The following Places (namely),—(1.) all those Lairs situate in Market-road, Caledonian-road, in the parish of Saint Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, in the occupation of Messrs. Hicks and Brieholt, and (2.) all those Lairs situate in York-road, in the parish of Saint Mary, Islington, in the county of Middlesex, in the occupation of Messrs. Hope and Harrington,—which were declared by Order of Council dated the twentieth day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, to be Places infected with foot-and-mouth disease, are hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and those Places shall, as from the passing of this Order, cease to be Places infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

(PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.)

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area (namely),—at North Bierley, in the West Riding of the county of York, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the Guide Post on Bierley-lane at the junction of Woodhouse-lane by Milker Hill-lane to Merrydale Beck on the south, from Milker Hill-lane by Merry Hill Beck to Woodhouse Hill-road on the north-west, and from Merrydale Beck by Woodhouse-lane back to the junction of Woodhouse-lane with Bierley-lane on the east,—which was declared by Order of Council dated the fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia, is hereby declared to be free from pleuro-pneumonia, and that Area shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with pleuro-pneumonia.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the eighth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.
