PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "The Weights and Measures Act, 1878," it is (among other things) provided that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the amount of error to be tolerated in local standards when verified or re-verified by the Board of Trade, and to revoke and vary any Order made for the purposes of the Act:

And whereas it is by the same Act also provided, that the provisions of the said Act with respect to defining the amount of error to be tolerated in local standards when verified or re-verified, shall apply to defining the amount of error to be tolerated in any copies of the models of gasholders verified and deposited in the Standards Department of the Board of Trade as are provided by any Justices, Council, Commissioners, or other local authority in pursuance of the Act of the Session of the twenty-second and twenty-third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, chapter sixty-six, intituled "An Act for regulating measures used in the sales of Gas," and of the Acts amending the same:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 4th day of February 1879, Her Majesty was pleased to define the amounts of errors to be then tolerated in the local standards referred to in the Schedule annexed to the said Order:

And whereas it has been now made to appear that further amounts of errors should be hereafter tolerated on such standards, and that there should be also defined the amounts of errors to be hereafter tolerated on certain new denominations of local standards made since the passing of the said Order:

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order so made should be revoked:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to revoke the said Order of the 4th day of February 1879, and to define that the amounts of errors set forth in the Schedule hereto may from and after the date of this Order be tolerated in local standards when verified or re-verified by the Board of Trade.

PRESENT.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Merchant Shipping (Colonial) Act, 1869, it is (among other things) enacted, that where the Legislature of any British Possession provides for the examination of and grant of certificates of competency to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British ships, and the Board of Trade reports to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons, and in the like manner, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council,—

1. To declare that the said certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.
2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to certificates of competency granted under those Acts shall apply to the certificates referred to in the said Order.
3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said certificates and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations.

And that upon the publication in the London Gazette of any such Order in Council as last aforesaid, the provisions therein contained shall, from a date to be mentioned for the purpose in such Order, take effect as if they had been contained in the Act, and that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to revoke any Order made as aforesaid.

And whereas the Legislatures of the British Possessions of—

Canada.
Malta and its Dependencies.
Victoria.
New Zealand.
New South Wales.
South Australia.

Tasmania.
Bengal.
Newfoundland.
Bombay, and
Queensland,

have respectively provided for the examination of and grant of certificates of competency to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British ships, which certificates are hereinafter denominated Colonial Certificates of Competency, and the Board of Trade have reported to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the said examinations are so conducted as to be equally efficient as the examinations for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and that the certificates are granted on such principles as to show the like qualifications and competency as those granted under the said Acts, and are liable to be forfeited for the like reasons and in the like manner.

And whereas Her Majesty by various Orders in Council, and certain Orders in Council amending the same, has been pleased to declare, that subject to certain conditions and regulations therein contained the Colonial Certificates of Competency therein referred to granted by—

- (a.) The Minister of Marine and Fisheries in Canada.
- (b.) The Head of the Government of Malta and its Dependencies.
- (c.) The Steam Navigation Board of Victoria appointed by the Government of Victoria.
- (d.) The Governor for the time being of New Zealand.
- (e.) The Marine Board of New South Wales.
- (f.) The Marine Board of South Australia.
- (g.) The Governor of Tasmania.
- (h.) The Lieutenant-Governor of Bengal.
- (i.) The Governor of Newfoundland.
- (j.) The Governor of Bombay.
- (k.) The Marine Board of Queensland,

shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

And whereas by the condition or regulation numbered five contained in each of the said recited Orders in Council it is provided that such Colonial Certificates of Competency shall be granted only to persons who for a period of three years immediately preceding their application for such Colonial Certificates, or who for several periods amounting together to three years, the earliest of which shall have commenced within five years prior to such application have been domiciled in or have served in a ship or ships registered in the said possessions respectively, and that Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

And whereas it has been represented to Her Majesty in Council that the provisions of the said fifth condition or regulation in the said recited Orders in Council should be rescinded, and that other provisions should be substituted in lieu thereof.

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said recited Orders in Council should be revoked, and a new Order in Council, modified and amended in manner aforesaid, substituted in lieu thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, doth hereby direct that from and after the first day of October 1882, the following Orders in Council; that is to say,

- (a.) An Order in Council dated the 19th day

of August 1871 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries in Canada ;

(b.) An Order in Council dated the 12th day of May 1874 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Head of the Government of the Possession of Malta and its Dependencies ;

(c.) An Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Steam Navigation Board of Victoria appointed by the Governor of the said Possession of Victoria ;

(d.) An Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor for the time being of the Possession of New Zealand ;

(e.) An Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Marine Board of the Possession of New South Wales ;

(f.) An Order in Council dated the 12th day of February 1876 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Marine Board of South Australia ;

(g.) An Order in Council dated the 20th day of November 1880 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor of the Possession of Tasmania ;

(h.) An Order in Council dated the 27th day of June 1876 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Lieutenant-Governor of the Possession of Bengal ;

(i.) An Order in Council dated the 14th day of May 1877 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor of the Possession of Newfoundland ;

(j.) An Order in Council dated the 11th day of July 1877 relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor of the Possession of Bombay ;

(k.) An Order in Council dated the 26th day of March, 1878, relating to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Marine Board of the Possession of Queensland ;

shall be and the same are hereby revoked ; provided, however, that the revocation of the said Orders in Council shall not affect or invalidate any Colonial Certificate of Competency previously granted thereunder.

And Her Majesty is further pleased—

1. To declare that the Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by—

- (l.) The Minister of Marine and Fisheries in the Possession of Canada, and the Governor of the Possession of Newfoundland to persons intending to act as masters and mates on board British ships ;
- (m.) The Head of the Government of the Possession of Malta and its Dependencies, the Governor for the time being of the Possession of New Zealand, the Governor of the Possession of Tasmania, the Marine Board of the Possession of Queensland, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Possession of Bengal, and the Governor of the Possession of Bombay, to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers on board British ships ;
- (n.) The Steam Navigation Board of Victoria appointed by the Government of the Possession of Victoria to persons intending to act as masters, mates, or engineers of British seagoing steamships ;
- (o.) The Marine Board of the Possession of

New South Wales to persons intending to act as masters, first mates, or second mates, or as first class engineers, or second class engineers on board British ships ;

- (p.) The Marine Board of the Possession of South Australia to persons intending to act as masters, first mates, only mates, or second mates, or first class engineers, or second class engineers, on board British ships ;

shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts.

2. To declare that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted under those Acts, except so much of the 139th Section of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and the 10th Section of the Merchant Shipping Amendment Act, 1862, as requires the delivery by the Board of Trade to any master, mate, or engineer of a copy of any certificate to which he appears to be entitled as therein mentioned, so much of the third paragraph of the 23rd Section of the said last-mentioned Act as requires at the conclusion of a case relating to the cancelling or suspending of a certificate such certificate if cancelled or suspended, to be forwarded to the Board of Trade, and the whole of the provisions of the fourth paragraph of the same Section shall apply to such colonial certificates of competency, provided, however, that the foregoing exceptions shall not, as regards Colonial Certificates of Competency granted by the Governor for the time being of the British Possession of New Zealand interfere with or suspend the operation of an Act of the Legislature of New Zealand entitled the Merchant Shipping Acts Adoption Act, 1869 (32 and 33 Vict., No. 5).

3. To impose and make the conditions and regulations set out in the schedule hereto, numbered 1 to 10 respectively, with respect to the said Colonial Certificates of Competency, and to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension thereof, and to impose for the breach of such conditions and regulations the penalties therein mentioned.

This Order shall take effect in each of the said Possessions from and after the first day of October, 1882, and shall apply not only to Colonial Certificates of Competency granted under this Order, but also to such as shall have been granted under the Orders hereby revoked and be subsisting at the above date.

SCHEDULE.

CONDITIONS AND REGULATIONS with respect to the use, issue, delivery, cancellation, and suspension of Colonial Certificate of Competency.

Interpretation Clause.

1. In the construction and for the purposes of these conditions and regulation, the following terms shall have the respective meanings hereinafter assigned to them that is to say :—

“*Colonial Certificate of Competency*” shall mean a certificate of Competency authorized to be granted by the Legislative authority of a British Possession to persons intending to act as Masters, Mates, or Engineers of British ships on similar principles and conditions as those granted under the Imperial Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

“*Authority*” shall mean the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Administrator, Head of the Government, Minister, Board, Body or Corporation of or in any British Possession for the time being authorised by the Legislature of such Possession to grant Colonial Certificates of Competency.

Form of Certificate.

2. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be on parchment, and as nearly as possible similar in shape and form to the corresponding Certificate of Competency for the Foreign Trade granted by the Board of Trade under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

Name of Possession to be inserted.

3. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall have the name of the British possession in which the same is granted, inserted prominently on its face and back.

Certificates to be numbered consecutively.

4. The Colonial Certificates of Competency granted in each British Possession shall be numbered in consecutive order.

Lists of Certificates granted, cancelled, &c., to be sent to Registrar-General of Seamen.

5. The Authority in each British possession shall furnish the Registrar-General of Seamen in London, from time to time, with accurate lists of all such Colonial Certificates of Competency as may be granted therein or as may for any cause whatsoever be cancelled, suspended, renewed, or re-issued; and shall also furnish him with duplicates of the applications for examination made by the persons to whom such Certificates are granted.

Certificates to be granted only upon proof of service at Sea.

5. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be granted only upon proof that the previous service at sea of the person applying for the same has been such as is required by the regulations for the time being in force in the United Kingdom with respect to certificates of the like grade.

Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation, or upon any false, incorrect or insufficient proof, certificate, or report of service, qualification, conduct, or character shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates not to be granted when former are cancelled.

6. A Colonial Certificate of Competency shall not be granted to any person who may have had a certificate, whether granted by the Board of Trade or by the Government of a British possession, cancelled or suspended under the provisions of the said Acts or of any Act for the time being in force in any part of Her Majesty's dominions, unless the period of suspension has expired, or unless intimation has been received from the Board of Trade, or the authority by whom the cancelled or suspended certificate was originally granted, to the effect that no objection to the grant of such Colonial Certificate is known to exist, or unless a new certificate has been granted to him by such board or authority; and in the last-named event no such Colonial Certificate of Competency shall be for a higher grade than the certificate so last granted as aforesaid.

Colonial Certificates of Competency granted contrary to this regulation shall be regarded as improperly granted.

Certificates improperly granted may be cancelled without formal investigation.

7. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which appears from information subsequently acquired, or otherwise, to have been improperly granted, whether in the above or in any other respect, may be cancelled by the authority by which the same was granted, or by the Board of Trade in the United Kingdom, without any formal investigation under "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," and the holder of such certificate shall thereupon deliver it to the Board of Trade or such authority or as

they or either of them may direct, and in default thereof shall incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Cancellation, &c., of a Certificate shall involve cancellation of all the other Certificates possessed by its Owner.

8. Every decision with respect to the cancellation or suspension of a certificate pronounced by any board, court, or tribunal under the provisions of the said Acts, shall extend equally to all the Colonial Certificates at the time possessed by the person in respect of whom the decision is made, as well as to all certificates granted to him under any of the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, and whether such certificates be specified in such decisions or not.

Certificates believed to be fraudulent may be demanded.

9. Any officer of the Board of Trade, or the Registrar-General of Seamen, or any of his officers, or a superintendent of a mercantile marine office, or a consular officer, or duly appointed shipping officer in a British possession, may demand the delivery to him of any Colonial Certificate of Competency which he has reason to believe has been improperly issued, or is forged, altered, cancelled, or suspended, or to which the person using it is not justly entitled, and may detain such certificate for a reasonable period for the purpose of making inquiries respecting such issue, forgery, alteration, cancellation, suspension or possession, and any person who, without reasonable cause, neglects or refuses to comply with such demand shall incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds or its equivalent in local currency, which shall be recoverable in the same manner as penalties imposed by the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping are thereby made recoverable.

Suspended Certificates to be re-issued only by Colony by which originally granted.

10. A Colonial Certificate of Competency which has from any cause been cancelled or suspended, shall be renewed or re-issued only by the Authority by which the same was originally granted.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or

(as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation one month before such representation is so considered: provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by an Order in Council bearing date the 12th day of December, 1874, burials were directed to be discontinued in the parish of Tynemouth, in the words following:—

TYNEMOUTH.—Forthwith wholly in the North Shields and Tynemouth Cemetery, except in vaults which can be used without baling out water, or disturbance of soil that has been buried in, each coffin buried in which shall be separately enclosed in an air-tight manner, and except in earthen graves not less than five feet deep, free from remains and from water, and which have not been previously buried in, every coffin buried in which shall be enclosed by concrete and covered with it at least six inches thick.

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the said Parish ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that he is of opinion that the said Order of Her Majesty in Council as affecting burials in the said parish should be varied in the following manner, viz.:—

By the omission of the words after "except" to "thick," and by the substitution in their stead of the following words—

"as follows (a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the cemetery burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:

"(b.) In such reserved grave spaces in the cemetery as have never before been buried in and when opened are free from water burials may be allowed of so many

"members of the families to whom they have been allotted as can be buried at or below the depth of five feet."

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fourteenth day of August next:

THE following areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):—

Cheshire.—So much of the township of Bredbury, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Stockport-road to Bent's-lane End, thence along Bent's-lane to Red House-lane to George-lane, along George-lane to the turn leading to the Commercial Inn, and along the Hyde-road through Woodley village to the Railway Arch.

So much of the parish of Worthenbury, in the county of Flint, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Whitchurch and Wrexham-road to Green-lane on the north, the Bangor and Worthenbury-road to Worthenbury on the north-east, Green-lane to the outer boundary of Emral Park to Pandly Bridge and Halghton Mill on the south-west.

Herefordshire.—(1.) At Ross, in the county of Hereford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Prince of Wales Inn along the road to Ross to the Old Maids Walk, along such Walk to the Churchyard, thence north-westward in a straight line as the crow flies to the Old Wilton-road, along the said road to the junction thereof with the New Wilton-road, along the last-mentioned road to Mr. Collins's new road, along that road to the Ross and Goodrich Ferry-road, and along that road to the Prince of Wales Inn, but exclusive of the said roads except the new road from Ross to Wilton from its junction with the old road up to the Royal Hotel.

(2.) So much of the township of Walmersley-cum-Shuttleworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Park Chapel on the north, Nan-greaves on the east, Brookshaw on the west, and Nabs on the south.

(3.)
