PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act passed in the 37th year of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 88, intituled "The Slave Trade Act, 1873," it was, amongst other things, provided that "Where any "Treaty in relation to the Slave Trade is made "after the passing of that Act, by or on behalf of "Her Majesty with any Foreign State, Her "Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that as from such date, not being earlier than the date of the Treaty, as may be specified in the "Order, such Treaty shall be deemed" to be an existing Slave Trade Treaty within the meaning of the Act, and it was further provided that "thereupon (as from the said date, or if no date is specified as from the date of such Order)" all the provisions of the Act shall apply and be construed accordingly.

And whereas on the 2nd day of March in the year 1882 a Treaty or Convention was concluded between Her Majesty and His Majesty the Shah of Persia for the suppression of the Slave Trade, in the following terms, that is to say:—

"In the Name of God, the Almighty, all Merciful.

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, and His Majesty the Shah of Persia, being mutually animated by a sincere desire to co-operate for the extinction of the barbarous Traffic in Slaves, have resolved to conclude a Convention for the purpose of attaining this object, and have named as their Plenipotentiaries, that is to say:—

Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Empress of India, Ronald Ferguson Thomson, Esquire, Her Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Persia;

And His Majesty the Shah of Persia, his Excellency Mirza Saeed Khan, his Minister for Foreign Affairs;

Who, after having communicated to each other their full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

"ARTICLE I.

"In order to prevent the chance of negro slaves, male and female, being imported into Persia, British cruizers shall be permitted to visit and detain merchant-vessels under the Persian flag,

or belonging to Persian subjects, which may be engaged in, or which there may be reasonable grounds for suspecting to be or to have been engaged during the voyage on which they are met, in carrying slaves; and if any such slaves are found on board such merchant-vessels, the vessel, with all on board, shall be taken before the nearest Persian authorities for trial. But no person whatsoever who, being furnished with a Government passport, countersigned by a British Resident or Consul, may have gone from Persia to visit the places of pilgrimage, shall, when returning, be interfered with, provided such person be not accompanied by more negroes, either male or female, than the number mentioned in his original pass. The presence of any such additional negro or negroes shall be prima facie evidence of an attempted Traffic in Slaves.

"ARTICLE II.

"If any merchant-vessel under the Persian flag be captured by a British cruizer and taken into a Persian port for adjudication, it shall be the officer of the British cruizer making the capture, or some duly authorized officer of the British Government who shall be present at such adjudication.

ment who shall be present at such adjudication.

In the event of the captured merchant-vessel being condemned and sold the proceeds of such sale shall go to the Persian Government, and all slaves found on board such vessel shall be handed over to the British authorities.

"ARTICLE III.

"His Majesty the Shah of Persia agrees to punish severely all Persian subjects or foreigners amenable to Persian jurisdiction who may be found engaging in Slave Trassic by sea, and to manumit and guarantee the safety and proper treatment of all slaves illegally imported, that is to say, imported by sea into His Majesty's dominions after the signature of the present Convention.

"ARTICLE IV.

"The present Convention shall come into operation on the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two. After the Convention shall so have been brought into operation, Article XIII of the Treaty between Great Britain and Persia, signed at Paris on the fourth of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, by which the agreement entered into by Great Britain and Persia in August, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, was renewed, shall be considered as cancelled except as to any proceeding that may have already been taken or commenced in virtue thereof.

"ARTICLE V.

"The ratifications of the present Convention shall be exchanged at Tehran within five months or sooner, if practicable.

"Done at Tehran in quadruplicate, this second day of the month of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two

And whereas it is expedient that the said Treaty or Convention should be brought within the operation of the Slave Trade Act, 1873.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf as aferesaid, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

The said Treaty or Convention hereinbefore recited shall, from the 1st day of May, 1882, being the day on which the said Treaty or Convention came into operation, be deemed to have been and to be an existing Slave Trade Treaty within the meaning of "The Slave Trade Act, 1873."

And the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, the Right Honourable the Earl Granville, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter thirty-nine duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-nine have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following supplemental scheme having reference to the parish of Malpas, situate partly in the county of Chester and partly in the county of Flint, and wholly in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas by an Order of Your Majesty in Council dated the nineteenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-fifth day of the same month a scheme of us the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England having reference to the said parish of Malpas was ratified.

"And whereas since the date of the said Order, it has been discovered that certain errors by way of omission occur in the plan of the Bishop of Chester which forms part of the said last-mentioned scheme.

"And whereas the Right Reverend William, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester has submitted to us a supplemental plan, bearing date the twenty-second day of July in this present year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two for remedy of the errors aforesaid which said plan is executed by the said Bishop and by the patrons of the Upper Mediety and by the patron of the Lower Mediety of the benefice of the said parish of Malpas, and by the rector or incumbent of the said Upper Mediety, and by the rector or incumbent of the said Lower Mediety of the same benefice.

"And whereas the said supplemental plan is in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"To the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England.

"I William Lord Bishop of Chester under and by virtue of the Act of 3rd and 4th years of Her present Majesty chapter 113 have with the consent (testified as hereinafter is mentioned) of the Most Honourable William Henry Hugh Marquess of Cholmondeley and Thomas Tyrwhitt Drake of Shardiloes in the county of Buckingham Esquire alternate patrons of the Upper Mediety of the benefice and rectory of Malpas situate partly in the county of Chester and partly in the county of Flint and wholly in my diocese of Chester entitled to the alternate right of presentation thereto and of the said Thomas Tyrwhitt Drake patron of the Lower Mediety of the said benefice framed the following plan supplemental to the plan and scheme hereinafter recited and referred to for making further arrangements such as I judge likely to promote the efficient discharge of pastoral duties in that portion of the ancient parish of Malpas aforesaid wherein the two rectors of the same parish still jointly possess exclusive cure of souls which said supplemental plan being a plan framed so as not to prejudice the interests of any existing incumbent I do hereby submit for consideration of you the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and request that the same may be carried into effect as in the said Act is provided.

"Whereas by a plan dated the twenty-second day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty framed by me under and by virtue of the provisions of the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter 113 with all necessary and proper consents it was proposed that from and immediately after the then next avoidance of the Lower Mediety of the said benefice of Malpas the same benefice (then and now held by the said rectors in Medieties respectively known as the Upper Mediety of Malpas and the Lower Mediety of Malpas as aforesaid) should be divided into two separate benefices and rectories to be called and designated respectively the benefice and rectory of Malpas and the benefice and rectory of Whitewell And that such separate benefices and rectories should respectively consist of such portions of the ancient parish of Malpas wherein the two rectors of the same parish still jointly possess exclusive cure of souls as are mentioned and specified in the said plan and in the first and second schedules thereto and should be respectively endowed with such glebe houses and glebe lands and hereditaments then and now belonging to the said rectors of Malpas and with such commuted tithe rent-charges then and now payable to the said rectors of Malpas as are mentioned and specified in the said plan and in the third and fourth schedules thereto. And by the said plan provision is also made for the appropriation of certain commuted tithe rent-charges then and now payable to the said rectors of Malpas mentioned and specified in the said plan and in the fifth and sixth schedules thereto, to and for the benefit of the benefices of Holy Trinity Bickerton and Saint Chad Malpas otherwise Saint Chad Tushingham respectively these benefices being portions of the ancient parish of Malpas which have been formed into separate ecclesiastical districts and which have become new parishes for ecclesiastical purposes.

"And whereas the said recited plan of the twenty-second day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty was by a scheme of you the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners dated the fifteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty and ratified and confirmed by an Order of Her Majesty in Council dated the ninetcenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty duly carried into effect in accordance with the provisions of the said Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen. And by the said Order it was directed that the same scheme should be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when the said Order should have been duly published in the London Gazette.

"And whereas the said Order was duly published in the London Gazette of the twenty-fifth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty.

"And whereas it was intended to provide in the said recited plan for the appropriation from and after the next avoidance of the said Lower Mediety of Malpas of all the commuted tithe rentcharges then belonging and payable to the said rectors of Malpas or either of them and other the endowments of the ancient parish of Malpas with a view to make provision for the better cure of souls in the said ancient parish as well as in those portions of it wherein the said two rectors of Malpas jointly possess exclusive cure of souls as of those portions of the said ancient parish which had become new parishes for ecclesiastical purposes as aforesaid as in the said recited plan and in the third fourth fifth and sixth schedules thereto is expressed and intended to be provided.

"And whereas it has been discovered that the commuted tithe rent-charges mentioned and specified in the schedules to this plan and belonging to the said rectors of Malpas or one of them were omitted in the allotment and apportionment of the endowments of the said ancient parish of Malpas made and provided in the said recited plan.

"And whereas the commuted tithe rent-charge of one pound six shillings and eight pence mentioned and specified in the first schedule to this plan and one moiety of the other commuted tithe rent-charges mentioned and specified in the first and second schedules to this plan are part of the endowments of the Upper Mediety of the benefice of Malpas and the other moiety of the commuted tithe rent-charges other than the said commuted tithe rent-charge of one pound six shillings and eight pence mentioned and specified in the said schedules to this plan is part of the endowments of the Lower Mediety of the henefice of Malpas.

of the Lower Mediety of the henefice of Malpas.

"And whereas the Reverend Charles William
Cox Clerk in Holy Orders who was the rector

of the Lower Mediety of Malpas at the date of the said recited plan of the twenty-second day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty still remains such rector and the Honourable and Reverend William Trevor Kenyon Clerk in Holy Orders who was the rector of the Upper Mediety of Malpas at the date of the said recited plan also remains such rector.

"And whereas it is proposed that this present plan shall not take effect until the next avoid-avoidance of the Lower Mediety of Malpas and they the said Charles William Cox and William Trevor Kenyon the present or existing incumbents of the parish of Malpas are satisfied and admit by their signing and sealing this plan that the same will not prejudice or affect the interests of them as such existing incumbents of the said parish.

" Now I the said William Bishop of Chester with the consent as well of the said William Henry Hugh Marquess of Cholmondeley and Thomas Tyrwhitt Drake testified by their respectively signing and sealing this present plan as of the said Charles William Cox and William Trevor Kenyon testified as aforesaid do in addition to and not in derogation of the proposals expressed and contained in the said recited plan of the twentysecond day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty which has been carried into effect as aforesaid propose firstly, that from and immediately after the next avoidance of the Lower Mediety of the said benefice of Malpas the commuted tithe rent-charges now payable out of lands in the several townships mentioned and specified in the first schedule hereunder written to the rectors of Malpas or one of them amounting altogether to thirty-seven pounds six shillings and eight pence shall be and shall form part of the endowments of the benefice and rectory of Malpas expressed and intended to be formed and constituted by the said recited plan of the twenty-second day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty and the said scheme and Order in Council carrying the same into effect and the same rent-charges shall be held and enjoyed by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said intended rectory of Malpas as fully and freely and with the same rights privileges and beneficial interest therein as the endowments of the Upper Mediety of Malpas are now held and enjoyed by the said William Trevor Kenyon the present rector of the said Upper Mediety.

"And se ondly that from and immediately after the next avoidance of the Lower Mediety of the said benefice of Malpas the commuted tithe rent-charges now payable out of lands in the township of Coddington mentioned and specified in the second schedule hereunder written to the rectors of Malpas amounting to thirty-one pounds ten shillings shall be and shall form part of the endowments of the benefice and rectory of Whitewell expressed and intended to be formed and constituted by the said recited plan on the twenty-second day of January one thousand eight hundred and eighty and the said scheme and Order in Council carrying the same into effect and shall be held and enjoyed by the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said intended rectory of Whitewell as fully and freely and with the same rights privileges and beneficial interest therein as the endowments of the Lower Mediety of Malpas are now held and enjoyed by the said Charles William Cox the present lector of the said Lower Mediety.

"Now therefore we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend and propose that the said supplemental plan shall as to all the contents thereof be carried into effect as in the same plan is mentioned.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing in this scheme or in the said plan shall prevent us from recommending and proposing to Your Majesty in Council any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or either of them or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners
for England have, in pursuance of the
Bishoprics Act, 1878, duly prepared and laid
before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing
date the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year
one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in

the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for
England in pursuance of the Bishoprics Act
1878 have prepared and now humbly lay before
Your Majesty in Council the following scheme
with respect to the Bishopric of Newcastle.

Whereas the Bishopric of Newcastle aforesaid was founded by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two and published in the London Gazette on the twenty-third day of the same month which Order was made in pursuance of the fourth section of the above-mentioned Act; and which Order, as appears by the terms thereof, came into operation on the said twenty-third day of May one thousand eight hundred and eightv-two.

eight hundred and eighty-two.

"And whereas by the same Order it is ordered that the diocese of the Bishopric of Newcastle

shall consist of the county of Northumberland and the counties of the towns of Newcastle-upon-Tyne and Berwick-upon-Tweed and shall include such detached parts of any other county as are under any Act of Parliament deemed to form part of the county of Northumberland or have been or can be transferred to the county of Northumberland by the Justices in General or Quarter Sessions assembled, and shall include also the ancient common law parish of Alston with its chapelries in the county of Cumberland.

"And whereas on the thirtieth day of June

"And whereas on the thirtieth day of June one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two Letters Patent were passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom for constituting the borough of Newcastle-upon-Tyne a city.

"And whereas by the said Order of Your Majesty in Council the parish church of Saint Nicholas in the town and borough (now the city) of Newcastle-upon-Tyne aforesaid was (subject to the rights of the patron and incumbent of the same church) declared to be the Cathedral Church of the Bishopric of Newcastle.

"And whereas by the same Order the Bishop of Newcastle was constituted a body corporate and was invested with all such rights privileges and jurisdictions as are possessed by any other Bishop in England and was subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archbishop of York as Metro-

politan.

"And whereas by the seventh section of the said Act it is enacted that whenever a certain certificate shall have been given to Your Majesty by us the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England with respect to the endowment fund of any new bishopric in the said Act mentioned we shall lay before Your Majesty a scheme for all or any of the matters which in the same section are mentioned.

"And whereas the said certificate has been given by us in the case of the Bishopric of Newcastle as by the said Order of Your Majesty in Council of the seventeenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two appears.

"Now therefore we the said Écclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly recommend

and propose as follows; namely:-

"(1.) The Bishop for the time being of Newcastle shall have all such courts and officers and all such jurisdiction as are at present or were at the time of the publication in the London Gazette of the said Order of Your Majesty in Council of the seventeenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two possessed by the Bishop of the diocese of Durham within the area assigned by the same Order as the diocese of the Bishopric of Newcastle and all terriers tithe apportionments maps plans and other documents relating exclusively to any parish or parishes ccclesiastical districts or places situate within the diocese of Newcastle or otherwise relating exclusively to the said diocese (that is to say to the area or any part of the area thereof) shall be transferred from the custody of the Registrar or other officer of the diocese of Durham in whose custody the same now are and shall become and be in the custody of such Registrar or other officer or officers of the diocese of Newcastle as the Bishop of Newcastle shall appoint in that behalf.

"(2.) All parishes ecclesiastical districts and places churches and chapels and all the clergy and others Your Majesty's subjects within the limits of the diocese of Newcastle as the same diocese is defined by the said Order of Your Majesty in Council of the seventeenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two shall be exempted and released from all episcopal jurisdiction

authority and control of the Bishop of Durham and shall be under and subject to the episcopal jurisdiction authority and control of the Bishop of Newcastle and his successors.

"(3.) Until a Dean and Chapter of and for the said Cathedral Church of Saint Nicholas at New-castle-upon-Tyne shall have been created, the Bishop of the diocese of Newcastle may as to any and every matter with respect to which the confirmation or other agency of a Dean and Chapter is by law required for rendering effectual the action of a Bishop, take action in such matter without any such confirmation or agency and his action so taken shall not be thereby made ineffectual or invalid.

"(4.) During any and every vacancy in the See of Newcastle whether such vacancy shall happen before or after the creation of a Dean and Chapter of and for the said Cathedral Church of Saint Nicholas at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, the Archbishop of York for the time being shall have the custody and be the guardian of the spiritualities of the See of Newcastle.

"(5.) The archidiaconal supervision of all the parishes ecclesiastical districts and places comprised within the diocese of Newcastle shall remain and be with and in and be exercised by the archdeacons of the two archdeaconries comprised within the limits of that diocese as at present existing in accordance with the said Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the seventeenth day of May one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two that is to say the Archdeacon of Northumberland, and the Archdeacon of Lindisfarne each of which said two Archdeacons shall be an officer of the diocese of Newcastle and shall not be subject to the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Durham but shall be subject to the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Newcastle and the archidiaconal dignity of each of which said two archdeacons shall be transferred from the Cathedral Church of Durham to the Cathedral Church of the diocese of Newcastle that is to say to the aforesaid Cathedral Church of Saint Nicholas at Newcastle-upon-Tyne and all the endowments belonging to the said two archdeaconries respectively shall continue to belong to the same respectively notwithstanding the transfer of the same two archdeaconries from the diocese of Durham to the diocese of Newcastle.

"(6.) Any existing archdeacon whose archdeaconry is affected by the foundation of the new Bishopric of Newcastle may reside in any place in which he is residing at the date of this scheme.

"(7.) The portion of the endowment or income of the Bishopric of Durham which in the third section of the said Act and in the schedule to the same Act is mentioned (being such portion of the same endowment or income as will if no deduction were made for first fruits and tenths yield a net annual sum of one thousand pounds) shall (as the said Act and section enacts that it shall) as from the twenty-third day of May in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two being the day on which the said Order of Your Majesty in Council was published in the London Gazette as aforesaid and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same be transferred from the Bishop of Durham and from his successors, and shall for ever become and be and form part of the Newcastle Bishopric endowment fund, so as to become part of the annual income of the Bishop of Newcastle for the time being; and the said portion of the endowment or income of the said Bishopric of Durham so to be transferred as last-mentioned shall be subject to the payment of a proportionate part of the tenths and first fruits payable by the Bishop of the diocese of Durham for the time

"And with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Barber, Bishop of Durham in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal, we further recommend and propose all that is eighthly hereinafter set forth that is

"(8.) The patronage of every ecclesiastical dignity or benefice being within the diocese of Newcastle, of which dignity or benefice the patronage is now vested for any estate or interest in the Bishop of Durham shall forthwith, to the extent of such estate or interest, be without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same as aforesaid be transferred from the said Joseph Barber Bishop of Durham and from his successors to, and shall become and be vested in, the Bishop of Newcastle and his successors.

"And with the consent of the Right Reverend Ernest Roland Bishop of Newcastle in testimony whereof he has to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal we further recommend and propose all that is ninthly and tenthly hereinafter set forth

that is to say :-

" (9.) Cheshire.—So much of the township of Newton, in the county of Chester, as lies within the follow-

ing boundaries, that is to say, Hoole-road to Kilmorey-road, along Browns fence to Brook lane, along the brook to James Dickson and Son's boundary fence, to Well-lane, to Newton Hall, and along Barnes fence and Cinder-road to Hoole-road aforesaid.

Derbyshire.—(1.) So much of the counties of Warwick, Leicester, and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the Railway from Tamworth to Atherstone crosses the boundary of the borough of Tamworth, thence along the boundary of the borough and by the river Tame to Fazeley Bridge, thence along the Watling Street to Church-street in Atherstone, thence along the high-road leading from Atherstone through Twycross and Snarstone to Measham, thence along the road leading from Measham to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties to a point where the county of Stafford joins, thence along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Warwick and the boundary of the borough of Tamworth to the starting point.

So much of the parishes of Willington, Findern, Burnaston, Etwall, and Egginton, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Canal Wharf in Willington along the Canal to Stenson Lock, up Stenson-road passing on the left and taking in Mr. Tomlinson's farm premises along the occupation road (on the top of the hill) over the Midland Railway Arch, passing and taking in Hell Meadows farm premises, thence by Mays brook to the Burton turnpikeroad, turning on the left along that road and taking the turn on the right along Burnastonlane through Burnaston village, by the left (opposite Mr. Gilbert Camp's farm) along Etwall-lane, turning on the left into the occupation-lane along Hill Top into Sandy-lane passing Brown's farm, turning to the left (at the back of Etwall Lodge) along Willingtonlane, thence by the right along Blakeley brook into Egginton-lane, by the left along that lane to Park Hill Four-lane Ends, turning to the left along Willington-lane (crossing the turn-pike-road) to the Canal Bridge, and then along the Canal to the Wharf in Willington aforesaid

(3.)
