"Whereas Your Majesty was graciously pleased by Your Order in Council of the 30th December 1878 to sanction the promotion of Captain His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh, K.G., K.T., K.P., G.C.S.I., G.C.M.G., Personal Aide-de-Camp to Your Majesty, to the rank of Rear-Admiral, such promotion to be additional to the authorised numbers as established by certain of Your Majesty's Orders in Council and Regulations until the time at which he would be entitled to such promotion by Seniority as Captain when he is to be considered as absorbing a vacancy.

"And whereas we are of opinion that it is now desirable to advance His Royal Highness to the rank of Vice Admiral, we would therefore submit that Your Majesty be pleased to empower us to confer such advancement under conditions similar to those under which His Royal Highness was promoted to be Rear Admiral.

"And we would moreover submit that should His Royal Highness be promoted to the rank of Admiral, either by Seniority as Vice Admiral or otherwise, he may be considered as additional to the authorised numbers under the same conditions until the time he would have attained such position according to his Seniority as Captain."

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words following; that is to say :—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Chad situate at Mill Hill in the new parish of Christ Church, Derby, in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said new parish of Christ Church, Derby, and of the particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby, in the said county of Derby, and in the said diocese of Lichfield and of the parish of Normanton in the county and diocese aforesaid, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such new parish, particular district and parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said new parish of Christ Church, Derby, of the said particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby, and of the said parish of Normanton should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should

be assigned to the said church of Saint Chad situate at Mill Hill as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend William Dalrymple, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, as such Bishop and also as the patron, in right of his See, of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby, and with the consent of the Reverend Alexander Atkinson Holden of Nuttall Temple, in the county of Nottingham, Clerk in Holy Orders, of FitzHerbert Wright, of the Hayes, Swanwick, in the said county of Derby Esquire, of Rowland Smith, of Duffield Hall, in the said county of Derby, Esquire, of William Ogle, of the Elms, Derby, Doctor of Medicine, and of the Reverend James Allan Smith, Clerk in Holy Orders now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the new parish of The Trinity Nottingham, in the diocese of Lincoln, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Christ Church, Derby, and with the consent of Francis Butcher Gill, of Lansdown-crescent, Bath, in the county of Somerset Esquire, of the said Rowland Smith, of the said FitzHerbert Wright, of the said William Ogle, of the said James Allan Smith, and of Charles Edmund Newton, of Mickleover Manor, in the said county of Derby Esquire as the patrons of the vicarage of the said parish of Normanton (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent, that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said new parish of Christ Church Derby, of the said particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby, and of the said parish of Normanton which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Chad, situate at Mill Hill as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Chad, Mill Hill, Derby.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Chad, Mill Hill, Derby, being:—

"All that portion of the new parish of Christ Church Derby and also all those contiguous portions of the particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby, and of the parish of Normanton, all in the county of Derby and in the diocese of Lichfield which said portions of such cures are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the parish of Saint Peter Derby in the said county and diocese from the new parish of Christ Church Derby aforesaid at the point where Normanton-street is joined by Charnwood-street and by Mill Hill-lane and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of seven and a quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Swinburn-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Burton-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-

one and a half chains or thereabouts to a point at or near to the junction of the said road with Stonehill private lane upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Christ Church, Derby, from the parish of Normanton aforesaid and continuing thence still south-westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-one chains or thereabouts (thereby continuing to follow the course of Burton-road aforesaid) to the point where the same boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Normanton from the parish of Littleover in the county and diocese aforesaid and continuing thence still south-westward along the last-described boundary for a distance of nineteen and three quarters chains or thereabouts (thereby still following the course of Burton-road aforesaid) to the point on Littleover Hill where the said last-described boundary joins the boundary of the municipal borough of Derby, as the same municipal borough boundary was extended under the authority of the Act of the fortieth and forty-first years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and eighteen and was thereby defined, and extending thence, that is, from the said Burton-road in a direction for the most part eastward along the said municipal borough boundary for a distance of one mile and seven-and-a-half chains or thereabouts to the point in the middle of the Old Normanton-road at Pear Tree, where the same municipal borough boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Normanton from the particular district of Saint James the Greater, Derby aforesaid, and extending thence first north-eastward and then north-westward along the last-described boundary for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts, thereby following in part the course of the said Old Normanton-road, and in part the course of Pear Tree-road, to the point a little to the south of the junction of the said Pear Tree-road with Church-street and with Normanton-road at which point the said last-described boundary bends sharply to the west and extending thence from the same boundary northward along the middle of the said Pear Tree-road for a distance of one and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Church-street and with Normanton-road as aforesaid and continuing thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of twelve and a quarter chains or thereabouts to a point upon the boundary which divides the said particular district of Saint James the Greater Derby from the new parish of Christ Church Derby aforesaid, and continuing thence still northward along the last-described boundary for a distance of fourteen chains or thereabouts thereby first continuing to follow the course of Normanton-road aforesaid and then following the course of Normanton-street aforesaid to the point at the junction of the last-named street with Leonard-street, where the said last-described boundary joins the boundary dividing the said new parish of Christ Church Derby from the parish of Saint Peter Derby aforesaid and continuing thence still northward along the last-described boundary for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts thereby still continuing to follow the course of Normanton-street aforesaid, to the first-described point at the junction of such street with Charnwood-street and with Mill Hill-lane as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced.

"Save and except from the above-described portion of the new parish of Christ Church Derby aforesaid, all that piece or parcel of land containing by admeasurement two thousand four hundred and fourteen square yards or thereabouts and situate on the north-western side of Mill Hill-lane

aforesaid whereon the house and premises called or known as Christ Church Parsonage or Vicarage House stands."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Lichfield.

THE following additions to Statute XVI Clauses 11 and 22 of the Statutes of Christ Church, Oxford, made on the 25th day of October, 1882, by the Governing Body, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877.

ADDITIONS to Statute XVI, Clauses 11 and 22, of the Statutes of Christ Church, Oxford, made at a Stated Meeting of the Governing Body by a unanimous vote, and sealed the twenty-fifth day of October, 1882.

11. Every person appointed to an Official Studentship shall be entitled to hold his Studentship (subject to the provisions for vacating Studentships otherwise than by lapse of time and for deprivation of Students in these Statutes contained) for a period of fifteen years *except as hereinafter provided*; but any Official Student may, at any time within two years before the expiration of the period for which he shall have been originally appointed or last previously re-appointed be re-appointed for any period not exceeding ten years from the expiration of the period for which he was originally appointed, or last previously re-appointed as the case may be, each re-appointment being subject to confirmation by the Governing Body at a Stated Meeting.

22. The Governing Body may, on a representation from the Electoral Board, by the vote of a majority of those present and voting at a Stated Meeting, appoint to an Official Studentship for a period not exceeding fifteen years, any person who may be deemed eminently fitted for the educational requirements of the House. Such person shall be under no restriction as regards celibacy, and shall, as far as seniority is concerned, be placed in the same position as he would have held had he been appointed from the Non-Official Students, unless the Governing Body at the time of his appointment shall think fit to confer upon him any other rank, which they shall have power to do; but so as to entitle him to no other than honorary privileges.

The following Area (namely),—so much of the parishes of Clifton, and Barton, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Clifton to the Thrumpton highway on the east, the highway leading from Barton Lodge to the river Trent on the west, the river Trent from Barton Boat to Clifton Church on the north, and the highway leading from Clifton Green to Barton Lodge on the south,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the tenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area declared by Order of Council to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely),—so much of the counties of Warwick, Leicester, and Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the Railway from Tamworth to Atherstone crosses the boundary of the borough of Tamworth, thence along the boundary of the borough and by the river Tame to Fazeley Bridge, from Fazeley Bridge by the river Tame to Kingsbury Bridge, thence by the road to the Kingsbury Station, thence by the Mineral Railway to the Hall End Colliery, thence by the Colliery-road to the Wailing Street, thence along the Watling Street to Church-street in Atherstone, thence along the high-road leading from Atherstone through Twycross and Snarstone to where that

road intersects the boundary line (Snarstone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties to a point where the county of Stafford joins, thence along the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Warwick and the boundary of the borough of Tamworth to the starting point,—is, except such portion thereof as is included in the Area described in Article 2 of this Order, hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and the Area above described, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. The following Area (namely),—so much of the counties of Leicester and Derby as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the counties of Stafford, Derby, and Warwick meet, thence along the eastern boundary of the county of Warwick to where such boundary crosses the Atherstone and Snarstone-road at Pinwall, thence along such last-mentioned road through Twycross and Snarstone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarstone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties, and thence along the boundary of the county of Stafford to the starting point,—shall be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs an Ordinance of Maritime Health issued by the Italian Government, of which the following is a translation, viz. :—

ORDINANCE OF MARITIME HEALTH, No. 11.

THE Minister of the Interior, in view of the law of March 20, 1865, chap. c. on Maritime Health and the Ministerial Instructions of December 26, 1871, having official information of the existence of cholera at Mecca, decrees :—

ART. 1. All ships arriving from a port of the Hedjaz, or any port on the Arabian coast of the Red Sea, which have not undergone regular quarantine in uninfected intermediate ports, will be subjected to a quarantine of three days observation if they arrive with clean bills of health for the voyage, and to a rigorous quarantine of ten days in the lazaretto if they have had cases of cholera on board, or have any at the time of arrival.

ART. 2. Ships from Egypt with clean bills of health for the voyage and in good sanitary condition, will be subjected to three days of observation. This period will be reduced to twenty-four hours for such ships as have a medical official on board.

The Prefects of the maritime provinces are charged with the execution of the above Decree.

Position of Light near Lefchimo Point.

WITH reference to Notice to Mariners, No. 12, of 1874, on the exhibition of a light of small power at the mouth of the river near Salternes of Lefchimo, south east end of Corfu Island.

Information has been received from Admiral Sir F. Beauchamp P. Seymour, G.C.B., Commander-in-Chief, Mediterranean Station, that this light is shown from a small square stone column on the centre of the pier, south side of Potami River Entrance. This is about $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-eastward of the position formerly assigned it.

The light is an oil lamp, which is not at all times to be depended upon.

Position, lat. $39^{\circ} 25' 30''$ N., long. $20^{\circ} 6' 20''$ E.

NOTE.—The light-vessel on the shoal ground extending off Lefchimo Point is now placed on the north-east part of this shoal ground, or about 3 cables E.S.E. of the position heretofore assigned.

These buoys are about $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles apart.

Tramway No. 1 will be laid as a single line, except at the following parts, where it will be laid as a double line (that is to say):—

In Winwick-road, for a distance of 2 chains from its commencement; and between the north side of Kerfoot-street and a point 3 chains south thereof.
