth, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Dethick on to Tansley Moor, thence on to Riber Castle and Matlock Moor, thence by Bow Wood to Mr. Lowe's house on the Cromford-road, up to Lea Mills, up to top of Holloway, thence on the top-road to Lea village, and on to the first-mentioned road from Dethick.

(8.) So much of the parish of Duffield, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Derwent on the south, and on the east along the highway leading from Milford to Duffield to a point at Castle orchard, from thence by the foot-path across the fields to Hazelwood-road at New Inn, and across the Wirksworth branch of the Midland Railway to the Three-lane Ends at Kirk-hill, from thence in a straight line across the fields to the highway at Birley Grange farm, and from thence along the boundary fence between Allestree and Duffield parishes to the river Derwent aforesaid.

(9.) At King's Newton, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Portnall's shop Melbourne along the Derby-road by the Sir Francis Burdett Inn to Breach brook, thence along the brook course to the river Trent, to the right down the river to the corner of Donington Park, turning to the right along the wood round the south-western side of Donington Park to where the wood intersects the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester at the northern corner of Samuel Stretton's Calf Croft, thence to the right along the fence on the boundary of those counties to the road from Donington to Melbourne, turning to the right along that road by Melbourne Railway station to the end of Chapel-street, and up Chapel-street to junction with the Derby-road at Portnall's shop aforesaid.

(10.) In the parishes of Newton Solney, and Repton, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Repton Cross through the village by the police station the Bulls Head Inn and the Shakespeare Inn to the cross roads at Repton Park Pond, thence to the right up the road by Broken Flats farm to (Higgotts) Newton-lane End, to the right down Newton-lane by Spooner's farm to Newton Solney, down Smedleys-lane



by the blacksmith's-shop and Plough Inn Beer-house and foot-path to the river Trent, to the right along the river Trent to Willington Bridge, thence to the right along Willington-road over Old Trent Bridge and by Repton Church to Repton Cross aforesaid.

(11.) At Sandiacre, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point on the Sandiacre and Stanton main-road known as Orchard Head Hill to a foot-path crossing two fields known as Lady Cross and Freezland in the occupation of William Shaw junior to Forster's house, along the highway to the Derby and Nottingham-road, thence to a foot-path in the parish of Risley opposite Garrat's farm, by the right to Heaton's farm and No Mans-lane, thence by a fence to Stanton Hall sheds taking the fence by the right to the Stanton and Sandiacre main-road at Orchard Head Hill aforesaid.

(12.) So much of the parishes or townships of Repton, and Foremark, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from William Waytes house Milton, along Milton-lane to a point opposite Barnett's house Repton, turning to the left over the Brook at Brook End by Paddock Wall, passing the Brook Inn up to Repton Cross, thence to the right by the Church over Old Trent Bridge along Willington-road to Willington Bridge, to the right along the Trent by Twyford Ferry to junction with the back water from Anchor Church, thence to the right along the back water, Anchor Church post, and Brook course to John Goodall's Church Close at Foremark, turning to the left to Pale Close gate, and along the eastern and southern boundary fence of Church Close to the point where the fence intersects the foot-road from Foremark to Milton village, thence to the left along the foot-road to Milton village, turning to the right through a portion of the village to William Waytes house aforesaid.

*Essex.*—So much of the parish of East Ham, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Romford-road on the north, the London, Tilbury, and Southend railway on the south, Red Post-lane, East Ham, on the east, and Upton-lane, West Ham.

*Flintshire.*—The whole of the farm known as The Dee Side House farm, situate in the township of Sealand, in the parish of Hawarden, in the petty sessional division of Hawarden, in the county of Flint, bounded on the south-west by the river Dee, on the north-west and north-east by an embankment known as The Old Bank with a water-course running parallel thereto, and on the south-east by a farm known as Wood farm.

*Herefordshire.*—(1.) At Ross, in the county of Hereford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Prince of Wales Inn along the road to Ross to the Old Maids Walk, along such Walk to the Churchyard, thence north-westward in a straight line as the crow flies to the Old Wilton-road, along the said road to the junction thereof with the New Wilton-road, along the last-mentioned road to Mr. Collins's new road, along that road to the Ross and Goodrich Ferry-road, and along that road to the Prince of Wales Inn, but exclusive of the said roads except the new road from Ross to Wilton from its junction with the old road up to the Royal Hotel.

(2.) At Ross, in the county of Hereford, comprised within the following boundaries, that

is to say, from the Ross Railway Station along the Ross and Gloucester Railway to a point opposite the upper end of the meadows lying between Rudhall and Ross occupied by Mr. T. R. Webb, Mr. W. V. Bonner, and others, thence from the Railway as the crow flies northward to the Ross and Rudhall foot-path, thence along the said foot-path and Messrs. Gould's occupation road to the Ross and Ledbury-road, down the said road and over Ross-street to the Railway, and along the Railway to the station, but exclusive of the said roads and street.

(3.) So much of the parish of Cradley, in the county of Hereford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from Steens Bridge, Cradley, by the Hereford and Worcester-road to Ridgway Cross, by a lane leading from Ridgway Cross by Tan House farm to White House farm, and from thence by Home House farm to Novering's farm in a southerly direction, and thence to Arbor Hill and Bentley's farm; on the west by a brook running from Steens Bridge to Bentley's farm known as the Leddon brook, and by the highway leading from the Hereford and Worcester-road to Bosbury.

*Lancashire.*—(1.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Cheesden-brook on the north; Royds-brook on the south; Ashworth-brook on the west; and Knowe Hill-brook on the east.

(2.) So much of the township of Worsley, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north side Green-lane Broad Oak farm, on the west side along Worsley-road Worsley Court House, on the south side along the Bridgewater Canal to Monton Bridge, and on the east side along Worsley-road to the White Horse public-house.

(3.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a fence dividing the lands in the occupation of Thomas Starkie and John Oddie on the east, a fence dividing the lands in the occupation of Edmund Stafford and Richard Pitton on the west, Dark-lane on the north, and Mokin Brow on the south.

(4.) So much of the township of Edge-worth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from the White Horse to Broadhead on the north and east, and by the highway from Hob-lane to Darwen on the south and west.

(5.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Whitewall farm on the north, Cheesden Bar on the east, Walmersley-road on the west, and the boundary of the borough of Bury on the south.

(6.) So much of the township of West-houghton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from St. James Church, Daisey Hill, to the Wesleyan Chapel, Hindley-road on the north and west, and by a public footway leading from St. James Church, Daisey Hill, past Old Sirs farm to Hindley-road on the east and south.

(7.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lan-

caster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Park Chapel on the north, Nangreaves on the east, Brookshaw on the west, and Nabs on the south.

(8.) So much of the township of Higher Booths, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Sandstone Quarries and Lollywood on the east, the fence-wall on the top of Cribden on the west, Scar Foot and Sandstone Quarries on the north, and Laund farm on the south.

(9.) So much of the parish of Royton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the townships of Royton and Crompton from Fir-lane to Spring Vale farm on the north, High Barn, High Barn-street, and Pickford-street on the east, High-street, Thorp-road, and Royton Cemetery on the south, and the boundary of the townships of Thornham and Royton from Lark Hill to Fir-lane on the west.

(10.) So much of the parish of Crompton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mossgate-road and Higher Rushcroft farm on the north, Lower Rushcroft Bardsleys and Cow-lane to Hunger Hill on the east, Scowcroft-lane Cowlshaw and the footpath through the fields to Low Crompton on the south, and Coalpit-lane, Thornham-road to Knowe, and the footpath through the fields to Samuel-lane, and Mossgate-road on the west.

(11.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Rochdale and Edenfield turnpike-road on the south, Woodhouse-lane and Rooley Moor-road on the west, Catlow-lane Head and the Rochdale borough boundary on the north, and the Rochdale borough boundary to Cut Gate on the east.

(12.) So much of the township of Castleton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Chadwick and Lower-lane on the north, Dean brook, Ginnel farm, and Lords Tenement farm on the south, Dean Houses and Dean farm on the west, and Langfield farm on the east.

*Leicestershire.*—(1.) The whole of the parishes of Goadby, and Keythorpe, and so much of the parish of Tugby as is included within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mr. Kendall's Church Close, Neather Meadow, and Sir A. Hazelrigg's Ploughed Close, and the village of Goadby on the west, Kendall's Baxted Hill, and his ten acres, Harrison's twenty acres, and Berry's Broad Meadow on the north, the Honourable Tyrwhitt Wilson's Bassetts Close on the east, Mr. Kendall's Top Hill and Side Hill fields, and the Honourable Tyrwhitt Wilson's ploughed field on the south.

(2.) The whole of the parish of Medbourne, in the county of Leicester.

(3.) The whole of the parish of Thorpe Langton, in the county of Leicester.

(4.) All lands in the parish of Welham, in the county of Leicester, lying west of the village of Welham and in the occupation of Messrs. Hayres and King.

(5.) So much of the parish of Allextion, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Uppingham turnpike-road on the north, East Norton station, railway, and bridle-road leading to Horninghold on the west, and Allextion-road leading to Hallaton on the east and south.

(6.) (8.) So much of the parish of Stonton Wyville, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stonton brook on the north and west, the road from Tur Langton to Glooston on the south, and the boundary of the parish of Glooston on the east.

(9.) So much of the parishes of East Norton, Loddington, and Tugby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the north, Uppingham turnpike-road on the south, Loddington-road on the east, and Tugby Wood-lane on the west.

(10.) So much of the parishes of Castle Donington, and Diseworth, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Kegworth-lanes to Isley Walton and Diseworth as far as N. C. Curzon's farm premises the Wilderness, thence along the south-east fence known as Stud folds to Diseworth by Samuel Fletcher's farm premises the Hall farm, by the Holbow brook as far as Mr. Archer's farm-house The Grange, up Donington-lane to the Four Turns, thence to Richard Vesty's farm-house, thence along the north fence to Hemington-lane, and thence to the Wilderness aforesaid.

(11.) So much of the parishes of Bradley cum Neville Holt, and Great Easton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Medbourne-road on the west, Blaston-road on the north, Great Easton-road and Mr. Marchant's premises on the east, and Sir Bache Cunard's American House Cropsale and Marchant's Cropsale on the south.

(12.) So much of the parish of Odstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east by certain lands in the occupation of Maria Barr, and the bridle-road from Odstone to Shackerstone, on the west by certain lands in the occupation of Elijah Timms, on the north by the turnpike-road from Odstone to Newton Burgoland, and certain lands in the occupation of B. Walker, and on the south by the river Sence, and certain lands in the occupation of Elijah Timms.

(13.) So much of the parish of Humberstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading to Thurmaston from Humberstone, road leading to Belgrave from Humberstone, Gupsey-lane, and road leading from Barkby Thorpe to Belgrave.

*Lincolnshire (Holland).*—So much of the parishes of Frieston, and Fishtoft, in the petty sessional division of the Hundreds of Kirton and Skirbeck, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Roman Bank or Old Sea Bank on the south, and west from George Fletcher's house to Hobhole Sluice, on the north by Hobhole Drain from Hobhole Sluice to Fishtoft Bridge near the Rectory, and on the east by Frieston Scrane End-road from Fishtoft Bridge to George Fletcher's house aforesaid, but exclusive of the Frieston Scrane End-road.

(3.) At Quarrington, in the Parts of Kes-

teven, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Sleaford to Grantham on the south, and towards the west to Quarrington Wash Dyke, thence on or towards the north by the Quarrington and Ranceby Beck to Lord Bristol's Top Plantation, and on or towards the north-east by certain fields in the occupation of Frederick Ward and Frederick Rippon to the said Frederick Rippon's farm buildings in the parish of Holdingham, and on or towards the south-east by Rippon's Cottages to William Clark Allen's Bouncing Hill farm, and on or towards the south by an imaginary line to the Sleaford Water Works Engine-house, the Sleaford Water Works Tank, and a certain field in the occupation of John Taylor Marston, to the highway first-mentioned.

(4.) So much of the parish of Temple Bruer, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Cuckoo-lane south and towards the west to Birds Plantation, and on or towards the north by the boundary hedge between Robert G. F. Howard's, Atley Barnes, and John Chatterton's, Temple Grange, and on or towards the east by the Blind Bob field and the Garden Close to the Fox Hills Cover, and on or towards the south by the said Fox Hills Cover, and Long Close in the occupation of the said John Chatterton to the Cuckoo-lane aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parish of Leadenham, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a public highway leading from Newark to Leadenham on the north, a lane known as The Back-lane and a lane known as Gospel-lane and an imaginary line to the Leadenham and Fulbeck parish boundary on the east, the Leadenham and Fulbeck parish boundary to the river Brant on the south, and the river Brant to the said first-mentioned highway on the west.

(6.) So much of the parish of Great Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a public highway leading from Sleaford to Boston on the north, three closes of arable land in the occupation of C. J. B. Parker on the east, four closes of arable land in the occupation of Charles Sharpe on the south, three closes of arable land in the occupation of the said Charles Sharpe one in the occupation of John Brown and one in the occupation of the said C. J. B. Parker on the west, to the said first-mentioned highway.

(7.) So much of the parish of Little Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the parish boundary line or fence running between the parishes of Great Hale and Little Hale on or towards the north and east, in part to the highway leading from Little Hale to Burton Pedwardine, and in other part from the said highway by fields in the occupation of John Hides and Julia Garratt respectively, the boundary line or fence running between Little Hale parish and Helpringham on or towards the south, fields in the occupation of Julia Garratt, Felix Tomlinson, and John Hides to the said highway leading from Little Hale to Burton Pedwardine in part on or towards the west and in other part by fields in the occupation of the said Felix Tomlinson and the said Charles Sharpe to the said first-mentioned boundary line or fence.

(8.) So much of the parish of Billingborough,

in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the forty-foot drain on the east, the Neslam Drove to William Hardy Swards new buildings on the south, four arable fields in the occupation of William Hardy Swards to the Horbling drain on the west, and the said Horbling drain to the first-mentioned forty-foot drain on the north.

(9.) So much of the parish of Temple Bruer, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Navenby to the Green Man farm, and the Green Man plantation on the north, arable fields in the occupation of Henry Bott and John Chatterton on the east, four arable fields in the occupation of John Chatterton on the south, and seven arable fields in the occupation of Henry Bott to Navenby highway on the west.

(10.) In the parish of Horbling, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, comprising the whole of the village of Horbling and the adjoining fields as far as the South Beck on the south, the Long Plantation, Sandy Gate-lane, and an imaginary line to Swaton-lane End on the east, Swaton-lane and Holland-road on the north, and the Great Northern Railway on the west.

(11.) So much of the parish of Temple Bruer, in the parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, arable fields in the occupation of John Chatterton and Henry Bott to the Green Man plantation on the west, the Green Man plantation to William Cartwright's farm buildings, Blankney, on the east, an imaginary line by arable fields in the occupation of William Cartwright, Blankney, and Henry Paddison, Scopwick, to the farm buildings of the said Henry Paddison at Scopwick Lodge on the west, and Scopwick Lodge-road the Fox Hills to the arable fields first-mentioned on the south.

*Norfolk.*—The parishes of Wiggenhall St. Mary the Virgin, Wiggenhall St. Germans, and Tilney-cum-Islington, in the county of Norfolk.

*Northamptonshire.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Weston-by-Welland, in the county of Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Wade's two fields, and Hayer's field on the east the river Welland and the London and North-Western Railway bank on the north, Smith's field and Slawston-road on the west, and Rowlatt's field and Ashley-road on the south.

(2.) So much of the lands in the county of Leicester as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Medbourne to Welham on the north, and so much of the lands in the county of Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and North-Western railway on the east and south, and so much of the lands in the counties of Leicester and Northampton as lie within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the point where the railway line crosses the Welham-road through Welham to the point at which the bridle-road enters the road from Welham to Slawston on the west.

(3.) The whole of the parish of Ashley, and the whole of the lands in the occupation of Messrs. E. Berry, Charles Berry, and Robert Wade which lie in the parish of East Carlton, in the county of Northampton.

(4.) The parish of Crick, in the county of Northampton.

(5.) The parishes of Barby, and Kilsby, in the county of Northampton.

*Nottinghamshire.*—(1.) So much of the township of Brough, in the parish of North Collingham, in the county of Nottingham, as is comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north by Norrell-lane, on or towards the east by a line leading from Mr. Barlow's farm to Norrell-lane, on or towards the south by Danethorpe-lane leading from Mr. Barlow's farm to the Foss-road, and on or towards the west by the Foss-road leading from Newark to Lincoln.

(2.) So much of the parish of Willoughby, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway commencing at the Widmerpool boundary and ending at Back-lane Willoughby on the east, the boundary river of the counties of Nottingham and Leicester on the west, Back-lane Willoughby and along the highway to Wymeswold Bridge on the south, and the boundary fence of the parishes of Willoughby and Wysall on the north.

(3.) Within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent on the south from Barton Boat in the county of Nottingham to and including a field known as Curzens Meadow at Long Eaton in the county of Derby in the occupation of John Shepperd, by a fence to Long Meadow-lane crossing the Midland railway to Clays Works, and on the east side of the Erewash railway, on the west to a point where the railway crosses the river Erewash into the county of Nottingham, on an occupation-road by John Hallam's farm in the parish of Toton, on the north to the Stapleford and Toton-road by a stream of water to the Nottingham-road by Moor Wood, by a fence in Harlys Field, on the east to a road leading to Attenborough by a fence dividing Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Handburry's land and Mr. Holbrook's and Mr. Morris's by a wire fence down to Barton Boat.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Attenborough, and Toton, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the west by a road from Barton Boat to Toton village, from thence along the Long Eaton and Nottingham-road to Chilwell brick-yard, along Bramcote-lane, on the north by Chilwell boundary fence to the Hop Pole Inn, on the east by the said boundary fence to the river Trent, on the south crossing the river Trent to Barton Wood, and along the Wood side to Barton Boat aforesaid.

*Rutland.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Caldecott, in the county of Rutland, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Welland on the south, the road leading from Thorpe-by-Water to Rockingham railway station on the north and west, and the road from Liddington to Gretton on the east.

(2.) The whole of the parish of Glaston, in the county of Rutland.

*Shropshire.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Sheriff Hales, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Lodge Wood and private road leading from thence to Lilleshall Abbey and to Lilleshall House, thence His Grace the Duke of Sutherland's drive to Sheriff Hales Manor, and thence to Lodge Wood aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parish of Baschurch, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the water-course from

Walford Heath to Fenemere brick-yard, thence the boundary fence which divides T. Slaney Eyton's property to the high-way leading from Merrington Green to Walford Heath water-course aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Hinstock, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Lightwood-lane leading from the Woodseaves and Hinstock main-road to the Chester main-road at the Sweet Apple Tree, then the Chester main-road to the foot-road at Hinstock Villa, then the foot-road from Hinstock Villa to the Woodseaves and Hinstock main-road, and thence to the end of Lightwood-lane at Mount Pleasant.

(4.) So much of the parish of Chetwynd, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road from Blue House to Canal Bridge, Chetwynd End, thence by Water-lane to Vineyard-road, along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Salop by Meertown brook, thence to Masons-place, and thence by foot-road to Blue House aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Childs Ercall, and Stoke upon Tern, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from the post office at Childs Ercall to Eaton village, thence the highway from Eaton to Ollerton village, and the highway from Ollerton to the post office at Childs Ercall aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parish of Chetwynd, in the county of Salop, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway at Pilson river bridge, then the highway from Pilson river bridge to the Chester and London main-road, then the Chester and London main-road to Chetwynd Furs, then the foot-road from Chetwynd Furs to Pickstock village, then the highway from Pickstock village to Flash brook, then the highway from Flash brook to Whitley ford river bridge, then the river Lanco from Whitley ford river bridge to the river Mase at Chetwynd park, then the river Mase to Pilson river bridge.

*Staffordshire.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Chedleton, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway from Basford to Leek as far as Leek brook (the boundary of the parish), thence by Leek brook to the boundary of the township of Bradnop, by that boundary to the road from Ball fields to Cocket Knob, and by that road and its continuation to Ringe Hay and the highway aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parish of Handsworth, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Villaroad, thence by the Hamstead or Old Walsall-road to the Tame Valley canal, thence by that canal to the boundary of the county of Warwick, and thence by that boundary to Villaroad aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Swinnerton, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the western side of the highway from Millstone Green through Acton village to Whitmore.

(4.) So much of the parish of Rushall, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Walsall to Aldridge from Longwood Locks to Darbys Crossings, thence along Bosty-lane to the Midland Railway bridge near Daw End, thence along the Midland Railway to the Birmingham Canal, and thence along that Canal to Longwood Locks aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parish of Whitmore, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the northern side of the road from Shutlaneland by Woodhouses to Nethersit Hay.

(6.) So much of the township of Weston Jones, and of the parish of High Offley, in the county of Stafford, as lies to the west of the turnpike-road from Eccleshall to Newport, and to the south of the highway or road from the said turnpike-road by Loynton and Shebdon to Batchacre Hall.

(7.) So much of the parish of Longdon, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the north-eastern side of the turnpike-road from Lichfield to Rugeley, and on the south-eastern side of How brook.

(8.) So much of the township of Longnor, in the county of Stafford, as lies on the northern side of the road from Longnor Mill through Longnor village to Crowdecote.

(9.) So much of the township of Branstone, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent from Drakelow Viaduct to Trent House Branstone, thence by the Flood Embankment to the Midland Railway leading from Burton-upon-Trent to Tamworth at Branstone village, thence by the said railway to Branstone Junction, and thence by the Birmingham Curve and the Burton-upon-Trent and Leicester line of railway to the river Trent at Drakelow Viaduct aforesaid.

*Warwickshire.*—(1.) So much of the parish of Elmdon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry turnpike-road on the north, Olton-road on the south, Elmdon-lane leading to Solihull on the east, and Olton-road leading to the Birmingham and Coventry-road on the west.

(2.) So much of the hamlet of Erdington, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway on the south, Chester-road on the east, Grange-lane on the north, and the road leading from Bromford to Erdington on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Sheldon, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bacons End to File Cross, File Cross to Mackadown, Mackadown to Marston Green, Marston Green to Windy-harbour, and Windy-harbour to Bacons End.

(4.) So much of the parish of Aston, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Chester-road from Castle Bromwich Hall to the Midland railway, thence to Bromford Bridge, to Stetchford Bridge, the river Cole to Coleford, the lane by Bucklands End, over the Green to the Coleshill turnpike-road, and on to the road to Castle Bromwich Hall aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the borough of Birmingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Tame from Lichfield-road to the Midland railway on the north and north-east, Warwick Junction canal from Tame to Church-road, Nechells, on the west and north-west, Church-road, Nechells, on the west and south-west, Washwood Heath-road on the south, and Common-lane to the Midland railway on the east.

(6.) So much of the parish of Wootton Wawen, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Alcester to Henley in Arden, and the road leading out of the said road to Hungerhill Bridge on the east, and the stream from

Hungerhill Bridge to the west boundary of the parish on the north.

(7.) The whole of the parish of Preston Baggott, in the county of Warwick, including the road on the east of that parish leading from Claverdon-road to Yarnagle Common, and so much of the parish of Rowington, in the said county, as is bounded on the east by the Birmingham and Stratford-on-Avon Canal.

*Wiltshire*.—At Laverstock and Ford, in the county of Wilts, bounded on the north by a row of elm-trees extending from a pond called Read's pond on the eastern side of the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Amesbury to a field called Buckle Corner, on the east by a row of elm-trees extending from Buckle Corner to a field called The Sling, on the south by a bank and fence extending from The Sling to a plantation called Rockshill plantation, and thence by the northern boundary of such plantation to the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Amesbury, and on the west by the eastern boundary of the said turnpike-road.

*Worcestershire*.—(1.)
