

the Burton-upon-Trent and Leicester line of railway to the river Trent at Drakelow Viaduct aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the parish of Forton, in the county of Stafford, and of the township of Chetwynd Aston, in the county of Salop, as lies between the following boundary, that is to say, the main-road from Newport to Coley Mill, Moreton-brook, the Shropshire Union Railway, and the brook which runs from near Chetwynd Aston village to the main-road aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the township of Branstone, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent from Trent House, Branstone, to the boundary between the townships of Branstone and Dunstall, thence by that boundary to the Trent and Mersey Canal near Tatenhill Lock, thence by the said Canal to the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent at Shobnall, thence by that boundary to the Midland Railway leading from Burton-upon-Trent to Tamworth near Branstone Junction, and thence by the said Railway to the flood embankment at Branstone village, and thence by the said embankment to Trent House, Branstone, aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the parish of Forton, in the county of Stafford, and of the parish of Newport and the township of Chetwynd Aston, in the county of Salop, as is bounded by the main-road from Coley Mill to Newport, Tanhouse-lane, the Shropshire Union Canal, Meer-town brook, Aqualate Meer, and Moreton brook.

(10.) So much of the townships of Dunstall, and Tatenhill, in the county of Stafford, as lies between the main-road from Burton-upon-Trent to Lichfield, the highway from Barton-under-Needwood village to the cross-roads at the southern end of Tatenhill village, and the highway thence to Branstone.

Warwickshire.—(1.) So much of the hamlet of Erdington, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Midland railway on the south, Chester-road on the east, Grange-lane on the north, and the road leading from Bromford to Erdington on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Wootton Waven, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Alcester to Henley in Arden, and the road leading out of the said road to Hungerhill Bridge on the east, and the stream from Hungerhill Bridge to the west boundary of the parish on the north.

(3.) The whole of the parish of Preston Baggott, in the county of Warwick, including the road on the east of that parish leading from Claverdon-road to Yarnagle Common, and so much of the parish of Rowington, in the said county, as is bounded on the east by the Birmingham and Stratford-on-Avon Canal.

(4.) The whole of the parish of Bulkington, in the county of Warwick.

Wiltshire.—(1.) At Laverstock and Ford, in the county of Wilts, bounded on the north by a row of elm-trees extending from a pond called Read's pond on the eastern side of the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Amesbury to a field called Buckle Corner, on the east by a row of elm-trees extending from Buckle Corner to a field called The Sling, on the south by a bank and fence extending from The Sling to

a plantation called Rockshill plantation, and thence by the northern boundary of such plantation to the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Amesbury, and on the west by the eastern boundary of the said turnpike-road.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Stratford, and Fugglestone St. Peter, in the county of Wilts, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north by the southern fence of the main-road from Wilton to Woodford from the Direction Post at New Cut on the Devizes-road to the top of Camp Hill, from thence by a straight line across the Down to Little Durnford Lodge, and on the east by the eastern fence of and including the main-road from Woodford to Salisbury from Little Durnford Lodge to the county bridge crossing the river Avon at Stratford-sub-Castle, and on the south by a straight line from the county bridge at Stratford-sub-Castle across an orchard in the occupation of William Allen to a hedge extending from the western side of the orchard to the Devizes-road, and on the west by the eastern fence of the old turnpike-road from Salisbury to Devizes from the said hedge to the Direction Post at New Cut on the Devizes-road aforesaid.

Worcestershire.—So much of the parish of Yardley, in the county of Worcester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Paradise and Church roads, Yardley Wood, on the east, Stoney-lane on the west, Billesley Common-lane on the north, and Wurstock-lane on the south from Hannah-lane to Church-road, Yardley Wood, aforesaid.

Yorkshire (East Riding).—(1.) So much of the parish of Grindall, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from North Burton to Boynton on the east and south, and a quickwood fence dividing a grass field and tillage fields on the north and west sides in the same occupation and known by the name of the Back Garth.

(2.) So much of the parish of Hunmanby, in the Dickering petty sessional division, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Hunmanby to Rudston on the east, certain quickwood fences dividing tillage fields from the grass field known as Cowpasture, in the occupation of Hannah Lowish, on the north, south, and west.

Yorkshire (North Riding).—(1.) So much of the parish of Dalby-cum-Skewsby, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Garforth's plantation on the north, part of the Scackleton and Dalby-road and the Bushfield in the occupation of Christopher Gibson of Scackleton on the east, four grassfields known as Hagwoom Hill in the occupation of John Rook Farlington on the south, and the Hag Wood and Guide Postfield in the occupation of Robert Dobson on the west.

(2.) So much of the townships of Henderskelfe, and Welburn, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the outward boundary of the said township of Henderskelfe on the east, north, and west, and on the south by nine fields known as the Lords Moor, Moorhouse-Cottage-Pasture, Woodward's Moor, and Craven's Moor, all in the occupation of Richard Waller, Edith Woodward, Jabez Craven, and the Trustees of the Earl of Carlisle.
