road from the said turnpike-road past the borough Asylum to the said road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the west.

(4.) So much of the parish of Beeby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Beeby to South Croxton on the north, the road leading from Beeby to Hungarton on the south, a footpath leading from Keyham to South Croxton on the east, and the village of Beeby on the west.

(5.) So' much of the parish of Gaddesby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain arable and pasture land in the occupation of E. H. Cheney on the north and 'east, certain arable and pasture land in the occupation of E. H. Cheney, J. Smith, and William Walpole on the west, and Gaddesby brook on the south.

(6.) So much of the parish of Barkby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Ridgemere-road on the north, the road leading from Barkby village to Beeby village on the south, the road leading from Beeby village to South Croxton village on the east, and a fence, and certain fields in the occupation of Mr. Talbot on the west.

Lincolnshire (Kesteven.)—(1.) So much of the parish of Billingborough, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the forty-foot drain on the east, the Neslam Drove to William Hardy Sewards new buildings on the south, four arable fields in the occupation of William Hardy Sewards to the Horbling drain on the west, and the said Horbling drain to the first-mentioned forty-foot drain on the north.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Caythorpe, and Fulbeck, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Fulbeck-road, the highway leading from Leadenham to Sleaford, and an arable field in the occupation of Richard Bestall, Byards Leap, to the Cranwell Lodge-road on the north, the said Cranwell Lodge-road and Gorse-lane on or towards the east, Caythorpe Heath-road to Henry Barnes cottages on the south, and an imaginary line from the said Henry Barnes cottages to the Foreman's house at F. M. Pogson's farm premises, Caythorpe Heath, thence by corn-fields to Henry Burtt's farm buildings, Fulbeck, and a grass field to Fulbeck-road aforesaid on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Metheringham, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Blankney-lane from Blankney cross-roads to the Great Northern and Great Eastern Railway on the south, the Great Northern and Great Eastern Railway on the west, the Metheringham Fen-lane to the Old Carr Dyke on the north, and the said Old Carr Dyke, an arable-field and a corn-field in the occupation of Henry Chaplin, Esquire, M.P., and the Fox Cover plantation and the Metheringham Moor - lane to the Blankney cross-roads aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Horbling, Billingborough, and Threckingham, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Great Northern Railway on the east, Falkinghamroad to Madam-lane on the south, Madam-lane to Holland-road on the west, and Holland-road to the Great Northern Railway on the north.

(5.) So much of the parish of Metheringham, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Green Man bridle-road to Bloxholm-road on the south, Bloxholm-road to Dunston Heathlane on the west, Dunston Heath-lane to Lincoln and Sleaford low-road on the north, and Lincoln and Sleaford low-road to Green Man bridle-road aforesaid on the east.

Staffordshire.—(1.) So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Waltonupon-Trent, Drakelow, and Croxall, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Stanton-road, thence to the right along Stanton-road through Stanton village by the Gate Inn to Cadley Hill four cross roads, thence to the right along the road by Cadley Hill farm in the occupation of Robert William Beard to Cauldwell village, turning to the left along the road by Cauldwell Hall to the First Three-lane Ends, thence again to the left up the lane for Linton by the Square-and-Compass Inn to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, thence to the right up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence to where it intersects the road from Grange Wood to Lullington near the residence of Dr. Barstable, thence to the right along the road by Wood Fields farm to Lullington village, by the Gas Works, to the left by Lullington Church, to the right down the lane for Edingale by Westbrook farm Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale School, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the township of Barton-under-Needwood, in the county of Stafford, as lies between the main-road from Rangemoor to Yoxall, and the main-road from Burton-upon-Trent to Lichfield.

(3.) So much of the townships of Harlaston, Haunton, and Clifton Campville, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Harlaston Mill by the river Mease to Clifton Mill, thence by the Lullington-read the Harlaston turnpike-road and the road leading from Clifton village to Statfold as far as Thorpe brook, then by the said brook to Harlaston Mill aforesaid.

(4.) So much of the parish of Elford, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Tame from Fisherwick Bridge to Salters Bridge, thence along the Burton turnpike-road to Fisherwick Bridge aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parish of Tatenhill, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the foot-path from Yoxall Lodge by Lin brook to Range moor, thence by the highway to Dunstall cross-roads, thence by the Shirall highway to Penny's turn, and thence by the carriage-drive to Yoxall Lodge aforesaid.

(6) So much of the townships of Barton-under-Needwood, and Wichnor, in the county
