The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop or Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may

approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and enquiry, be satisfied with any such scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the second and third years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne; and for other purposes," it is amongst other things, further enacted "That when, by any Order of Her Majesty in Council as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing, of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof, duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors, shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent-charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts, for the church of such perpetual curacy sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the incumbent or incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Lord Bishop of Lincoln hath made a representation in writing to his Grace the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Archibald Campbell
Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"I the Right Reverend Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln do hereby represent to your Grace that there is in the county and diocese of Lincoln the vicarage and parish church of *Timberland* to which belongs amongst other places the hamlet or township of *Martin* the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the population of the parish of *Timber-*

land according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one exclusive of the said hamlet or township of Martin amounts to seven hundred persons.

"That the parish church of Timberland affords accommodation for one hundred and eighty persons or thereabouts.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of Timberland including the township or hamlet of Martin after deducting all taxes rates dues and other permanent charges and outgoings is three hundred and ninety-four pounds arising from tithe rent-charge glebe land and surplice fees.

"That the said vicarage of Timberland is in the patronage of Sir Thomas Whichcote of Aswarby Hall in the said county of Lincoln Baronet.

"That the population of the said hamlet or township of Martin (according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one) amounts to eight hundred and fifty persons.

"That the said hamlet or township of Martin contains a chapel consecrated in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six affording accommodation for about two hundred and fifty persons.

"That such chapel is distant from the parish church of Timberland one mile and a half or thereabouts.

"That the said hamlet or township of Martin is treated as a separate parish for all civil purposes and baptisms and churchings are solemnized in the chapel within the said hamlet or township. That since the ninth day of April one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven marriages have been solemnized in the said chapel under a licence granted by me under the provisions of an Act of Parliament made and passed in the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth chapter eighty-five entitled 'An Act for Marriages in England.' That the inhabitants of the said hamlet or township bury their dead in the burial-ground surrounding the said chapel situate at Martin aforesaid.

"That it appears to me that the said hamlet or township of Martin may under the provisions of the Acts of the first and second years of Her present Majesty chapter one hundred and six and the second and third years of Her said Majesty chapter forty-nine be advantageously separated from the said parish and parish church of Timberland and that the said hamlet or township of Martin may be advantageously constituted a separate and distinct parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy.

"That if the said hamlet or township of Martin be separated from the said vicarage of Timberland and constituted a separate and distinct benefice and perpetual curacy it is proposed to transfer to the said perpetual curacy the whole of the tithe rent-charge arising within the said hamlet or township of Martin and now belonging to the said vicarage of Timberland and amounting according to the tithe apportionment to the sum of forty-five pounds per annum and it is also proposed to charge the remainder of the endowments of the said vicarage of Timberland with the payment of a sum of thirty-five pounds per annum in favour of the said perpetual curacy and it is hoped that grants in augmentation of the said perpetual curacy may be obtained from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and other sources.

"That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Lord Bishop have drawn up a scheme in writing appended to this representation describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations above proposed

may be best effected and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do submit the same to your Grace together with the consent in writing of the said Sir Thomas Whichcote Baronet the patron and of the Reverend Christopher George Wheat the vicar of the said vicarage of Timberland to the intent that your Grace may if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said scheme certify the same and such consent to Her Majesty in Council."

And whereas the Scheme and Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That the hamlet or township of Martin be separated from the said vicarage and parish church of Timberland and be constituted a separate and distinct parish and benefice for all ecclesiastical purposes by the name or style of the perpetual curacy of Martin of which the said chapel in the said hamlet or township shall be the parish church and the same shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said vicarage of Timberland now is.

"That the incumbent of Martin shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the said proposed separate parish and benefice.

"That baptisms churchings marriages and burials shall be performed and celebrated in the church of Martin and in the churchyard thereto belonging and that the fees for all such and other ecclesiastical offices arising from or in respect of the said proposed separate parish and benefice and usually payable to the incumbent of a benefice shall belong and be paid to the incumbent thereof.

"That the whole of the tithe rent-charge arising within the said hamlet or township of Martin and now belonging to the said vicarage of Timberland and amounting according to the tithe apportionment to the sum of forty-five pounds per annum be annexed and belong to and form part of the endowment of the said proposed separate parish and benefice.

"That the inhabitants of the said hamlet or township of Martin shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Timberland or any other church or chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said parish but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act 1868' to repair the said church or chapel of Martin and the vicar of Timberland shall henceforth cease to be liable to repair or to contribute to the repair of the chancel of the church or chapel of Martin.

"That the inhabitants of Martin shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said church or chapel at Martin aforesaid as their parish church and to be accommodated with sittings therein but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Timberland.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the right of patronage to the said benefice of Timberland but that the same shall remain continue and be as it now is and that the patronage of the said proposed separate benefice of Martin shall belong to and be vested in me the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln and my successors Bishops of Lincoln for ever.

"That nothing herein contained shall affect or be construed to affect the revenues and endowments of the said vicarage of Timberland except as hereinbefore mentioned namely the annexation of tithe rent-charge of forty-five pounds per

annum and the fees arising within the said proposed parish and benefice.

"Given under my hand this first day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two. " *C. Lincoln.*

"I Sir Thomas Whichcote of Aswarby Hall in the county of Lincoln Baronet the patron or person entitled to present to the vicarage of Timberland in case the same were now vacant and I the Reverend Christopher George Wheat Clerk the vicar of the said vicarage do hereby severally and respectively signify our consent to the scheme above proposed and to every matter and thing therein contained.

And whereas the said Bishop of Lincoln hath transmitted the said scheme to the Archbishop of Canterbury for his consideration and the said Archbishop being satisfied with such scheme, hath certified the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report, to Her Majesty in Council, dated the fourteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, which report is in the words and figures following:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Archibald Campbell Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln has represented unto us (amongst other things).

"That there is in the county and diocese of Lincoln the vicarage and parish church of Timberland to which belongs amongst other places the hamlet or township of Martin the boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"That the population of the said parish of Timberland according to the census of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one exclusive of the said hamlet or township of Martin amounts to seven hundred persons and that the population of the said hamlet or township according to the same census is eight hundred and fifty.

"That the said hamlet or township of Martin contains a chapel consecrated in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six affording accommodation for about two hundred and fifty persons and that the said chapel is distant from the parish church of Timberland one mile and a half or thereabouts.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said hamlet or township of Martin may be advantageously separated from the said vicarage and parish church of Timberland and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patron and incumbent of the said vicarage of Timberland has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:—

In the parish churchyard of Womersley, in the county of York, to the thirty-first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

In the parish churchyard of Hoveringham, in the county of Nottingham, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

In the churchyard of Saint Mark's, Connah Quay, in the county of Flint, to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three. *C. L. Peel.*

giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-grounds should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications, viz. :—

HYSON GREEN.—Forthwith and entirely in Saint Paul's Church, Hyson Green, in the parish of Lenton, in the county of Nottingham; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

BURHAM.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Burham, in the county of Kent; and also in the churchyard, after the first June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, except as follows : In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

CASTLE DONINGTON.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Castle Donington, in the county of Leicester; and also in the churchyard, except as follows :

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

ABERYSTRUTH.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Aberystruth, in the county of Monmouth; and also in the churchyard after the thirtieth April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, except as follows :

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to

the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

HEVER.—Forthwith in the parish church of Hever, in the county of Kent; and also in the churchyard, except as follows : In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

UFFCULME.—Forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Uffculme, in the county of Devon; and also in the churchyard after the thirty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, except as follows :

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented :

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz. : widows and widowers, as can be buried at or below that depth.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the fifteenth day of September next :

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said fifteenth day of September.

6. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the linings, or remove or deface any number plate, printed or other notice, in or on the carriage, or break or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this Regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these Bye-laws and Regulations; in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and, if found in the interior of any carriage, shall, on request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to

the conductor or other duly authorized officer of the Company the fare legally demandable for the journey.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket (if any), when required so to do, to the conductor or any duly authorized servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

11. A passenger not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer within the true intent and meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Company, shall not use or attempt to use any ticket intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

12. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) shall, unless otherwise permitted by the conductor, be placed on the front or driver's platform, and not in the interior or on the roof of any carriage.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

14. No person, except a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any carriage, and no person shall hold or hang on by or to any part of any carriage, or travel therein otherwise than on a seat provided for passengers.

15. When any carriage contains the full number of passengers, which it is licensed to contain no additional person shall enter, mount, or remain in or on any such carriage when warned by the conductor not to do so.

16. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

17. The conductor shall not permit any passenger beyond the licensed number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage.

18. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst in motion.

19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor. Any dog or other animal taken into or on any carriage in breach of this Regulation shall be removed by the person in charge of such dog or other animal from the carriage immediately upon request by the conductor, and in default of compliance with such request may be removed by or under the direction of the conductor.

20. No person shall travel in or on any carriage of the Company with loaded fire-arms.

21. No passenger shall wilfully obstruct, or impede any officer or servant of the Company in the execution of his duty upon or in connection with any carriage or tramway of the Company.

22. The conductor of each carriage shall enforce or prevent the breach of these Bye-laws and Regulations to the best of his ability.

23. Any person offending against or committing a breach of any of these Bye-laws or Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.

24. The expression "conductor" shall include

any officer or servant in the employment of the Company and having charge of a carriage.

25. There shall be placed and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each carriage in use a printed copy of these Bye-laws and Regulations.

26. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 6th day of September, 1882.

Intoxicated Persons.

5. A person in a state of intoxication shall not enter or mount upon any carriage, nor shall any person swear, or use any profane, obscene, or abusive language whilst in or upon any carriage, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger; and if any person shall commit any of the offences in this bye-law mentioned he shall be immediately removed from the carriage by or under the direction of the conductor.

Committing Nuisance.

6. No person shall commit any nuisance in or upon or against any carriage.

Wilful Damage.

7. No person shall wilfully cut, tear, soil, or damage the cushions or the curtains or linings, or remove or deface any number or number-plate, printed or other paper or painted notice, in or on any carriage, or mark, break, or scratch any window of or otherwise wilfully damage any carriage. Any person acting in contravention of this regulation shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, in addition to the liability to pay the amount of any damage done.

Offensive Clothing, &c.

8. A person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor of a carriage, soil or injure the linings or cushions of the carriage, or

the dress or clothing of any passenger, or a person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be offensive to passengers, shall not be entitled to enter or remain in the interior of any carriage, and may be prevented from entering the interior of any carriage, and shall not enter the interior of any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor, and if found in the interior of any carriage shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the interior of the carriage upon the fare, if previously paid, being returned.

Fares and Tickets or Checks.

9. Each passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or to such duly authorised persons, and at such places upon or near to the tramway as the Company shall at any time and from time to time appoint, the fare or fares legally demandable for the journey, and under such regulations as to tickets or checks as the Company may from time to time determine.

Production of Tickets or Checks.

10. Each passenger shall show his ticket or check (if any), when required so to do, to the conductor, or any duly authorised servant of the Company, and shall also, when required so to do, either deliver up his ticket or check, or pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled over by such passenger.

Artizans' Special Carriage.

Standing on Steps, &c.

13. No passenger or other person not being a servant of the Company shall be permitted to travel on the steps, staircase, or platforms of any carriage, or stand either on the roof or in the interior, or sit on the outside rail on the roof of any carriage, and shall cease to do so immediately on request by the conductor.

Travelling without having a Seat.

16. When a carriage contains the full licensed number of passengers which it is constructed to carry, a notice to that effect shall be placed in conspicuous letters and in a conspicuous position on the carriage.

Conductor to Prevent Overcrowding.

17. The conductor shall not permit any person beyond the last-mentioned number to enter or mount or remain in or upon any part of a carriage,

Entering &c., Carriage in Motion.

18. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave any carriage whilst in motion.

Dogs or other Animals.

19. No dog or other animal shall be allowed in or on any carriage except by permission of the conductor, nor in any case in which the conveyance of such dog or other animal might be offensive or an annoyance to passengers. No person shall take a dog or other animal into any carriage after having been requested not to do so by the conductor or any passenger.
