

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 14th day of February, 1883.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. The following Area (namely),—so much of the township of Terrington, in the North Riding of the county of York, as lies within the following boundaries, that is to say, a brooklet leading from Wiganthorpe Lake to Terrington Flooding-Pond on the north, thence a brooklet to Ganthorpe Brick-yard on the east, thence a quickwood fence to the Terrington and Mowthorpe highway, thence a quickwood fence in a straight line to Sideing's Beck, by Sideing's Beck to a quickwood fence at the low side of Prospect House on the south, the said fence which passes on the west side of Prospect House in a straight line to the Terrington and Flat-top highway on the west, and thence a quickwood fence to Wiganthorpe Lake,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the eleventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the fifteenth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The

Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. Animals brought from the port of Boulogne-sur-Mer in France shall not be landed in England or Wales or Scotland.

2. In this Order words have the same meaning as in The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twenty-fifth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of an offence committed on or before that day.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross upon the undermentioned Soldier, whose claim has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, for his conspicuous bravery during the recent Campaign in Egypt, as recorded against his name :—

3rd Battalion, the King's Royal Rifle Corps	Private Frederick Corbett	During the reconnaissance upon Kafr Dowar, on 5th August, 1882, the Mounted Infantry, with which Private Corbett was serving, came under a hot fire from the enemy and suffered some loss, including Lieutenant Howard-Vyse, mortally wounded. This officer fell in the open, and there being then no time to move him, Private Corbett asked and obtained permission to remain by him, and though under a constant fire, he sat down and endeavoured to stop the bleeding of this officer's wounds, until the Mounted Infantry received orders to retire, when he rendered valuable assistance in carrying him off the field.
