A PROCLAMATION.
VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by the Reserve Force Act, 1867, as amended by the Army Enlistment Act, 1870, and the Regulation of the Forces Act, 1881, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that, in case of great emergency, the occasion being first communicated to Parliament, if Parliament be then sitting, or declared by Proclamation, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Proclamation to direct that the Reserve Force be called out on Permanent Service; and that any such Proclamation of Her Majesty may extend to all or any of the men in the Army Reserve; and that when a man is called out by any such Proclamation as aforesaid he shall, during his service, form part of the Regular Forces, and may be appointed to any Corps as a soldier of the Regular Forces, and may, within three months afterwards, be transferred to any other Corps, so, however, that he shall be appointed or transferred only to a Corps in the arm or branch in which he previously served; and that men in the Army Reserve, when so called upon to enter on Permanent Service, shall be liable to serve until Her Majesty no longer requires their services, so, however, that a man shall not be required to serve for a period exceeding in the whole the remainder unexpired of his term of service in the Army Reserve and the further period of twelve months during which the service of a soldier of the Regular Forces may be prolonged.

And whereas by the Army Act, 1881, it is enacted, amongst other things, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, in case of great emergency, the occasion be first communicated to Parliament, if Parliament be then sitting, by Proclamation to direct that all or any persons who would otherwise be entitled, in pursuance of the terms of their enlistment, to be transferred to the Reserve, shall continue in Army Service, and such persons shall accordingly continue to serve in Army Service for the same period for which they might be required to serve if they had been transferred to the Reserve and called out for permanent service by a Proclamation of Her Majesty under the enactments relating to the Reserve.

And whereas the present state of public affairs in Egypt, and the necessity in connection therewith of taking steps for the maintenance of Peace and for the protection of the interests of the

Empire, have, in Our opinion, constituted a case of great emergency within the meaning of the said Acts, and We have communicated the same to Parliament:

Now, therefore, We do, in pursuance of the said Acts, hereby direct that on the twenty-sixth day of July, soldiers who have been transferred to Class I. of the Army Reserve on or after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, before they had completed twelve years' service, shall be called out on permanent service, and that such men shall, on or before the second day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, proceed to, and attend at, the places which may be respectively appointed by Our Secretary of State, to serve as part of Our Regular Forces until legally discharged or re-transferred to the Army Reserve: and We further direct that all soldiers who, on and after this date, would otherwise be entitled, in pursuance of the terms of their enlistment, to be transferred to the Reserve, shall continue in Army Service until legally discharged or transferred to the Army Reserve.

And We do hereby direct the Right Honourable Hugh Culling Eardley Childers, one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, to give all necessary directions herein accordingly.

And whereas it is expedient that the Training of the Regiments hereafter named should be extended beyond the period of twenty-eight days, for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two;

Now therefore, Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council is pleased to order and direct that the period of Training and Exercise of

WHEREAS by the 333rd section of "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1854," it is enacted that, subject to the provisions contained in the fifth part of that Act, it shall be lawful for every Pilotage Authority, by byelaw made with the consent of Her Majesty in Council from time to time, to do within its districts all or any of certain things in that behalf specified in the said section, and to repeal any byelaw made in exercise of the powers conferred by such section, and to make a new bye-law or bye-laws in lieu thereof:

And whereas the Pilot Commissioners of the Port of King's Lynn, being the Pilotage Authority for the Port of King's Lynn within the meaning of the said Act, have made byelaws to which the consent of Her Majesty in Council, under the said section of the said Act, has been signified by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-first day of February 1874:

And whereas Nos. 35, 36, 38, 39, and 40 of the said byelaws are as follows:—

35. Each pilot when superannuated shall receive twenty pounds per annum, to be paid by the headsman of the pilots out of the aggregate earnings of the pilots in twelve equal monthly instalments.

36. No pilot licensed after the first day of March 1864 shall be entitled to superannuation until he shall have served twenty-five years as a working pilot.

38. The headsman shall not excuse any pilot from the exercise of his duty on account of, or under any pretence of, illness, unless such illness shall be certified in writing under the hand of some known physician, surgeon, or apothecary.

39. Any pilot being excused as above shall produce a similar certificate monthly, and at the end of three months from the date of the first certificate he shall, if still unable to discharge his ordinary duty, be put upon half-pay, and at the end of six months he shall, if eligible, be put on superannuation allowance.

40. If the pilot be not eligible to superannuation allowance he shall remain on half-pay for twelve months, after which his pay shall cease; and if he shall be unable to resume his duties within two years after the date of his first certificate his name shall then be erased, and he shall cease to be a pilot of the port, but in any case in which the incapacity arises from injuries or illness sustained in the exercise of his duty as pilot it shall be at the discretion of the Commissioners to award him any sum not exceeding £15 per annum.

And whereas the said Commissioners have submitted for the approval of Her Majesty the repeal of the above-recited byelaws and the substitution of a new byelaw in lieu thereof, a copy of which is set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty, that the said byelaw set forth in the Schedule to this Order is reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Her by the said Merchant Shipping Act, 1854, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve and signify Her consent to the said new byelaw in lieu of the byelaws Nos. 35, 36, 38, 39, and 40, hereinbefore recited.

SCHEDULE referred to in the above Order.

The Headsman shall not allow any Pilot to be absent from duty on account of illness unless the same shall be certified in writing by some known Medical Practitioner, and any Pilot so absent shall produce a similar Certificate monthly and at the end of three months from the date of the first Certificate he shall, if still unable to discharge his ordinary duty, and on production of a Certificate to that effect from a Medical Practitioner to be named by the Commissioners, be put upon half-pay and at the end of six months he shall, if entitled to

Superannuation allowance, or to the Annuity hereinafter mentioned cease to be a Pilot.

If the Pilot be not entitled to Superannuation allowance or to an Annuity he shall remain on half-pay for twelve months after which his pay shall cease, and if unable to resume his duties within two years from the date of his first Certificate, he shall cease to be a Pilot of the Port, but it shall be at the discretion of the Commissioners to award him any sum not exceeding Fifteen pounds per annum to be paid out of the Pilots' Superannuation Fund.

A Fund shall be established to be called "The Pilots' Superannuation Fund" which shall be vested in and managed and distributed by the Pilotage Committee to be appointed annually by the Commissioners.

- (a.) The six retired Pilots now on the Superannuation list, viz.:—Robert Melton, Edward H. Neach, George Burton, Thomas Shafto, Thurlow G. Rayner, and Samuel W. Teasel shall each be paid out of the said Fund a Life Pension of Twenty-five pounds per annum.
- (b.) The seven Senior working Pilots, viz.:—Peter Hart, Robert Fysh, Samuel Greenacre, John Harle, William Jones, Robert John Brooke and Edward Greenacre shall each contribute to the said Fund out of their Earnings the sum of £1 13s. 4d. per annum and when placed on the Superannuation list by an order of the Commissioners, after having served twenty-five years, shall each receive Twenty-five pounds per annum to be paid out of the said Fund.
- (c.) The five Junior working Pilots, viz.:—William Green Dent, William Gamble, John Gamble, Walter Hains, and George James Crake and every Pilot hereafter licensed, shall each be required to effect an Insurance with Her Majesty's Post Master General, to entitle him to an Annuity of Twenty-five pounds per annum to become payable on his attaining the age of Sixty, the necessary Premiums to be paid by the Commissioners out of the Pilots Superannuation Fund and repaid by monthly deductions from the Pilots Earnings and the Policies to be held by the Commissioners so long as the Pilots shall continue in the service: Provided that the Commissioners shall from time to time contribute such amounts towards the Premiums to become payable in respect of the annuity Policies to be effected by the Junior Pilots above named as will reduce each Pilot's contribution to £1 13s. 4d. per annum.
- (d.) In the event of any Pilot referred to in the preceding subsection becoming permanently disabled by reason of some casualty incident to his calling before attaining the age of Sixty, the Commissioners shall, after the expiration of six months from the time of such permanent disability and upon the production of such evidence thereof as they shall deem conclusive, pay to such Pilot the sum of £25 per annum by equal half yearly payments until he shall be entitled to receive the Annuity secured by his Policy, and shall in the meantime pay the Premiums for keeping his Policy on foot.
- (e.) The Commissioners shall from time to time, out of the Mooring Dues authorised to be levied by them, pay to the Pilots Superannuation Fund such sums of money as may be necessary for all or any of the purposes aforesaid.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the bishop of any diocese, or by the bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein after directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-third day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words following, that is to say:

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend William Basil Lord Bishop of Saint David's having represented unto us that the vicarage of Llangathen in the county of Carmarthen and diocese of Saint David's and the rectory of Llanfihangel Cilfargen in the same

county and diocese being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the said Lord Bishop being the patron or person entitled to collate to the said vicarage of Llangathen and also to the said rectory of Llanfihangel Cilfargen if the same respectively were now vacant has signified his consent in writing to the union of the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Saint David's our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

"As witness our hand this twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage of Llangathen situate in the county of Carmarthen and diocese of Saint David's and the rectory of Llanfihangel Cilfargen situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the fourth and fifth

years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine of the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and fourteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (which said church and cure are hereinafter called the said benefice) of Saint Alban, Tyglyn, in the county of Cardigan, and in the diocese of Saint Davids.

"Whereas the said advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Alban Tyglyn, is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession in William John Davies of Tyglyn aforesaid Esquire.

"And whereas the said William John Davies is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Alban, Tyglyn, now vested in him as aforesaid should be transferred to and be vested in the Bishop for the time being of the said diocese of Saint Davids.

"And whereas a capital sum of one hundred pounds sterling has been paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England in augmentation of the endowment of the said benefice of Saint Alban Tyglyn and we have in respect of the said capital sum agreed and undertaken to pay to the incumbent of the said benefice of Tyglyn (being duly licensed to the same benefice) a yearly sum of three pounds six shillings and eight pence so long as the said capital sum shall remain in our hands.

"And whereas the said capital sum has been paid to us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England upon condition that the transfer of the patronage of the same benefice which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed shall be made.

"And whereas the Right Reverend William Basil now Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids is willing to accept for himself and his successors in the bishopric of Saint Davids the said proposed transfer and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the hereinbefore recited Acts or by some or one of them is made necessary he the said William Basil Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids has executed this scheme as herein-after mentioned.

"And whereas under the circumstances above set forth it appears to us that the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Saint Alban, Tyglyn which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the said right of patronage and advowson arises and exists.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said William John Davies (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this scheme) and with the consent of the said William Basil, Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids (in testimony whereof he the said Bishop has signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly

gazetted Order, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Saint Alban Tyglyn now vested in the said William John Davies and his heirs and assigns as aforesaid shall be transferred from the said William John Davies and from his heirs and assigns to the said William Basil Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids as such Bishop and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said William Basil Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids and his successors Bishops of the same diocese for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Davids.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen; of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the new parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth in the county of Southampton and in the diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Saint Peter Bournemouth which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds four pounds per centum debenture stock of the North British Railway Company has been transferred into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us as and for a permanent endowment for the minister for the time being of the said district hereinafter recommended to be constituted and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act then for the incumbent of the said new parish and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act.

"And whereas certain persons who have contributed towards the purchase of the same debenture stock and whose joint contributions represent the larger portion of the purchase money, have nominated the Warden, Council, and Scholars of Keble College in the University of Oxford as the persons to whom they the said contributors desire that the whole right of patronage of the said proposed district and the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned.

"And whereas the said sum of debenture stock has been so provided as aforesaid upon the understanding that we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners should out of our common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act pay to the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed as aforesaid a grant of fifty pounds per annum, and upon the further understanding that (such arrangement appearing to us to be expedient) the whole right of patronage of the said district, and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereto should be assigned in the manner above proposed.

"And whereas we have agreed and undertaken to make such grant of fifty pounds per annum as aforesaid by an instrument to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

"The District of Saint Stephen Bournemouth being :—

And whereas the patron of the said vicarage of the new parish of Saint Peter, Bournemouth, has offered certain objections to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has, notwithstanding such objections, been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette

pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Winchester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Tretower as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend William Basil Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Llanvihangel cwm Dû otherwise called or known as Saint Michael cwm Dû which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Tretower as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint John Tretower.'

"And with the like consent of the said William Basil Bishop of the said diocese of Saint Davids (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint John the Evangelist situate at Tretower as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint John Tre-tower being:—

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint Davids. *C. "Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said new parish of Saint Philip Clerkenwell which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas there is not at present within

the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

"And whereas for the purpose of providing an endowment for the said proposed district Miss Lucy Nicholson, of No. 13, Lloyd-square, Clerkenwell, Spinster, has (firstly) contributed and paid to the credit of our account at the Bank of England the capital sum of one thousand two hundred and forty-two pounds, and we have in respect thereof agreed with the said Lucy Nicholson and have undertaken to provide and pay by equal half yearly payments on the the first day of May and on the first day of November to the minister for the time being of the said proposed district when duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore secondly mentioned Act and so soon as the said district shall have become a new parish under the provisions of the same Act then to the incumbent of the said new parish the yearly sum of forty-one pounds and eight shillings in each and every year during which the said capital sum shall remain in our hands; and the said Lucy Nicholson has (secondly) transferred the sum of one thousand four hundred and sixty-five pounds, four pounds per centum funded debt of the Glasgow and South Western Railway Company into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us for the permanent endowment of the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish, and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed as aforesaid, and the same Lucy Nicholson has (thirdly) transferred a sum of two thousand five hundred pounds, four pounds per centum debenture stock of the North Eastern Railway Company into our name in the books of the same Company to be held in trust by us for the further permanent endowment of the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said proposed district or new parish, and the amount of the annual interest and dividends to accrue due on account of the said lastly mentioned sum of stock to be receivable by the said minister or incumbent for the time being when he shall have been duly licensed as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that the right of patronage of the said proposed district and of the nomination of the minister or incumbent thereof shall without any assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid be assigned to and become absolutely vested in and shall and may be exercised for one turn of nomination and that the first turn only by the said Lucy Nicholson or by her heirs and assigns and that all the rest and residue and remainder of the said right of patronage and nomination of the minister or incumbent of the same district or new parish as the case may be shall in like manner be assigned to and be vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised jointly by the Reverend Edward Francis Russell now curate of Saint Albans, Holborn, in the said diocese of London Clerk in Holy Orders, the Reverend Richard Meux Benson now vicar of Saint John's Cowley in the diocese of Oxford Clerk in Holy Orders, Charles Lindley Wood of number 10 Belgrave-square in the said county of Middlesex Esquire commonly called the Honourable Charles Lindley Wood, Etheldreda Anna Bennett of number 13 Lloyd-square Clerkenwell aforesaid Spinster and Emmeline Franks also of number 13 Lloyd-square Clerkenwell aforesaid Spinster their heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or to any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of the Holy Redeemer, Clerkenwell, being:—

"All that part of the new parish of Saint Philip Clerkenwell in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, which is bounded on the north-west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the parish of Saint James Clerkenwell in the said county and diocese from the new parish of Saint Philip Clerkenwell aforesaid, at the point opposite to the northern angle of the building called or known as the Middlesex House of Correction where Farring-

And whereas the said scheme has notwithstanding such objections been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Town Council of any borough stating that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds of one or more parishes, being wholly or partly within such borough, that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing, under the powers of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis, requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of such parish or parishes, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of the Privy Council, to order that powers shall be vested in the Council of such borough for providing such places of burial under the provisions of the said Act: Provided always, that

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notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in such borough one month at least before such petition is so considered:

And whereas the Town Council of the borough of Arundel, in the county of Sussex, have presented a Petition to Her Majesty in Council stating that an Order in Council has been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard of the parish of Arundel, and representing that for divers reasons it is extremely difficult to obtain ground within that parish or an adjoining parish with soil suitable for a burial place; that no active steps can be taken by the Town Council of the said borough to procure a burial site until all necessary powers are vested in them for providing a place of burial for the said parish under the provisions of the 17 and 18 Victoria cap. 87: and praying that powers may be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Arundel for providing a place of burial for the said parish under the provisions of that Act:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council has been duly published as required by the said first-recited Act.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, as it is hereby ordered, that powers be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Arundel for providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parish of Arundel under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis."

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications men-

tioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the under-mentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the seventeenth day of May last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the sixth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows; viz.:

IFFLEY.—Forthwith and entirely in the Littlemore Baptist Chapel, in the parish of Iffley, in the county of Oxford: and also in the chapelyard, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the chapelyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented:
