Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Each of the Areas described in the Schedule to this Order is hcreby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

### SCHEDULE.

(1.) An Area comprising so much of the township of Hawes, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies to the east and south-east of Burtersett on the south side of the road leading from Bainbridge to Hawes and commencing at the township boundary on the south side of the said last-mentioned road and continuing along the south side of the said road through Hawes to the point where it branches off to Widdale and continuing along the Widdale-road to the West Cam Old-road End, from thence up the West Cam-road to the Bands-road End, from thence down the Bands-road to the village of Gayle, across the Gayle Beck, and along the footpath leading to Marcett to a point where it joins the township of Bainbridge on the south.

(2.) An Area at High Abbotside, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing at the Bridge crossing the brooklet in the village of Hardrow, continuing southward along the said brooklet to the river Yore, thence westward up the river Yore to a stone fence on the east of Collierholme farm, thence northward along the said stone fence to the Hawes and Sedbergh turnpike-road to Cotter dale-road End, thence up the Cotterdale-road to Cotter Riggs, thence along a stone fence to Cotter brooklet, from there along the boundary fence of Pry House farm to the West Pit Coal-road on the west, and continuing along the last-named road to the said Bridge in Hardrow village.

(3.) An Area at Bainbridge, in the North Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, commencing where the river Bain flows into the river Yore and continuing up the river Yore in a westerly direction to the township boundary dividing Bainbridge from Hawes township, thence along the township boundary in a southerly direction to where it joins the Cam-road, continuing down the Cam-road in an easterly direction to the end of the last-named road, thence following a brooklet through the Holme Pasture forming part of Gill-Edge farm in the occupation of Edward Brown to the river Bain on the south, and thence following the river Bain to the point where it flows into the river Yore.

1. The following Area (namely),-so much of the parish of Thanington, near Canterbury, in the county of Kent, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, the highway leading from Wincheap Forge, Wincheap-street, to the Canterbury Water Works on the north, the footpath from the Canterbury Water Works to New House-road on the west, the New Houseroad to Stuppington Corner on the south, and thence Hollow-lane to Wincheap Forge, Wincheap-street, aforesaid on the east,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the third day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-andmouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Areas (namely),-(1.) at Hoby, in the county of Leicester, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the fence forming the boundary between Ragdale and Hoby on the north, the road leading from Ragdale to Hoby and on to Rotherby on the east, the river Wharf on the south, and the road from Brooksby to Hoby and Mr. Main's farm on the west; (2.) so much of the parishes of Blaston, and Medbourne, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, Blaston-road on the north, the road leading from Blaston to Medbourne as far as Ivy Gate on the east, Gilson's Close on the south, and Hallatonroad as far as Gilson's Close on the west; and (3.) so much of the parish of Loughborough, in the county of Leicester, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Upton and Mr. Sarjeant on the north, the road leading from Nanpanton to Woodbouse and certain land in the occupation of W. B. Paget, Esq. on the south, certain land in the occupation of Mr. Watnaby and E. H. Warner, Esq., and a certain Wood known as the Outwoods in the occupation of Mr. Sutton on the east, and certain land in the occupation of Messrs. Smalley and Hanson, and Mr. Hopkins, and Mr. Peberdy on the west,-which were declared by Orders of Council to be Areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those Areas shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be Areas infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.
