Moore, and in the occupation of the Trustees or the late Joseph Johnson, thence proceeding in an easterly direction along such lastmentioned fence and along the fence of two adjacent fields (numbered respectively 26 and 27 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to the said Georgiana E. M. Moore, and in the occupation of the said Trustees of the late Joseph Johnson, to a point where the fence of the field numbered 27 aforesaid adjoins upon the ditch on the west side of the right bank of the River Foss, thence proceeding along the said ditch in a north-easterly direction for a distance of 125 yards or thereabouts to a point where the fence at the north-east corner of the said last-mentioned field adjoins upon the said ditch, thence crossing the said ditch, bank, and river, and proceeding in an east-erly direction across a field (numbered 28 in red ink on the said map) lying between such river and the road or highway called the Huntington-road, belonging or reputed to belong to John S. Winn, and in the occupation of John Swales, thence crossing the said Huntington-road to the fence at the north-west corner of "Yearsley Cottage," shown on the said map, thence following the line of such fence in an easterly direction for a distance of 250 yards or thereabouts to a point in such fence where the same meets the fence at the south-west corner of a certain field (numbered 29 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to Albert Grayston, and in the occupation of William Dove, Esq., thence proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 50 yards or thereabouts along the fence on the west side of a certain field (numbered 30 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to the said Albert Grayston, and in the occupation of the said William Dove, Esq., thence proceeding in a straight line in a south-easterly direction for a distance of 742 yards or thereabouts over certain fields (numbered respectively 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, and 37 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to Albert Grayston, the Trustees of Eleanor Atkinson, John Wrigglesworth, and Thomas Contes respectively, and in the several occupations of George Acomb, William Wood, John Wrigglesworth, and Amos Watson, to the road or highway called or known as the York and Scarborough Trust, thence crossing the said road or highway to and following and including the footpath leading from such road or highway over Monk Stray (numbered 38 in red ink on the said map), and over and along certain fields (numbered respectively 39 and 40 in red ink on the said map), belonging or reputed to belong to Miss Husband, and in the occupation of William Britton, thence along and including an occupation road (numbered 41 in red ink on the said map), to the said Stockton-lane, thence crossing the said Stocktonlane, and proceeding in a north-easterly direction along the south-east side of such lane for a distance of 83 yards or thereabouts measured from the junction of such lane with another lane called Hempland-lane to the fence at the north-east corner of a field abutting upon the said Stockton-lane (numbered 42 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to and in the occupation of William Dixon, thence proceeding in a

south-easterly direction following the line of such last-mentioned fence and also the line of fence of the adjoining fields (numbered respectively 43 and 44 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to the Rev. Robert William Bilton Hornby, D.D., and Miss Atkinson respectively, and in the occupation of John Atkinson to a point where such last-mentioned fence meets the fence at the north-east corner of a certain field (numbered 45 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to and in the occupation of John Bellerby, Esq. thence proceeding in a south-easterly direction from such last-mentioned point along the line of fence on the north-east side of the said field numbered 45 and along the fence on the north-east side of another field (numbered 46 in red ink on the said map) also belonging to and in the occupation of the said John Bellerby to where such last-mentioned fence joins the lane called or known as Osbaldwick Back-lane, thence proceeding in a westerly direction along the fence dividing the said field numbered 46 and a certain other field (numbered 47 in red ink on the said map) also belonging to and in the occupation of the said John Rellerby, from the said Osbaldwick Back-lane, thence crossing the said Osbaldwick Back-lane and proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of vards or thereabouts following the line of fence on the east side of certain fields (numbered respectively 48, 49, 50, 51, and 52 in red ink on the said map) lying between the said Osbaldwick Back-lane and the road or highway called or known as the Osbaldwick-lane, belonging or reputed to belong to the Trustees of the late Thomas Samuel Watkinson and Francis Theakston Nursaw respectively, and in the several occupations of Samuel Ridsdell, Ann Boyes, and Mrs. Whitehead, to a point where the said line of fence terminates on the north side of the said Osbaldwick-lane, thence crossing the said last-mentioned lane to the fence at the north-east corner of a certain field abutting upon the said lane (numbered 53 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to the said Francis Theakston Nursaw, and in the occupation of Mrs. Hagyard, thence following the line of such last-mentioned fence, and the fence on the east side of the adjacent field (numbered 54 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to the said Francis Theakston Nursaw, and in the occupation of John Forth Ward, to where the said fence in such last-mentioned field terminates at the road or highway called or known as the York and Kexby Bridge Trust, at a point distant 33 yards or thereabouts north-east of a public-house marked as the Black Bull public-house on the said 6-inch ordnance map, thence crossing the said road or highway called the York and Kexby Bridge Trust at the last-mentioned point, and proceeding in a southerly direction for a distance of 725 yards or thereabouts following the line of fence on the cast side of a certain field (numbered 55 in red ink on the said map) belonging or reputed to belong to George Bateson de Yarburgh, Esq., and in the occupation of George Penty to a point where such fence meets a certain lane leading from Heslington to the before-mentioned road or highway called the York or Kexby Bridge Trust, and to certain fields called the
