

contact with or employed about animals affected with or suspected of foot-and-mouth disease, or being in a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place within their District or of so much as is within their District, and the use of precautions against the spreading of that disease by such persons.

(2.) Every Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Privy Council a copy of every Regulation made by them under this Article.

(3.) If the Privy Council are satisfied on inquiry with respect to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Article that the same is of too restrictive a character, or otherwise objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

Offences.

6. If anything is done or omitted to be done in contravention of any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order, the person doing the same, or failing to carry out in any respect the provisions of any such Regulation shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

THE ENGLAND AND WALES MARKETS AND FAIRS TEMPORARY ORDER OF 1883, AMENDMENT No. 22.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The England and Wales Markets and Fairs Temporary Order of 1883 (in this Order referred to as the Markets Order) is hereby amended as follows:

Exclusion of certain Districts from Markets Order.

The provisions of the Markets Order shall not apply to the following Districts (namely),—

County of Buckingham,

Borough of Buckingham,

Borough of Chepping Wycombe,

and the Markets Order shall be read and have effect as if those Districts were included in the Schedule to that Order.

2. This Order may be cited as The England and Wales Markets and Fairs Temporary Order of 1883, Amendment No. 22.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 25th day of March, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The following Area declared by Order of Council dated the fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, to be

an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease (namely),—all that portion of the county of Salop comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the main-road from Shipley to Bridgnorth commencing at the boundary of the counties of Stafford and Salop near Shipley Common so far as Roughton, thence to the river Worfe, thence along the river Worfe to the junction with the river Severn, thence by the river Severn to Coalport Bridge, thence to the Coalport and Wellington Branch Railway, thence by the said Railway to the Watling Street-road near the London and North-Western Railway-station at Oakengates, and thence along the Watling Street-road to the county boundary near Weston,—is, except such portion thereof as is included in the Area described in Article 2 of this Order, hereby declared to be free from foot-and-mouth disease, and the Area above described, except as aforesaid, shall, as from the commencement of this Order, cease to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

2. The following Area (namely),—all that portion of the county of Salop comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, the eastern side of the Newport and Wolverhampton-road from the county boundary at the crossing of the Watling Street, through Tong to the Bridge under the Great Western Railway at Donington, and along the northern side of the Great Western Railway to the county boundary near Beamish Wood,—shall continue to be and is hereby declared to be an Area infected with foot-and-mouth disease.

3. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the twenty-sixth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.

(FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE.)

THE following Areas are now Areas Infected with Foot-and-Mouth Disease under the above-mentioned Act (except the lines of railway within those Areas so far as those lines are used or required for the transit of animals through those Areas, without untrucking):—

Liberty of the Isle of Ely.—The parish of Stan-
ground, in the Liberty of the Isle of Ely.

Cumberland.—In the counties of Westmorland and Cumberland, comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say, from the bridge over the river Eamont and the east side of the road to the Crown Hotel at Eamont Bridge, from there to a point opposite Southwaite Green Mill, following the south side of the
