" CONSENTS.

"I the Right Reverend George Lord Bishop of Salisbury the patron or person entitled in right of my See to collate to the benefice (being a vicarage) of Gillingham above-mentioned in case the same were now vacant and I the Reverend Edward Inman the incumbent of the said benefice do hereby severally signify our consent to the scheme above proposed and set forth and to every matter and thing therein contained In witness whereof we have hereunto set our hands this 31st day of July 1883. "We the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne do hereby signify our consent that the benefice of Gillingham and the endowments which will remain thereto after the separation of the chapelry as referred to in the foregoing representation and scheme shall remain and be exclusively liable to and charged with the payment of the sum of one thousand three hundred and fifty-six pounds and interest mentioned in the foregoing representation in exoneration of the proposed separate benefice of Motcombe with Enmore Green and the emoluments thereof.

" Dated this 1st August, 1883.



And whereas the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury hath transmitted the said scheme to the Archbishop of Canterbury for his consideration and the said Archbishop being satisfied with such scheme hath certified the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report, to Her Majesty in Council dated the 9th day of August 1883, which report is in the words and figures following :--

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend George Lord Bishop of Salisbury has represented unto us (amongst other things)

"That to the benefice (being a vicarage) of Gillingham in the county of Dorset and diocese of Salisbury belongs (amongst other places) the chapelry of Motcombe the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined. "That there is in the said chapelry the church or chapel of Motcombe distant from the parish church of the said benefice of Gillingham three and a half miles or thereabouts and there is also within the said chapelry of Motcombe a church or chapel at a place called Enmore Green distant from the church or chapel of Motcombe two miles or thereabouts.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry of Motcombe may be advantageously separated from the said benefice and parish church of Gillingham and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the proposed alteration may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithe rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested which scheme together with the consents thereto in writing of the patron and of the incumbent of the said benefice and also with the consent in writing of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne as mortgagees of the endowments of the said benefice of Gillingham has been transmitted by the said Lord Bishop to us for our consideration.

"The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the consents before referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with the said scheme do hereby pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 certify the same and such consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for carrying the said scheme into effect.

"As witness our hand this ninth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three. "Eaw. Cantuar."

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order, us it is hereby ordered, that the said scheme of the Lord Bishop of Salisbury be carried into effect. C. L. Peel.
