THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Vice Consul at St. Domingo, intimating that the St. Dominican Government have ordered that vessels shall not be admitted to pratique unless they possess a clean bill of health certified by the Dominican Consul at the port of departure, except where no Consul resides at such port, in which case vessels possessing clean bills of health will be admitted to pratique, provided it is reported that no epidemic disease prevails at the port of her departure; in both of the above cases, however, vessels under suspicion will only be allowed to enter after complying with such quarantine as may be assigned by the Board of Health.

The Consul adds that the above regulations were to come into force on the 30th December for vessels from the West Indies, on the 14th instant for vessels from the United States of America, and on the 13th February for vessels from any other ports.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES
(ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

THE following Areas are now *Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease* under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those Areas as far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those Areas, without untrucking):—

Bedfordshire.—So much of the parish of Clophill in the county of Bedford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Clophill to Shefford from Clophill Mill to Beadlow Turn from west to north and from north to east, the road from Clophill Mill to the road that leads from Silsoe to Shefford past the Warren farm from west to south, and the road that leads from Silsoe to Shefford from Clophill Warren farm to Beadlow Turn aforesaid from south to east.

Berkshire.—At Sunninghill, in the county of Berks, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the east the road leading from the north point of Ascot Race Course to Dr. Brown's Corner, thence across the highroad to the South-Western Railway Arch on Sunninghill Bog, thence westward along the South-Western Railway to the Arch by Ascot (West) Station, and thence north-east along the Bagshot-road to the north point of Ascot Race Course aforesaid.

Buckinghamshire.—(1.) So much of the parish of Wing, in the county of Buckingham, as is bounded on the northward by the main-road from Aylesbury to Leighton Buzzard as far as Wing Mill, thence bounded on the eastward or north-eastward by the brook from Wing Mill to the crossing by the said brook of the road from the village of Wing to Mentmore Cross-roads, thence bounded on the eastward by the said road from the village of Wing as far as the said Cross-roads, thence bounded on the southward by the road leading to Wingrave as far as the boundary between the parish of Wing and the parish of Wingrave, and thence bounded on the westward by the parish of Wingrave as far as the said main-road.

(2.) So much of the parish of Langley Marish, in the county of Buckingham, as lies between the Great Western Railway and the main-road called the Bath-road (except the hamlet or chapelry of Colnbrook).

Cambridgeshire.—(1.) At Oakington, in the county of Cambridge, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Longstanton and Cambridge-road on or towards the south, the road leading from the Longstanton and Cambridge-road to the Church and Railway Station on or towards the west and north, and the road leading from Westwick through Oakington to the Longstanton and Cambridge-road on or towards the east.

(2.) At Cottenham, in the county of Cambridge, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main-street of Cottenham from Rooks-lane to Church Drove on the west, Church Drove on the north, Long Drive in Fen on the east, and Landbeach-road, Back-lane, and Rooks-lane on the south.

Liberty of the Isle of Ely.—(1.) So much of the parish of Newton, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Green-lane from Tyd St. Giles-road to Newton Church on the north, Old Bank from Newton Church to Fetton

End-road on the east, Fetton End-road on the south, and Mill-lane and Tyd St. Giles-road on the west.

(2.) At Benwick, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, partly by Back Reach Drove and partly by an imaginary line in continuation of the said Drove to Joseph Shepper-son's Spinnny on the north, thence White Fen Drove to its junction with the Whittlesey-road on the east, thence the Whittlesey-road to the Plantation corner of John Golden's farm (excluding such road) on the south, and thence Shaw's Dyke to the Back Reach Drove aforesaid on the west.

(3.) At Chatteris, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the New High-road from its commencement in High-street to the Parochial Cemetery on the north, an imaginary line from the said Cemetery to the end of Campole Drove on the east, the said Drove and thence an imaginary line to the Mill End-road at the Black Mill on the south, and the said Mill End-road, West Park-street, North Park-street, and High-street as far as the junction of the said New High-road with the said High-street on the west, the said roads not being included in the Area.

(4.) At Littleport, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north and west partly by the Brandon river in the county of Norfolk and partly by the boundary Dyke which separates the farms of H. T. Luddington and William C. Peacock including the farm of the latter, and thence south and east by the outward boundary Dyke of White House farm to George Morton's farm.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Witcham, and Mepal, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hundred Feet river on the north, the highway from Witcham to Mepal to the Hundred Feet river on the south and west, and the highway from Witcham to the Hundred Feet river on the east; the said highways not being included in the Area.

(6.) So much of the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at a point at the end of the Benwick Plantation at or near the south-east boundary of the parish known as Shaws Dike, along such Dike to the Cock Public-house, thence along the south side of Glassmoor Bank, being the southern Bank of Whittlesey Dike in a north-westwardly direction to Ironsides Mill, thence in a south-westwardly direction along the Mill drain to Searles Drove, thence in a north-westwardly direction along such last-mentioned Drove to the Benwick-road, thence in a southwardly direction along such last-mentioned road to Smith's Corner, thence in a south-eastwardly direction to the first-mentioned point, including the farms of D. Morton and Messrs. T. K. Specchly, T. Searle, B. Savage, and T. Grant; the said Benwick-road and Glassmoor Bank not being included in the Area.

(7.) Such part of the parish of Thorney, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, as lies within the following limits, that is to say, Thorney Causeway and Wards Causeway otherwise Wisbech-road on the north from the westernmost boundary of the parish known as Cats-water to a point at or near the north end of Great Knarr Fen Drove, Thorney Dike-road

on the south from Catswater aforesaid to a point at or near the south end of Great Knarr Fen Drove aforesaid, Catswater aforesaid on the west, and Great Knarr Fen Drove aforesaid on the east; the roads and Drove aforesaid not being included in the Area.

Cheshire.—(1.) At Woodford, in the parish of Prestbury, in the county of Chester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Lane Ends at Ivy Cottage by Robert Nield's farm, by the fence along Marfield, Booth's Moss, Walker's Moss, by Barn field to James Booth's farm, across the Woodford-road by Woodford School, along by a new fence to the foot-road, and thence along the foot-road and Moor-lane to Ivy Cottage at Lane Ends aforesaid.

(2.) In the counties of Lancaster and Chester comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, in the township of Tintwhistle, in the county of Chester, commencing at a point at the junction of the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road and Henshull-lane, by Henshull-lane to the Manchester and Huddersfield high-road; in the township of Mossley, in the county of Lancaster, along the Manchester and Huddersfield high-road to Dark-lane, along Dark-lane back to the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road, and thence along the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road to the starting point.

(3.) At Kingsley, in the county of Chester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Kingsley Church, thence by Wood-lane to the footpath leading to Kingsley, by the fence to Water Pits, and by the stream to the stile, thence by the fence leading to the junction of the Hall on the Hey-lane and Ball-lane to Crewood Common, road to Mill-lane, Mill-lane to Beech-lane junction with the Frodsham-road, and the Frodsham-road to Newton Five-lane Ends to Kingsley Church aforesaid.

Derbyshire.—(1.) So much of the parishes or townships of Stapenhill, Stanton and Newhall, Castle Gresley, Cauldwell, Linton, Lullington, Coton-in-the-Elms, Rosliston, Catton, Walton-upon-Trent, Drakelow, Croxall, Bretby, Harts-horne, and Swadlincote, in the county of Derby, and of the parish of Edingale, in the county of Stafford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Drakelow Viaducts along the Burton and Leicester branch of the Midland Railway to Stapenhill Railway Bridge, turning along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent to Ashby-road, turning to the right along Ashby-road to Masons Arms Midway, turning to the right along Swadlincote-road to Reed's Mill, thence by the right along Newhall-road, turning to the left by Swadlincote Oldfield Colliery and Cartwright's Mill to Swadlincote Market Place, thence by the right along the turnpike-road by Hall and Boardman's Colliery, Catchems Inn, and lane by Kidds Rough and Beards Brewery to High Cross Banks at Castle Gresley, thence to the right along Brookey-lane to a point opposite Burton's Old Chapel, turning to the left up the road through the village of Linton by the Red Lion Inn to Tilley's Beer House and by the fence to the boundary of the counties of Derby and Leicester, thence to the right along the boundary fence and Seal brook to its junction with the river Mease, along that river turning to the right along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to where it intersects the road near Westbrook farm, turning to the left

by Edingale fields to Edingale village, through the village by Holly Bush and Black Horse Inns and Kinson's shop to Edingale Schools, then along the boundary of the counties of Derby and Stafford to and along the river Mease to its junction with the river Trent, and turning to the right along the river Trent to Drakelow Viaducts aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes or townships of Newton Solney, Bretby, and Winshill, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Unicorn Inn Newton Solney up Newton-lane by Mr. Spocner's farm to the top, thence to the right along Bretby-lane by wheelwright's shop to the point where it intersects the boundary line of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent near Moat Bank House, thence to the right along the boundary of the borough of Burton-upon-Trent at Winshill to the river Trent, to the right along the river Trent to a point opposite Smedley House at Newton Solney, thence to the right in a straight line from that point to Smedley's-lane, and up that lane by the Plough Inn and blacksmith's shop to the Unicorn Inn aforesaid.

(3.) (5.) So much of the parish of Sweptstone, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Measham Hall and the bridle-road leading to Normanton on the north, thence to the right along the bridle-road to Sweptstone and thence to the Crown Inn on the east, thence to the right along the turnpike road as far as the cross-roads leading to Measham on the south, and thence to the right as far as Gallows-lane and along the footpath from Gallows-lane to the bridle-road from Measham Hall aforesaid on the west.

(6.) At Offcote and Underwood, in the parish of Ashbourne, in the petty sessional division of Ashbourne, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Offers-lane and Dovehouse Green, turning to the right along Union-street and Church Banks, turning to the right past the Workhouse and following the footway past Ashley Mill House, thence on the footway through Buckholm to the brook, turning to the right and following the brook to the Bridge crossing for Haywood, and turning to the right thence along the footway to the Channel in Offers-lane aforesaid.

(7.) So much of the parishes or townships of Ticknall, Melbourne, Derby Hills, and Calke, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point opposite Garrad's House, Ticknall, along the Derby-road to the First-lane End on the right, thence to the right along that road (Grass-lane) to Four-lane Ends at the top of Robinson's Hill, down Robinson's Hill by Shaw House to the junction with the road from Calke to Melbourne, to the right along the Calke-road to a point near Calke Mill, thence to the right along the northern boundary fence of Calke Park to a point opposite the House occupied by William Sparks, thence to the right along the occupation-road from that House to Ticknall village, and to the right along the Derby-road to Garrad's House aforesaid.

(8.) So much of the counties of Leicester and Derby as lies within the boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the counties of Stafford Derby, and Warwick meet, thence along the eastern boundary of the county of Warwick to where such boundary crosses the Atherstone and Snarestone-road at Pinwall, thence along such last-mentioned road through Twycross and Snarestone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarestone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties, and thence along the boundary of the county of Stafford to the starting point.

(9.) At Tideswell, in the county of Derby, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Richard-lane and Back-lane, thence by Craven House up Slagg Hillocks taking the Old Town Head, following the road to Cross Daggers Inn, thence by the right up Cliff Hill passing Cliff Inn taking the highway as far as Barratt-lane into Litton Dale, following the highway to Tideswell and Millers Dale main-road, and taking the said main-road to Tideswell Gas Works and to Richard-lane aforesaid.

(10.) So much of the parish of Dale Abbey, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, starting from a point on the Ilkeston and Derby-road (the Sandpits), by the right to the Flourish Inn, by the right along the footpath to Stanley brook, thence along the brook course to Baldock Mill, by the right up Cat and Fiddle-lane to the Ilkeston and Derby-road, and by the right along the Ilkeston and Derby-road to the Sandpits aforesaid.

(11.) So much of the parishes and townships of Willsthorpe, Sandiacre, Risley, Draycott and Church Wilne, Breaston, Sawley, and Long Eaton, in the county of Derby, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the river Trent Bridge at Sawley along that river passing Trent Lock to the junction of the river Erewash, along the Erewash to Sandiacre Bridge, by the left through Sandiacre village, along the Nottingham and Derby-road through Risley passing Hopwell Park Lodge, by the left along Gipsy-lane, along the Dray-

cott-road, over the Canal Bridge, by the right down the occupation-lane at Nooning Ford, by the left along the river Derwent passing Wilne Mill to Derwent mouth, and thence along the river Trent to Trent Bridge at Sawley aforesaid.

Durham.—(1.) At Kyo, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Catchgate to Kyo on the north, the boundary fence of Kyo Laws farm on the east, the North-Eastern Railway on the south, and the turnpike-road leading from Annfield Plain to Catchgate on the west.

(2.) At Stranton, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Oxford-road Belle Vue on the south, York-road on the west, Whitby-street on the east, and Church-street and Cambridge-road on the north.

(3.) In the township of Collierley, in the parish of Lanchester, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary fence of Pontop Hall, Collierley, and Lintz farms on the north, the turnpike-road leading from Mountsett to Hare Law on the east, the Fondlysett highway to Pontop Pyke-lane Ends on the south, and from Pontop Pyke-lane Ends in a straight line to Pontop Pyke Hall on the west.

(4.) At Dalton-le-Dale, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Murton Colliery village on the south, Water Gate Plantation near the Sunderland and Hartlepool branch of the North-Eastern Railway on the west, the old parish-road leading from Murton Junction to the Sunderland and Stockton highway on the north, and the Stockton and Sunderland highway on the east.

(5.) At Medomsley, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway known as Cut Throat-lane leading to Allendale Cottages on the north, the cart-road leading from South Field to Cut Throat-lane Ends on the east, the bridle-road leading from Bradley-lane Ends to South Field on the south, and West-lane leading from Allendale Cottages to Bradley-lane Ends on the west.

(6.) At Brandon, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the foot-road leading from Brandon village to Langley Hall on the north-west, the highway leading from Langley Hall to Langley Moor on the north, the highway leading from Langley Moor to Brandon-lane Ends on the south-east, and the highway leading from Brandon-lane Ends to Brandon village on the south-west.

(7.) So much of the borough of Darlington, in the county of Durham, as is bounded on the north by the Cross Back-street leading from Back-street behind Hargreave-terrace to Park-place, on the east by the said Back-street behind Hargreave-terrace, on the south by the south side of Swan-street, and on the west by the west side of Park-place.

(8.) So much of the borough of Darlington, in the county of Durham, as is bounded on the north by the stream known as Cocker-beck, on the south by Gladstone-street, on the east by certain land belonging to Edwin Lucas Pease, in the occupation of Messrs. (9.) At Harton, in the county of Durham, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary of the borough of South

Shields on the north, the boundaries of Whitburn and Cleadon townships on the south, the seabeach on the east, and by and including the township-road leading from Tyne Dock to East Boldon to a point at the south side of an occupation-road leading to Biddick Hall on the west.

Essex.—(1.) At Latchingdon, in the county of Essex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Blackwater on the north, Butterfields and Mundon Hall farms on the west, Clark's Lower farm on the east, and the road leading from Latchingdon to Steeple dividing Lawling Hall farm from Lawling Smith's farm, in the occupation of George Attenborough, on the south.

(2.) At Great Bentley, in the county of Essex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Tendring Hundred Railway on the south, Great Bentley Green and main-road on the north, nine acres of land on Bordells farm, in the occupation of Philip B. Vincent, on the east, and eleven acres of land and buildings, in the occupation of James Alward, and Goding-lane on the west.

(3.) So much of the parish of Mashbury, in the county of Essex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Friday's farm on the Waltham-road by Gatehouse as far as Mashbury Hall, thence to the cottage by Mashbury Independent Chapel, thence to Bereman's farm, and thence to Friday's farm on the Waltham-road aforesaid.

(4.) The whole of the farm known as the Home farm, situate near Wyvenhoe Park, in the parish of Greenstead, in the borough of Colchester, in the county of Essex, and all such part of the said Wyvenhoe Park as lies within the boundary of the said borough, the said boundary being shewn and the said part of the said Park being divided off from the remainder thereof by a fence, dyke, watercourse, and pond; and which farm and Park are respectively in the occupation of H. J. Gurdon-Rebow.

(5.) All such part of the farm known as Friday Wood farm, in the parish of Berechurch, in the borough of Colchester, in the county of Essex, in the occupation of Samuel Blomfield, as lies on the west side of the highway (called Friday Wood-road) leading from Colchester aforesaid to Layer-de-la-Haye and within the boundary of the said borough of Colchester.

Hampshire.—(1.) At Dibden, in the county of Southampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Hythe to Marchwood as far as Dibden Church on the north, the village of Hythe on the south, Southampton Water on the east, and Claypitts-lane and farm as far as the Forest Gate at the end of Claypitts-lane on the west.

(2.) In the petty sessional division of Fareham, in the county of Southampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is say, from the gate in Rowner-road leading into Grange-lane, along Rowner-road to the Railway Arch of the London and South-Western Railway, along the said Railway to the Railway Arch in Anns Hill-lane, along Anns Hill-lane in a southerly direction to Bury Cross, thence along Privett-road to certain land now or late of Larcom occupied by C. W. (3.) So much of the parish of Lilley, in the county of Hertford, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Red Lion, Lilley, on the north, the Homestead farm, Putteridge Park, on the south, Davis's Hill on the east, and Beeche's Hill on the west.

(4.) At Preston, in the county of Hertford, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, King's Hill on the north, Old St. Albans highway on the east, Kiln Wood on the south, and Dead Woman's-lane on the west.

Huntingdonshire.—(1.) At Yaxley, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Norman Cross to Yaxley and Yaxley village-street as far as Dobbs-lane on the south, thence east by Dobbs-lane and Robert Loweth's property as far as Robert Warwick's farm premises, north Poors Allotment field to Hurry Burnham's arable land on the north-west, and west occupation-road leading from William Whitehead's farm to the road from Norman Cross to Yaxley aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parish of Great Gransden, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Great Gransden to Caxton on the north, the boundary dividing the counties of Huntingdon and Cambridge on the east, the drift-way from Longstowe to the Windmill at Great Gransden on the south, and thence a certain hedge to the road leading from Great Gransden to Caxton aforesaid on the west.

(3.) At Upwood, in the county of Huntingdon, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Raveley drain from the north corner of Ramsey Turf Fen to a branch of the same drain that runs south to a house in the occupation of William Curtis on the west, Lower Drove-road in Ramsey Turf Fen to Ugg Mere Cote-road then along New Fen Drove-road to Bury Green on the north, Biggin-lane and Gravel-road to the road leading to Upwood and Raveley Fen-road on the east, and the said Upwood and Raveley Fen-road to Raveley drain near to William Curtis's house aforesaid on the south; the Lower Drove-road, the New Fen Drove-road, and the Upwood and Raveley Fen-road not being included in the Area.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Ramsey, and Warboys, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Forty Foot river from Crease Mill running in a westerly direction to Ash drain on the north, from Forty Foot river running in a southerly direction to Ramsey Hollow-road on the west, thence by the corner of A. J. C. Rose's farm running in an easterly direction to

Puttock Drove, thence along the said Drove to a private-road in the occupation of Alfred Rose and Hugh John Smith to Crease drain on the south, and thence running along the boundary line dividing the counties of Huntingdon and Cambridge to Crease Mill aforesaid on the east.

(5.) So much of the parishes of Little Raveley, Broughton, King's Ripton, and Abbot's Ripton, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Little Raveley Church to Broughton cross-roads on the east, thence to King's Ripton cross-roads on the south, thence to Abbot's Ripton Church on the west, and thence by the road at Wennington Corner to Little Raveley Church aforesaid on the north—the said roads not being included in the Area.

(6.) So much of the parish of Sawtry, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Sawtry to Gidding on the north, the Old Bullock-road on the west, the foot-path from Gidding to Sawtry on the south, and a certain hedge running in a direct line from the said foot-path to the Gidding-road and dividing at the northern end a field of arable land in the occupation of William Collett from a field of arable land in the occupation of Benjamin Masters on the east.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Diddington, and Southoe, in the county of Huntingdon, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the footway leading from Diddington through Battlefield across Mr. Rampley's-road and Black Lane field to the south-east corner of Fuzzin field on the east, the hedge separating Mr. Rampley's farm from Mr. Bowyer's farm to near Southoe Bell on North Road Cross-road, then by the right to the first fence on the left, and then by the said fence to Hillfield Spinny on the south, the fence from Hillfield Spinny and Allotment Grounds to Wood-lane, Diddington, on the west, and Wood-lane and Diddington village-street to the footway aforesaid on the north.

Kent.—(1.) At Tunstall, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Siller Field on the north and west, and Ruins-road leading from Sittingbourne to Bexon on the east and south.

(2.) At West Malling, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Malling Railway Station Bridge, the footpath from the East Malling-road to the London-road, the road from the London-road past Leybourne Rectory to Leybourne Church, the road from Leybourne Church to Leybourne Park, the road from Leybourne Park to the Wheatsheaf Inn, the footpath from the Wheatsheaf Inn to the Railway Crossing, the fence round the Cricket field to the Gas house, the road from the Gas house through Miss Savage's to St. Leonards Street, from St. Leonards Street to Lavenders, and from Lavenders to the Malling Station Railway Bridge aforesaid.

(3.) At Bromley, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hayes-road from the Bromley-road to Hayes parish Church, thence by a straight line to the Church on Bromley Common opposite the bottom of Oakley-road, and thence to the Hayes-road aforesaid.

(4.) At Wateringbury, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Cannon Heath-road to Watering-

bury Church, thence to the King's Head Inn and Malling-road to the North Pole Inn, Barnwells Lodge, and Mereworth-road to Cannon Heath.

(5.) At Cobham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Cobham to Gravesend on the north, a certain Cherry Orchard in the occupation of Thomas Stevens on the south, the highway leading from the Howletts to Sole Street on the east, and certain arable land in the occupation of Thomas Stevens on the west.

(6.) At Frindsbury, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain arable land in the occupation of Messrs. George and Richard Brooker on the north, the highway leading from Strood to Cobham on the south, certain Hop Gardens in the occupation of William Dunford on the east, and certain arable land in the occupation of Messieurs G. and R. Brooker on the west.

(7.) At East Farleigh, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Stiles farm to East Farleigh Church, the road from East Farleigh Church to East Farleigh Bridge, the river Medway from East Farleigh Bridge to Bydews, and the road from Bydews to Stiles farm aforesaid.

(8.) At Sevenoaks, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, a straight line from the farm buildings of Ashgrove to Shenden on the north, the Sevenoaks and Tunbridge-road on the east, Morley's-lane as far as the Weald Church on the south-east, thence a straight line to Dale farm on the south, and thence a straight line to the farm buildings of Ashgrove aforesaid on the west.

(9.) So much of the parish of Thanington, near Canterbury, in the county of Kent, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Wincheap Forge, Wincheap-street, to the Canterbury Water Works on the north, the footpath from the Canterbury Water Works to New House-road on the west, the New House-road to Stuppington Corner on the south, and thence Hollow-lane to Wincheap Forge, Wincheap-street, aforesaid on the east.

(10.) At Wrotham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Pilgrim-road from Wrotham Hill to Hixdown, the road from Hixdown to the London Chatham and Dover Railway Bridge at Ightham Court, the London Chatham and Dover Railway from Ightham Court Bridge to Cricket farm Bridge, the footpath from Cricket farm Bridge through Wrotham Plain to the bottom of St. Mary's-lane, and the main-road from St. Mary's-lane through Wrotham town to Pilgrim-road at Wrotham Hill aforesaid.

(11.) At Boxley, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Ashford-road from Maidstone borough boundary to Huntsmans-lane, the new line of Railway from Huntsmans-lane to Maidstone borough boundary, and Maidstone borough boundary from the new line of Railway to the Ashford-road aforesaid.

(12.) At Thurnham, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Millgate to Bearsted as far as Watery-lane, Watery-lane to the new Railway, the new Railway to the stream by Criswell, and the stream to Millgate.

(13.) At Herne, near Herne Bay, in the county of Kent, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Mickleburgh Hill House along the King's road to the Railway-road on the north, thence along the Railway-road to Edington Bridge, Edington-lane, on the west, thence along Edington-lane and Pigeon-lane to Pigeon Corner on the south, and thence along the occupation-road to Mickleburgh Hill House aforesaid on the east.

Lancashire.—(1.) So much of the township of Todmorden and Walsden, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Ramsden-road on the west, Moorland and Deanroyd Mill on the south, Deanroyd-lane, to Deanroyd farm on the south-east, Moorland on the east, and Skew Bridge (Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway) and Cricket Ground Walsden on the north.

(2.) At Chorlton-cum-Hardy, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Lovers Walk on the north, Manchester-road on the south, Wilbraham-road on the east, and Upper Chorlton-road on the west.

(3.) At Stretford, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Pool-lane on the east, Chapel-lane on the west, Burton-road on the north, and Chester-road on the south.

(4.) At Cliviger, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the river Calder on the south commencing at its source, thence along the river side to the foot of the Scout Rocks, thence in a westerly direction along the side of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway to Honey Holme-lane, along Honey Holme-lane to the Todmorden and Burnley highway at Bull's Head, thence to the north by the Higher Bank wall fence, and to the east by the Higher Helliplatt wall fence to the river Calder, and thence to the south along its side to its source.

(5.) In the counties of Lancaster and Chester comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, in the township of Tintwhistle, in the county of Chester, commencing at a point at the junction of the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road and Henshull-lane; by Henshull-lane to the Manchester and Huddersfield high-road; in the township of Mossley, in the county of Lancaster, along the Manchester and Huddersfield high-road to Dark-lane, along Dark-lane back to the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road, and thence along the Stalybridge and Huddersfield-road to the starting point.

(6.) At Pennington, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Bedford brook from Mill-lane to Orchard-lane on the north, Orchard-lane, Bolton-road, Kirkhall-lane, and the London and North-Western Railway on the west, Pennington brook to Pennington Mill bridge, the occupation-road through Green Fold farm to Dick Mather Bridge, and the Canal to Boardman-street End on the south, and Boardman-street, Chapel-street, and Mill-lane on the east.

(7.) So much of the township of Blatchinworth and Calderbrook, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Barn Meadows, Handle Hall, and Newgate on the north, Higher Clough, Heights farm, and Shore on the west, Shore Gardens to Featherstall on the south, and Todmorden-road and Gale on the east.

(8.) At Quarlton, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the brook running between Mr. Walker's Factory and Tottington on the north, the brook running between Edgeworth and the Red Lion Public-house Quarlton on the east, the public highway from the Red Lion Public-house Quarlton to Quarlton Vale on the south, and the brook running from Quarlton Vale to Mr. Walker's Factory on the west.

(9.) At Mossley, in the county of Lancaster, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Egmont-street on the north-east, Manchester-road on the south, Stanhope-street on the north, the river Tame on the east, and Scout-road on the west.

(10.) So much of the townships of Blatchinworth and Calderbrook, and Butterworth, in the county of Lancaster, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Light Howlers-road and Pyke House on the east, Featherstall, Whitelees-road, and Caldermoor on the south-west, Newbarn in Butterworth on the south, and Gale on the north.

Leicestershire.—(1.) The whole of the parish of Welham, in the county of Leicester.

(2.) The whole of the parish of Slawston, in the county of Leicester.

(3.) So much of the parish of Humberstone, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the north, the turnpike-road from Leicester to Uppingham on the south, the road from the said turnpike-road to Humberstone on the east, and the road from the said turnpike-road past the borough Asylum to the said road from Belgrave to Humberstone on the west.

(4.) So much of the parishes of Eaton, Eastwell, and Stathern, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from the Readed House near Belvoir to Knipton on the north, the road leading from Eaton to Waltham on the east, the road leading from Eastwell to Stathern on the south, and the road leading from Belvoir Top Wood to Eastwell on the west.

(5.) So much of the parish of Packington, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Oakey Hovel by the side of the Ashly-road and thence by that road to Fortiss-lane as far as Packington House on the north, Packington House and across Garner land to Garner Barn and the bridle-road leading to Stow House on the east, the bridle-road to Stow House and Stone House and along the road to Arlix House on the south, and Arlix farm house and across to Cherry Orchard then across Oakey Old Turf to the Hovel aforesaid on the west.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Redmile, Barkestone, Bottesford, and Granby, in the counties of Leicester, and Nottingham, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road from Granby to Elton on the north, the road from Elton to Bottesford on the east, the accommodation-road from Bottesford to Barkestone on the south, and the road from Barkestone to Granby on the west.

(7.) So much of the parish of Sweptstone, in the counties of Derby, and Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Measham Hall and the bridle-road leading to Normanton on the north, thence to the right along the bridle-road to Sweptstone and thence to the Crown Inn on the east, thence to the right along the turnpike-road as far as the cross-

roads leading to Measham on the south, and thence to the right as far as Gallows-lane and along the footpath from Gallows-lane to the bridle-road from Measham Hall aforesaid on the west.

(8.) At Stoke Golding, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, two arable fields in the occupation of the executors of the late W. N. Berry of Stoke Golding on the north and west, the road leading from Hinckley to Stoke Golding on the south, and the road leading from Hinckley to Dadlington on the east.

(9.) So much of the parishes of Great Easton, Drayton, and Neville Holt, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Great Easton and Drayton-road on the south, the Drayton-road leading to Holt on the west, Holt Hall, America House, six fields in the occupation of Sir Bache Cunard, and three fields in the occupation of Mr. Mould on the north, and the Great Easton village-road leading to Blaston as far as Mr. Mould's road field on the east.

(10.) So much of the parish of Stathern, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Stathern Railway Bridge to Bottesford, thence the occupation-road from Miller's farm to Stathern Wood End, thence across by the bridle-road from Stathern Wood End to Stathern Mill Point, and thence across from Stathern Mill Point direct to Stathern Railway Station.

(11.) So much of the parishes of Slawston, and Hallaton, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Cranoe to Hallaton on the north, the London and North-Western Railway from Hallaton to the Bridge crossing the road midway between Slawston and Medbourne on the east, the road leading from the said Bridge so far as Slawston on the south, and the road leading from Slawston to Cranoe on the west.

(12.) At Hoby, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the fence forming the boundary between Ragdale and Hoby on the north, the road leading from Ragdale to Hoby and on to Rotherby on the east, the river Wharf on the south, and the road from Brooksby to Hoby and Mr. Main's farm on the west.

(13.) So much of the counties of Leicester and Derby as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, from a point where the counties of Stafford, Derby, and Warwick meet, thence along the eastern boundary of the county of Warwick to where such boundary crosses the Atherstone and Snarestone-road at Pinwall, thence along such last-mentioned road through Twycross and Snarestone to where that road intersects the boundary line (Snarestone brook) of the counties of Derby and Leicester near Peppers House, thence to the right along the boundary of those counties to a point opposite Gallows Gate, across Ashley-road and along Willesley-lane to Willesley Pinfold, thence to the left along that road to the First Four-lane Ends at Donisthorpe, thence to the right along the turnpike-road to the Moira Railway Station on the Leicester and Burton branch of the Midland Railway, thence along the Railway from the Moira Railway Station to the boundary of the counties of Leicester and Derby, thence along the boundary of those counties, and thence along the

boundary of the county of Stafford to the starting point.

(14.) So much of the parishes of Medbourne, Holt, and Blaston, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Holt to Blaston on the north, the foot-road leading from Medbourne to Holt on the east, the London and North-Western Railway from Medbourne to Blaston Bridge on the south, and from Blaston Bridge to Blaston village on the west.

(15.) So much of the parishes of Blaston, and Medbourne, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Blaston-road on the north, the road leading from Blaston to Medbourne as far as Ivy Gate on the east, Gilson's Close on the south, and Hallaton-road as far as Gilson's Close on the west.

(16.) At Cotes de Val, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields at Cotes de Val on the north, certain fields at Cotes de Val, certain fields in the parish of Gilmorton, and the road leading from Gilmorton to the turnpike-road between Lutterworth and Leicester on the south, certain fields at Cotes de Val, and the turnpike-road leading from Lutterworth to Leicester on the west, and certain fields in the occupation of C. Bloxam and J. Gardner in the parish of Gilmorton on the east.

(17.) So much of the parishes of Great Bowden, and Little Bowden, in the counties of Leicester, and Northampton, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading through Great Bowden on the north, the road leading from the Bowden turn on the Dingley-road to Great Bowden on the east, the road leading from the Bowden turn on the Dingley-road to Market Harborough on the south, and the road leading through Market Harborough to Great Bowden on the west.

(18.) So much of the parish of Loughborough, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Upton and Mr. Sarjeant on the north, the road leading from Nanpanton to Woodhouse and certain land in the occupation of W. B. Paget, Esq. on the south, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Watnaby and E. H. Warner, Esq., and a certain Wood known as the Outwoods in the occupation of Mr. Sutton on the east, and certain land in the occupation of Messrs. Smalley and Hanson, and Mr. Hopkins, and Mr. Peberdy on the west.

(19.) So much of the parish of Harby, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Harby to Stathern on the north, the road leading from Stathern to Eastwell on the east, the road leading from Eastwell to Goatby turn on the south, and the road leading from Goatby turn to Harby on the west.

(20.) So much of the parishes of Loughborough, Thorpacre, and Knight-Thorpe, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Palmer and Mr. Reynolds and the lane leading from Thorpacre to the Derby turnpike-road on the north, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Joseph Reynolds, Dr. Eddowes, Mr. Matthews, and Mr. E. L. Barker on the south, certain allotment gardens in the occupation of Mr. Z. Onions senior and others and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Z. Onions junior, Mr. W. Blood, and

Mr. Withers, and a portion of the line of the Charnwood Forest Railway Company on the north side of the Ashley turnpike-road, and on the south side of the said road by a lane leading from the said Ashley turnpike-road to Radmoor on the east, and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Gimson and Mr. Matson, a portion of the line of the said Charnwood Forest Railway Company, and the road leading from the said Ashley-road to the village of Thorpacre on the west.

At Garthorpe, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary fence between Garthorpe and Waltham on the north, the road leading from Waltham to Garthorpe on the east, certain arable land in the occupation of Mr. Pacey on the south, and certain land in the occupation of Mr. Roe, Saxby, and the boundary fence between Garthorpe and Saxby on the west.

(23.) At Thorpe Arnold, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Melton Mowbray to Waltham on the north, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Shilling and the Broom Wood on the east, the boundary fence between Thorpe Arnold and Brentingby on the south, and certain land in the occupation of Messieurs Garner and Hill, Melton Mowbray, on the west.

(24.) At Glenn Parva, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Mr. Wilders in the parish of Aylestone on the north, the villages of Glenn Parva and Blaby on the south, the Barracks of Glenn on the east, and the Lutterworth turnpike-road on the west.

(25.) At Long Clawson, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the upper part of the Waltham-road and the bridle-road to Ab-Kettleby on the south, the Melton and Hickling lanes and the street in the village of Long Clawson on the west, the bridle-road between Hose and Hickling on the north, and the parish of Hose on the east.

Lincolnshire (Holland).—(1.) So much of the parishes of Sutton St. James, Tydd St. Marys, and Long Sutton, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway running through the village of Sutton St. James from Ive's Cross to Catlan's Barn in Draw Dyke-road on the south, thence the road running from the said Catlan's Barn to the Great South Holland Drain near to Foreman's Bridge on the east, thence the said Great South Holland Drain to Clifton's Bridge on the north, thence Raven's Bank, otherwise Sutton St. James-road, to Ive's Cross aforesaid on the west; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

(3.) So much of Holbeach Marsh, in the parish of Holbeach, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the sewer dividing Mr. Thomas H. Savage's, Mr. Cole Tinsley's, and Leaden Hall farms from Mr. Joseph Ward's Lap Water farmhouse to the Silt-lane near to Leaden Hall farmstead on the north and west, thence the said Silt-lane and Gravel-road passing Mr. Cole Tinsley's Old Thatched farmhouse and Mr. Patchet's farm buildings to Mr. Joseph Ward's Lap Water farmhouse aforesaid on the south and east; the said Silt-lane and Gravel-road not being included in the Area.

(4.) So much of the parish of Gedney, in the Parts of Holland, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Spalding and Sutton Bridge Railway from Stone-Gate Crossing to Long-lane Crossing on the north, thence Long-lane and Delph-Bank to Fleet drain on the west, thence Fleet drain to Gedney Broad-Gate on the south, and thence Gedney Broad-Gate and Stone-Gate to Stone-Gate Crossing aforesaid on the east and north-east; exclusive of all boundary-roads but inclusive of all intersecting-roads.

Lincolnshire (Kesteven).—(1.) So much of the parish of Deeping St. Nicholas, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the South Drove drain to Neal's farm on or towards the south, the road from Neal's farm to Oat Sheaf, thence by certain lands in the occupation of E. Paulett to E. Paulett's farmstead on or towards the west, from E. Paulett's farmstead by certain lands in the occupation of E. Paulett and John Holland to C. Eldret's farmstead on or towards the north, and from C. Eldret's farmstead by certain lands in the occupation of J. Bartholomew and G. Kemp to Kemp's house and to the South Drove drain aforesaid.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Horbling, Spanby, and Swaton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Great Northern Railway from William Dickens's nine acres field, Horbling, to Dawson Bellamy's Spinny, Spanby, on the west, from Dawson Bellamy's Spinny by W. Bellamy's field, Spanby, and Mrs. Wadsley's arable field to Mrs. Wadsley's new farmstead, Swaton, thence by two arable fields in the occupation of J. Modd, one arable field in the occupation of W. Morris, one arable field and one grass field in the occupation of Mrs. Wadsley, and two arable fields in the occupation of William Mansfield to Swaton-lane or the north, from William Mansfield's arable field by Swaton-lane to Edward Harris's house, Horbling, on the east, and from Edward Harris's house, Horbling, by Edward Harris's home field, two grass fields in the occupation of R. J. Pepper, Horbling Poor Gardens, and Glenn's sixteen acres to William Dickens's nine acres field, Horbling, aforesaid on the south.

(3.) So much of the parish of Bassingthorpe, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Westby to Great

Ponton from David Lee's Brick-Yard field to Henry Hall's Far Weetings grass field on or towards the south, thence by Henry Hall's Cow Close to Mrs. A. Gibson's Dyke Close on or towards the west, thence by James Scarborough's Ten Acres grass field and the Cottage field to James Scarborough's Walk Close on or towards the north, and thence by D. Lee's Middle Beck grass field and the Brick-Yard field to the highway leading from Westby to Great Ponton aforesaid on or towards the east.

(4.) So much of the parish of Deeping St. Nicholas, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the south the Great Northern Railway from a certain arable field in the occupation of Thomas Holland to the South Drain Drove, on or towards the west from the Great Northern Railway by the South Drain Drove to Kemp's House and thence to W. Harrison's farmhouse to the Spalding and Deeping highway, on or towards the north from W. Harrison's house by the Spalding and Deeping highway to the farmstead of Thomas Holland, and on or towards the east from Thomas Holland's farmstead by certain arable fields in the occupation of G. Holland to the Great Northern Railway.

(5.) So much of the parish of Brant Broughton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Leadenham to Newark from the river Brant to the seventh mile stone from Newark on the south, thence in a direct line by the Poor Close, F. Shaw's, Southern's, and W. Sneath's arable and two grass fields, across Mill-lane, C. Williams's two grass fields, W. Ashton's grass field, and Mr. W. Everitt's western boundary to the parish boundary of Carlton-le-Moorland on the west, thence by the parish boundary of Carlton-le-Moorland and Brant Broughton to the river Brant on the north, and thence by the river Brant to the highway leading from Leadenham to Newark aforesaid on the east.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Barholm, and Langtoft, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Langtoft Fen-road from Edward Stafford's farmstead to the Cross-road on or towards the south, thence the Cross-road to William Charity's farmstead on or towards the west, thence the drain dividing the parishes of Barholm and Langtoft and Baston to the Cross drain on or towards the north, and thence the Cross drain to Edward Stafford's farmstead aforesaid on or towards the east.

(7.) So much of the parish of Brant Broughton, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Broughton Mill-lane on the south, thence the Top-road leading from Beckingham to Carlton-le-Moorland on the west, thence the dividing hedge of the parishes of Brant Broughton and Carlton-le-Moorland on the north, and thence the bridle-road leading from Carlton-le-Moorland to Broughton to Broughton Mill-lane aforesaid on the east.

(8.) So much of the parishes of Heckington, and Great Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north the Sleaford and Boston highway from Burton-lane End to Heckington Cemetery, thence on the east a direct line across certain fields in the occupation of Charles Little, Mrs. Mason, and Edward Rowe to the said Edward Rowe's farmhouse

in Great Hale, thence to the Old Vicarage House in Great Hale aforesaid on the south, thence the road running in a southerly direction to Woods Orchard, thence to the south-west corner of the said Edward Rowe's grass field known as Weavers field, and thence on the west a direct line across several fields of Charles Sharpe to the said Burton-lane End.

(9.) So much of the parishes of Heckington, and Great Hale, in the Parts of Kesteven, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the south from Henry Thompson's farm buildings Great Hale Fen by the Beckson Bridge drain to Beckson Bridge, thence on the west by the highway leading from Little Hale to Heckington to the Great Northern Railway Station Heckington, thence on the north by the Great Northern Railway to opposite George Wood's Cottage Great Hale Fen, thence on the east by a direct line across certain fields in the occupation of F. G. Mastin and Henry Thompson to Henry Thompson's farm buildings aforesaid.

Lincolnshire (Lindsey).—(1.) At Humberstone, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Louth and Tetney-road on the north and west, the road leading to Mr. Marshall's farm on the south, and a certain large grass field in the occupation of Mr. Andrew on the east.

(2.) At Laceby, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain fields in the occupation of Mr. Kirk on the north, the Welbeck drain on the south, Laceby Beck on the east, and Irby Moat on the west.

(3.) The whole of the parish of Hemswell, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire.

(4.) So much of the parish of Thoresway, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the parish of Rothwell on the north, the village of Thoresway on the east, the road leading from the High-street leading from Caistor to Horncastle to the village of Thoresway on the south, and the said High-street leading from Caistor to Horncastle on the west.

(5.) At Gayton-le-Wold, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Lincoln turnpike-road on the north, the boundary fence between the farms in the respective occupations of R. Martin and Jabez Rigall on the south, the Heath-road on the east, and the road leading from the Lincoln turnpike-road to Gayton on the west.

(6.) At Santon, Appleby, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire Railway running from Appleby to Frodingham on the north, a water-course on the side of Scunthorpe Common on the west, and a certain plantation on the south and east.

(7.) At Wainfleet All Saints, in the Parts of Lindsey, Lincolnshire, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the boundary Bridge between Wainfleet All Saints and Wainfleet St. Marys highway leading to Boston on the south, the highway to Wainfleet Bank on the west, the highway leading to Firsby on the north, and the highway leading from Wainfleet to Skyness on the east.

Middlesex.—(1.) At Harrow-on-the-Hill, in the county of Middlesex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from Mr

Brown's boundary wall Kenton-lane farm by the thorn hedge passing the Rifle Canteen across the fields (bounded by thorn hedges) to the London and North-Western Railway at Harrow Railway Bridge, thence the London and North-Western Railway to the Bridge in Kenton-lane, thence Kenton-lane to four-cross-way, the stream to Gooseacre-lane, past Kenton School to the lane adjoining Kenton Lodge, thence the footpath towards Edgware to the stile and the hedge to the top of Woodman's Hill, and thence the hedge to Kenton-lane-farm.

(2.) So much of the parishes of Hillingdon, and Uxbridge, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Uxbridge Common on the north, the continuation of the same to Park-road on the east, Halefield-road on the west, and High-street Uxbridge on the south.

(3.) At Enfield Highway, in the county of Middlesex, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Hertford-road on the west, the Great Eastern Railway on the east, a certain brook extending to the Great Eastern Railway and thence to the river Lee on the north, and Eagle House footpath and Duck Lees-lane on the south.

(4.) So much of the parish of Harrow, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Towards Harrow, the boundary wall of Kenton-lane farm in the occupation of Mr. Brown and the hedgerow running at the back of the Rifle Canteen and its continuation to the London and North-Western Railway Bridge at Harrow Station, thence the London and North-Western Railway to the Bridge in Kenton-lane, and thence Kenton-lane to the four-cross-way: Towards Kingsbury, the hedge running from opposite the boundary wall of Kenton-lane farm to the centre of Woodman's Hill and the hedge running thence (at right angles) as far as the Kenton and Edgware footpath, thence the Kenton and Edgware footpath to Kenton-lane, thence Gooseacre-lane to the stream at the back of Kenton Grange, and thence the said stream to the four-cross-way in Kenton-lane.

(5.) So much of the parish of Hillingdon, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, on or towards the north-west Long-lane leading from the Uxbridge and London main-road to Ickenham and thence the road to Ruislip as far as the West End-road leading to Yeading and Greenford, on or towards the north-east and south-east the West End-road leading to Yeading and Greenford to the Uxbridge and London main-road, and thence on or towards the south-west the Uxbridge and London main-road to Long-lane aforesaid.

(6.) So much of the parishes of Twickenham, and Teddington, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Thames Valley line of the London and South-Western Railway from the point where the Hampton-road crosses it near Fulwell Station to its junction with the Kingston line of the London and South-Western Railway on the north, the Kingston line of Railway from its junction with the Thames Valley line to the point where the road from Teddington to New Hampton crosses the line on the east, the road leading from Teddington to New Hampton from the point where it crosses the Kingston line to

its junction with the road leading from New Hampton to Twickenham on the south, and the road from New Hampton to Twickenham from its junction with the road leading from Teddington to the point where it crosses the Thames Valley line on the west.

(7.) So much of the parishes of Isleworth, and Twickenham, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the Staines-road on the north, the Hanworth-road on the south, Cromwell-lane on the east, and the eastern boundary hedge of Hounslow Heath on the west.

(8.) So much of the parishes of Finchley, Hornsey, and Friern Barnet, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Summers-lane and the road leading from that lane into Colney Hatch at the point where it joins Colney Hatch-lane on the north, an imaginary line drawn from the High-road Finchley by Melrose Cottage along the southern boundary of the Islington and St. Pancras Cemeteries, then along the northern boundary of Coldfall Wood, and then from the north-east corner of that Wood along the hedge into Tatterdown-lane at a point just north of Coppett farm on the south, Tatterdown-lane from the point just above Coppett farm to the junction of that lane with Colney Hatch-lane, and then Colney Hatch-lane to the point where it joins the road leading to Summers-lane on the east, and the High-road Finchley from Summers-lane to Melrose Cottage on the west.

(9.) So much of the parish of Teddington, in the county of Middlesex, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, High-street Teddington from the Railway Bridge to the point where it joins the Kingston-road near St. Mary's Church on the north, the Kingston-road from High-street Teddington to Bushey Park-road on the east or north-east, Bushey Park-road from the point where it joins the Kingston-road to the Kingston line of the London and South-Western Railway on the south or south-east, and the Kingston line of Railway on the west or south-west.

Norfolk.—An Area comprising so much of the parish of Stoke Holy Cross, in the county of Norfolk, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Shottesham-road (by fields) on the east, Stoke Park and the boundary fence separating Mr. Whittaker's and Mr. Pitt's farms on the west, Stoke-lane on the north, and the road running through Mr. Seago's occupation and Stoke Park on the south.

Also an Area at Littleport, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north and west partly by the Brandon river in the county of Norfolk and partly by the boundary Dyke which separates the farms of H. T. Luddington and William C. Peacock including the farm of the latter, and thence south and east by the outward boundary Dyke of White House farm to George Morton's farm.

Cransford Church eastward to Colston Hall, northward to the White House, and westward to Mrs. Stanford's crossways on the Framlingham-road, and thence by the road leading to Cransford Church aforesaid.

At Fletchamptstead, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, Tile Hill-lane on the north, certain land of James Harris on the east, Tenshilling and Park Woods and certain land in the occupation of William Campbell and Robert Cartwright on the south, and Tile Hill-road and Railway Station on the west.

(6.) So much of the parish of Curdworth, in the county of Warwick, as lies within the follow-

ing boundaries, that is to say, the Tamworth and Birmingham turnpike-road on the north, the lane known as Farthing-lane leading into the village of Curdworth on the east, the foot-road leading from Curdworth to Water Orton on the south, and a straight line from the said foot-road to Curdworth Parish New School on the west; so much of the Tamworth and Birmingham turnpike-road as forms the boundary of the Area being included in the Area.

At Sutton Coldfield, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Barley Mow Inn by the road leading past Mere Pool Church to Shepherds Pool on the north, Whitehouse-lane to Whitehouse Bar on the east, Tamworth-lane to the Birmingham-road on the south, and the Birmingham and Lichfield turnpike-road to the Barley Mow Inn aforesaid on the west.

(10.) At Brandon, in the county of Warwick, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the road leading from Brandon to Bretford from Side-Hill Spiny to Bretford village, thence the road leading from Bretford to Wolston to where it is crossed by the London and North-Western Railway, thence the London and North-Western Railway to where it adjoins the river Avon, and thence the river Avon to Side-Hill Spiny aforesaid.

(No. 10.)—TIERRA DEL FUEGO.

Mission Station at Ooshooia, Beagle Channel.

REPRESENTATION having recently been made by the South American Mission Society in London, as to the advantages offered by their station at Ooshooia (Ushuwia), in Beagle Channel, as a place of refuge to the crews of vessels wrecked or abandoned in the vicinity of Cape Horn; the following information (originally published in Notice to Mariners, No. 40 of 1871), is now republished:—

The Mission Station, Ooshooia, is established on the north shore of Beagle Channel, Tierra del Fuego, in the cove of a small peninsula N. by E. from the Murray Narrows or northern entrance to Ponsonby Sound, and which may be used as a place of refuge and relief to mariners shipwreck in the vicinity of Cape Horn.

If a ship is abandoned to the westward of Cape Horn, the most direct course for boats is, to pass eastward of False Cape Horn and through Ponsonby Sound, using Packsaddle Island (where it is considered the natives are to be trusted) for a stopping place, but avoiding communication with natives in Ponsonby Sound until near the north part of it, as they are said to be very hostile.

For crews escaping when to the eastward of Cape Horn, the best course would be to the eastward of Navarin Island and westward through the Beagle Channel; stopping if necessary at Banner Cove, in Picton Island, or at the Narrows of Beagle Channel, where, on the south shore, friendly natives are settled, and from which the Mission is distant about 30 miles.

The position of the Mission settlement is in lat. $54^{\circ} 53' S.$, long $68^{\circ} 12' W.$
