

Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal wisdom, shall seem meet.

“The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

“The District Chapelry of Saint Iiid, Cray, being:—

“All that part of the parish of Devynock in the county of Brecon, and in the diocese of Saint David's which is comprised within and is co-extensive with that portion of the hamlet of Cray and ancient chapelry of Llanulid which is bounded on part of the east and on part of the north by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the hamlet of Maescar in the said parish of Devynock from the hamlet of Cray and ancient chapelry of Llanulid aforesaid at a point in the middle of the line of the Midland Railway and extending thence generally south-westward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of one mile and forty-six chains or thereabouts thereby passing along the western side of the Treweren Valley, to the point opposite to the north-western end of the road which leads towards the house called or known as Nant-Madog and extending thence south-eastward to and along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction at or near to the said house with the road which leads from Devynock along the said western side of the Treweren Valley aforesaid towards the church of Saint Iiid, Cray, and which is called or known as the Cray Main-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of twenty-four chains or thereabouts to its junction with the cross-road called or known as Treweren-road which leads across the said Treweren Valley past the house called or known as Llwynhrychedd into the Senny Valley and extending thence eastward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of fifty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said hamlet of Cray and ancient chapelry of Llanulid from the hamlet of Senny in the parish of Devynock aforesaid.

“All which said hereinbefore described part of the said parish of Devynock being a portion of the hamlet of Cray and ancient chapelry of Llanulid as aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than as hereinbefore mentioned that is to say upon the remaining part of the east upon the south-east upon the south-west upon the west and upon the remaining part of the north as follows upon the remaining part of the east by the hamlet of Senny aforesaid on the south-east by the parish of Ystradvellte upon the south-west by the parish of Blaen Glyntawe otherwise Colwen or Capel Colwen upon the west by the parish of Llywell all in the county and diocese aforesaid and upon the remaining part of the north partly by the parish of Llywell aforesaid and partly by the said hamlet of Maescar in the parish of Devynock aforesaid.”

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Saint David's.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-four duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, in the words following, that is to say;

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Your Majesty chapter thirty-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and four and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes to be taken out of the parish of Claines in the county of Worcester and in the diocese of Worcester.

“Whereas it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular part of the said parish of Claines which is hereinafter mentioned and described should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth.

“And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed district any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of Divine worship.

“And whereas certain hereditaments and premises situate within the limits of the said parish of Claines, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the hereinbefore-mentioned Acts or of some or one of them, and we have, in respect of such hereditaments and premises, agreed to make and pay out of the common fund created by the firstly hereinbefore-mentioned Act to the minister of the district hereinafter recommended to be constituted, so soon as a minister shall have been appointed and licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, and to his successors, a grant of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum, and also so soon as a church shall have been erected within and for such district, and shall have been approved by us and shall have been consecrated as the church of such district, and such district shall have thereupon become a new parish within the meaning of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, to make to the Incumbent of the said new parish and his successors a further grant from the said fund of fifty pounds per annum.

“And whereas such grants as aforesaid will be made by an instrument or instruments to be executed by us under our common seal in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and eleven.

“And whereas the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester and
