The following Place (namely),—in the borough of Daventry, in the county of Northampton, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, on the north the road leading from Daventry to Banbury, on the south the road leading out of the road between Daventry and Weedon and extending to the boundary of Daventry parish, on the west the outer boundary of Mr. Jesse Adams's occupation, and on the east the road leading from Daventry to Weedon,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the second day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease, is hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the second day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

1. The following Place (namely),—the byres on the farm of Drums, parish of Foveran, in the county of Aberdeen, in the occupation of James H. Harvey, together with the two grass fields on the said farm known respectively by the names of Sannanc and Hillfield,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the twenty-first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Place shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be a Place infected with pleuro-pneumonia.
