A DESPATCH, of which the following is a copy, has been received by the Secretary of State for War from the General Officer Commanding in Egypt:—

SIR, *Ismailia, September 4, 1882.*

I HAVE the honour to forward herewith copy of the report from Major-General Graham, V.C., C.B., of the action at Kassassin on the 28th ultimo.

The operations of the Cavalry were so distinct from those of the Infantry, that I venture to forward also copy of the report from Major-General Drury-Lowe, C.B., although that officer is junior to Major-General Graham, and acted under his orders during the day.

The conduct of the soldiers of all arms was excellent, and many gallant deeds were done throughout the action. Two recent instances have come under my notice of men, who, being painfully wounded early in the day, continued to do their duty until severely wounded later on. One, on the 28th ultimo, was that of Lieutenant G. G. Cunningham, of the Cornwall Light Infantry; and the other, on the 25th ultimo, was that of Gunner Joseph Knowles, of N Brigade, A Battery, Royal Horse Artillery. As it is by soldier-like courage of this nature that the British Army has always maintained its high reputation, I have great pleasure in bringing these names to your notice.

The dispositions made by Major-General Graham, V.C., C.B., during the action at Kassassin, were all they should have been; and his steady advance upon the enemy, when he showed a disposition to drive his attack home, was well conceived and well executed.

The dashing and yet skilful manner in which the 1st Brigade of Cavalry was handled by Brigadier-General Sir Baker Russell, under the immediate orders of Major-General Drury-Lowe, was all that could be desired. The charge of the Household Cavalry under Colonel Ewart was most gallantly executed.

I have to regret the loss of many brave men, and it is a matter of deep sorrow to all this army that we have not been able to ascertain the fate of Lieutenant Gribble, 3rd Dragoon Guards, who was Orderly Officer to Sir Baker Russell; he has been missing since the Cavalry charge on the 28th August, and although the ground where it took place has been searched, no trace of him has been found.

I shall only add to what is contained in the enclosed reports that all ranks of this army are

animated by the highest military spirit, and all longing to advance upon the enemy.

Inclosure 1.

From Major-General Graham to Sir Garnet Wolseley.

SIR, *Kassassin, August 29, 1882.*

I HAVE the honour to report that an important engagement with the enemy took place here yesterday, the 28th instant, in which, though attacked by a vastly superior force numerically, tried seriously by exposure to the sun and previous privations, the troops I have the honour to command finally drove back the enemy at all points; and, with the aid of the cavalry, under Major-General Drury-Lowe, C.B., inflicted severe chastisement.

The position the advanced Brigade occupied at Kassassin is not the best for defence. We are astride the Canal (which runs nearly east and west) and hold the bridge and locks. Taking the west as our proper front, on our right the desert rises to a ridge, with an elevation of from 100 to 160 feet; at a distance of from 2,000 to 3,000 yards, there is the millet and palm-covered plain of the Ouady, intersected by a disused branch of the Canal. This ridge, on our right, is obviously a source of danger to a force too weak to occupy it, as I have already observed in a previous report.

About 9.30 A.M. on the 28th instant, the enemy's Cavalry appeared in force on our left front, on the north side of the Freshwater Canal, and I at once heliographed to Major-General Drury-Lowe at Masameh. The force under my command, consisting of 57 Cavalry, 70 Mounted Infantry, 1,728 Infantry, and 40 Artillery with two 13-prs. as detailed in margin,* were at once posted by me under cover, fronting to the north and west, the Cavalry and Mounted Infantry (50) being thrown out on the flanks to observe the enemy's move-

ments, while I awaited the development of his attack. About eleven A.M. it was reported that a large force of Cavalry, Infantry, and Artillery were being moved round towards our right, behind the ridge. At twelve the enemy opened fire from two heavy guns on our left front, at least 4,000 yards off, the shot from which fell short.

The enemy's attack seemed to languish, and about three P.M., the Officer Commanding the Mounted Infantry reported the enemy retiring.

The men had been suffering very much from their long exposure to the heat of the sun without food, so I ordered them back to their camps. Major-General Drury-Lowe brought a Brigade of Cavalry within two or three miles of the camp, and about three P.M., withdrew them to Masameh; as I had previously requested him not to engage them unnecessarily.

At 4.30 P.M., the enemy advanced his Infantry in great force, displaying a line of skirmishers at least a mile in length, with which he sought to overlap my front, on the left, supported by a heavy and well directed fire of Artillery, with which he searched the camp, wounding a sick officer in the house where I had established my head-quarters; but which, as the best building, was now given up as a hospital. My dispositions to meet this attack were as follows:—On the left the Marine Artillery were directed to take up a position on the S. bank of the Canal, where (secure from being turned themselves, the Canal being 5 to 6 feet deep) they could check the enemy's advance by a flank fire. (The Royal Marine Artillery, therefore, gave fire to W. and N.W.)

In the centre, the 2nd Battalion Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry extended a fighting line of three Companies, facing W. by N., about 800 yards to the right rear (E.N.E.) of the Royal Marine Artillery. The supports and reserves of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry were under cover of the railway embankment, facing N.

The 2nd Battalion York and Lancaster extended the fighting line of the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry with 2½ Companies, keeping the remainder in support and reserve.

The position of the Infantry, therefore, was an irregular echelon, right thrown back. The troop of the 7th Dragoon Guards was kept on this flank, and the two 13-prs., now reinforced by two others, took up a position on the ridge. Unfortunately these guns had only got the ammunition in their limbers, and had soon to cease firing for want of a further supply, though they did good service while it lasted. The Mounted Infantry and detachment of 4th Dragoon Guards occupied a portion of the gap between the Royal Marine Artillery and Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, and all the persistent efforts of the enemy to break through at this point were unavailing, owing to the steady fire of the Royal Marine Artillery and the gallant resistance of the little band of Mounted Infantry and detachment of 4th Dragoon Guards dismounted and employed as Infantry. The enemy made great efforts to overcome this resistance: putting a number of men across the Canal; and three times his guns were kept from advancing, by their horses and men being shot, when trying to press past. In order to support the left, the Companies on left of Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, facing N., were spread out along line of railway embankment, and a fresh Company from the right half Battalion was moved to the left to prolong the line.

Feeling secure on my left, I turned my attention to the right flank. On the first notice of the

attack (4.30 P.M.) I had sent a message to Major-General Lowe, by heliograph, and by a mounted Officer to Masameh, 3 and 4 miles distant, requesting him to move up the Cavalry Brigade to cover my right flank, and to send forward the Royal Marine Light Infantry.

At five P.M., thinking I saw the cavalry advancing, I sent an order to Major-General Drury-Lowe to bring round his Cavalry, under cover of the hill, fall upon the left flank of the enemy's skirmishers, and roll up his line. This order was received, and gallantly executed. For an account of this part of the action, I beg to refer to Major-General Drury-Lowe's own Report.

At five P.M. I observed reinforcements coming to the enemy by train, and fearing a charge of Cavalry, on our exposed right, directed the Officer Commanding the Reserve Company of York and Lancaster to prepare to receive them in line. Near the right of our position, on the line of railway, a Krupp gun, taken from the enemy at Masameh, had been mounted on a railway truck, and was being worked by a gun detachment of the Royal Marine Artillery, under Captain Tucker. This gun was admirably served, and did great execution among the enemy. As the other guns had to cease firing, for want of ammunition, Captain Tucker's gun became the target for the enemy's artillery, and I counted salvoes of four guns opening on him at once with shell and shrapnel; but although everything around or in line was hit, not a man of the gun detachment was touched, and this gun continued to fire to the end, expending 93 rounds.

At 6.45 P.M., I ordered an advance, with the object of closing on the enemy's Infantry, about the time of the expected Cavalry charge. The advance was made very steadily, by the fighting line, in echelon from the left, about 600 yards to our west front, when the line fired volleys by Companies; the Reserves following in rear of the railway embankment.

On arriving at the point held by the Mounted Infantry, a message reached me that the Royal Marine Light Infantry had come on to the ground on our right; and, galloping back, I at once directed them to advance in order of attack. This advance was continued for about 2 or 3 miles supported by the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry on left, the York and Lancaster being left behind in reserve, the enemy falling back, only one attempt being made at a stand, on our left, which broke at the first volley of the Royal Marines.

About 8.15 P.M., I first heard of the cavalry charge from an Officer of the 1st Life Guards, who had lost his way.

We had now been advancing, for an hour and a-half, in the moonlight, and my two aides-de-camp had had narrow escapes in mistaking detached bodies of the enemy for our own troops. Fearing some mistake might be made, and seeing no further chance of co-operation with the cavalry, I ordered the Marines and Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry to retire at 8.45 P.M. On approaching the camp, I called in the other troops.

The accompanying rough sketch shows approximately the position held by the Infantry during the action.

During the night, the enemy made no sign, and this morning at daybreak, I rode out over the battlefield, and have had all wounded, that were found, brought in.

I append a detailed list of killed and wounded,

an abstract of which is given in the margin.* The corps which suffered most heavily was the Royal Marine Artillery, under Lieutenant-Colonel Tuson, whom I would beg to bring especially to your notice. Lieutenant-Colonel Tuson speaks in high terms of the conduct of Major Ogle, Captain Rawstorne, Lieutenants Pym and Talbot, and of Captain and Adjutant Noble, whose horse was killed under him. The Mounted Infantry also suffered heavily, and, early in the action, were deprived of the services of their gallant leader, Lieutenant Piggott, an officer who deserves especial mention. Another valuable officer of this Corps, Lieutenant Edwards, was also wounded. The services of the Mounted Infantry have been invaluable to me, in the absence of a sufficient force of Cavalry. I have also to bring to your notice the admirable steadiness of the 2nd Battalion Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry under fire, and during their advance under Colonel Richardson. This officer mentions Lieutenant - Colonel John, Major Grieve, Lieutenant and Adjutant Ashby, and Lieutenant Falls, as being indefatigable in their exertions. The 2nd Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry were effectively supported by the 2nd York and Lancaster, under Colonel Wilson, to whose careful personal leading, ably supported by the officers under him, much credit is due. The Royal Marine Light Infantry, although they arrived too late to take any decisive share in the action, showed by the promptitude of their march to the field, and the steadiness of their advance, under Colonel Jones, that they are well capable of sustaining the high character of their Corps.

In general, I cannot too highly express my opinion of the steadiness of the troops under fire, and the ready alacrity with which they carried out my orders. Although exposed for two hours to a heavy fire of Artillery, the lines, I advanced, were full of cheerful confidence, and eager to close with the enemy.

I may also mention that the five hours' exposure to the sun in the morning, expecting an attack, had been most trying to the men; and that the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry had not had time to eat their dinners before they were ordered out to meet the enemy.

I estimate the enemy's force at 1,000 cavalry, 8,000 infantry, and 12 guns.

I beg to bring to your notice Major Hart, V.C., R.E., who showed the utmost devotion on this, as on other occasions.

Lieutenant Pirie, 4th Dragoon Guards, was attached to me as extra Aide-de-Camp, and rendered invaluable service in carrying my order to General Drury-Lowe, to charge. At the time I imagined the brigade to be near at hand, and Lieutenant Pirie galloped on until his horse dropped, fortunately near to a battery of Royal Artillery, where he got another horse, and continued his gallop, till he reached General Drury-Lowe.

Captain Hare, my Brigade Major, also rendered good service in carrying messages, and by his

cheerful readiness to do any service required in the fighting line.

From Major-General Drury-Lowe to Major-General Willis, C.B.

SIR,

Masameh, August 29, 1882.

HAVING received information from Major-General Graham, at Kassassin, that the enemy were advancing on his position, and having been told by Colonel Keyser that his signallers had been withdrawn, I turned out the following troops of the 1st Cavalry Brigade, under Brigadier-General Sir Baker Russell, viz., Household Cavalry, 7th Dragoon Guards, and four guns, N Battery A Brigade Royal Horse Artillery, and advanced towards the enemy's left. A distant and ineffective artillery fire was being directed against General Graham's position, but beyond this nothing was taking place. I remained some hours, communicated with General Graham, and withdrew my brigade about 4.30 p.m. At about 5.30, Major Molyneux arrived from Kassassin, and gave me a message from General Graham, that the enemy was advancing in force; I again, 5.30 p.m., turned out the brigade, and moved to the sound of the heavy firing that was now taking place. En route, a galloper reached me from General Graham, who stated that the General desired him to say that "he was only just able to hold his own, and that he wished me to attack the left of the enemy's infantry skirmishers." The sun had now set, and a bright moon was shining. The light, however, was not good, owing to the haze, and we were guided by the flash of guns and musketry. I made a wide circuit to turn the enemy's left, and the brigade arrived, without being noticed, near this portion of their line. As we approached a heavy fire of shells and musketry was opened upon us, which was practically harmless, as it was very high. I cleared the front of our guns by a retirement of the first line, whilst the Household Cavalry on their right, formed line. After a few rounds from our guns, Sir Baker Russell led a charge, of the Household Cavalry under Colonel Ewart, against the enemy's infantry, which had commenced to advance. Moving most steadily towards the flash of the rifles, the charge was right gallantly led and executed. The enemy's infantry was completely scattered, and our Cavalry swept through a battery of seven or nine guns, which, in daylight, must have been captured, but unfortunately, their exact position could not be found afterwards, and they were no doubt removed during the fight, after our retirement. The enemy's loss was heavy, the ground being thickly strewn with their killed, and quantities of ammunition, &c. I beg to attach a list of casualties sustained by the brigade, which considering the nature of the attack, was not heavy. The greatest praise is due to the Household Cavalry for their behaviour throughout, and I have to thank Brigadier-General Sir Baker Russell, and the officers and men of the brigade, for their gallant conduct.

THE following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those areas, without untrucking):—

Derbyshire.—(1.) So much of the parishes of Willington, Findern, Burnaston, Etwall, and Egginton, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Canal Wharf in Willington along the Canal to Stenson Lock, up Stenson-road passing on the left and taking in Mr. Tomlinson's farm premises along the occupation road (on the top of the hill) over the Midland Railway Arch, passing and taking in Hell Meadows farm premises, thence by Mays brook to the Burton turnpike-road, turning on the left along that road and taking the turn on the right along Burnaston-lane through Burnaston village, by the left (opposite Mr. Gilbert Camp's farm) along Etwall-lane, turning on the left into the occupation-lane along Hill Top into Sandy-lane passing Brown's farm, turning to the left (at the back of Etwall Lodge) along Willington-lane, thence by the right along Blakeley brook into Egginton-lane, by the left along that lane to Park Hill Four-lane Ends, turning to the left along Willington-lane (crossing the turnpike-road) to the Canal Bridge, and then along the Canal to the Wharf in Willington aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Walton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, Croxall, Bretby, Hartshorne, and Swadlincote, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton upon-Trent to Ashby-road, turning to the right along Ashby-road to Masons Arms Midway, turning to the right along Swadlincote-road to Reed's Mill, thence by the right along Newhall-road, turning to the left by Swadlincote Oldfield Colliery and Cartwright's Mill to Swadlincote Market Place, thence by the right along the turnpike-road by Hall and Boardman's Colliery, Catchems Inn, and lane by Kidds Rough and Beards Brewery to High Cross Banks at Castle Gresley, thence to the right along Brookey-lane to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, turning to the left up the road through the village of Linton by the Red

Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence and Seal brook to its junction with the river Mease, along that river turning to the right along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to where it intersects the road near Westbrook farm, turning to the left by Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale Schools, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the river Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(3.) The whole of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent.

(4.) So much of the parishes or townships of Newton Solney, Bretby, and Winhill, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Unicorn Inn Newton Solney up Newton-lane by Mr. Spooner's farm to the top, thence to the right along Bretby-lane by wheelwright's shop to the point where it intersects the boundary line of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent near Moat Bank House, thence to the right along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent at Winhill to the river Trent, to the right along the river Trent to a point opposite Smedley House at Newton Solney, thence to the right in a straight line from that point to Smedley's-lane, and up that lane by the Plough Inn and blacksmith's shop to the Unicorn Inn aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Spondon, and Chaddesden, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Spondon Church along the Locks-road, along Brandy-lane, on the left by the foot-road over the fields to Chaddesden brook, by the left along that brook to the river Derwent, by the left along the river side, turning by the left into and along Lodge-lane, crossing the Midland Railway, and passing the Railway Station the Nottingham-road to Spondon Church aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Mickleover, Littleover, Burnaston, Radbourne, and Bearwardcote, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Chain-lane Toll Gate, along the Etwall-road, to the right along Poke-lane into and along Mickleover-lane to Radbourne Three-lane Ends, returning and taking the brook course on the right over the fields to The Bonnells farm, down Bonnells-lane, by the right along Etwall-road taking the turn on the left and along Burnaston-lane, through that village to Three-lane Ends, taking the lane on the left to Little Derby, by the left along the Derby turnpike-road to Chain-lane End, and by the left along that lane to Chain-lane Toll Gate aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Little Eaton, and Breadsall, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Breadsall Canal Bridge adjoining the Derby and Ripley-highway, along that highway taking the turn to the left down Green-lane at the foot of the second Canal Bridge to the river Derwent, by the right along the side of that river to the garden fence of the Bull's Head Inn, turning by the right along the lane to Eaton Bank, turning to the left by Duffield Bank Lodges along Eaton Bank, by the right at Miss Watson's shop along the Steeple Hill Bridle Stall-lane and Whittaker-lane into the Derby-

road, turning to the right along that road crossing Jack of Darley Bridge, turning by the left up Morley Moor-road to Three-lane Ends, taking the lane on the right passing Sheep Gaps farm on the left through Breadsall village, and thence to the Canal Bridge adjoining the Derby and Ripley-highway aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the parishes of Alvaston, and Elvaston, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Meadow-lane End on the Derby and Shardlow-road, along that road through Alvaston village, turning to the left over fields along Elvaston Park side to Borrowwash-lane, along that lane by the left to the river Derwent, by the left along that river side through the meadows to Meadow-lane, and turning by the left along that lane to Meadow-lane End on the Derby and Shardlow-road aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the counties of Warwick, Leicester, and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the Railway from Tamworth to Atherstone crosses the boundary of the borough of Tamworth, thence along the boundary of the borough and by the river Tame to Fazeley Bridge, from Fazeley Bridge by the river Tame to Kingsbury Bridge, thence by the road to the Kingsbury Station, thence by the Mineral Railway to the Hall End Colliery, thence by the Colliery-road to the Watling Street, thence along the Watling Street to Church-street in Atherstone, thence along the high-road leading from Atherstone through Twycross and Snarstone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarstone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties to a point where the county of Stafford joins, thence along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Warwick and the boundary of the borough of Tamworth to the starting point.

(4.) So much of the parish of Twycross, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Gopsall Wood to Gopsall House on the north, the brook across the new road to Gardner's Barn on the east, across the turnpike-road to Haywood Hovel to the Atherstone turnpike-road on the south, and Orton-lane across the Appleby turnpike-road to Gopsall Wood aforesaid on the west.

(5.) So much of the counties of Warwick, Leicester, and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the Railway from Tamworth to Atherstone crosses the boundary of the borough of Tamworth, thence along the boundary of the borough and by the river Tame to Fazeley Bridge, from Fazeley Bridge by the river Tame to Kingsbury Bridge, thence by the road to the Kingsbury Station, thence by the Mineral Railway to the Hall End Colliery, thence by the Colliery-road to the Watling Street, thence along the Watling Street to Church-street in Atherstone, thence along the high-road leading from Atherstone through Twycross and Snarstone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarstone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties to a point where the county of Stafford joins, thence along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Warwick and the boundary of the borough of Tamworth to the starting point.

Lincolnshire (Lindsey).—(1.) So much of the parish of Great Limber, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Great Limber to Kirmington on the north, the highway leading from Great Limber to Grasby on the south and east, and by certain gardens in the occupation of Plaskitt and Abbott on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Caistor, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Caistor to Brigg on the east, the occupation-road leading out of the said highway to Sand Braes on the south, the hedge dividing a corn-field and grass-field in the occupation of John Anson on the west, and the hedge between the Brick-yard in the occupation

of Thomas Ringrose and a certain farm in the occupation of Benjamin Marshall on the north.

Nottinghamshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Wilford, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a certain road known as Wilford-lane leading from the Old Toll Bar to Wilford blacksmith's shop on the north-west, Ruddington-road to Landmear-lane on the south, Landmear-lane to Loughborough-road on the east, and Loughborough-road to the Old Wilford Toll Bar on the north.

(2.) So much of the parish of Wilford, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Trent from the borough boundary near Wilford Bridge on the north, along the river Trent to the Clifton boundary brook on the west, along the boundary fence to Ruddington-road on the south, along the Ruddington-road to Wilford blacksmith's shop, and along Wilford-lane to The Gravel House on the east, and along the river Trent by the borough boundary to Wilford Bridge aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Ruddington, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Ruddington to Wilford on the west, the highway leading to Edwalton Bar on the east, the boundary fence of Bradmore and Ruddington on the north, and the foot-way leading from Ruddington to Bradmore on the south.

Staffordshire.—(1.) So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Walton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, Croxall, Bretby, Harts-horne, and Swadlincote, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Ashby-road, turning to the right along Ashby-road to Masons Arms Midway, turning to the right along Swadlincote-road to Reed's Mill, thence by the right along Newhall-road, turning to the left by Swadlincote Oldfield Colliery and Cartwright's Mill to Swadlincote Market Place, thence by the right along the turnpike-road by Hall and Boardman's Colliery, Catchems Inn, and lane by Kidds Rough and Beards Brewery to High Cross Banks at Castle Gresley, thence to the right along Brookey-lane to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, turning to the left up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence and Seal brook to its junction with the river Mease, along that river turning to the right along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to where it intersects the road near Westbrook farm, turning to the left by Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale Schools, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the river Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(2.) The whole of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent.

(3.) So much of the parishes of Bradley, Haughton, Castle Church, and Penkrige, in the county of Stafford, as is bounded by the highway from Hyde Lea to Levedale, thence by the highway through Bradley village to Haughton, thence by the main-road to Billington Bank, thence by the highway to Doxey Wood, and by the footpath from Doxey Wood to Hyde Lea aforesaid.

(4.) The petty sessional division of Elford, except the portion of the parish of Edingale which lies on the northern side of the highway from Lullington through Edingale village to Croxall; the petty sessional divisions of Rugeley, and Burton-upon-Trent, except the portion of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent situate within the latter division; the township of Newborough; such portions of the townships of Marchington, and Draycott-in-the-Clay, as lie to the east of the turnpike-road from Yoxall to Sudbury; the place called Staffordshire Moor; the township of Fazeley with its liberties; the townships of Swinfen and Packington, Wall, Pipehill, and Burntwood (including Edial and Woodhouses); the Chapelry of Hammerwich, the parishes of Hopwas Hays, Ogle Hay and Farewell, and so much of the parish of Cannock as lies on the eastern side of the highway from the boundary of the parish of Rugeley near Hednesford Pool through Hednesford and Heath Hays to Norton Common, all in the county of Stafford; and the whole of the borough of Lichfield.

(6.) The township of Marchington Woodlands, and so much of the townships of Marchington, and Draycott-in-the-Clay, and of the parishes of Abbots Bromley, and Uttoxeter, as are bounded by the main-road from Doveridge to Uttoxeter town, thence by the turnpike-road to Abbots Bromley village and that from there to Newborough, by the boundary of the township of Newborough from the last-mentioned turnpike-road to that from Yoxall to Sudbury, by this turnpike-road to the river Dove, and by the river Dove to the main-road aforesaid, all in the county of Stafford.

Warwickshire.—So much of the counties of Warwick, Leicester, and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the Railway from Tamworth to Atherstone crosses the boundary of the borough of Tamworth, thence along the boundary of the borough and by the river Tame to Fazeley Bridge, from Fazeley Bridge by the river Tame to Kingsbury Bridge, thence by the road to the Kingsbury Station, thence by the Mineral Railway to the Hall End Colliery, thence by the Colliery-road to the Watling Street, thence along the Watling Street to Church-street in Atherstone, thence along the high-road leading from Atherstone through Twycross and Snarstone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarstone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the

First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties to a point where the county of Stafford joins, thence along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Warwick and the boundary of the borough of Tamworth to the starting point.

Yorkshire (East Riding).—(1.) So much of the parish of Grindall, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from North Burton to Boynton on the east and south, and a quickwood fence dividing a grass field and tillage fields on the north and west sides in the same occupation and known by the name of the Back Garth.

(2.) The light exhibits white flashes every minute with total eclipses; it is elevated 157 feet above high water (148 feet above the ground), and should be visible in clear weather from a distance of 19 miles.
