

Mill Wood to Wiggantheorpe Lodge in the township of Hovingham, on the east the Hovingham and Scackleton-road from Wiggantheorpe Lodge to Scackleton Moor Plantation, on the south Scackleton Moor Plantation and five fields known as High field in the occupation of William Mattison, Cow-house field and Melbourns in the occupation of William Foxton, Pasture field in the occupation of John Sootheran, and the Cooms in the occupation of George Ward, and Mill Beck to Colton Mill, and on the west by a stream known as Mill Beck from Colton Mill to Hovingham Mill Wood, in the township of Scackleton.

(5.) So much of the township of Welburn, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the bridle-road from Welburn Church to Pretty Wood on the west, Pretty Wood, Mill Wood, and Crambe Wood on the north, the Malton and York highway from Crambe Wood to the Stone Pillars on the east, and the highway from the Stone Pillars to Welburn Church on the south, and also comprising that portion of a field known as Woodcock Bank Pasture on the west of the said highway in the occupation of William Heckley.

(6.) So much of the township of Allerston, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north the Pickering and Scarborough highway commencing at Allerston School and extending to a place one hundred yards east of the Red Houses, on the east a field-road passing on the west side of Dolly Bog Plantation to Penniston-lane, from thence on the south Penniston-lane to Allerston Railway station, and on the west the village-street from Allerston Railway station to Allerston School, and all highways lying within the said boundaries.

*Yorkshire (West Riding).*—(1.) So much of the townships of Gisburn Forest, and Tosside, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing on the north side at Tosside Chapel Smithy, then along the Settle and Slaidburn-road to Pyethorns, then on the east side by Mere Syke (Beck) to William Nelson's barn, then on the south side by White Moss Carn (fence) to Burn Ridge Chapel, then on the west side by the Bolton and Tosside-road to the starting point at Tosside Chapel Smithy aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the townships of Newsholme, and Horton-in-Gisburn, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north commencing at the river Ribble, thence by Boundary Syke by Slacks farm in the townships of Newsholme and Napper to the township boundary of Horton-in-Gisburn, thence on the east side by Boundary Syke to the Newsholme and Horton-road, thence along such road to Height Brow Bottom, thence on the south by Painley-road to the fence between Horton Green and Painley farms to Back Pasture fence, thence by the fence adjoining Stricklands farm to the Gisburn and Settle-road, thence along such road to Paythorne-lane top, thence along Paythorne-lane to the river Ribble Bridge, thence on the west side to the starting point.

(3.) So much of the township of Stansfield, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is

to say, East Lee-road on the south and east, Great House-road on the north, and East Lee Clough or Beck on the west until it joins East Lee-road aforesaid.

(4.) The whole of the township of Healaugh, in the West Riding of the county of York.

(5.) At Guiseley, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south and west by the Leeds and Otley highway, on the north by Buckle-lane, and on the east by Moor-lane.

(6.) So much of the township of Rathmell, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north commencing at Rathmell Mill, thence by School-lane to Rathmell Village, thence by Settle-road to Liniams Syke at the bottom of Rathmell Brow, thence by the said Syke to the river Ribble; on the east by the river Ribble to Rathmell Beck; on the south by Rathmell Beck to junction of Hollow Gill Beck, thence by the said Beck to a point where it joins Knowles Reaker Pasture; and on the west by the east fences of fields known as Knowles Reaker and High Meadow, thence by the north fence of a field known as Barn Shaw, and thence by the west fence of Low Gill Pasture and Wood to the starting point.

(7.) So much of the townships of Horton-in-Gisburn, Newsholme, Nappa, and Swinden, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north side commencing at Slack Syke with junction of the river Ribble, thence along Slack Syke to the Settle and Gisburn-road, thence along the Settle and Gisburn-road to Nappa-lane, thence by Nappa-lane to Swinden township boundary, and along Nappa-lane by Swinden Moor Head to a point at Limestone Quarry; on the east by Horton-in-Gisburn township boundary fence to the point where it crosses the Skipton and Clitheroe-road; on the south along the inner side fence of the Skipton and Clitheroe-road to Monks Bridge, thence by Stock Beck to the river Ribble; and on the west by the river Ribble to where Slack Syke runs into that river at the starting point.

(8.) So much of the township of Weeton, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Castley Beck, the river Wharfe, Weeton Church-lane, Huby-lane, and the Harrogate and Otley-road past Castley-lane End as far as Castley Beck.

(9.) So much of the townships of Stainforth, Halton Gill, and Malham Moor, in the West Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north commencing at a point called Far End of Moor Heads, then by townships boundary fences to the top of Pennyghent Hill at the east end, on the east by the fence adjoining School Allotment to Blishmer Barn, thence by west close fence to the top of Fountains Fell, on the south by fence adjoining Rough lands and Rainscar Fell to Sannett Hall farm at Catterick-road, and on the west by Catterick-road to Silverdale-road, thence by Moor Heads-road to Far End of Moor Heads aforesaid.
