

don-road is joined by Margaret-street, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the said street for a distance of  $23\frac{1}{2}$  chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of such street with Amwell-street and with Upper Rosoman-street, which boundary divides the said new parish of Saint Philip Clerkenwell from the district parish of Saint Mark Clerkenwell in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described part of the new parish of Saint Philip Clerkenwell aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides, other than upon the north-west as aforesaid, that is to say, upon the north-east, upon the south-east and upon the south-west as follows: upon the north-east by the district parish of Saint Mark Clerkenwell aforesaid, and upon the south-east and south-west by the parish of Saint James Clerkenwell aforesaid."

And whereas drafts of the said scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore mentioned Act, been transmitted to the patron and to the incumbent of the vicarage of the said new parish of St. Philip, Clerkenwell, out of which it is intended that the district recommended in such scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and whereas such patron has signified his assent to such scheme: And whereas the incumbent of the same vicarage has offered certain objections to the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has notwithstanding such objections been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of London.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament, held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Town Council of any borough stating that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds of one or more parishes, being wholly or partly within such borough, that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing, under the powers of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis," and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of such parish or parishes, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of the Privy Council, to order that powers shall be vested in the Council of such borough for providing such places of burial under the provisions of the said Act: Provided always, that

notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in such borough one month at least before such petition is so considered:

And whereas the Town Council of the borough of Arundel, in the county of Sussex, have presented a Petition to Her Majesty in Council stating that an Order in Council has been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyard of the parish of Arundel, and representing that for divers reasons it is extremely difficult to obtain ground within that parish or an adjoining parish with soil suitable for a burial place; that no active steps can be taken by the Town Council of the said borough to procure a burial site until all necessary powers are vested in them for providing a place of burial for the said parish under the provisions of the 17 and 18 Victoria cap. 87: and praying that powers may be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Arundel for providing a place of burial for the said parish under the provisions of that Act:

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council has been duly published as required by the said first-recited Act.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, as it is hereby ordered, that powers be vested in the Town Council of the said borough of Arundel for providing requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parish of Arundel under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis."

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications men-
