WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-fifth day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Tilehurst in the county of Berks and in the diocese of Oxford.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Tilehurst which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas by a certain deed or indenture bearing date on or about the sixth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two and made or expressed to be made under the provisions of ‘The New Parishes Acts 1843, 1844 and 1856’ or some or one of them between John Henry Blagrove of Calcot Park, near Reading in the said county of Berks Esquire of the first,

part us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the second part and George Pringle of No. 10 Whitehall-place in the city of Westminster, Esquire of the third part (which deed or indenture is intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division of your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said John Henry Blagrove did grant and confirm unto said George Pringle and his heirs a certain piece of ground situate in Broad-street in the town of Reading aforesaid which same piece of ground is more particularly described in the said deed or indenture together with the messuage or dwelling-house and buildings erected and standing upon the said piece of ground and known as No. 100 Broad-street aforesaid subject nevertheless to the indenture of lease the particulars of which are set forth in the said deed to have and to hold the said piece of ground with the messuage or dwelling-house and buildings thereon erected and standing as aforesaid unto the said George Pringle and his heirs to the use and intent that the minister of the said proposed district (intended as is mentioned in the said deed or indenture to be named ‘The District of Saint George Tilehurst,’) so soon as a minister shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the same Act then the incumbent of such new parish and his or their successors ministers or incumbents of the said proposed district or new parish for the time being shall for ever have receive and take one perpetual clear yearly rent-charge or net annual sum of fifty pounds to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon the said hereditaments and premises above mentioned.

“And whereas by a certain other deed or indenture also bearing date the sixth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two and likewise made and expressed to be made under the provisions of ‘The New Parishes Acts, 1843, 1844 and 1856’ or some or one of them between the Reverend John William Routh rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Tilehurst of the first part the President and Scholars of the College of Saint Mary Magdalene in the University of Oxford, the patrons of the same rectory of the second part the Right Reverend John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford of the third part and us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England of the fourth part (which said last-mentioned deed or indenture is likewise intended to be enrolled in the Chancery Division

of your Majesty's High Court of Justice) the said John William Routh did grant and confirm unto the minister or incumbent aforesaid of the said proposed district or new parish of Saint George Tilehurst when appointed and licensed as aforesaid and to his successors for the time being one perpetual clear yearly rent-charge or net annual sum of two hundred pounds to be for ever issuing and payable out of and charged upon the whole of the endowments and revenues of the said rectory of the parish of Tilehurst aforesaid, subject nevertheless to a proviso that of the said annual sum of two hundred pounds, one hundred and fifty pounds per annum shall not become payable to the minister or incumbent of the said proposed district or new parish until after the next avoidance of the said rectory of the parish of Tilehurst aforesaid and that upon and from and for ever after such next avoidance the whole of the said yearly sum of two hundred pounds shall become so payable.

"And whereas the said piece of ground situate in Broad-street in the town of Reading has been so granted and confirmed as aforesaid and the said yearly rent-charge upon the endowments and revenues of the rectory of the parish of Tilehurst has been so granted and confirmed as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England should out of our common fund created by the hereinbefore firstly mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish of Saint George Tilehurst when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of fifty pounds per annum and upon the further understanding and condition expressed and set forth in both of the above quoted deeds or indentures bearing date respectively the sixth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two as aforesaid that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned to the said John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford as such Bishop.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty one hundred and eleven.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said parish of Tilehurst which is described in the schedule hereunder written and is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed shall upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme become and be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes and that the same shall be named 'The District of Saint George Tilehurst.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said district and so soon as the same district shall have become a new parish as aforesaid then of such new parish and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and be vested in and

shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said John Fielder Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford and by his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Saint George, Tilehurst, being :—

All that part of the parish of Tilehurst in the county of Berks and in the diocese of Oxford which is bounded on the south and on the west by an imaginary line commencing in the middle of Peg's Green-lane at the point where the boundary which divides the said parish of Tilehurst from the parish of Saint Mary Reading in the county and diocese aforesaid diverges northward from the said lane and extending thence westward along the middle of the same lane for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to its junction with Water-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'T. St. G. D. 1882 No. 1' and placed at the western angle where the same lane bends towards the north-east and continuing thence that is to say from the last-described point still north-westward to the said boundary-stone and from thence in a direct line still north-westward for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to the point where the road or lane leading from Tilehurst through Northcott into the Reading and Oxford road, is joined by the public footpath leading towards Reading at or near to which point of junction a boundary-stone inscribed 'T. St. G. D. 1882, No. 2' has been placed and extending hence north-eastward along the middle of the last-described road or lane for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts thereby passing through Northcott aforesaid, to the junction of the same road or lane with the Reading and Oxford road aforesaid and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the same road for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction (near the milestone indicating a distance of two miles from Reading) with a certain occupation road leading to the River Thames and extending thence that is to say from the said Reading and Oxford road northward along the middle of the said occupation road for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts, thereby passing under the line of the Great Western Railway, to the point where the same occupation road joins the towpath on the southern bank of the said river and continuing thence still northward and in a direct line across the said towpath to the county boundary in the middle of the same river which boundary divides the said parish of Tilehurst from the parish of Mapledurham, in the county of Oxford and in the diocese of Oxford aforesaid. All which said hereinbefore described part of the parish of Tilehurst aforesaid is bounded on the remaining sides, other than upon the south and west as aforesaid that is to say, upon the north and upon the east as follows : upon the north by the parish of Mapledurham aforesaid or in other words by the River Thames aforesaid, and upon the east partly by the said parish of Saint Mary Reading and partly by the new parish of the Holy Trinity Reading both in

the said county of Berks and in the diocese of Oxford aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patrons and to the incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Tilehurst out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such patrons and incumbent have respectively signified their assent to such scheme :

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council : Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

Elwood's Hill farm on or towards the south, the boundary hedge between the said two farms running westward to B. P. Coulsen's farm in Brauncewell on or towards the west, a boundary hedge between the farm in the occupation of the said B. P. Parker on the east, four closes of arable land in the occupation of Charles Sharpe on the south, three closes of arable land in the occupation of the said Charles Sharpe one in the occupation of John Brown and one in the occupation of the said C. J. B. Parker on the west, to the said first-mentioned highway; (4) so much of the parish of Little Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the parish boundary line or fence running between the parishes of Great Hale and Little Hale on or towards the north and east, in part to the highway leading from Little Hale to Burton Pedwardine, and in other part from the said highway by fields in the occupation of John Hides and Julia Garratt respectively, the boundary line or fence running between Little Hale parish and Helpringham on or towards the south, fields in the occupation of Julia Garratt, Felix Tomlinson, and John Hides to the said highway leading from Little Hale to Burton Pedwardine in part on or towards the west and in other part by fields in the occupation of the said Felix Tomlinson and the said Charles Sharpe to the said first-mentioned boundary line or fence; and (5.) in the parish of Horbling, in the parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, comprising the whole of the village of Horbling and the adjoining fields as far as the South Beck on the south, the Long Plantation, Sandy Gate-lane, and an imaginary line to Swaton-lane End on the east, Swaton-lane and Holland-road on the north, and the Great Northern Railway on the west;—which were declared by Orders of Council to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

THE following areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):—

Cheshire.—So much of the township of Bredbury, in the county of Chester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Stockport-road to Bent's-lane End, thence along Bent's-lane to Red House-lane to George-lane, along George-lane to the turn leading to the Commercial Inn, and along the Hyde-road through Woodley village to the Railway Arch.

Derbyshire.—(1.) At Sandiacre, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point on the Sandiacre and Stanton main-road known as Orchard Head Hill to a foot-path crossing two fields known as Lady Cross and Freezland in the occupation of William Shaw junior to Forster's house, along the highway to the Derby and Nottingham-road, thence to a foot-path in the parish of Risley opposite Garrat's farm, by the right to Heaton's farm and No Mans-lane,

thence by a fence to Stanton Hall sheds taking the fence by the right to the Stanton and Sandi-acre main-road at Orchard Head Hill aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Cotton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Walton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, and Croxall, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Stanton-road, thence to the right along Stanton-road through Stanton village by the Gate Inn to Cadley Hill four cross roads, thence to the right along the road by Cadley Hill farm in the occupation of Robert William Beard to Cauldwell village, turning to the left along the road by Cauldwell Hall to the First Three-lane Ends, thence again to the left up the lane for Linton by the Square-and-Compass Inn to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, thence to the right up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence to where it intersects the road from Grange Wood to Lullington near the residence of Dr. Barstable, thence to the right along the road by Wood Fields farm to Lullington village, by the Gas Works, to the left by Lullington Church, to the right down the lane for Edingale by Westbrook farm Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale School, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the Tront, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

Essex.—So much of the parishes of Aveley, Wennington, and Rainham, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Thames on the south, the London, Tilbury, and Southend Railway on the north, the road leading from Purfleet to Aveley on the east, and Rainham Creek on the west.

Flintshire.—(1.) The whole of the farm known as The Dee Side House farm, situate in the township of Sealand, in the parish of Hawarden, in the petty sessional division of Hawarden, in the county of Flint, bounded on the south-west by the river Dee, on the north-west and north-east by an embankment known as The Old Bank with a water-course running parallel thereto, and on the south-east by a farm known as Wood farm.

(2.) So much of the parish of Worthenbury, in the county of Flint, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Whitchurch and Wrexham-road to Green-lane on the north, the Bangor and Worthenbury-road to Worthenbury on the north-east, Green-lane to the outer boundary of Emral Park to Pandy Bridge and Halghton Mill on the south-west.

Lancashire.—(1.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Rochdale and Edenfield turnpike-road on the south, Woodhouse-lane and Rooley Moor-road on the west, Catlow-lane Head and the

Rochdale borough boundary on the north, and the Rochdale borough boundary to Cut Gate on the east.

(2.) So much of the township of Castleton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Chadwick and Lower-lane on the north, Dean brook, Ginnel farm, and Lords Tenement farm on the south, Dean Houses and Dean farm on the west, and Langfield farm on the east.

(3.) So much of the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bunker's Hill-lane on the north, Green Side-lane on the south, Lumb-lane on the east, and Failsworth brook on the west.

(4.) So much of the township of Birtle-cum-Bamford, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the borough of Rochdale on the east, the river Roach on the south, Birtle Chapel on the west, and Dixon Fold on the north.

(5.) So much of the township of Spotland, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary line of Reaps Moss Spotland from Todmorden and Walsden on the north, Old Road farm Troughgate Bacup on the south, Old Home farm and New Hill farm near Under Shore Shawforth on the east, and Dry Corner farm and Hey Head farm Bacup on the west.

(6.) So much of the township of Crompton, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the townships of Crompton and Butterworth from Whitfield Bottoms to Jep Wood on the north, the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway from Jubilee to Smallbrook on the east, the footpath to Lower and Higher Rushcroft on the south, and the footpath by Mossgate and Whitfield Hey to Whitfield Bottoms aforesaid on the west.

(7.)
