WHEREAS by the "Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873," it was amongst other things enacted, that where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, Her Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that Her Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of Her Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, between Her Majesty and the President of the Republic of Salvador, for the Mutual Extradition of Fugitive Criminals, which Treaty is in the terms following:—

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and his Excellency the President of the Republic of Salvador, having judged it expedient, with a view to the better administration of justice and to the prevention of crime within the two countries and their jurisdictions, that persons charged with or convicted of the crimes or offences hereinafter enumerated, and being fugitives from justice, should, under certain circumstances, be reciprocally delivered up, have named as their Plenipotentiaries to conclude a Treaty (that is to say):

"Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, the Right Honourable Richard Bickerton Pemell, Lord Lyons, a Peer of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, one of Her Britannic Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and Her Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the French Republic;

"And his Excellency the President of the Republic of Salvador, Señor Don José Maria Torres-Calcedo, Minister Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Salvador to Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Grand Officer of the Legion of Honour;

"Who, after having communicated to each other their respective full powers, found in good and due form, have agreed upon and concluded the following Articles:—

"Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, y Su Excelencia el Presidente de la República de Salvador, habiendo juzgado conveniente, con la mira de mejorar la administracion de justicia y prevenir los crímenes en ámbos países y sus jurisdicciones, que las personas acusadas ó convictas de los delitos ó crímenes que en seguida se enumerarán, huyendo la justicia, sean, bajo ciertas circunstancias, recíprocamente entregadas, han nombrado por sus Plenipotenciarios para concluir un Tratado, á saber:—

"Su Majestad la Reina del Reino Unido de Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, al Muy Honorable Richard Bickerton Pemell, Lord Lyons, Par del Reino Unido de Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, Gran Cruz de la Muy Honorable Orden del Baño, Gran Cruz de la Muy Distinguida Orden de San Miguel y San Jorge, uno de los Más Honorables Consejeros de Su Majestad Británica, Embajador Extraordinario y Plenipotenciario de Su Majestad Británica ante la República Francesa;

"Y Su Excelencia el Señor Presidente de la República del Salvador, al Señor Don José Maria Torres-Calcedo, Ministro Plenipotenciario de la República del Salvador, acreditado ante el Gobierno de Su Majestad la Reina de la Gran Bretaña é Irlanda, Gran Oficial de la Legion de Honor;

"Quienes, despues de haberse comunicado mutuamente sus respectivos plenos poderes y encontrádoslos en buena y debida forma, han aceptado y admitido los Artículos siguientes:—

"ARTICLE I.

"The High Contracting Parties engage to deliver up to each other, under the circumstances and conditions stated in the present Treaty, those persons who, being accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences enumerated in Article II, committed in the territory of the one Party, shall be found within the territory of the other Party.

"ARTICLE II.

"The extradition shall be reciprocally granted for the following crimes or offences :—

"1. Murder (including assassination, parricide, infanticide, poisoning), or attempt to murder.

"2. Manslaughter.

"3. Administering drugs or using instruments with intent to procure the miscarriage of women.

"4. Rape.

"5. Aggravated or indecent assault; carnal knowledge of a girl under the age of 10 years; carnal knowledge of a girl above the age of 10 years and under the age of 12 years; indecent assault upon any female, or any attempt to have carnal knowledge of a girl under 12 years of age.

"6. Kidnapping and false imprisonment, child-stealing, abandoning, exposing, or unlawfully detaining children.

"7. Abduction of minors.

"8. Bigamy.

"9. Wounding, or inflicting grievous bodily harm.

"10. Assaulting a magistrate, or peace or public officer.

"11. Threats, by letter or otherwise, with intent to extort money or other things of value.

"12. Perjury or subornation of perjury.

"13. Arson.

"14. Burglary or housebreaking, robbery with violence, larceny, or embezzlement.

"15. Fraud by a bailee, banker, agent, factor, trustee, director, member, or public officer of any Company, made criminal by any law for the time being in force.

"16. Obtaining money, valuable security, or goods by false pretences; receiving any money, valuable security, or other property, knowing the same to have been stolen or unlawfully obtained.

"17 (a.) Counterfeiting or altering money, or bringing into circulation counterfeited or altered money.

(b.) Forgery, or counterfeiting or altering, or uttering what is forged, counterfeited, or altered.

(c.) Knowingly making, without lawful authority, any instrument, tool, or engine, adapted and intended for the counterfeiting of coin of the realm.

"18. Crimes against Bankruptcy Law.

"19. Any malicious act done with intent to endanger persons in a railway train.

"20. Malicious injury to property, if such offence be indictable.

"21. Crimes committed at sea :—

(a.) Piracy by the law of nations.

"ARTICULO I.

"Las Altas Partes Contratantes se comprometen á entregarse reciprocamente en las condiciones y circunstancias expresadas en el presente Tratado, las personas que siendo acusadas ó convictas de los delitos ó crímenes enumerados en el Artículo II, cometidos en el territorio de una de las Partes, se encuentren dentro del territorio de la otra Parte.

"ARTICULO II.

"La extradición será recíprocamente acordada por los siguientes crímenes ó delitos :—

"1. Homicidio premeditado (incluyendo el asesinato, el parricidio, el infanticidio, el envenenamiento), ó tentativa de homicidio premeditado.

"2. Homicidio.

"3. Administración de drogas ó el uso de instrumentos á fin de ocasionar el aborto en las mujeres.

"4. Estupro.

"5. Atentado al pudor con violencia; relaciones sensuales con una muchacha menor de diez años; relaciones sensuales con una muchacha mayor de diez años y menor de doce años; atentado al pudor con cualquiera mujer, ó tentativa alguna para tener relaciones sensuales con una muchacha menor de doce años.

"6. Hurto de niños ó adultos para trasportarlos á otro país ó conservarlos en el mismo (plagio), indebida encarceración, abandono, exposición, y encierro ilegal de niños ó adultos.

"7. Rapto de menores.

"8. Bigamia.

"9. Heridas ó golpes graves en el cuerpo.

"10. Violencias contra algún magistrado, oficial de paz ó público.

"11. Amenazas por medio de cartas ó de otra manera, con ánimo de obtener indebidamente dinero ú otras cosas de valor.

"12. Perjurio, soborno para perjurio.

"13. Incendio voluntario.

"14. Robo con efracción, robo con violencia, ratería, y hurto.

"15. Fraude cometido por un depositario de bienes, banquero, mandatario, comisionista, administrador de bienes ajenos, tutor, curador, liquidador, síndico, oficial ministerial, director, miembro ú oficial público de alguna compañía, considerado el fraude como criminal por alguna ley vigente.

"16. Estafa ó todo lo que sea obtener dinero, fianza ó mercaderías por medio de falsos datos; recibir dinero, fianza ó cualesquiera otros valores, sabiendo que han sido robados ó adquiridos en oposición á las leyes.

"17. (a.) Falsificar ó alterar moneda, ó poner en circulación moneda falsa ó alterada.

(b.) Contrahacer, falsificar ó alterar, ó poner en circulación lo que está falsificado, contrahecho ó alterado.

(c.) Hacer premeditadamente, sin permiso de la autoridad constituida, algún instrumento, herramienta ó máquina con la intención de falsificar ó contrahacer la moneda nacional.

"18. Crímenes cometidos contra la ley de quiebras.

"19. Cualquier acto doloso ejecutado con la mira de poner en peligro las personas que viajen en trenes de ferro carriles.

"20. Perjuicio malicioso causado á la propiedad, si el delito es justiciable.

"21. Delitos cometidos en el mar :—

(a.) Piratería, según la ley de las naciones.

"(b.) Sinking or destroying a vessel at sea, or attempting or conspiring to do so.

"(c.) Revolt, or conspiracy to revolt, by two or more persons on board a ship on the high seas against the authority of the master.

"(d.) Assault on board a ship on the high seas with intent to destroy life, or to do grievous bodily harm.

"22. Dealing in slaves in such manner as to constitute an offence against the laws of both countries.

"The extradition is also to take place for participation in any of the aforesaid crimes as an accessory before or after the fact, provided such participation be punishable by the laws of both Contracting Parties.

"ARTICLE III.

"No Salvadorian shall be delivered up by the Government of Salvador to the Government of the United Kingdom, and no subject of the United Kingdom shall be delivered up by the Government thereof to the Government of Salvador.

"ARTICLE IV.

"The extradition shall not take place if the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or the person claimed on the part of the Government of Salvador, has already been tried and discharged or punished, or is still under trial in the territory of Salvador or in the United Kingdom respectively for the crime for which his extradition is demanded.

"If the person claimed on the part of the Government of the United Kingdom, or on the part of the Government of Salvador, should be under examination for any other crime in the territory of Salvador or in the United Kingdom respectively, his extradition shall be deferred until the conclusion of the trial and the full execution of any punishment awarded to him.

"ARTICLE V.

"The extradition shall not take place if, subsequently to the commission of the crime, or the institution of the penal prosecution or the conviction thereon, exemption from prosecution or punishment has been acquired by lapse of time, according to the laws of the State applied to.

"ARTICLE VI.

"A fugitive criminal shall not be surrendered if the offence in respect of which his surrender is demanded is one of a political character, or if he prove that the requisition for his surrender has, in fact, been made with a view to try or punish him for an offence of a political character.

"ARTICLE VII.

"A person surrendered can in no case be kept in prison or be brought to trial in the State to which the surrender has been made, for any other crime, or on account of any other matters, than those for which the extradition shall have taken place. This stipulation does not apply to crimes committed after the extradition.

"ARTICLE VIII.

"The requisition for extradition shall be made through the Diplomatic Agents of the High Contracting Parties respectively.

"The requisition for the extradition of an accused person must be accompanied by a warrant of arrest issued by the competent authority of the State requiring the extradition, and by such evidence as, according to the laws of the place

"(b.) Echar á pique ó destruir un buque en el mar, ó esforzarse ó conspirar para hacerlo.

"(c.) Sublevacion ó conspiracion para rebelarse, de dos ó más personas á bordo de un buque, en alta mar, contra la autoridad del capitán.

"(d.) Ataques á bordo de un buque en alta mar, con intencion de quitar la vida ó de hacer otro daño grave corporal.

"22. Darse al Tráfico de Esclavos, si fuese con violacion de las leyes de ámbos paises.

"La extradicion tambien se puede pedir por la participacion en cualquiera de los crímenes mencionados más arriba, como un accesorio ántes ó despues del hecho, con tal que dicha participacion sea castigado por las leyes de las dos Partes Contratantes.

"ARTICULO III.

"Ningun Salvadoreño será entregado por el Gobierno del Salvador al Gobierno del Reino Unido, y ningun súbdito del Reino Unido será entregado por su Gobierno al Gobierno del Salvador.

"ARTICULO IV.

"La extradicion no se efectuará si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno del Reino Unido, ó la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno del Salvador, ha sido ya juzgada, absuelta ó castigada, ó está aún procesándose en el territorio del Salvador ó del Reino Unido respectivamente, por el delito por el cual se pide la extradicion.

"Si la persona reclamada por parte del Gobierno del Reino Unido, ó por parte del Gobierno del Salvador, estuviese sometida á juicio por algun otro delito en el territorio del Salvador ó del Reino Unido respectivamente, se deferirá su extradicion hasta el fin del juicio y la plena ejecucion de cualquiera castigo á que fuese condenada.

"ARTICULO V.

"La extradicion no se efectuará si, subsecuentemente á la ejecucion del crimen ó al empezar el proceso, ó á la conviccion del reo, se puede oponer la prescripcion para que sea exento de proceso ó del castigo, segun las leyes del Estado al cual se reclama.

"ARTICULO VI.

"El reo fugitivo no será entregado si el delito por el cual se pide la extradicion es de un carácter político, ó si se prueba que la peticion para entregarlo se ha hecho en efecto con la mira de juzgarlo ó castigarlo por un delito de carácter político.

"ARTICULO VII.

"Una persona entregada no podrá, en ningun caso, ser mantenida en prision ó procesada en el Estado al que se ha hecho la entrega, por ningun otro crimen ó delito, ó por ninguna otra causa que aquella por la cual se ha efectuado la extradicion. Esta estipulacion no se aplica á crímenes cometidos despues de la extradicion.

"ARTICULO VIII.

"La peticion de extradicion se hará respectivamente por medio de los Agentes Diplomáticos de las Altas Partes Contratantes.

"La demanda de extradicion de una persona acusada debe ir acompañada de una orden de prision, dictada por la autoridad competente del Estado que pide la extradicion, y fundada en testimonios tales que segun las leyes del lugar

where the accused is found, would justify his arrest if the crime had been committed there.

"If the requisition relates to a person already convicted, it must be accompanied by the sentence of condemnation passed against the convicted person by the competent Court of the State that makes the requisition for extradition.

"A requisition for extradition cannot be founded solely on sentences passed in *contumaciam*, but persons convicted for contumacy shall be deemed to be accused persons.

"ARTICLE IX.

"If the requisition for extradition be in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the competent authorities of the State applied to shall proceed to the arrest of the fugitive.

"The prisoner is then to be brought before a competent Magistrate, who is to examine him, and to conduct the preliminary investigation of the case, just as if the apprehension had taken place for a crime committed in the same country.

"ARTICLE X.

"A fugitive criminal may be apprehended under a warrant issued by any Police Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority in either country, on such information or complaint, and such evidence, or after such proceedings as would, in the opinion of the authority issuing the warrant, justify the issue of a warrant if the crime had been committed or the person convicted in that part of the dominions of the two Contracting Parties in which the Magistrate, Justice of the Peace, or other competent authority exercises jurisdiction: provided, however, that in the United Kingdom the accused shall, in such case, be sent as speedily as possible before a Police Magistrate in London. He shall, in accordance with this Article, be discharged, as well in Salvador as in the United Kingdom, if within the term of thirty days a requisition for extradition shall not have been made by the Diplomatic Agent of his country in accordance with the stipulations of this Treaty.

"The same rule shall apply to the cases of persons accused or convicted of any of the crimes or offences specified in this Treaty, and committed on the high seas on board any vessel of either country which may come into a port of the other.

"ARTICLE XI.

"The extradition shall take place only if the evidence be found sufficient, according to the laws of the State applied to, either to justify the committal of the prisoner for trial, in case the crime had been committed in the territory of the same State, or to prove that the prisoner is the identical person convicted by the Courts of the State which makes the requisition, and no criminal shall be surrendered until after the expiration of fifteen days from the date of his committal to prison to await the warrant for his surrender.

"ARTICLE XII.

"In the examinations which they have to make in accordance with the foregoing stipulations, the authorities of the State applied to shall admit as entirely valid evidence the sworn depositions or statements of witnesses taken in the other State, or copies thereof, and likewise the warrants and sentences issued therein, provided such documents purport to be signed or certified by a Judge, Magistrate, or Officer of such State, and are au-

donde se encuentre el acusado, justifiquen su prision como si el delito hubiese sido cometido allí.

"Si la demanda se refiere á una persona ya convicta, debe ir acompañada de la sentencia de condenación pronunciada contra la persona convicta por el Tribunal competente del Estado que hace la demanda de extradición.

"Una demanda de extradición no puede fundarse solamente en sentencias dictadas por contumacia; pero las personas convictas de contumacia deben ser consideradas como acusadas.

"ARTICULO IX.

"Si la demanda de extradición está de acuerdo con las precedentes estipulaciones, las autoridades competentes del Estado al que se dirige la petición procederán á la prision del fugitivo.

"El prisionero será conducido entónces ante el Magistrado competente, quien debe examinarlo y hacer la investigacion preliminar del caso, como si la aprehension se habiese efectuado por un delito cometido en el mismo pais.

"ARTICULO X.

"Un delincuente fugitivo puede ser aprehendido en virtud de una orden de prision dictada por cualquier Magistrado de Policía, Juez de Paz ú otra autoridad competente en ámbos paises, teniendo á la vista tales informes ó quejas, y tales pruebas, ó habiéndose procedido á tales diligencias que, en la opinion de la autoridad que dicta la orden de prision, justificaria dicha orden si el crimen hubiese sido cometido ó si la persona hubiese sido convencida en la parte del territorio de las dos Partes Contractantes en la cual el Magistrado, Juez de Paz, ú otra autoridad competente ejerce jurisdiccion; con tal, sin embargo, de que en el Reino Unido el acusado sea en tal caso conducido tan pronto como se pueda ante un Magistrado de Policía en Lóndres. El criminal fugitivo será, segun este Artículo, puesto en libertad, sea en el Salvador ó en el Reino Unido, si en el término de treinta dias no se hubiese hecho la demanda de extradición por medio del Ajente Diplomático de su pais, conforme á las estipulaciones de este Tratado.

"La misma regla será applicada al caso de las personas acusadas á convictas de alguno de los delitos ó crímenes especificados en este Tratado, y cometidos en alta mar á bordo de cualquier buque de uno ú otro pais que entre en un puerto del otro.

"ARTICULO XI.

"La extradición se efectuará solamente si los testimonios se encuentran suficientes segun las leyes del Estado á que se hace la demanda, ya sea para justificar el sometimiento á juicio del preso, en caso en que el crimen hubiese sido cometido en territorio de dicho Estado, ó para probar la identidad del preso convencido por los Tribunales del Estado que hace la demanda, y ningun delincuente ó criminal puede ser entregado ántes de pasados quince dias desde la fecha de su sometimiento á juicio, en tanto que se dicte la orden de entrega.

"ARTICULO XII.

"En el exámen que se haga de conformidad con las precedentes estipulaciones, las autoridades del Estado á que se ha recurrido reconocerán como plena prueba las deposiciones juradas y las relaciones de los testigos hechas en el otro Estado ó las copias de aquellas, y asimismo las órdenes y sentencias pronunciadas, con tal que esos documentos estén firmados ó certificados por un Juez, Magistrado, ú Oficial de dicho Estado, y sean

thenticated by the oath of some witness, or by being sealed with the official seal of the Minister of Justice, or some other Minister of State.

" ARTICLE XIII.

" If the individual claimed by one of the two High Contracting Parties in pursuance of the present Treaty should be also claimed by one or several other powers, on account of other crimes or offences committed upon their respective territories, his extradition shall be granted to that State whose demand is earliest in date ; unless any other arrangement should have been made between the different Governments to determine the preference, either on account of the gravity of the crime or offence, or for any other reason.

" ARTICLE XIV.

If sufficient evidence for the extradition be not produced within two months from the date of the apprehension of the fugitive, he shall be set at liberty.

" ARTICLE XV.

" All articles seized which were in the possession of the person to be surrendered at the time of his apprehension shall, if the competent authority of the State applied to for the extradition has ordered the delivery of such articles, be given up when the extradition takes place ; and the said delivery shall extend, not merely to the stolen articles, but to every thing that may serve as a proof of the crime.

" ARTICLE XVI.

" The High Contracting Parties renounce any claim for the reimbursement of the expenses incurred by them in the arrest and maintenance of the person to be surrendered and his conveyance till placed on board ship ; they reciprocally agree to bear such expenses themselves.

" ARTICLE XVII.

" The stipulations of the present Treaty shall be applicable to the Colonies and foreign Possessions of Her Britannic Majesty.

" The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal who has taken refuge in any of such Colonies or foreign Possessions shall be made to the Governor or chief authority of such Colony or Possession by the Chief Consular Officer of the Republic of Salvador in such Colony or Possession.

" Such requisition may be disposed of, subject always, as nearly as may be, to the provisions of this Treaty, by the said Governor or chief authority, who, however, shall be at liberty either to grant the surrender or to refer the matter to his Government.

" Her Britannic Majesty shall, however, be at liberty to make special arrangements in the British Colonies and foreign Possessions for the surrender of Salvadorian criminals who may take refuge within such Colonies and foreign Possessions, on the basis, as nearly as may be, of the provisions of the present Treaty.

" The requisition for the surrender of a fugitive criminal from any Colony or foreign Possession of Her Britannic Majesty shall be governed by the rules laid down in the preceding Articles of the present Treaty.

" ARTICLE XVIII.

" The present Treaty shall come into force ten days after its publication, in conformity with the forms prescribed by the laws of the High Con-

" ARTICULO XIII.

" Si el individuo reclamado por una de las Altas Partes Contratantes, conforme al presente Tratado, fuese reclamado simultáneamente por uno ó varios otros Estados, por otros delitos ó crímenes cometidos en sus respectivos territorios, su extradición será otorgada al Estado que ha presentado primero la demanda de extradición ; á ménos que algun otro arreglo no haya sido estipulado entre los diferentes Gobiernos, para determinar la preferencia, ya sea en vista de la gravedad del crimen ó delito, ó ya por cualquiera otra causa.

" ARTICULO XIV.

" Si despues de dos meses de la aprehension del fugitivo no se hubiere aducido prueba bastante para la extradición, será puesto en libertad.

" ARTICULO XV.

" Cualesquiera artículos que se embarguen á la persona aprehendida, si la, autoridad competente del Estado requerido para la extradición ha ordenada la entrega de ellos, serán entregados al tiempo de verificarse aquella ; y se hará no sólo de los artículos robados sino de todo lo que pueda servir como prueba del crimen.

" ARTICULO XVI.

" Las Altas Partes Contratantes renuncian á cualquier reclamacion por el reembolso de los gastos hechos en la captura y mantenimiento de la persona que há de entregarse, y en su conduccion hasta ponerla á bordo de el buque, comprometiéndose recíprocamente á hacer ellas mismas tales gastos.

" ARTICULO XVII.

" Las estipulaciones del presente Tratado serán aplicables á las Colonias y Posesiones extranjeras de Su Majestad Británica.

" La peticion para la entrega de un criminal fugitivo que se haya refugiado en alguna de tales Colonias ó Posesiones extranjeras se hará al Gobernador ó principal autoridad de tal Colonia ó Posesion por el principal Ajente Consular de la República del Salvador en dicha Colonia ó Posesion.

" Podrá darse curso á tales peticiones, sujetándose siempre lo más aproximadamente posible á lo estipulado en este Tratado, por dicho Gobernador ó principal autóridad, quien, sin embargo, estará en libertad de conceder la entrega ó referir el asunto á su Gobierno.

" Su Majestad Británica quedará, sin embargo, en libertad de hacer arreglos especiales en las Colonias Británicas y Posesiones extranjeras para la entrega de los Salvadoreños criminales que puedan refugiarse dentro de tales Colonias y Posesiones extranjeras, observando, lo más que se pueda, las estipulaciones del presente Tratado.

" La demanda para la entrega de un criminal fugitivo de alguna Colonia ó Posesion extranjera de Su Majestad Británica estará sujeta á las reglas establecidas en los Artículos precedentes del presente Tratado.

" ARTICULO XVIII.

" El presente Tratado empezará á ejecutarse diez dias despues de su publicacion, de conformidad con las formas prescritas por las leyes de la

tracting Parties. It may be terminated by either of the High Contracting Parties, but shall remain in force for six months after notice has been given for its termination.

"The Treaty, after receiving the approval of the Congress of Salvador, shall be ratified and the ratifications shall be exchanged at London as soon as possible.

So much of the parish of Goldington, in the county of Bedford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Bedford and St. Neots-road on the north-east commencing at the Swan Public-house; thence to the mansion and grounds of Goldington Grange, and by the river Ouse on the south and south-west to Newnham Old Mill.

Berkshire.—At Sunninghill, in the county of Berks, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the road leading from the north point of Ascot Race Course to Dr. Brown's Corner, thence across the highroad to the South-Western Railway Arch on Sunninghill Bog, thence westward along the South-Western Railway to the Arch by Ascot (West) Station, and thence north-east

along the Bagshot-road to the north point of Ascot Race Course aforesaid.

Buckinghamshire.—(1.) The whole of the parish of Newport Pagnell, in the county of Buckingham, and all hamlets, liberties, and extra-parochial places (if any) in the same parish.

(2.) So much of the parish of Harlton, in the county of Cambridge, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the lane leading to the parish Church Pit on the south, the road leading to Barrington Cross on the west, Home Grass Close on the east, and Great Grass Close on the north.

(3.) At Gamlingay, in the county of Cambridge, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Church-yard and footpath on the north, the private-road leading to Grange farm on the east, the highway leading to Gamlingay Station on the south, and the highway known as Church-lane leading to the Church-yard on the west.

(4.) At Oakington, in the county of Cambridge, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Longstanton and Cambridge-road on or towards the south, the road leading from the Longstanton and Cambridge-road to the Church and Railway Station on or towards the west and north, and the road leading from Westwick through Oakington to the Longstanton and Cambridge-road on or towards the east.

(5.) At Cottenham, in the county of Cambridge, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main-street of Cottenham from Rooks-lane to Church Drove on the west, Church Drove on the north, Long Drive in Fen on the east, and Landbeach-road, Back-lane, and Rooks-lane on the south.

Liberty of the Isle of Ely.—(1.) At March, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Upwell-road on the north, Black Drove on the east, the Great Eastern Railway on the south,

and the Dyke dividing the farm known as The Fifties from the farm known as The Poplars farm on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Newton, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Green-lane from Tyd St. Giles-road to Newton Church on the north, Old Bank from Newton Church to Fetto End-road on the east, Fetto End-road on the south, and Mill-lane and Tyd St. Giles-road on the west.

So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Walton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, Croxall, Bretby, Harts-horne, and Swadlincote, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Ashby-road, turning to the right along Ashby-road to Masons Arms Midway, turning to the right along Swadlincote-road to Reed's Mill, thence by the right along Newhall-road, turning to the left by Swadlincote Oldfield Colliery and Cartwright's Mill to Swadlincote Market Place, thence by the right along the turnpike-road by Hall and Boardman's Colliery, Catchems Inn, and lane by Kidds Rough and Beards Brewery to High Cross Banks at Castle Gresley, thence to the right along Brookey-lane to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, turning to the left up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence and Seal brook to its junction with the river Mease, along that river turning to the right along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to where it intersects the road near Westbrook farm, turning to the left by Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale Schools, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the river Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes or townships of Newton Solney, Bretby, and Winshall, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Unicorn Inn Newton Solney up Newton-lane by Mr. Spooner's farm to the top, thence to the right

along Brethby-lane by wheelwright's shop to the point where it intersects the boundary line of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent near Moat Bank House, thence to the right along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent at Winshill to the river Trent, to the right along the river Trent to a point opposite Smedley House at Newton Solney, thence to the right in a straight line from that point to Smedley's-lane, and up that lane by the Plough Inn and blacksmith's shop to the Unicorn Inn aforesaid.

(3.) So much of the parish of Packington, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Oakey Hovel by the side of the Ashly-road and thence by that road to Forties-lane as far as Packington House on the north, Packington House and across Garner land to Garner Barn and the bridle-road leading to Stow House on the east, the bridle-road to Stow House and Stone House and along the road to Arlix House on the south, and Arlix farm house and across to Cherry Orchard then across Oakey Old Turf to the Hovel aforesaid on the west.

(4.) At Shirley Common, in the petty sessional division of Ashbourne, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Ashbourne and Derby-road from Shirley Bridge to Shirley-lane End, thence following the Shirley-road past the Vicarage to the Pinfold, then turning to the right and following the road to Shirley Park farm, leaving the farm-house to the right, and thence along the road to Osmaston Fish Ponds, then turning to the right and following the brook to Shirley Bridge aforesaid.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Sweptstone, and Measham, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Tibern Cottage and Green-lane to Normanton on the north, the bridle-road to Sweptstone on the east, the turnpike-road and Measham Hall Lodge on the south, and the bridle-road to Tibern Cottage aforesaid on the west.

(6.) So much of the parish of Sweptstone, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Measham Hall and the bridle-road leading to Normanton on the north, thence to the right along the bridle-road to Sweptstone and thence to the Crown Inn on the east, thence to the right along the turnpike road as far as the cross-roads leading to Measham on the south, and thence to the right as far as Gallows-lane and along the footpath from Gallows-lane to the bridle-road from Measham Hall aforesaid on the west.

(7.) At Offcote and Underwood, in the parish of Ashbourne, in the petty sessional division of Ashbourne, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Offers-lane and Dovehouse Green, turning to the right along Union-street and Church Banks, turning to the right past the Workhouse and following the footway past Ashley Mill House, thence on the footway through Buckholm to the brook, turning to the right and following the brook to the Bridge crossing for Haywood, and turning to the right thence along the footway to the Channel in Offers-lane aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the parishes or townships of Ticknall, Melbourne, Derby Hills, and Calke, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point opposite Garrad's House, Ticknall, along

the Derby-road to the First-lane End on the right, thence to the right along that road (Grass-lane) to Four-lane Ends at the top of Robinson's Hill, down Robinson's Hill by Shaw House to the junction with the road from Calke to Melbourne, to the right along the Calke-road to a point near Calke Mill, thence to the right along the northern boundary fence of Calke Park to a point opposite the House occupied by William Sparks, thence to the right along the occupation-road from that House to Ticknall village, and to the right along the Derby-road to Garrad's House aforesaid.

(9.) So much of the counties of Leicester and Derby as lies within the boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the counties of Stafford Derby, and Warwick meet, thence along the eastern boundary of the county of Warwick to where such boundary crosses the Atherstone and Snarestone-road at Pinwall, thence along such last-mentioned road through Twycross and Snarestone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarestone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties, and thence along the boundary of the county of Stafford to the starting point.

Durham.—At Kyo, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Catchgate to Kyo on the north, the boundary fence of Kyo Laws farm on the east, the North-Eastern Railway on the south, and the turnpike-road leading from Annfield Plain to Catchgate on the west.

Essex.—(1.) So much of the parish of Rickling, in the county of Essex, as lies on the north-east side of the road from Wicken past Rickling Church across Rickling Green to the Coach and Horses in the said parish of Rickling.

(2.) So much of the county of Essex, and of the borough of Colchester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the fence commencing near Stanway Church at Shrub End on the Maldon-road and extending to the Layer-road, thence along the Layer-road towards Colchester as far as the foot-path known as Four Gate foot-path leading to the Maldon-road, thence the fence extending to Pretty Gate farm and Shrub End-road and to Stanway Church aforesaid.

(3.) At Latchingdon, in the county of Essex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Blackwater on the north, Butterfields and Mundon Hall farms on the west, Clark's Lower farm on the east, and the road leading from Latchingdon to Steeple dividing Lawling Hall farm from Lawling Smith's farm, in the occupation of George Attenborough, on the south.

(4.) At Great Bentley, in the county of Essex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Tendring Hundred Railway on the south, Great Bentley Green and main-road on the north, nine acres of land

on Bordells farm, in the occupation of Philip B. Vincent, on the east, and eleven acres of land and buildings, in the occupation of James Alward, and Goadling-lane on the west.

(5.) So much of the parish of Mashbury, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Friday's farm on the Waltham-road by Gatehouse as far as Mashbury Hall, thence to the cottage by Mashbury Independent Chapel, thence to Bereman's farm, and thence to Friday's farm on the Waltham-road aforesaid.

(6.) The whole of the parish of Clavering, in the county of Essex.

(7.) So much of the parish of Stisted, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Stisted School by the village to Gowers farm and Stisted Villa, then by Lords Land-road and Church-lane to Coven brook, then by the brook to Stisted Mill, and then by the road to Stisted School aforesaid.

(8.) At Great Saling, in the county of Essex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highroad leading from Little Saling Church by Little Saling School, Elms farm, and Boarded Barn to the Stebbing-road, thence by the Stebbing-road to Bells farm, and thence to the right by Little Saling Mill to Little Saling Church aforesaid.

(9.) The whole of the farm and lands known as the Parsonage farm, situate at Bardfield Saling, in the petty sessional division of Freshwell, in the county of Essex, in the occupation of Abraham Smith.

(10.) At Panfield, in the petty sessional division of South Hinckford, in the county of Essex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highroad leading from Panfield Church by Little Priory farm to the boundary of Panfield parish near Sheering Hall, then by the parish boundary to Bell-lane, and then by the highroad to Panfield Church aforesaid.

(11.) The lands known as Great Bardfield Hall farm, Lower Hall farm, and The Place farm, all in Great Bardfield, in the petty sessional division of Freshwell, in the county of Essex, all in the occupation of the Executors of the late Henry Smith.

Hampshire.—At Dibden, in the county of Southampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Hythe to Marchwood as far as Dibden Church on the north, the village of Hythe on the south, Southampton Water on the east, and Claypitts-lane and farm as far as the Forest Gate at the end of Claypitts-lane on the west.

Hertfordshire.—(1.) At Lilley, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Rectory on the north, Lilley Bottom cottages on the east, Beech's Hill on the south, and Lilley Wood on the west.

(2.) At Weston, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the Gravely and Baldock high-road to Weston on the north, certain land in the occupation of Charles Wenham on the east, certain land in the occupation of Thomas Franklin, James Wright, and Ralph Iredale on the south, and the Gravely and Baldock high-road on the west.

(3.) At Aston, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Aston House-lane on the west,

Aston-road on the north, and Bury-lane on the south and east.

(4.) At Watton, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highroad leading from Watton to Hertford on the west, the highroad leading from Watton to Ware on the north and east, and a certain brick wall on the south.

(5.) At Ashwell, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, a driftway or accommodation-road commencing at the road leading from Ashwell to the Station, and proceeding in a westerly direction past Pack's and Baily's limekilns to Mr. Langley's house at the corner of Newnham-road, and thence along the public-road from Ashwell to the Quarries, and then along the road through Ashwell End to its junction with the North Fields-road, and then returning by the south-eastern portion of North Fields-road to its junction with the Station-road opposite to the driftway or accommodation-road aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parish of Lilley, in the county of Hertford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Red Lion, Lilley, on the north, the Homestead farm, Putteridge Park, on the south, Davis's Hill on the east, and Beeche's Hill on the west.

(7.) So much of the parish of Harpenden, in the county of Hertford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Beeson End-lane, Hammonds End farm, Harpenden Common, and Rothamsted Park.

Huntingdonshire.—(1.) At Yaxley, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Norman Cross to Yaxley and Yaxley village-street as far as Dobbs-lane on the south, thence east by Dobbs-lane and Robert Loweth's property as far as Robert Warwick's farm premises, north Poors Allotment field to Harry Burnham's arable land on the north-west, and west occupation-road leading from William Whitehead's farm to the road from Norman Cross to Yaxley aforesaid.

(2.) At Yaxley, and Standground, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the brook running from Morborn to Standground on the north, Stilton brook continued by the Yaxley Pigs-water drain to Farcet and Horsey Bridge on the south, Whittlesea-road from Horsey Bridge to Standground Guide Post and thence a straight line to Standground lode or brook on the north-east, and the London and York-road from where it crosses Stilton brook to Morborn brook, midway between the seventy-sixth and seventy-seventh milestones on that road from London on the west; the said Whittlesea-road and the said London and York-road not being included in the Area.

(3.) So much of the parish of Great Gransden, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Great Gransden to Caxton on the north, the boundary dividing the counties of Huntingdon and Cambridge on the east, the drift-way from Longstowe to the Windmill at Great Gransden on the south, and thence a certain hedge to the road leading from Great Gransden to Caxton aforesaid on the west.

(4.) At Hemingford Abbots, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Hemingford Abbots Meadow Backwater Black Bridge, along the Backwater to the Cock Public-house Hemingford Grey on the north, thence along Braggs-lane and Parrowbrook-road to Gore

Tree on the Cambridge-road on the east, thence along the Cambridge-road in a westerly direction to the Ramping Lion Public-house on the south, thence to Hemingford House Lodge, including Hemingford Park and Hemingford House, and thence in a northerly direction to the Black Bridge aforesaid on the west; the said roads not being included in the Area except the occupation-road leading from Hemingford House to the Black Bridge.

(5.) At Bluntisham, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the steam engine on the side of the river Ouse, along the river Ouse to Over Cote Ferry on the east, thence along Fen-lane in a westerly direction to White Bridge Fen-lane on the south, thence along the Needingworth parish brook to Sandifer's hovels in the Bluntisham-road on the west, thence along the Bluntisham-road in a northerly direction to Tibbut's White Bridge, and thence in a straight line across Tibbut's farm (including the farm-yard premises) to the steam engine aforesaid on the north; Over Cote Fen-lane and Bluntisham-road not being included in the Area.

(6.) So much of the parish of Standground, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Oakley Dyke on the north-east, a certain Dyke (partially filled in) running at right angles from Oakley Dyke to Milk-and-Water Drove at the entrance to an allotment-field known as Paradise on the south, Milk-and-Water Drove from Paradise corner as far as Horsey Bridge on the west, and thence the old river Nene to Oakley Dyke aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Folksworth, and Stilton, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London and York-road on the east, the George and Dragon Public-house, Stilton, and a hedge running therefrom to a hedge dividing a certain field known as High Holborn from a certain field known as Top Broken Back in the parish of Folksworth on the south, from the last-mentioned hedge in a direct line to Folksworth-lane on the west, and Folksworth-lane to Norman Cross on the north; the London and York-road from Norman Cross as far as the George and Dragon Public-house being included, but Folksworth-lane not being included, in the Area.

(8.) At Upwood, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Raveley drain from the north corner of Ramsey Turf Fen to the branch of the same drain that runs south to a house in the occupation of William Curtis on the west, Lower Drove-road in Ramsey Turf Fen to Ugg Mere Cote-road then along New Fen Drove-road to Bury Green on the north, Biggin-lane and Gravel-road to the road leading to Upwood and Raveley Fen-road on the east, and the said Upwood and Raveley Fen-road to Raveley drain near to William Curtis's house aforesaid on the south; the Lower Drove-road, the New Fen Drove-road, and the Upwood and Raveley Fen-road not being included in the Area.

(9.) So much of the parishes of Ramsey, and Warboys, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Forty Foot river from Crease Mill running in a westerly direction to Ash drain on the north, from Forty Foot river running in a southerly direction to Ramsey Hollow-road on the west, thence by the corner of A. J. C.

Rose's farm running in an easterly direction to Puttock Drove, thence along the said Drove to a private-road in the occupation of Alfred Rose and Hugh John Smith to Crease drain on the south, and thence running along the boundary line dividing the counties of Huntingdon and Cambridge to Crease Mill aforesaid on the east.

(10.) So much of the parishes of Little Raveley, Broughton, King's Ripton, and Abbot's Ripton, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Little Raveley Church to Broughton cross-roads on the east, thence to King's Ripton cross-roads on the south, thence to Abbot's Ripton Church on the west, and thence by the road at Wennington Corner to Little Raveley Church aforesaid on the north; the said roads not being included in the Area.

(11.) So much of the parish of Sawtry All Saints, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Connington brook as far as Cooks-lane on the north-west, north, and east, Cooks-lane and Sawtry-road as far as Fort Hill on the south, and a certain hedge running in a straight line from Fort Hill to Connington brook aforesaid on the west.

(12.) So much of the parish of Sawtry, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Sawtry to Gidding on the north, the Old Bullock-road on the west, the foot-path from Gidding to Sawtry on the south, and a certain hedge running in a direct line from the said foot-path to the Gidding-road and dividing at the northern end a field of arable land in the occupation of William Collett from a field of arable land in the occupation of Benjamin Masters on the east.

(13.) So much of the parishes of Diddington, and Southoe, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the footway leading from Diddington through Battlefield across Mr. Rampley's-road and Black Lane field to the south-east corner of Fuzzin field on the east, the hedge separating Mr. Rampley's farm from Mr. Bowyer's farm to near Southoe Bell on North Road Cross-road, then by the right to the first fence on the left, and then by the said fence to Hillfield Spinny on the south, the fence from Hillfield Spinny and Allotment Grounds to Wood-lane, Diddington, on the west, and Wood-lane and Diddington village-street to the footway aforesaid on the north.

(14.) So much of the parish of Stilton, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a certain hedge dividing the parishes of Folksworth and Stilton, and Yaxley brook on the north, thence by Yaxley brook as far as Gregory's Plantation on the east, thence by Stilton brook as far as the rear of Stilton School on the south, and thence by Stilton brook and a certain hedge running at right angles to the first-mentioned hedge on the west; the London and York-road between Yaxley brook and Stilton brook being included in the Area.

Kent.—(1.) At Ash, near Wrotham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the Crooked Billet to the White Swan Inn and thence the footpath to Ash parish Church on the north, the footpath from the Church-yard to Berrys Maple on the east, the road from Berrys Maple to South Ash farm on the south, and certain arable and wood land from a point

taken at South Ash farm aforesaid in a direct line to the Crooked Billet aforesaid on the west.

(2.) At Dartford, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main Dover-road leading from Dartford Bridge near Trinity Church to a spot on such road about seventy yards east of Gartley Cottages on the south, a private-road from the main Dover-road to Stoneham farm on the west, a private-road leading from Stoneham farm to the Dartford Creek Paper Mill on the north, and the river Darent (Dartford Creek) from Dartford Creek Paper Mill to Dartford Bridge aforesaid on the east.

(3.) At Shorne, near Gravesend, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from the Rochester and Gravesend-road to Thong on the north, Shorne Church-yard on the south, the road leading through the village to Ridgway on the east, and the meadows in the occupation of the Reverend T. S. Barrett on the west.

(4.) At Tunstall, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Siller Field on the north and west, and Ruins-road leading from Sittingbourne to Bexon on the east and south.

(5.) At West Malling, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Malling Railway Station Bridge, the footpath from the East Malling-road to the London-road, the road from the London-road past Leybourne Rectory to Leybourne Church, the road from Leybourne Church to Leybourne Park, the road from Leybourne Park to the Wheatsheaf Inn, the footpath from the Wheatsheaf Inn to the Railway Crossing, the fence round the Cricket field to the Gas house, the road from the Gas house through Miss Savage's to St. Leonards Street, from St. Leonards Street to Lavenders, and from Lavenders to the Malling Station Railway Bridge aforesaid.

(6.) At Bromley, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hayes-road from the Bromley-road to Hayes parish Church, thence by a straight line to the Church on Bromley Common opposite the bottom of Oakley-road, and thence to the Hayes-road aforesaid.

(7.) At Watlingbury, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Cannon Heath-road to Watlingbury Church, thence to the King's Head Inn and Malling-road to the North Pole Inn, Barnwells Lodge, and Mereworth-road to Cannon Heath.

(8.) At Cobham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Cobham to Gravesend on the north, a certain Cherry Orchard in the occupation of Thomas Stevens on the south, the highway leading from the Howletts to Sole Street on the east, and certain arable land in the occupation of Thomas Stevens on the west.

(9.) At Frindsbury, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain arable land in the occupation of Messrs. George and Richard Brooker on the north, the highway leading from Strood to Cobham on the south, certain Hop Gardens in the occupation of William Dunford on the east, and certain arable land in the occupation of Messieurs G. and R. Brooker on the west.

(10.) At East Farleigh, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Stiles farm to East Farleigh Church, the road from East Farleigh Church to East Farleigh Bridge, the river Medway from East Farleigh Bridge to Bydews, and the road from Bydews to Stiles farm aforesaid.

Leicestershire.—(1.) The whole of the parish of Welham, in the county of Leicester.

(2.) The whole of the parish of Slawston, in the county of Leicester.

(3.) So much of the parish of Humberstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the north, the turnpike-road from Leicester to Uppingham on the south, the road from the said turnpike-road to Humberstone on the east, and the road from the said turnpike-road past the borough Asylum to the said road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the west.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Eaton, Eastwell, and Stathern, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the Readed House near Belvoir to Knipton on the north, the road leading from Eaton to Waltham on the east, the road leading from Eastwell to Stathern on the south, and the road leading from Belvoir Top Wood to Eastwell on the west.

(5.) So much of the parish of Packington, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Oakley Hovel by the side of the Ashly-road and thence by that road to Fortiss-lane as far as Packington House on the north, Packington House and across Garner land to Garner Barn and the bridle-road leading to Stow House on the east, the bridle-road to Stow House and Stone House and along the road to Arlix House on the south, and Arlix farm house and across to Cherry Orchard then across Oakley Old Turf to the Hovel aforesaid on the west.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Redmile, Barkestone, Bottesford, and Granby, in the counties of Leicester, and Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Granby to Elton on the north, the road from Elton to Bottesford on the east, the accommodation-road from Bottesford to Barkestone on the south, and the road from Barkestone to Granby on the west.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Sweptstone, and Measham, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Tibern Cottage and Green-lane to Normanton on the north, the bridle-road to Sweptstone on the east, the turnpike-road and Measham Hall Lodge on the south, and the bridle-road to Tibern Cottage aforesaid on the west.

(8.) So much of the parish of Sweptstone, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Measham Hall and the bridle-road leading to Normanton on the north, thence to the right along the bridle-road to Sweptstone and thence to the Crown Inn on the east, thence to the right along the turnpike-road as far as the cross-roads leading to Measham on the south, and thence to the right as far as Gallows-lane and along the footpath from Gallows-lane to the bridle-road from Measham Hall aforesaid on the west.

(9.) At Stoke Golding, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boun-

daries, that is to say, two arable fields in the occupation of the executors of the late W. N. Berry of Stoke Golding on the north and west, the road leading from Hinckley to Stoke Golding on the south, and the road leading from Hinckley to Dadlington on the east.

(10.) So much of the parishes of Horninghold, and Stockerston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Stockerston Wood on the east, part of Knob Hill, Atkins Close, and Dick Hills on the north, Breech Townend Close and Horninghold village on the west, and the road leading from Great Easton to Horninghold on the south.

(11.) At Kirby Bellairs, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road leading from Melton to Leicester on the north exactly opposite the road leading to Asfordby Station on the Midland Railway, certain grass fields in the occupation of Messrs. Greaves and Fox on the east, a certain grass field in the occupation of Mr. Buck, Tilton, on the south, and by a certain grass field in the occupation of Mr. Houghton, Asfordby, on the west.

(12.) So much of the parish of Kirby Bellairs, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road leading from Melton to Leicester on the north, certain grass land in the occupation of Mr. Bowley, Kirby Bellairs, on the east, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Black on the south, and the fence known as the Mere fence which is the boundary between the parishes of Frisby and Kirby Bellairs on the west.

(13.) So much of the parish of Glenn Magna, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the village of Glenn, and the road leading from Market Harborough to Leicester on the east, the Midland Railway on the west, the road leading from Glenn village to Wistow on the north, and certain lands in the occupation of W. Clements on the south.

(14.) So much of the parish of Barrow-on-Soar, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Archer, the Midland Railway, and the highway leading from Barrow-on-Soar to Sileby on the north, certain land in the occupation of George Chapman and the river Soar on the south, certain land in the occupation of William Lovett on the east, and by certain land in the occupation of Mr. Mason on the west.

(15.) So much of the parish of Diseworth, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain lands in the occupation of Mr. Barrow and the highway leading from Diseworth to Belton on the north, certain lands in the occupation of Mr. Saddington and Mr. Hudson on the south, certain lands in the occupation of Mr. Harris and Mr. Archer on the east, and certain lands in the occupation of Mr. Palmer, Mr. Saddington, Mr. Barrow, and Mr. Simpkin on the west.

(16.) So much of the parishes of Great Easton, Drayton, and Neville Holt, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Great Easton and Drayton-road on the south, the Drayton-road leading to Holt on the west, Holt Hall, America House, six fields in the occupation of Sir Bache Cunard, and three fields in the occupation of Mr. Mould on the north, and the

Great Easton village-road leading to Bloston as far as Mr. Mould's road field on the east.

(17.) At Burton-Lazars, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Burton-Lazars to Great Dalby on the north, the turnpike-road leading from Melton to Oakham on the east, certain land in the occupation of Mr. G. Hack, Burton-Lazars, on the south, and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Spreckley, Burton, on the west.

(18.) So much of the parish of Stathern, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Stathern Railway Bridge to Bottesford, thence the occupation-road from Miller's farm to Stathern Wood End, thence across by the bridle-road from Stathern Wood End to Stathern Mill Point, and thence across from Stathern Mill Point direct to Stathern Railway Station.

(19.) So much of the parishes of Slawston, and Hallaton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Cranoe to Hallaton on the north, the London and North-Western Railway from Hallaton to the Bridge crossing the road midway between Slawston and Medbourne on the east, the road leading from the said Bridge so far as Slawston on the south, and the road leading from Slawston to Cranoe on the west.

(20.) At Hoby, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain grass land in the occupation of Mr. Henson on the north, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Henson and the vicarage grounds on the east, the road leading from Hoby to Ragdale on the south, and certain arable land in the occupation of Mr. Washbourne on the west.

(21.) At Hoby, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the fence forming the boundary between Ragdale and Hoby on the north, the road leading from Ragdale to Hoby and on to Rotherby on the east, the river Wharf on the south, and the road from Brooksby to Hoby and Mr. Main's farm on the west.

(22.) So much of the counties of Leicester and Derby as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the counties of Stafford, Derby, and Warwick meet, thence along the eastern boundary of the county of Warwick to where such boundary crosses the Atherstone and Snarestone-road at Pinwall, thence along such last-mentioned road through Twycross and Snarestone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarestone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donishorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties, and thence along the boundary of the county of Stafford to the starting point.

(23.) So much of the parishes of Medbourne, Holt, and Bloston, in the county of Leicester,

as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Holt to Blaston on the north, the foot-road leading from Medbourne to Holt on the east, the London and North-Western Railway from Medbourne to Blaston Bridge on the south, and from Blaston Bridge to Blaston village on the west.

(24.) So much of the parishes of Blaston, and Medbourne, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Blaston-road on the north, the road leading from Blaston to Medbourne as far as Ivy Gate on the east, Gilson's Close on the south, and Hallaton-road as far as Gilson's Close on the west.

(25.) At Cotes de Val, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields at Cotes de Val on the north, certain fields at Cotes de Val, certain fields in the parish of Gilmorton, and the road leading from Gilmorton to the turnpike-road between Lutterworth and Leicester on the south, certain fields at Cotes de Val, and the turnpike-road leading from Lutterworth to Leicester on the west, and certain fields in the occupation of C. Bloxam and J. Gardner in the parish of Gilmorton on the east.

(26.) At Hinckley, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Rugby turnpike-road on the north, Watling Street-road on the south, Sketchly-lane on the east, and Anker brook on the west.

(27.) So much of the parishes of Great Bowden, and Little Bowden, in the counties of Leicester, and Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading through Great Bowden on the north, the road leading from the Bowden turn on the Dingley-road to Great Bowden on the east, the road leading from the Bowden turn on the Dingley-road to Market Harborough on the south, and the road leading through Market Harborough to Great Bowden on the west.

(28.) So much of the parish of Loughborough, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Upton and Mr. Sarjeant on the north, the road leading from Nanpanton to Woodhouse and certain land in the occupation of W. B. Paget, Esq. on the south, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Watnaby and E. H. Warner, Esq., and a certain Wood known as the Outwoods in the occupation of Mr. Sutton on the east, and certain land in the occupation of Messrs. Smalley and Hanson, and Mr. Hopkins, and Mr. Peberdy on the west.

(29.) So much of the parish of Harby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Harby to Stathern on the north, the road leading from Stathern to Eastwell on the east, the road leading from Eastwell to Goatby turn on the south, and the road leading from Goatby turn to Harby on the west.

(30.) So much of the parishes of Loughborough, Thorpacre, and Knight-Thorpe, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Palmer and Mr. Reynolds and the lane leading from Thorpacre to the Derby turnpike-road on the north, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Joseph Reynolds, Dr. Eddowes, Mr. Matthews, and Mr. E. L. Barker on the south, certain allotment gardens in the occupation of Mr. Z. Onions senior and others and certain land in the occupation

of Mr. Z. Onions junior, Mr. W. Blood, and Mr. Withers, and a portion of the line of the Charnwood Forest Railway Company on the north side of the Ashley turnpike-road, and on the south side of the said road by a lane leading from the said Ashley turnpike-road to Radmoor on the east, and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Gimson and Mr. Matson, a portion of the line of the said Charnwood Forest Railway Company, and the road leading from the said Ashley-road to the village of Thorpacre on the west.

(31.) At Saxby, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Cottage Pasture (now unoccupied) on the north, the boundary fence separating Saxby from Garthorpe and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Miller and Mr. Pacey on the east, the road leading from Saxby to Garthorpe on the south, and the road leading from Saxby to Waltham on the west.

(32.) At Garthorpe, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary fence between Garthorpe and Waltham on the north, the road leading from Waltham to Garthorpe on the east, certain arable land in the occupation of Mr. Pacey on the south, and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Roe, Saxby, and the boundary fence between Garthorpe and Saxby on the west.

(33.) At Thorpe Arnold, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Melton Mowbray to Waltham on the north, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Shilling and the Broom Wood on the east, the boundary fence between Thorpe Arnold and Brentingby on the south, and certain land in the occupation of Messieurs Garner and Hill, Melton Mowbray, on the west.

(34.) At Glenn Parva, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Mr. Wilders in the parish of Aylestone on the north, the villages of Glenn Parva and Blaby on the south, the Barracks of Glenn on the east, and the Lutterworth turnpike-road on the west.

Lincolnshire (Holland).—(1.) So much of the parish of Crowland, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Spalding and Thorney-road from Pidduck's Drove to the drain one field to the south of Henry Cook's house on the east, the said drain to Clood's Drove and Clood's Drove on the north, Clood's Drove in a continuous line over the Spalding-road and along Whitsed's Drove and Hack's Drove to Pidduck's Drove on the west, and Pidduck's Drove on the south; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

(2.) So much of the parish of Pinchbeck, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Glen from Money Bridge to the Foot Bridge opposite John Benner's house on the north, an imaginary line drawn southwards from such Foot Bridge across two fields of John Benner's and one field of Samuel Freer's to Fen-Gate-road against Joshua Smith's house on the east, Fen-Gate-road to the Old Fen Dyke-road (otherwise Tydd-lane) on the south, and the Old Fen Dyke-road (otherwise Tydd-lane) to Money Bridge aforesaid on the west, including the river Glen's south bank road from the Foot Bridge aforesaid westwardly to

Money Bridge and the Old Fen Dyke-road (otherwise Tydd-lane) from Money Bridge southwardly to its junction with Fen-Gate-road, but excluding Fen-Gate-road and Money Bridge.

(3.) So much of the parishes of Whaplode, and Holbeach, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the occupation-road to G. F. C. Howard's Top and Bottom farms, Whaplode Marsh, from the Top farm buildings, continuing by the division line of the Top and Bottom farms and Joseph Ward's farm to Joseph Ward's farm-house on the west, Joseph Ward's private foot-path from his farm-house across two of his fields and one of Mr. Metheringham's fields to Petticoat Bridge on the Holbeach Bank-road on the north, the Holbeach Bank-road from Petticoat Bridge to Mr. Papworth's house, the sheep-dresser, on the east, and an imaginary line drawn westwardly from Mr. Papworth's house across certain lands in the occupation of Mr. Crawley to G. F. C. Howard's occupation-road against his Top farm buildings aforesaid on the south.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Spalding, and Pinchbeck, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Leave's Lake Drove from Pinchbeck Bar's-road to the Forty Foot drain on the south, thence the said Forty Foot drain to Star Lode Drove on the west, thence the said Star Lode Drove to Pinchbeck Bar's-road against the Horse and Jockey Public-house on the north, and thence the said Pinchbeck Bar's-road to Leave's Lake Drove aforesaid on the east; the Six Houses Drove otherwise Black Hole Drove being included, but the boundary-roads not being included, in the Area.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Spalding, and Pinchbeck, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Park-road from the Pinchbeck-road Crossing on the Great Northern Loop line to the Crossing on the Spalding and Lincoln line on the south, thence the Spalding and Lincoln line to the Blue Gowt Pup drain on the west, thence the said Blue Gowt Pup drain to the Spalding and Donnington-road on the north, thence the said Spalding and Donnington-road to the Pinchbeck-road Crossing aforesaid on the east; the said Spalding and Donnington-road not being included in the Area.

(6.) So much of the parish of Crowland, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Church-lane from Whitsed's Drove, along the Abbey Yard and the Crowland and Thorney-road to the Durham Ox Public-house on the west, the boundary line between Lincolnshire and Cambridgeshire from the Durham Ox Public-house to the Spalding and Thorney-road on the south, the Spalding and Thorney-road to Pidduck's Drove on the east, and Pidduck's Drove and Hack's Drove on the north; Pidduck's Drove and Hack's Drove being included, but the boundary-roads not being included, in the Area.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Sutton St. James, Tydd St. Marys, and Long Sutton, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway running through the village of Sutton St. James from Ive's Cross to Catlan's Barn in Draw Dyke-road on the south, thence the road running from the said Catlan's Barn to the Great South Holland Drain near to Foreman's Bridge on the east, thence the said

Great South Holland Drain to Clifton's Bridge on the north, thence Raven's Bank, otherwise Sutton St. James-road, to Ive's Cross aforesaid on the west; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

(8.) So much of the parishes of Tydd St. Marys, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, and Tydd St. Giles, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Old Eau-Dyke-Bank from Tretton Bridge as far as the Shire drain on the west, south, and east, thence the Shire drain to Tretton Bridge aforesaid on the north; the said Tretton Bridge not being included in the Area.

(9.) So much of the parish of Sutton St. James, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Raven's Bank and Taylor's Drove from Seal's Gate-road (otherwise Scale's Gate-road) to Gilbert's Gate-road on the east, thence the said Gilbert's Gate-road to the Old Fen Dyke on the south, thence the said Old Fen Dyke to Seal's Gate-road (otherwise Scale's Gate-road) on the west, and thence the said Seal's Gate-road (otherwise Scale's Gate-road) to Raven's Bank aforesaid on the north; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

(10.) So much of Holbeach Marsh, in the parish of Holbeach, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the sewer dividing Mr. Thomas H. Savage's, Mr. Cole Tinsley's, and Leaden Hall farms from Mr. Joseph Ward's Lap Water farmhouse to the Silt-lane near to Leaden Hall farmstead on the north and west, thence the said Silt-lane and Gravel-road passing Mr. Cole Tinsley's Old Thatched farmhouse and Mr. Patchet's farm buildings to Mr. Joseph Ward's Lap Water farmhouse aforesaid on the south and east; the said Silt-lane and Gravel-road not being included in the Area.

(11.) So much of the parish of Gedney, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Spalding and Sutton Bridge Railway from Stone-Gate Crossing to Long-lane Crossing on the north, thence Long-lane and Delph-Bank to Fleet drain on the west, thence Fleet drain to Gedney Broad-Gate on the south, and thence Gedney Broad-Gate and Stone-Gate to Stone-Gate Crossing aforesaid on the east and north-east; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

Lincolnshire (Kesteven).—(1.) So much of the parish of Deeping St. Nicholas, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the South Drove drain to Neal's farm on or towards the south, the road from Neal's farm to Oat Sheaf, thence by certain lands in the occupation of E. Paulett to E. Paulett's farmstead on or towards the west, from E. Paulett's farmstead by certain lands in the occupation of E. Paulett and John Holland to C. Eldret's farmstead on or towards the north, and from C. Eldret's farmstead by certain lands in the occupation of J. Bartholomew and G. Kemp to Kemp's house and to the South Drove drain aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Horbling, Spanby, and Swaton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Great Northern Railway from William Dickens's nine acres field, Horbling, to Dawson Bellamy's Spinny, Spanby, on the west, from Dawson Bellamy's Spinny

by W. Bellamy's field, Spanby, and Mrs. Wadsley's arable field to Mrs. Wadsley's new farmstead, Swaton, thence by two arable fields in the occupation of J. Mudd, one arable field in the occupation of W. Morris, one arable field and one grass field in the occupation of Mrs. Wadsley, and two arable fields in the occupation of William Mansfield to Swaton-lane or the north, from William Mansfield's arable field by Swaton-lane to Edward Harris's house, Horbling, on the east, and from Edward Harris's house, Horbling, by Edward Harris's home field, two grass fields in the occupation of R. J. Pepper, Horbling Poor Gardens, and Glenn's sixteen acres to William Dickens's nine acres field, Horbling, aforesaid on the south.

(3.) So much of the parish of Basingthorpe, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Westby to Great Ponton from David Lee's Brick-Yard field to Henry Hall's Far Weetings grass field on or towards the south, thence by Henry Hall's Cow Close to Mrs. A. Gibson's Dyke Close on or towards the west, thence by James Scarborough's Ten Acres grass field and the Cottage field to James Scarborough's Walk Close on or towards the north, and thence by D. Lee's Middle Beck grass field and the Brick-Yard field to the highway leading from Westby to Great Ponton aforesaid on or towards the east.

(4.) So much of the parish of Deeping St. Nicholas, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the south the Great Northern Railway from a certain arable field in the occupation of Thomas Holland to the South Drain Drove, on or towards the west from the Great Northern Railway by the South Drain Drove to Kemp's House and thence to W. Harrison's farmhouse to the Spalding and Deeping highway, on or towards the north from W. Harrison's house by the Spalding and Deeping highway to the farmstead of Thomas Holland, and on or towards the east from Thomas Holland's farmstead by certain arable fields in the occupation of G. Holland to the Great Northern Railway.

(5.) So much of the parish of Brant Broughton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Leadenham to Newark from the river Brant to the seventh mile stone from Newark on the south, thence in a direct line by the Poor Close, F. Shaw's, Southern's, and W. Sneath's arable and two grass fields, across Mill-lane, C. Williams's two grass fields, W. Ashton's grass field, and Mr. W. Everitt's western boundary to the parish boundary of Carlton-le-Moorland on the west, thence by the parish boundary of Carlton-le-Moorland and Brant Broughton to the river Brant on the north, and thence by the river Brant to the highway leading from Leadenham to Newark aforesaid on the east.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Barholm, and Langtoft, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Langtoft Fen-road from Edward Stafford's farmstead to the Cross-road on or towards the south, thence the Cross-road to William Charity's farmstead on or towards the west, thence the drain dividing the parishes of Barholm and Langtoft and Baston to the Cross drain on or towards the north, and thence the Cross drain to Edward Stafford's farmstead aforesaid on or towards the east.

(7.) So much of the parish of Brant Broughton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Broughton Mill-lane on the south, thence the Top-road leading from Beckingham to Carlton-le-Moorland on the west, thence the dividing hedge of the parishes of Brant Broughton and Carlton-le-Moorland on the north, and thence the bridle-road leading from Carlton-le-Moorland to Broughton to Broughton Mill-lane aforesaid on the east.

Lincolnshire (Lindsey).—(1.) At Humberstone, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Louth and Tetney-road on the north and west, the road leading to Mr. Marshall's farm on the south, and a certain large grass field in the occupation of Mr. Andrew on the east.

(2.) At Laceby, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Mr. Kirk on the north, the Welbeck drain on the south, Laceby Beck on the east, and Irby Moat on the west.

(3.) The whole of the parish of Hemswell, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire.

(4.) So much of the parish of Thoresway, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the parish of Rothwell on the north, the village of Thoresway on the east, the road leading from the High-street leading from Caistor to Horncastle to the village of Thoresway on the south, and the said High-street leading from Caistor to Horncastle on the west.

(5.) At Gayton-le-Wold, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Lincoln turnpike-road on the north, the boundary fence between the farms in the respective occupations of R. Martin and Jabez Rigall on the south, the Heath-road on the east, and the road leading from the Lincoln turnpike-road to Gayton on the west.

(6.) At Saxilby, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the line of the Great Northern Railway on the north, Broadholme-road on the west, Broadholme-lane on the south, and the Skellingthorpe and Saxilby-road on the east.

Middlesex.—(1.) At Harrow-on-the-Hill, in the county of Middlesex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Mr. Brown's boundary wall Kenton-lane farm by the thorn hedge passing the Rifle Canteen across the fields (bounded by thorn hedges) to the London and North-Western Railway at Harrow Railway Bridge, thence the London and North-Western Railway to the Bridge in Kenton-lane, thence Kenton-lane to four-crossway, the stream to Gooseacre-lane, past Kenton School to the lane adjoining Kenton Lodge, thence the footpath towards Edgware to the stile and the hedge to the top of Woodman's Hill, and thence the hedge to Kenton-lane-farm.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Hillingdon, and Uxbridge, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Uxbridge Common on the north, the continuation of the same to Park-road on the east, Halefield-road on the west, and High-street Uxbridge on the south.

(3.) At Enfield Highway, in the county of Middlesex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hertford-road

on the west, the Great Eastern Railway on the east, a certain brook extending to the Great Eastern Railway and thence to the river Lee on the north, and Eagle House footpath and Duck Lees-lane on the south.

(4.) At Glington, in the Soke of Peterborough, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the turnpike-road leading from Glington to Peakirk as far as Woodcroft Guide Post on the north, the road leading from Marholm Gate House to Glington Bridge on the south, the turnpike-road from Glington Bridge to the village of Glington on the east, and the Great Northern Railway from Woodcroft Crossing to Marholm Gate House on the west.

Nottinghamshire.—(1.) So much of the parishes of Redmile, Barkestone, Bottesford, and Granby, in the counties of Leicester, and Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Granby to Elton on the north, the road from Elton to Bottesford on the east, the accommodation-road from Bottesford to Barkestone on the south, and the road from Barkestone to Granby on the west.

(2.) So much of the parish of Sherwood, in the borough of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a certain grass field in the occupation of Richard Armitage on the north, a certain house and garden in the occupation of Mr. Rudd on the east, a certain house and garden at present unoccupied on the south, and a certain house lately in the occupation of Arthur Wells deceased on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Sneinton, in the borough of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain cottage-gardens on the north, certain land in the occupation of Messrs. Birkin and Scofield on the east, certain household property on the south, and certain land belonging to Earl Manvers on the west.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Ratcliffe-on-Trent, Carlton, and Colwick, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Stoke Dyke and boundary fence from Colwick Good's Yard to the river Trent on the east, from the end of Stoke boundary fence by the river Trent to the south corner of George Neale's field on the south, from thence by a straight line across to Colwick Passenger Station on the west, and from thence by the Great Northern Gedling line to the Stoke Dyke on the north.

(5.) At Tuxford, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries,

that is to say, the highway from Tuxford to Bevercotes on the north, the highway from Egmanton to Kirton on the south, the highway from Kirton to Willoughby on the east, and Farley's-lane including Saint John's College Low farm on the west.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Mansfield, and Mansfield Woodhouse, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a line from the Bridge near Bath Mill in Mansfield along the footpath to Old Mill-lane, across such lane, along Stinton-lane to Rushpool farm, thence along the road to Midworth's Plantation, from there to Clipstone-road at Walker's Plantation, across Newlands-road to Norman's Wood, thence along Rakring-road to Sandy-lane, and along Sandy-lane to the Bridge near Bath Mill in Mansfield aforesaid.

(7.) At South Muskham, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the south the parish boundary fence leading from Debdale Bar to Hopping Hill-lane, on or towards the west by Hopping Hill-lane and an imaginary line from the end of that lane to Walner Wood, on or towards the north by an imaginary line from Walner Wood to Hopyard-lane, and on or towards the east from Hopyard-lane to Debdale Bar aforesaid.

(8.) At Maplebeck, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north by a brook known as the Beck, on or towards the east by Duke's Wood, on or towards the south by a lane known as Moor-lane leading from the Maplebeck-road to Winkburn, and on or towards the west by a brook known as Hagley's Dumble.

(9.) At Langford, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north the Midland Railway from Newark to Lincoln, on or towards the east Langford Church-lane and an imaginary line from the end of Langford Church-lane to the Foss-road leading from Newark to Lincoln, on or towards the south the said Foss-road, and on or towards the west Thoroughfare-lane to Winthorpe School and a straight fence leading from Winthorpe School to the Midland Railway.

(10.) At Alverton, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Great Northern Railway on the south, Bottesford-road leading from the Great Northern Railway to Spa-lane in the parish of Orston on the west, Spa-lane leading from Bottesford-road to Alverton on the north, and a certain fence known as the boundary fence running from Alverton to the Great Northern Railway on the east.

(11.) So much of the parish of Sibthorpe, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the south by Longhedge-lane leading from White Cross to the Four-lane Ends near Hawksworth, on or towards the east by Sibthorpe-road leading from Hawksworth to Sibthorpe and the Back Dyke as far as the Hunting Bridge, on or towards the north by an imaginary line from the Hunting Bridge to Deadwong-lane Bridge and a straight line from the latter Bridge to White Cross, and on or towards the west by Longhedge-lane.

(12.) So much of the parish of Mansfield, in the county of Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Mans-

field and Southwell line of Railway from the Nottingham-road to the Southwell-road, the Southwell-road from the Railway Bridge to Lyndhurst-lane, Lyndhurst-lane through Mansfield Wood to the Old Turnpike-road, the Old Turnpike-road from Lyndhurst-lane to the Nottingham-road, and the Nottingham-road from the Old Turnpike to the Railway Bridge.

(13.) At Orston, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Alverton boundary to Bottesford Crossing on the Great Northern Railway on the east, Bottesford-lane to Gillotts farm on the south, Lordship-lane, Spa-lane, and Mill-lane to Flawborough boundary in Long Edge-lane, and Flawborough boundary fence to Alverton-road on the west, and Alverton-road to Alverton boundary aforesaid on the north.

(14.) At Bilsthorpe, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the house and premises of the Reverend Edward Garrow and the farmstead and buildings of John Nurcombe on the south, the bridle-road leading from Eakring to Bilsthorpe on the east, the blacksmith's shop in Bilsthorpe on the north, and thence along the village-street to one field beyond the lane leading to the Church on the west.

(15.) At Bilsthorpe, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the farm premises of the late William Hage to William Grass's farm premises on the east, the premises of Joseph Hutchinson and Clifford Adkin and the road leading from Bilsthorpe to Rufford to the top of Stoney Field-lane on the north, thence to the top of Big Dyke on the west, and thence to the Guide Post in Bilsthorpe on the south.

(16.) At Winthorpe, in the county of Nottingham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the fence known as the Winthorpe boundary fence on the east, the fence known as the Winthorpe and Newark boundary fence leading to Winthorpe Bridge on the south, the road known as Gainsborough-road leading from Winthorpe Bridge to Winthorpe School on the west, and the road known as Coddington-road leading from Winthorpe School to the Winthorpe boundary fence aforesaid on the north.

Rutland.—So much of the parish of Liddington, in the county of Rutland, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, in a line from Thorpe-by-Water Mill to the river Welland, and the said river Welland to the boundary of the parish of Caldecott on the south, thence the said boundary to James Morris's Saltmer Close on the west, thence two fields deep on the north side of the road leading from Caldecott to Thorpe-by-Water to the Liddington and Gretton-road on the north, thence the road leading from Caldecott to Thorpe-by-Water to Thorpe Mill-lane on the north-east, and from the said Mill-lane to the Mill and in a line therefrom to the river Welland on the east.

Staffordshire.—So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Burton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, Croxall, Bretby, Hartsborne, and Swadlincote, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge,

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turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Ashby-road, turning to the right along Ashby-road to Masons Arms Midway, turning to the right along Swadlincote-road to Reed's Mill, thence by the right along Newhall-road, turning to the left by Swadlincote Oldfield Colliery and Cartwright's Mill to Swadlincote Market Place, thence by the right along the turnpike-road by Hall and Boardman's Colliery, Catchems Inn, and lane by Kidds Rough and Beards Brewery to High Cross Banks at Castle Gresley, thence to the right along Brookey-lane to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, turning to the left up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence and Seal brook to its junction with the river Mease, along that river turning to the right along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to where it intersects the road near Westbrook farm, turning to the left by Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale Schools, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the river Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(4.) At Marlesford, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Little Glemham Lodge, Little Glemham, to Marlesford Common on the north, the road leading from Marlesford Common to Marlesford village and Railway Station, passing Marlesford Hall and Park, on the west and south, and the Ipswich and Yarmouth turnpike-road from Marlesford village to Little Glemham Lodge aforesaid on the south and east.

(5.) At Groton, in the county of Suffolk, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Lindsey to Kersey on the north, the road from Kersey to Hadleigh hamlet on the east, the road from Hadleigh

hamlet to Groton on the south, and the road from Groton to Lindsey on the west.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Benacre, and Wrentham, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the high-road leading from Wrentham to Kessingland on the north, the high-road from Wrentham to the sea shore on the west, and the high-road running from Kessingland-road south-west to the sea shore.

(7.) So much of the parish of Mettingham, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the high-road from Bungay to Beccles on the north, the high-road from Cross-Ways Bungay-road to Mettingham Castle on the west, Beach-lane from Bungay-road to Ilketshall St. Johns on the east, and the high-road from Mettingham Castle to Ilketshall St. Johns on the south.

(8.) So much of the parish of Spexhall, in the county of Suffolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the high-road from Spexhall to Rumburgh on the west, the high-road from Rumburgh to Saint Lawrence on the north, the high-road from Spexhall Church to the old turnpike-road from Halesworth to Bungay on the south, and certain arable and pasture land running up to the turnpike-road from Halesworth to Saint Lawrence and Bungay on the east.

Surrey.—(1.) At Shere, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain lands in the occupation of R. M. Bray on the north, a certain meadow and the South Eastern (Gomshall) Station on the east, a certain meadow and the highway leading from Shere to Dorking on the south, and Gomshall Tannery on the west.

(2.) In the parish of Woking, in the county of Surrey, bounded on the north and east by the road leading from Moor-lane by Kingfield Green and Westfield Common to Beech Hill, and on the south and west by the road leading from Beech Hill by Mayford Green and Egley to Moor-lane.

(3.) So much of the petty sessional division of Croydon, in the county of Surrey, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the London-road commencing at Norbury Station as far as New-road leading to Mitcham Common on the east, New-road leading to Mitcham Common on the south, Mitcham Common on the west, and an imaginary line across certain fields in various occupations from the northern corner of Mitcham Common to Norbury Station aforesaid on the north.

(4.) At Croydon, in the county of Surrey, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Mr. King's premises on the north, Mr. Watney's premises on the south, Bramley Hill-road on the east, and Mr. Rowland's fields and Violet-lane on the west.

Sussex.—At Trotton, in the county of Sussex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Iping Crossways to Fitzball and Bridgeland, thence along a footpath to a cottage near in the occupation of Owen Stephens, gamekeeper, into a lane leading towards Goldring's farm, down the said lane to a footpath leading into the public-road near Dumpford farm; thence along the said road into Dumpford-lane, along the said lane into a lane leading to Terwick Mill, thence across the river Rother by a bridge and public footpath and lane into the Midhurst and Petersfield dis-turnpiked-road near the foot of

Crocker Hill, thence along the said road into Gatehouse-lane, and along the said lane into a lane leading to Hammer Pond, along the said lane to a point near Hammer Pond, thence along a public footpath over the head of Hammer Pond into Iping-lane, and thence along the said lane past Iping Church and Iping Paper Mills to Iping Crossways aforesaid.

Warwickshire.—(1.) At Newbold-on-Avon, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Tren Valley Railway on the south, the Rugby and Lutterworth-road on the east, the Oxford Canal on the north, and the road leading from the village of Cosford to New Bilton on the west.

(2.) At Long Itchington, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Warwick and Napton Canal on the north, Cuttle Ground on the south and east, and the coal-yard at the Cuttle Inn on the west.

(3.) At Napton, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Dog-lane in the village of Napton on the north, the In-Meadow-road from Napton to Priors Marston on the east, the road from Napton to Priors Hardwick on the west, the bridle-road leading from the Napton and Hardwick-road to the Freeboard-road on the south, and the Freeboard-road on the south-east.

(4.) So much of the parish of Burton Dassett, in the county of Warwick, as lies on the north side of the East and West Junction Railway.

(5.) At Wolfhamcote, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Leam on the east, the bridle-road leading from Flecknoe to Daventry on the south, and the road leading from Flecknoe to Wolfhamcote on the north-west.

(6.) At Churchover, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Churchover to the Watling Street-road on the west, the Watling Street-road on the north, the Rugby and Lutterworth-road on the east, and the road leading out of the Rugby and Lutterworth-road to the village of Churchover on the south.

(7.) At Churchover, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Watling Street-road from the Gibbet to Caves Inn on the north, the road from Caves Inn leading to the village of Clifton through Newton on the east, the road leading out of the above road to Brownsover on the south, and the road leading from Rugby to the Watling Street-road on the west.

(8.) At Grendon, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Orton brook from the Bridge in the Grendon and Warton-lane to the Green-lane, thence the Green-lane to the Orton and Warton-road, thence the Orton and Warton-road to the Grendon and Warton-lane, and thence the Grendon and Warton-lane to the Bridge over the Orton brook aforesaid.

(9.) At Grendon, near Atherstone, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Watling Street-road from Grendon-road corner to where it meets Whillington-lane at the top of Archers Hill, Whillington-lane to the London and North-Western Railway, the London and North-Western Railway to the Bridge over Grendon-road, and Grendon-road to Watling Street-road aforesaid.

Yorkshire (East Riding).—(1.) So much of the parish of Grindall, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from North Burton to Boynton on the east and south, and a quickwood fence dividing a grass field and tillage fields on the north and west sides in the same occupation and known by the name of the Back Garth.

(2.) So much of the parish of Hunmanby, in the Dickering petty sessional division, in the East Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Hunmanby to Rudston on the east, certain quickwood fences dividing tillage fields from the grass field known as Cowpasture, in the occupation of Hannah Lowish, on the north, south, and west.
