REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations

shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The State Apartments will be open for the reception of Company coming to Court at half-past one o'clock.

* * No Candidate who fails to show satisfactory proficiency in any of the subjects specified above will be admitted to the competitive part of the Examination.

 - (b.) Engineering Drawing.
 - (c.) Preparation of Working Drawings for details of Builders' Work.
2. Theory of Construction.
3. Strength and quality of materials, and description of workmanship, tools, and plant.
4. Analysis of prices.
5. Measurement and estimate of Builders' work, including taking off quantities from Drawings and preparing the Abstracts and Bills of Quantities.

In addition to the above five subjects a Candidate may take up any of the following optional subjects :—

- A. Euclid (the first three Books).
- B. Algebra, including quadratic equations.

- C. Plane Trigonometry.
 D. Geometrical Drawing and Freehand Sketches in outline.
 E. Chemistry and Mineralogy relating to Building Materials.

IV. A fee of £1 will be required from each Candidate attending the preliminary part of the Examination, and a further fee of £4 from each Candidate who may be admitted to the competitive part.

V. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such times and in such manner as the Commissioners may appoint.

To the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Walton on Thames, in the County of Surrey;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS the population of the said parish of Walton on Thames, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons;

And whereas at a Meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held at the Parish Church, pursuant to public notice in that behalf, on the 29th day of January, 1883, and adjourned to the 5th day of February, 1883, and further adjourned to the 15th day of that month, it was resolved:—

“That application in writing be made by the Churchwardens to the Local Government Board for an Order under their Seal of Office that the Act 13 and 14 Vict. cap. 57, shall be applied to and be put in force within the Parish so far as relates to the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in the Parish Church and the provision of another place of Meeting.

“That the like application be made for an Order under the said Act so far as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk for this Parish.”

And whereas the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish have made application in writing to the Local Government Board, pursuant to the above resolutions:

Now therefore, we, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The whole of the Act passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled “An Act to prevent the holding of Vestry or other Meetings in Churches, and for regulating the Appointment of Vestry Clerks,” shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said parish of Walton on Thames.

ARTICLE II.—Every person for the time being appointed to or holding the office of Vestry Clerk for the said Parish as aforesaid, shall give to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Chertsey Union, a bond, in a penal sum of not less than one hundred pounds, in the names of himself and two sufficient sureties, not being officers of that Union, conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office; and shall give immediate notice to the said Guardians of death or bankruptcy of either of such sureties, or of either of them having compounded with his creditors or liquidated his affairs by arrangement, and shall, when required by the said Guardians,

produce a certificate, signed by two householders, that his sureties are alive and believed by them to be solvent, and shall supply a fresh surety in the place of any such surety who may die, or become bankrupt or who may have compounded with his creditors or liquidated his affairs as aforesaid.

Provided that the Guardians may accept as a security the guarantee of any Company or Association which shall undertake to guarantee the good conduct of such officer, and shall give their guarantee in a security, the form whereof shall have been approved by the Poor Law Board or the Local Government Board under their Seal.

ARTICLE III.—The Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish shall pay to the person for the time being appointed to the office of Vestry Clerk, under the authority of this Order, a salary at the rate of seventy-five pounds per annum, or such other remuneration for the performance of the duties of that office as the Local Government Board may, with the consent of such person, from time to time direct or approve.

ARTICLE IV.—Such remuneration, in the case of an annual salary, shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of “The Apportionment Act, 1870,” and shall be paid quarterly at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, and Lady Day.
