THE Queen has been pleased to grant unto Ella Katharine Hillas-Drake, heretofore Ella Katharine Hillas, of Princes-gardens, in the county of Middlesex, Spinster, and to her brother, Thomas Standish Hillas, of the same place, an Undergraduate of Trinity College, in the University of Dublin, Her Royal licence and authority that she, the said Ella Katharine Hillas-Drake, may continue to use the surname of Drake in addition to and after that of Hillas, and that he, the said Thomas Standish Hillas, may take and use the surname of Drake in addition to and after the name of Hillas :

And to command that the said Royal concession and declaration be recorded in Her Majesty's College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of none effect.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Valparaiso, intimating that, under the Regulations issued by the Chilean Government in 1878, but only recently put in force, all vessels arriving in the ports of that Republic have to undergo quarantine, unless provided with a bill of health viséd by the Chilean Consul at the port from which such vessels sail.
