WHEREAS by the 62nd section of "The Harbours and Passing Tolls, &c., Act, 1861," it is enacted that the Commissioners of Bridlington Harbour may, for the purpose of maintaining and improving the harbour, with the consent of Her Majesty in Council, impose rates on vessels using the harbour, and on goods shipped or unshipped in the harbour, not exceeding the rates specified in Schedule (A) annexed to "The Burgh Harbours (Scotland) Act, 1853," and may from time to time, with the like consent, vary such rates, by reducing or raising the same, so that they do not exceed the rates mentioned in the said Schedule, and that any rates so imposed may be either in lieu of or in addition to any other rates leviable by the said Commissioners:

And whereas the following rates are, amongst others, leviable by the said Commissioners in respect of goods laden or unladen at or in the Harbour of Bridlington, that is to say;

For every ton of manure, the sum of one half-

For every ton of bones, the sum of one penny;
For every ton of animalised carbon, the sum of one penny;

For every hundred weight of dried fish, the sum of one penny:

sum of one penny;
For every barrel of dried or cured herrings, the sum of two pence:

And whereas the said Commissioners have pre-

pared, and submitted for approval, a table of rates as the rates to be levied by them from the date of this Order in substitution for the rates above specified:

And whereas it has been made to appear to Her Majesty that the said rates do not exceed the rates specified in Schedule (A) of "The Burgh Harbours (Scotland) Act, 1853," and that the same are proper and reasonable:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve and doth hereby approve and signify her consent to the substitution from and after the date of this Order of the rates contained in the Schedule hereto annexed for the rates above specified.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twentieth day of March, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, in the words following; that is to say:—

to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners fo
England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth

and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew situate at Tudhoe Grange in the parish of Tudhoe in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Tudhoe and of the new parish of Saint Paul Spennymoor in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish

resprctively.

that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Tudhoe and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Spennymoor should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew situate at Tudhoe Grange as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joseph Barber, Bishop of the said diocese of Durham as such Bishop (in testimony whereof he the said Bishop has signed and sealed this representation) and with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Durham, the patrons both of the vicarage of the said parish of Tudhoe and also of the vicarage of the said new parish of Saint Paul Spennymoor (in testimony whereof they the said Dean and Chapter have set their corporate seal to this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Tudhoe and of the said new parish of Saint Paul Spennymoor which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Andrew situate at Tudhoe Grange as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew Tudhoe Grange.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Andrew

Tudhoe Grange comprising:

"All that portion of the parish of Tudhoe in the county of Durham and in the diocese of Durham and also all that contiguous portion of the new parish of Saint Paul Spennymoor in the same county and diocese which said portions are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Tudhoe from the new parish of Ferryhill in the county and diocese aforesaid at the point where the boundary dividing the township of Merrington from the township of Ferryhill strikes the northern side of the line of the Byers Green Branch of the North-Eastern Railway and extending thence northward along the said township boundary for a distance of seven chains or thereabouts to a point at Low Spennymoor at or near to the junction of Green-lane with the road leading from Low Spennymoor aforesaid

to Tudhoe where the same township boundary joins the boundary dividing the original parish of Merrington from the original parish of Brancepeth and extending thence that is from the last-described point first northward and then north-westward along the middle of the last-described road for a distance of one mile and five chains or thereabouts to its junction with the public footpath leading to Spennymoor and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of nearly one mile (thereby passing through Cow Pasture Wood and crossing the boundary in the middle of the stream called Valley Burn which boundary divides the said parish of Tudhoe from the new parish of Saint Paul Spennymoor aforesaid) to the point at Spennymoor where the same footpath joins Villiers-street and continuing thence still south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of three and-a-half chains or thereabouts to its junction with George-street and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named screet for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Duncombe-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Highstreet Spennymoor and with Thomas-street and extending thence south-eastward across the said High-street and along the middle of Thomasstreet aforesaid for a distance of five chains or thereabouts to a point at the south-eastern end of the last-named street upon the fence forming the northern boundary of the buildings and premises known as the Spennymoor and Tudhoe Gas Works, and extending thence first north-eastward then north-westward and then again north-eastward along the said fence for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to a point at the north-eastern end of the same fence upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Paul, Spennymoor, from the parish of Tudhoe aforesaid, and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of ten and a half chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the line of the Byers Green Branch of the North-Eastern Railway aforesaid) to the point at the south-eastern angle of the Spennymoor and Tudhoe Gasworks aforesaid where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary which divides the said parish of Tudhoe from the parish of Merrington aforesaid, and extending thence first southward then eastward and then north-eastward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of sixty-three chains or thereabouts (thereby passing along the southern end of the houses called or known as Merrington-terrace) to the point where the said last-mentioned boundary joins the boundary dividing the said parish of Tudhoe from the new parish of Ferryhill aforesaid, and extending thence northward along the lastmentioned boundary for a distance of ten chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the line of the Binchester Colliery Railway, and also crossing the line of the said Byers Green Branch of the North-Eastern Railway aforesaid) to the first described point on the northern side of the last-named branch line of railway at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the

London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Durham.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four in the words following; that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of the parish of Saint John Cardiff in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of the parish of Saint John Cardiff aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (testified by his having signed and scaled this representation) we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Saint John Cardiff which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Andrew situate within the limits of such parish as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew Cardiff.'

" And with the like consent of the said Richard Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Andrew and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any see for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof." "The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Cardiff, being:

"All that part of the parish of Saint John Cardiff in the county of Glamorgan and in the diocese of Llandaff which is bounded on the east on the south and on the west by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint John Cardiff from the parish of Roath in the county and discess aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries Crwys-road over the line of the Rhymney Railway and extending thence southward along the middle of the said line of railway for a distance of sixty-one chains or thereabouts thereby passing through the Rhymney Railway Station to the centre of the bridge which carries the same line of railway over the street or road called or known as Crockherbtown and extending thence westward along the middle of the last-named street or road for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts, thereby passing under the line of the Taff Vale Railway, to the junction of the same street or road with the street or road called or known as Park-place and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-named street or road for a distance of thirty-eight chains or thereabouts, thereby passing along the eastern side of Cathays Park, to the point at the northern end of the same street or road on the south-western side of the line of the Taff Vale Railway aforesaid where the same street or road joins the footway which leads along the said south-western side of the same line of railway to Woodville-road and extending thence, that is, from the last-described point of junction, north-westward along the middle of the said footway for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with Woodvilleroad aforesaid and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of two and a half chains or thereabouts, thereby passing over the line of the Taff Vale Railway aforesaid, to the junction of the said Woodville-road with Senghennyd-road and with the road which leads past the houses called or known as Cathays-terrace to the Cardiff New Cemetery and extending thence northward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a di-tance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to the boundary at the junction of the same road with Crwys-road aforesaid which boundary divides the said parish of Saint John Cardiff from the parish of Roath aforesaid. All which said hereinbefore described part of the parish of Saint John Cardiff aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining side other than upon the east, the south and the west as aforesaid, that is to say, upon the north-west by the parish of Roath aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore. Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Llandaff.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth and

twenty-first years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the Burial Acts," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appear to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Local Board of Health of any district established under the Public Health Act, that the district of such Local Board of Health is coextensive with a district for which it is proposed to provide a burial-ground, and that no Burial Board has been appointed for such district, and that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial-grounds within the said district, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, in case Her Majesty see fit so to do, to order that such Local Board shall be a Burial Board for the district of such Local Board, and thereupon such Local Board shall be a Burial Board for such district accordingly, and the powers and provisions of the Acts therein-before mentioned (except the provisions relating to the constitution or appointment and resignation of members of Burial Boards), and the provisions therein contained, shall extend to the district of such Board, and to such Board, and to any burial-ground and places for the reception of the bodies of the dead previously to interment which may be provided by such Board, in like manner as to any parish or parishes, and the Burial Board thereof, and any burial-ground, and any such places as aforesaid provided by such last-mentioned Board, save that no approval, sanction, or authorization of any vestry shall be requisite: Provided always, that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in the district of such

W HEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by Orders in Council made on the eighteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and the twenty-second day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fiftysix, burials, with certain exceptions, were directed to be discontinued in the parish church and churchyard of Tynemouth (commonly called Christchurch) in the county of Northumberland:

And whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Orders be varied:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to revoke the said Orders in Council in so far as they affect burials in the said church and churchyard and to order

That burials be discontinued entirely in the said church; and also in the churchyard. except as follows:-In such vaults and walled graves as were in existence on the

HEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial " of the dead in England beyond the limits of the " Metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning "the burial of the dead in the Metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that for the protection of the public health the opening of any new burial-ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or

(as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burialground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the fourth day of March last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council on the twenty-first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial-ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parishes without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that-burials in the said parishes shall be discontinued, as follows, viz.:—

St. Mary, ELING.—Forthwith and entirely in St. Mary's parish church, Eling, in the county of Southampton; and also in the churchyard, except as follows:

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework

or brickwork properly cemented:

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth:

(c.) In such earthen graves now existing, as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

CULLINGWORTH.—Forthwith and entirely in the Baptist Chapel, Cullingworth, Yorkshire; and that in the chapelyard the following regulations be observed:—

(1.) Except in vaults and wholly walled graves existing on the first December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, all

burials to be discontinued:

(2.) Every coffin buried in a vault or wholly walled grave to be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented, and to be at least three feet below the general level of the soil:

(3.) No interment to take place within the distance of fourteen feet of the chapel, except for the burial of Mr. Abraham Parker and Mr. Thomas Green (Deacons), at their decease.

THE following Statute, passed on the 23rd day of February, 1884, by the Governing Body of Lincoln College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877:—

A STATUTE to amend the Statutes of Lincoln College in the University of Oxford made by the Rector and Scholars of the said College under the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877, and passed at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College held on the twenty-third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four specially summoned for this purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting.

2. The word "Triginta" in the first Section of Chapter 7 of the same Statutes is hereby repealed and the words "quadraginta quinque" are substituted therefor, and the last clause of the said Section shall accordingly be read and have effect as follows:—

"Postquam autem anni quadraginta quinque exacti erunt &c."

3. The word "Triginta" in the 2nd Section of Chapter 8 of the same Statues is hereby repealed and the words "quadraginta quinque" are substituted therefor and the said Section shall accordingly be read and have effect as follows:—

"Annis autem quadraginta quinque exactis ab " hoc tempore computandis &c."

17. Each ordinary Fellow shall be entitled to receive the annual stipend of £200 out of the Corporate Revenues clear of income tax, but inclusive of all allowances save as hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Fellows of the said College that the revenues of the College are not at present sufficient to provide such annual stipends without unduly prejudicing the interest of the persons elected before the passing of the said Act, being interests intended to be saved by the said Act, and that it is therefore desirable to provide that the Fellows holding Fellowships under the said Statutes shall not be entitled to receive greater emoluments than the Fellows elected before the passing of the said Act, but that if the revenues of the College should hereafter increase, the emoluments of such first-mentioned Fellows, should so far as possible be augmented to an amount not exceeding an average stipend of £200 a year.

We, the said Provost and Fellows of the said College being the Governing body thereof, do hereby in exercise of the power given to us by the 54th section of the said Act alter the 17th clause of Statute III of the said Statutes by substituting for the clause as hereinbefore set out

the following clause :-

17. Each ordinary Fellow shall be entitled to receive out of the Corporate Revenues such share of the divisible income of the year as is herrinafter provided such share to be clear of income tax but inclusive of all allowances save as hereinafter

And we do further alter Statute XI of the said Statutes by adding the following clause numbered 1 and by renumbering the succeeding

clauses accordingly.

1. The Provost and Fellows shall in or as soon as may be after the close of each year declare so much of the clear surplus income of the College as they shall think fit to be the divisible income for that year: and the same shall be apportioned among the Fellows for that year (including any Fellowships which may be suspended or vacant) in equal shares: Provided that no Fellow shall receive more in respect of such share for any one year than the sum of £200, unless the average amount received by him in each of the preceding

his Fellowship, has been less than £200, in which case he may receive in respect of such share any sum not greater than the amount which would with the amounts previously received by him bring his average receipts for that year and for each of such preceding years up to £200.

We the said Master and Fellows of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given to us by the 54 section of the said Act and by Statute xi. framed by the Commissioners appointed by the said Act in relation to the said College alter and amend Statutes iii. and iv. as hereinafter appears that is to say :

INFORMATION has been received from Capt. Dale, H.M.S. "Diamond," December, 1883, of the existence of four islets lying between Lihou Reefs and Tregrosse Islets:-

Of this group (Diamond Islets), Central and East Islets, each about one mile in diameter, were seen from the deck of the "Diamond," the others from the masthead; the islets have broad sandy beaches, and are thickly covered with low trees and bush. Their approximate positions are as follows :

Central Islet, lat. 17° 26' S., long. 151° 0' E. East Islet, lat. 17° 25′ S., long. 151° 7′ E. North-west Islet, 17° 23′ S., long. 150° 54′ E. South-west Islet, 17° 35′ S., long. 150° 55′ E. The "Diamond" also passed over a shoul in, approximately, lat. 17° 22′ S., long. 151° 5′ E.

(2.) Particulars of Marion Reef.
The following information on Marion (Paget) Reef, has been published by the German Government:-

Marion Reef-about 110 miles southward of Lihou Reef,-the eastern extreme is in lat. 19°3'S., long. 152° 26' E., extending thence in a W.N.W. direction for a distance of about 8 miles; and to the southward for about 5 miles, then apparently trending to the westward.

From this, in connection with the original report by Mr. Paget, Master of the schooner "Marion Renny" in 1868, it is assumed the reef extends (decreasing gradually in breadth) to its western extreme, in about lat. 19° 10′ S., 152° 0′ E.; the western limit must however be considered undefined.

In December, 1883, H.M.S. "Diamond" passed about 10 miles eastward of the above position of 28th January, 1884.)

Marion Reef, without sighting it; and no bottom was obtained, with 130 fathoms of line.

(3.) Reef Southward of Osprey Reef. The Queensland Government has given notice of the existence of a reef lying about 100 miles

southward of Osprey Reef:-

This reef (Heath Reef) is stated to extend about 3 miles in a W.N.W. and E.S.E. direction, with a breadth of 21 miles; except on the northwest extreme, where some dry rocks were seen, and at an opening on the northern side, the outer edge of the reef was awash.

Position as given, lat. 15° 28' S., long. 147° 6' E. Note.—The existence of these islets and reefs, and the possible existence of others, within the western margin of the Outer "Route," points to the desirability of vessels navigating this part of the Coral Sea, keeping eastward of Libou, Frederick, Kenn, and Osprey Reefs.

A faint light is seen through the remaining portion of arc (51°), or approximately from N.W. § N. to W. § S.

On each side of the arc of 9°, through which

the fixed white light is shown, there is a sector of 13°, within which both the fixed white light and the flashing light may be seen, but vessels must not pass beyond the limits of the fixed white light.

The light is elevated 55 feet above the sea, and should be visible in clear weather from a distance The illuminating apparatus is of 12 miles. dioptric, or by lenses, of the third order.

The lighthouse, of iron, circular in shape and painted red, stands on a granite base; the lantern

roof and cupola are of copper unpainted.
