

A Pilot taking charge of a Foreign Vessel, on board of which there may not be any individual qualified to interpret his orders, shall be authorized to employ a person to assist him as leadman or interpreter; provided it be distinctly understood that the necessity for the employment of such person shall be proved to the satisfaction of the Corporation of Trinity House, in which case only the following rates shall be chargeable in addition to the regular Pilotage, viz. :—

For the whole run from Sea to Gravesend .. .. .	£2 10 0
Ditto from Gravesend to Sea .. .. .	1 0 0

The additional rate, for intermediate portions of a foot, in the draft to be regulated as follows, viz. :—

For three inches and under .. No addition.  
 For more than three inches .. The medium between the two rates.  
 For nine inches and upwards .. The rate for the next foot.

For removing a Ship or Vessel from Moorings into a Dry or Wet Dock, or from one part of the River situated above Greenwich to another part of the River so situated; or for Mooring or unmooring a Vessel with two anchors; or for putting a Vessel alongside a Pier or Wharf and remaining while Cattle or Merchandise are being discharged or taken on board; or for Mooring Vessels laden with Petroleum in accordance with the Harbour Regulations;—or for attendance while adjusting Compasses, the following charge may be made in addition to the Pilotage, viz. :—

For a Ship under 300 tons ..	£0 15 0
Ditto of 300 to 1,000 tons ..	1 0 0
Ditto above 1,000 tons ..	1 10 0

**T**HE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

2. The following areas (namely),—(1.) so much of the township of Read, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south by the Padiham and Whalley-road commencing at Newtown, thence in a westerly direction to Dunkirk Gate, thence along a fence past Clough Side Wood to Cobkerr Nook, thence along a bye-lane to Newhall Gate, thence along the highway to Winns Quarry, thence by a footpath to Symonstone Old Toll Bar, and thence by the Padiham and Whalley-road to Newtown aforesaid, and (?) at Lytham, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north from the passenger railway station along the Preston and Wyre railway to the junction cabin, east from the junction cabin along East Cliff-street across the beach by Glengarry House to the shore, south from opposite Glengarry House along the shore to Charlies Mast, west from Charlies Mast along Queen-street, Hastings-place, to the passenger railway station aforesaid,—which were declared by Orders of Council dated respectively the sixteenth day of

March, and the twenty-first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

The following areas (namely),—(1.) so much of the parish of Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Readycap Hill-road on the south, the outside of Church Grove farm, Sindridge-road by Whitehouse Common to the Blue Houses on the east, by road to White Horse Inn, Brick Kiln-lane, and Rectory-road to the Gas Works on the north and west, and (2.) so much of the parish of Stoneleigh, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Coventry and Tile Hill-road on the south, Banner-lane on the east, and Broad-lane on the north and west,—which were declared by Orders of Council dated respectively the sixth and twelfth days of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

Godson's garden, and thence the path to the Tenbury and Rochford-road,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the eleventh day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.
