THE ANIMALS ORDER OF 1884, SWINE-FEVER AMENDMENT.

T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 16th day of May, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT:

Lord President. Mr. Dodson.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Slaughter in Swine-Fever.

1. Article 62 (Slaughter in Swine-Fever) of The Animals Order of 1884 is hereby revoked; and the following provisions of this Article shall be read in the place of that Article, and shall be deemed to be Article 62 of that Order (namely)-

62.-(1.) A Local Authority may, if they think fit,-

(i.) Cause any swine affected with swinefever to be slaughtered; or

(ii.) Cause any swine being or having been in the same pig-sty or shed, or in contact with swine affected with swine-fever to be slaughtered.

(2.) The Local Authority shall, out of the local rate, pay compensation as follows for swine slaughtered under this Article:

(a.) Where the pig slaughtered was affected with swine-fever, the compensation shall be one half of its value immediately before it became so affected, but so that the compensation do not in any such case exceed forty shillings.

(b.) In every other case the compensation shall be the value of the pig immediately before it was slaughtered, but so that the compensation do not in any such case exceed four pounds.

General Saving.

2. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to affect the past operation of the Article by this Order revoked, or affect the validity or invalidity of anything done or suffered, or any right, title, obligation or liability accrued under the said Article before the date of this Order.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as THE ANIMALS ORDER OF 1884, SWINE-FEVER AMENDMENT.

(Moner Orders) Acrs, 1848 to 1883.
WHEREAS under the authority of the Post
Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 to 1883, certain Regulations, dated the 28th day of January, 1884, were made by me, the Right Honourable Henry Fawcett, Her Majesty's Postmaster-Gene al, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in relation to the issue and payment of Postal Orders in the United Kingdom (including therein the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man), and in Gibraltar, and it was recited (inter alia) that it was intended that, on and after the 2nd day of June next, the postal service of Malta should cease to be conducted by officers of the Postmaster-General.

And whereas since the making of the said Regulations it has become necessary to continue for a further period, on and after the 2nd day of June next, the conduct of the postal service at Malta by officers of the Postmaster-General, and it is therefore expedient to extend the said Regulations to the issue and payment of Postal Orders

in that Island.

Now, therefore, I, the said Henry Fawcett, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, in pursuance of the said Acts, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the consent of the Com-missioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby order as follows:

1. The said Regulations shall, until the repeal hereof, be read and construed as if the words "or Malta" were inserted in the said Regulations after the words "or in Gibraltar" wherever such lastmentioned words occur in the said Regulations.
