The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, in the words following; that is to say:—

“We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty, chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Emmanuel situate in Tinsley-road Attercliffe in the particular district of All Saints Brightside within the original limits of the parish of Sheffield in the county of York and in the diocese of York.

“Whereas at certain extremities of the said particular district of All Saints, Brightside, of the new parish of Brightside of the new parish of Attercliffe and of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sheffield Park (all which said new parishes are within the original limits of the parish of Sheffield aforesaid) which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such particular district and new parishes respectively.

“And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said particular district of All Saints Brightside of the said new parish of Brightside, of the said new parish of Attercliffe and of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sheffield Park should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all eccle-

siastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Emmanuel situate in Tinsley-road Attercliffe as aforesaid.

“Now therefore with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William Archbishop of York as diocesan with the consent of the said William Archbishop of York of John Edward Blakeney of Sheffield aforesaid Doctor in Divinity now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Sheffield of Sir John Brown of Endcliffe Hall in the said parish of Sheffield, Knight and of John Devonshire Ellis of Thurnscoe Hall in the said county of York Steel Manufacturer as the patrons of the perpetual curacy of the said particular district of All Saints Brightside with the consent of the said William Archbishop of York as one of the alternate patrons in right of his See of the vicarage of the said new parish of Brightside and of the Right Honourable William Ewart Gladstone, a Member of the Commons House of Parliament the First Lord of Your Majesty's Treasury, acting as such First Lord on behalf of Your Majesty as the other alternate patron (in right of the Crown) of the said vicarage of the new parish of Brightside aforesaid with the consent of the said John Edward Blakeney as the patron in right of his incumbency of the said vicarage of the parish of Sheffield aforesaid, of the vicarage of the said new parish of Attercliffe and with the consent of the Right Reverend Rowley Hill now Bishop of the diocese of Sodor and Man, of Samuel Roberts of the Towers Sheffield aforesaid Esquire of James Crossland, of Norfolk-road Sheffield aforesaid Esquire and of Charles Macro Wilson of East Parade Sheffield aforesaid, Gentleman, as the patrons of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Sheffield Park (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said particular district of All Saints Brightside, of the said new parish of Brightside, of the said new parish of Attercliffe and of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sheffield Park which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Emmanuel situate in Tinsley-road Attercliffe as aforesaid and that the

same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Emannel Attercliffe.'

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Emmanuel, Attercliffe being:—

"All that portion of the particular district of All Saints Brightside and also those contiguous portions of the new parish of Brightside of the new parish of Attercliffe and of the new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sheffield Park all within the original limits of the parish of Sheffield in the county of York and in the diocese of York which said portions of such particular district and of such new parishes are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the central point in the bridge at the north-western end of the Victoria Railway Station which bridge carries the line of the Manchester Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway over the River Don at which point the boundaries of the said particular district of All Saints Brightside of the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sheffield Park and of the new parish of Wicker also within the original limits of the parish of Sheffield aforesaid all meet, and extending thence that is from the said point first south-eastward and then eastward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of about one mile thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John the Evangelist Sheffield Park from the new parish of Attercliffe aforesaid to the centre of the bridge which carries Woodbourne-street over the same line of railway and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of four chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lumley-street and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of seven and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Lovetot-road and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bacon-lane and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said lane for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts thereby passing over the Sheffield Canal to the junction of the same lane with Effingham-road and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Carlton-road and with Baldwin-street and extending thence north-westward across the said Carlton-road and along the middle of Baldwin-street aforesaid for a distance of seven and three-quarter chains or thereabouts to its junction with Stevenson-road and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to its present northern end and continuing thence in precisely the same direction along the middle of the course of the proposed continuation of the same road for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the bank of the River Don aforesaid and continuing thence still northward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the said river upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Attercliffe from the new parish of Brightside aforesaid and extending thence westward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts thereby

following the course of the River Don aforesaid to the point where the said river strikes the line of the Midland Railway and extending thence first north-westward and in a direct line to a point in the middle of the last-named line of railway and then north-eastward along the middle of the same line of railway for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the said line of railway over Brightside-lane and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of eighteen chains or thereabouts to a point at the junction of the same lane with Carr Wood-lane and with Saville-street East upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Brightside from the particular district of All Saints Brightside aforesaid and continuing thence still south-westward for a distance of seventy-one chains or thereabouts along the middle of the last-named street and along the middle of Saville-street to a point at the centre of the railway bridge on the Manchester Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway aforesaid at the junction of the last-named street with the streets called or known respectively as Spital-hill and the Wicker such last-mentioned point being on the boundary which divides the said particular district of All Saints Brightside from the new parish of Wicker aforesaid and extending thence south-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of three and a half chains or thereabouts thereby following the course of the last-named line of railway to the first-described point at the centre of the bridge at the north-western end of the said Victoria Railway Station where the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of York.

Goody on the south, and the road leading from Moulton to Holcot on the west; (2.) at Great Houghton, in the county of Northampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Nene on the north, Little Houghton village on the east, and the Northampton and Bedford Railway on the south and west; (3.) at Creaton, in the county of Northampton, comprised within the following
