REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEES TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at the Levee, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by Treaty and otherwise, Her Majesty the Queen has power and jurisdiction within China and Japan and the dominions of the King of Corea:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, 1843 to 1878, and otherwise in Her vested, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the China, Japan, and Corea Order in Council, 1884.

2. In this Order—

The expression, the “China and Japan Orders in Council,” means the following:—

The China and Japan Order in Council 1865, as amended by the Orders in Council, dated the 13th May, 1869, and the 30th April, 1877;

The Orders in Council of the 19th June, 1868, and the 21st July, 1876, relating to Consular fees;

The China and Japan Maritime Order in Council, 1874;

The China and Japan Order in Council, 1878;

The China and Japan Order in Council, 1881;

The Shanghai Shipping Registry Order in Council, 1883;

and any Order in Council amending or extending this or any of the above-mentioned Orders in Council.

The expression “Corea” means the dominions for the time being of the King of Corea, including the territorial waters thereof.

Other expressions to which meanings are assigned by the China and Japan Orders in Council have the same meanings in this Order unless the subject or context otherwise requires.

In the China and Japan Orders in Council, and in this Order, the expression “British subject” shall include a British-protected person in so far as by Treaty, Capitulation, grant, usage, sufferance, or other lawful means, Her Majesty has jurisdiction in relation to such persons in China, Japan, and Corea respectively.

This Order may be cited as the China, Japan, and Corea Order in Council, 1884.

3. Any person for the time being, acting as Consul-General, Consul, or Vice-Consul holding Her Majesty's commission for Corea or any part thereof, or any person acting temporarily with the approval of a Secretary of State, or in case of emergency appointed temporarily by or acting with the approval of Her Majesty's Minister for Corea, as and for a Consul-General, Consul, or Vice-Consul as aforesaid, shall in and for such district as may be assigned by his commission or appointment, or as may be so approved, hold and form a Court for the purposes of this Order.

4. For the purposes and subject to the provisions of this Order—

(1.) All Her Majesty's jurisdiction exercisable, for the time being, in Corea, under the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, shall be exercised by a Court acting under this Order.

(2.) Such jurisdiction shall be exercised under and in accordance with the provisions of the China and Japan Orders in Council, and of any Rules and Regulations made under the authority thereof, and for the time being in force so far as the same are applicable, as if in those provisions expressions referring to Japan, or to any Government, Sovereign, person, thing, or matter in or relating to Japan, referred also *mutatis mutandis* to Corea, and to the corresponding Government, Sovereign, person, thing, or matter in or relating to Corea; and for the purposes of the said Orders in Council, Rules and Regulations as applied by this Order, a Court acting under this Order shall be deemed to be a Provincial Court.

(3.) All powers and jurisdiction, whether original, appellate, or auxiliary, which can, under the said Orders, be exercised by the Supreme Court at Shanghai, or any Judge thereof in relation to Japan, or any district thereof, or Provincial Court therein, shall be exercisable in relation to Corea, and any district or Provincial Court therein.

5. The powers and jurisdiction exercisable under this Order, or under the said Orders in Council, as applied to Corea, shall, in relation to Corea, be

exercised subject to the provisions of the Treaty dated the 26th November, 1883, between Her Majesty and the King of Corea, and to the Regulations and Protocol appended to the said Treaty, and to the provisions of any other Treaty for the time being in force between Her Majesty and the King of Corea, and the provisions of the said Treaty, Regulations, and Protocol shall have effect as if incorporated in this Order.

6. Where, by virtue of any Imperial Act, or of any of the China and Japan Orders in Council, or this Order, or otherwise, any provisions of any Imperial Acts, or of any Orders in Council other than this Order, are applicable in China, Japan, or Corea, or any forms, Regulations, or procedure prescribed or established by or under any such Order or Act, in relation to any matter, are made applicable for any purpose of any of the China or Japan Orders in Council, or of this Order, such Acts, Orders, forms, Regulations, or procedure shall be deemed applicable, so far only as the constitution and jurisdiction of the Courts and the local circumstances permit; and for the purpose of facilitating their application, they may be construed, or used with such alterations and adaptations not affecting the substance as may be necessary, and anything required to be done by or to any Court, Judge, officer, or authority may be done by or to a Court, Judge, officer, or authority having the like or analogous functions; and the seal of the Consular Court may be substituted for any seal required by any such Act, Order, form, Regulation, or procedure, and in case any difficulty occurs in the application of any such Act, Order, form, Regulation, or Procedure, it shall be lawful for a Secretary of State to direct by and to whom and in what manner anything to be done under such Act, Order, or Regulation, is to be done, and such Act or Order shall, in its application to matters arising under the China and Japan Orders in Council, or this Order be construed accordingly.

7. (1.) In cases of murder or manslaughter, if either the death or the criminal act which wholly or partly caused the death, happened within the jurisdiction of a Court acting under the China and Japan Orders in Council or this Order, such Court shall have the like jurisdiction over any person, being a British subject, who is charged either as the principal offender or as accessory before the fact to murder, or as accessory after the fact to murder or manslaughter, as if both such criminal act and the death had happened within such jurisdiction.

(2.) In the case of any crime committed on the high seas, or within the Admiralty jurisdiction, by any British subject on board a British ship, or on board a foreign ship to which he did not belong, a Court acting under this Order shall have jurisdiction as if the crime had been committed within the district of such Court. In cases tried under this Article, no different sentence can be passed from the sentence which could be passed in England if the crime were tried there.

(3.) The foregoing provisions of this Article shall be deemed to be adaptations for the purposes of this Order, and of “The Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1878,” of the following enactments described in the first schedule to that Act (that is to say):—

“The Admiralty Offences (Colonial) Act, 1849.”

“The Admiralty Offences (Colonial) Act, 1860.”

“The Merchant Shipping Act, 1867,” section 11.

And the said enactments shall, so far as they are repeated and adapted by this Article (but not further or otherwise), extend to China, Japan, and Corea.

8. “The Fugitive Offenders Act, 1881,” shall

apply, in relation to British subjects, to China, Japan, and Corea respectively, as if such countries were British possessions, and for the purposes of Part II. of the said Act and of this Article, China, Japan, and Corea shall be deemed to be one group of British possessions, and Her Majesty's Minister for China, Japan, or Corea (as the case may be), shall have the powers of a Governor or Superior Court of a British possession.

9. Judicial notice shall be taken of the China and Japan Orders in Council and of this Order, and of the commencement thereof, and of the appointment of Consuls or other officers, and of the constitution and limits of the Consular Courts and districts, and of Consular seals and signatures, and of any Rules or Regulations made or in force under the China and Japan Orders in Council or this Order, and no proof shall be required of any of such matters.

The provisions of "The Evidence Act, 1851" (14 and 15 Vict., cap. 99), sections 7 and 11, relating to the proof of judicial and other documents, shall extend and be applied for all purposes as if the Courts, districts, and places to which the China and Japan Orders in Council or this Order applies were in a British Colony.

10. This Order shall come into operation at such time or times in China, Japan, and Corea respectively as a Secretary of State, by a notice published in the London Gazette at or after the time of the publication therein of this Order, directs.

11. This Order shall be published in China, Japan, and Corea in such manner, and printed copies thereof shall be kept for sale at the Consular Courts there, at such prices as a Secretary of State from time to time directs.

And the Right Honourable the Earl Granville and the Right Honourable the Earl of Derby, two of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by the provisions of the Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883, it is, amongst other things, provided:—

That if Her Majesty is pleased to make any arrangement with the Government or Governments of any foreign state or states for mutual protection of inventions, designs and trade marks, or any of them, then any person who has applied for protection for any invention, design or trade mark in any such state shall, subject to the conditions further provided and set forth in the said Act, be entitled to a patent for his invention, or to registration of his design or trade mark (as the case may be) under the said Act in priority to other applicants, and such patent or registration shall have the same date as the date of the protection obtained in such foreign state.

And whereas it has pleased Her Majesty to make an arrangement of the nature contemplated by the said Act by and in virtue of a Declaration, signed and sealed by Her Majesty's Ambassador at Paris on the 17th March, 1884, duly conveying the accession of Great Britain to the International Convention and Protocol for the Protection of Industrial Property,

signed by representatives of certain powers on the 20th day of March, 1883, and duly ratified on the 6th day of June, 1884, power being reserved to Her Majesty to hereafter accede to the provisions of the said Convention and Protocol on behalf of the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, and any of Her Majesty's possessions, which Declaration or Accession was duly accepted by the French Government on behalf of the Signatory Powers, by and in virtue of a Declaration, dated the 2nd of April, 1884:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of Her Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority committed to Her by the said Act, doth declare, and it is hereby declared, that the provisions of the said Act hereinbefore specified shall apply to the following countries, viz.:—

And it is hereby further ordered and declared that this Order shall take effect from the seventh day of July, 1884.

WHEREAS by "The Weights and Measures Act, 1878," it is (among other things) enacted that, where the Board of Trade, upon the application of any Local Authority, from time to time represent to Her Majesty that it would be expedient to alter the fees taken in respect of the verification and stamping of weights and measures by the Inspectors of such authority under the said Act (whether specified in the Fifth Schedule to the said Act, or in any Order previously made under the 47th section of the said Act), or, for the purpose of adapting those fees to the local standards provided by such authority, to add to the said fees, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by Order in Council, from time to time to alter or add to the said fees:

And whereas the Board of Trade have, upon the application of the Local Authorities for the counties, cities, and boroughs named in Schedule A hereto annexed, represented to Her Majesty that it would be expedient to add to the scale of fees taken in respect of such verification and stamping of weights and measures by the Inspectors of such Local Authorities in the manner set forth in Schedule B. hereto annexed:

And whereas it has been made to appear that the addition contained in the last-mentioned schedule is reasonable and proper:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to add to the fees heretofore taken by the Inspectors of the Local Authorities for the counties, cities, and boroughs named in Schedule A. hereto annexed in the manner set forth in Schedule B. hereto annexed; and the fee specified in the last-mentioned schedule shall be taken accordingly in addition to the fees specified in the Fifth Schedule to the said Act.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1876, it is enacted that, when the Legislature of any British Possession provides for the survey of and grant of Certificates for passenger steamers, and the Board of Trade report to Her Majesty that they are satisfied that the Certificates are to the like effect, and are granted after a like survey, and in such manner as to be equally efficient with the Certificates granted for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty by Order in Council;

1. To declare that the said Certificates shall be of the same force as if they had been granted under the said Acts; and

2. To declare that all or any of the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates granted for passenger steamers under those Acts shall, either without modification or with such modifications as to Her Majesty may seem necessary, apply to the Certificates referred to in the Order; and

3. To impose such conditions and to make such regulations with respect to the said Certificates, and to the use, delivery, and cancellation thereof, as to Her Majesty may seem fit, and to impose penalties not exceeding fifty pounds for the breach of such conditions and regulations.

And whereas it was made to appear to Her Majesty that the Legislature of the British Possession of Bombay had provided for the survey of and grant of Certificates for passenger steamers.

And whereas the Board of Trade reported to Her Majesty that they were satisfied that such Certificates were to the like effect, and were granted after a like survey, and in such manner as to be equally efficient with the Certificates granted for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

And whereas by Order in Council dated the 28th day of October, 1879, Her Majesty was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy

Council, to declare that the Certificates granted by the Legislature of the British Possession of Bombay for passenger steamers should be of the same force as if they had been granted for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the said Acts relating to Merchant Shipping; and that all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to Certificates granted for passenger steamers under those Acts should, subject to certain modifications expressed in the said Order, apply to the Certificates referred to therein.

And whereas it has been made to appear desirable to Her Majesty that the provisions of the said recited Order in Council of the 28th day of October, 1879, should be revoked, and a new Order in Council made and substituted in lieu thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said recited Act, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to direct that the said recited Order in Council of the 28th day of October, 1879, shall be and the same is hereby revoked, and in lieu thereof, and in substitution therefor, Her Majesty is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of Her said Privy Council, to declare as follows, viz.:

1. That the Certificates granted under the said provision by the Legislature of the British Possession of Bombay for passenger steamers shall be of the same force as if they had been granted for the same purpose in the United Kingdom under the said Acts relating to Merchant Shipping.

2. That all the provisions of the said Acts which relate to certificates granted for passenger steamers under those Acts shall, without modification, except as hereinafter mentioned, apply to the Certificates referred to in this Order.

3. That it shall not be lawful for a passenger steamer to which this Order relates to proceed to sea with passengers on board from any port or place in the United Kingdom on any voyage to any port in Canada or the United States of America.

4. That if any such passenger steamer goes to sea from any place in the United Kingdom with any passengers on board upon any voyage to any port in Canada or the United States of America, the owner thereof shall for every such offence incur a penalty not exceeding fifty pounds, and such penalty is hereby imposed accordingly.

WHEREAS by Part II (Section 43) of the Explosives Act 1875 (in this Order referred to as the Act) it is provided that notwithstanding anything in the Act Her Majesty from time to time, by Order in Council, may prohibit either absolutely or except in pursuance of a license of the Secretary of State under the Act, or may subject to conditions and restrictions the manufacture, keeping, importation, conveyance and sale, or any of them, of any explosive which is of so dangerous a character that in the judgment of Her Majesty it is expedient for the public safety to make such Order.

And whereas explosives of the 7th (Firework) Class are of so dangerous a character that in the judgment of Her Majesty it is expedient for the public safety to make this Order.

Now therefore in pursuance of the above mentioned provision of the Act, Her Majesty is

pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order and prescribe as follows:—

(1.) On and from the date hereinafter specified when this Order shall come into operation all the provisions of Section 40 Sub-section 9 of the Act requiring a license for and otherwise regulating the importation of explosive from any place out of the United Kingdom shall apply to all explosive of the 7th (Firework) Class notwithstanding that fireworks are by the said sub-section expressly exempted from the provisions aforesaid.

(2.) A reference in this Order to any particular explosive shall be construed with reference to the Act and to the classification of explosives contained in the Order in Council dated the 5th day of August 1875 classifying explosives and made in pursuance of Section 106 of the Act.

(3.) This Order shall come into operation on the 1st day of September 1884. *C. L. Peel.*

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of population, or from other circumstances, it may be expedient that two or more benefices which have been heretofore united or which may be hereafter united under the provisions of this Act should be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "That when two or more benefices shall have been united, or may be hereafter united into one benefice, and with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop of the Province, that one or more of the benefices within his diocese, of which such united benefice shall consist, may be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion, the said Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before certifying such inquiry to Her Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement, in writing, of the facts, and in all other cases a copy, in writing, of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church or in some public and conspicuous place in each of the benefices forming part of the united benefice, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may within such six weeks show cause, in writing, under his, her, or their hands to the said Archbishop against any such disunion; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's consent is necessary, to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty to issue an Order for separating such last-mentioned benefice or benefices from such united benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage of the several patrons, if there be more than one patron, and such Order shall be registered in the registry of the diocese to which such united benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar

"of such diocese, immediately on the receipt thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, and thereupon immediately if such united benefice shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or benefices so proposed to be separated from such united benefice, but in all other respects shall remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward such last-mentioned benefice or benefices shall be and be deemed and taken to be a separate and distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and purposes whatever as if no such union had taken place, and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may according to the terms of such Order present or nominate thereto respectively, and so from time to time upon each and every avoidance of the same: Provided always, that no benefices which have been united for more than sixty years before the passing of this Act shall be disunited without the consent in writing of the patron or patrons thereof."

And whereas it was also enacted that "it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, on the recommendation of the Archbishop of the Province, with the consent of the patron or patrons of such benefices respectively (such consent to be signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons) to assign and attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges, or other endowments or emoluments belonging to, or arising, or accruing within the limits of such united benefice to each of such benefices respectively as to Her Majesty in Council shall seem fit, notwithstanding such proportion of glebe land, tithes, rent-charges, moduses, or other endowments or emoluments, or any part thereof, may not arise or accrue within the limits of the benefice to which the same shall be so assigned and attached as aforesaid, or may not have belonged thereto, and also to divide and apportion between such benefices all such charges and outgoings as before the disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole united benefice, and in the case of mortgagees with the consent of the mortgagees in writing under their hands and seals."

And whereas on the eighth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, John Thomas, Lord Bishop of Norwich, made a representation to His Grace Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"I, John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich do hereby represent to your Grace that it appears to me that the disunion of the rectory of Wood Norton with the rectory of Swanton Novers annexed in the county of Norfolk and my diocese of Norwich by the separation of the said rectory of Wood Norton from the said rectory of Swanton Novers may be made with advantage to the interests of religion.

"Witness my hand this 8th day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three. *John T. Norwich.*"

And whereas on the twenty-second day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three, the Lord Archbishop enquired into the circumstances of the case, and on the sixteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, certified to Her Majesty in Council as follows, that is to say:—

"That the Honourable and Right Reverend John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the united

benefice consisting of the rectory of Wood Norton with the rectory of Swanton Novers annexed in the county of Norfolk having represented unto us that the disunion of the said rectory of Wood Norton with the rectory of Swanton Novers annexed by the separation of the said rectory of Wood Norton from the said rectory of Swanton Novers might be made with advantage to the interests of religion. We inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully dissolved and that the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ in Oxford of the foundation of King Henry the Eighth being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the said united benefice the same being now vacant consent to the proposed disunion.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of each of the parish churches of the said united benefice with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the reply thereto the consent in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for separating the said rectory of Wood Norton from the said rectory of Swanton Novers and in accordance with the consent of the patrons above referred to and with the consent under the seal of the Governors of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the Poor Clergy hereto annexed we recommend that each benefice shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings and that all principal and interest moneys now due or to become due and owing to the said Governors on security of the said united benefice under or by virtue of an indenture of mortgage dated the thirtieth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty shall from and after the disunion of the said benefices be exclusively charged upon the said rectory of Wood Norton in exoneration of the said rectory of Swanton Novers.

"As witness our hand this sixteenth day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four. *Edw. Cantuar.*"

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice consisting of the rectory of Wood Norton and the rectory of Swanton Novers shall be disunited by separating the said rectory of Wood Norton from the said rectory of Swanton Novers.

And Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, to assign and attach to each of the said rectories of Wood Norton and Swanton Novers respectively, its original endowments and emoluments; and to direct that each benefice shall bear its original charges and outgoings.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is also pleased to

direct that all principal and interest moneys now due, or to become due and owing to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, on security of the aforesaid united benefice, under or by virtue of an indenture of mortgage dated the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty, shall from and after the disunion of the said benefices be exclusively charged upon the said rectory of Wood Norton in exoneration of the said rectory of Swanton Novers.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty, chapter seventy; of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-two; and of the Act of the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth years of Her Majesty, chapter fourteen; duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of April, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty, chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven, of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two and of the Act of the thirty-fifth and thirty-sixth years of Your Majesty chapter fourteen have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church situate at Purley in the parish of Coulsdon in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Coulsdon and of the parish of Beddington also in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the parish of Sanderstead in the same county and diocese and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Peter South End within the original limits of the parish of Croydon in the said county of Surrey and in the diocese of Canterbury which said extremities lie contiguous one to another and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parishes and new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Coulsdon, of the said parish of Beddington of the said parish of Sanderstead and of the said new parish of Saint Peter South End, should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church called Christ Church situate at Purley as aforesaid.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Edward White, Archbishop of Canterbury and also as such Arch-

bishop the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Coulsdon, with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester, with the consent of the Reverend Alexander Henry Bridges, now rector or incumbent of the rectory of the said parish of Beddington the patron of such rectory, with the consent of Mary Ann Wigsell of Sanderstead Court, Widow, the patron of the rectory of the said parish of Sanderstead, and with the consent of the Reverend John Masterman Braithwaite now vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Croydon and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the vicarage or incumbency of the new parish of Saint Peter South End aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly represent, that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Coulsdon, of the said parish of Beddington, of the said parish of Sanderstead and of the said new parish of Saint Peter South End which are described in the schedule hereunder written, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church called Christ Church situate at Purley as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church Purley' and that such consolidated chapelry should become and be and form part of the said diocese of Rochester and should be included within and form part of the rural deanery of Reigate and of the Archdeaconry of Kingston-upon-Thames within such last-named diocese.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Christ Church Purley being:—

"All those several contiguous portions of the parish of Coulsdon in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester, of the parish of Beddington, in the same county and diocese, of the parish of Sanderstead also in the county and diocese aforesaid and of the new parish (sometime district chapelry) of Saint Peter South End within the original limits of the parish of Croydon in the said county of Surrey, and in the diocese of Canterbury which said portions of such parishes and of such new parish are comprised within and are bounded by an imaginary line commencing at the point at or near to the public-house called or known as 'The Jolly Farmers' upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Beddington from the parish of Coulsdon aforesaid where the cross-road which connects the Brighton-road with the Godstone-road is joined by Hill Side-road and extending thence that is from the said boundary north-westward along the middle of the last-named road for distance of two chains or thereabouts to its intersection by the Brighton-road aforesaid and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said Brighton-road for a distance of exactly ten and a quarter chains to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. C. C. 1884, No. 1' and placed on the north-western side of the same road, and extending thence north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts (passing the said boundary-stone) to the eastern angle of the plantation called or known as 'The Furzes' on Woodcote Downs, and extending thence north-eastward and in a direct line for a distance of nine and a quarter

chains or thereabouts to the point where Foxley-lane is joined by Plough-lane at or near to which point a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884 No. 2' has been placed, and extending thence, that is, from the said point of junction first north-westward and then northward along the middle of the last-named lane for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to its intersection by the public footpath which leads from Woodcotes to South Croydon and extending thence first-eastward and then north-eastward along the middle of the said public footpath for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts thereby passing along the northern side of the grounds attached to the buildings situate on Russell Hill and called or known as the Warehousemen and Clerks Schools to a point at the north-eastern angle of the last-described school grounds upon the diocesan and parish boundary which divides the said parish of Beddington from the new parish of Saint Peter South End aforesaid at which point the said public footpath is intersected by the bridleway leading from Caterham Junction to Waddon Station and Duppas Hill at or near to which said last-described point a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884 No. 3' has been placed and extending thence that is, from the said last-described point eastward and in a direct line for a distance of forty-five chains or thereabouts to the point a little to the north of the public-house called or known as 'The Royal Oak' where the said Brighton-road joins the road leading to Riddles Down, at which point of junction a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884 No. 4' has been placed and continuing thence still in precisely the same direction and in a straight line for a further distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint Peter Croydon from the parish of Sanderstead aforesaid) to the mile post situate on the north-western side of the main line of the London Brighton and South Coast Railway, and indicating a distance of thirty-eight miles from Brighton, and continuing thence first eastward to, and then south-westward along, the middle of the said main line of railway for a distance of twenty-three chains or thereabouts to a point upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Coulsdon from the parish of Sanderstead aforesaid which last-mentioned point is at the north-eastern end of the bridge which carries the same main line of railway over the road leading to Riddles Down as aforesaid and extending thence southward along the last-mentioned boundary for a distance of twenty-six chains or thereabouts thereby following a hedge-row on the eastern side of the said road leading from Riddles Down to a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884, No. 5' and placed upon such boundary at a point on the eastern side of the last-described road opposite to the middle of the eastern end of the cross-road which leads towards the Caterham Junction Railway Station and into the Godstone-road aforesaid and extending thence that is from the last-mentioned boundary stone south-westward and in a direct line thereby passing over the northern end of Riddles Down aforesaid to a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884, No. 6' and placed at the junction of the said cross-road with the Godstone-road aforesaid and continuing thence still south-westward to a point in the middle of the last-named road and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said last-named road for a distance of ten and a quarter chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to a boundary-stone inscribed 'P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884,

No. 7' and placed on the south-western side of the same road and extending thence in a direction due south-west and in a straight line for a distance of nine chains or thereabouts to a boundary-stone inscribed P. Ch. Ch. D. 1884, No. 8' and placed on the north-eastern side of the line of the Caterham Branch of the South-Eastern Railway and extending thence first south-westward to and then north-westward, northward and north-eastward along the middle of the said branch line of railway for a distance of thirty-one chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge at Caterham Junction Railway Station aforesaid which bridge carries the same branch line of railway over the Godstone-road aforesaid and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of five chains (thereby crossing the main lines of the said South-Eastern Railway and of the London Brighton and South Coast Railway aforesaid) to the point at the Caterham Junction Hotel where the said last-named road is joined by the cross-road which connects it with the Brighton-road as aforesaid and continuing thence still north-westward along the middle of the said cross-road for a distance of four and three-quarters chains or thereabouts to the first-described point at or near to the public-house called or known as 'The Jolly Farmers' upon the boundary dividing the said parish of Coulsdon from the parish of Beddington as aforesaid at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Rochester and by the Registrar of the said diocese of Canterbury respectively.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Acts of the sixth and seventh years of His Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her Majesty chapter sixty-three, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the first day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His Majesty King William the Fourth chapter seventy-seven of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in

Council the following scheme with respect to the diocese of Ely.

"Whereas there are within the diocese of Ely four archdeaconries to wit the Archdeaconry of Ely, the Archdeaconry of Bedford, the Archdeaconry of Huntingdon, and the Archdeaconry of Sudbury.

"And whereas there are within the said diocese of Ely two rural deaneries to wit the Rural Deanery of Ely and the Rural Deanery of Wisbeach which are not within any of the said four archdeaconries but are subject only to the peculiar archidiaconal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Ely.

"And whereas the area comprised within the said two Rural Deaneries of Ely and Wisbeach is commonly known as the Archdeaconry of the Isle of Ely and is so called in this present scheme the same Archdeaconry of the Isle of Ely being different from and outside the limits of the said Archdeaconry of Ely.

"And whereas the Right Reverend James Russell Bishop of Ely has represented to us that it is desirable to make certain new arrangements (being the arrangements hereinafter recommended and proposed) with respect as well to the said Archdeaconry of the Isle of Ely as to the said Archdeaconry of Sudbury but the same arrangements do not affect any of the other archdeaconries of the said diocese of Ely.

"And whereas the statutory schedule prepared under the said Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty chapter sixty-three of the rural deaneries within the said diocese of Ely is dated the eighth day of February one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five and since that date the said rural deaneries or some of them have been altered as to area or otherwise in case of each of the said four Archdeaconries of Ely Bedford Huntingdon and Sudbury by Orders of Your Majesty in Council duly published in the London Gazette.

"And whereas we are of opinion that the new arrangements now proposed by the said James Russell Bishop of Ely may properly be carried into effect.

"Now therefore with the consent of the said James Russell Bishop of Ely (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the said Archdeaconry of the Isle of Ely and the said Archdeaconry of Sudbury respectively shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries the names of which are set down in order and are numbered consecutively in the first schedule and in the second schedule respectively to this scheme annexed and that the name which in either of the same two schedules is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof and that every parish or other cure the name and quality of which is set down in numbered order under the name of any rural deanery in the first column of the said first schedule or in the first column of the said second schedule shall belong to and be a part of the rural deanery under the name of which it so appears as aforesaid and shall be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the rural dean thereof and shall not any longer belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other rural dean the intent of this our recommendation and proposal being that as from the day aforesaid the said statutory schedule of rural deaneries within

the diocese of Ely which was prepared under the hereinbefore lastly-named Act and dated the eighth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five as aforesaid shall be superseded (in so far as the same is not already superseded by the aforesaid Orders of Your Majesty in Council) by the said first and second schedules to this scheme annexed in respect of and to the extent of the changes in the name or in the area of any rural deanery or rural deaneries which in the said first and second schedules respectively appear so that as from the day aforesaid the Archdeaconry of the Isle of Ely shall comprise and consist of the several rural deaneries which are in that behalf set out and named in the said first schedule to this scheme annexed and every rural deanery within the same archdeaconry shall comprise and consist of the several parishes or other cures which are in that behalf set out and named in the same schedule and so that as from the day aforesaid the Archdeaconry of Sudbury shall comprise and consist of the several rural deaneries which are in that behalf set out and named in the said second schedule to this scheme annexed and every rural deanery within the said last-mentioned archdeaconry shall comprise and consist of the several parishes or other cures which are in that behalf set out and named in the same lastly-mentioned schedule.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other matter or thing with respect to the matters aforesaid or any of them under or by virtue of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Your Majesty chapter seventy, of the Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Your Majesty chapter ninety-seven of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five, and of the Act of the thirty-fourth and thirty-fifth years of Your Majesty chapter eighty-two, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a consolidated chapelry to the consecrated church of

Saint Faith situate in the parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester.

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth and of the new parish of Saint John Battersea in the county and diocese aforesaid which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the schedule hereunder written there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several churches of such parish and new parish respectively.

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that such contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth and of the said new parish of Saint John Battersea should be formed into a consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes and that the same should be assigned to the said church of Saint Faith situate in the said parish of Saint Anne, Wandsworth as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Anthony Wilson, Bishop of the said diocese of Rochester with the consent of Elizabeth Du Buisson of Heathfield, Wandsworth Common in the said county of Surrey Spinster the patron of the vicarage of the said parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth and with the consent of the Reverend John Erskine Clarke, vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of Battersea and as such vicar or incumbent the patron of the vicarage of the new parish of Saint John Battersea aforesaid (in testimony whereof they the said consenting parties have respectively signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth and of the said new parish of Saint John Battersea which are described in the schedule hereunder written all which portions together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be united and formed into one consolidated chapelry for the said church of Saint Faith situate in the parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Faith Wandsworth.'"

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Faith Wandsworth, consisting of:—

"I. All that portion of the parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth in the county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester, wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the south by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth from the parish of All Saints Wandsworth in the county and diocese aforesaid at the centre of the bridge which carries High-street Wandsworth over the River Wandle and extending thence eastward along the middle of the said High-street for a distance of fifteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as East Hill and continuing thence still eastward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of thirty-seven and a half chains or thereabouts to the boundary at or near to the junction of the same road with the

road called or known as Saint John's Hill and Saint Anne's-road which boundary divides the said parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth from the new parish of Saint John Battersea in the county and diocese aforesaid.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the said parish of Saint Anne, Wandsworth is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the south as aforesaid that is to say, upon the east, upon the north and upon the west as follows, upon the east and north by the said new parish of Saint John Battersea and upon the west by the parish of All Saints Wandsworth aforesaid, that is to say by the River Wandle aforesaid.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the said new parish of Saint John Battersea which is bounded on the north-east by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said new parish of Saint John Battersea from the hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth aforesaid at a point on the northern side of the Windsor Line of the London and South-Western Railway at the middle of the north western end of the railway arch which is situate at a distance of two chains and eighty links or thereabouts to the south-west of the south-eastern end of John-street, and extending thence that is from the said railway arch north-westward and in a direct line for a distance of five and a half chains or thereabouts to the point where the road which passes in front of the houses called or known as Mozart-terrace, joins New Eltringham-street, and continuing thence still north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of three chains or thereabouts to its junction with York-road and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named road for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called or known as Jews'-row, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of eleven and a half chains or thereabouts to its north-western end on the bank of the River Thames, and continuing thence still in precisely the same direction and in a straight line to the boundary in the middle of the last-named river, which boundary divides the said county of Surrey and the diocese of Rochester aforesaid from the county of Middlesex and from the diocese of London.

"All which said hereinbefore described portion of the new parish of Saint John Battersea aforesaid is bounded upon the remaining sides other than upon the north-east as aforesaid that is to say upon the north, upon the west and upon the south as follows upon the north by the said boundary in the middle of the River Thames upon the west by the River Wandle that is to say partly by the new parish of Saint Stephen Wandsworth in the said county of Surrey and in the diocese of Rochester aforesaid and partly by the parish of All Saints Wandsworth aforesaid and upon the south by the Windsor Line of the London and South Western Railway aforesaid, that is to say by the hereinbefore described portion of the parish of Saint Anne Wandsworth aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Her Majesty chapter sixty-three duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fifteenth day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England acting in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, of the Act of the third and fourth years of Your Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, and of the Act of the thirty-seventh and thirty-eighth years of Your Majesty, chapter sixty-three, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the rural deaneries or some of them which are within the Archdeaconry of Northumberland, one of the two archdeaconries of the diocese of Newcastle.

"Whereas it has been represented to us by the Right Reverend Ernest Roland, Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle, that the arrangements which are hereinafter recommended and proposed with respect to the said rural deaneries, or some of them, are desirable and should be carried into effect, and we are of opinion that the same may properly be carried into effect.

Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Ernest Roland Bishop of Newcastle (in testimony whereof he hath to this scheme set his hand and his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that as from the day on which any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme shall be published in the London Gazette and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order the Archdeaconry of Northumberland shall comprise and consist of those rural deaneries, the names of which are set down in order and are numbered consecutively in the schedule to this scheme annexed; and that the name which in the same schedule is given to any rural deanery shall be the name thereof; and that every parish or other cure, the name and quality of which is set down, in numbered order under the name of any rural deanery in the first column of the said schedule, shall belong to and be a part of the rural deanery under the name of which it so appears as aforesaid, and be subject to the jurisdiction and authority of the rural dean thereof, and shall not any longer belong to or be a part of any other rural deanery or be subject to the jurisdiction or authority of any other rural dean; the intent of this our recommendation and proposal being, that as from the day aforesaid the existing arrangement of the rural deaneries within the diocese of Newcastle (being an arrangement in accordance with the statutory schedule of

rural deaneries within the diocese of Durham which was prepared under the hereinbefore lastly named Act and dated the sixteenth day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five) shall be superseded by the said schedule to this scheme annexed, in respect of and to the extent of the changes in the name or in the area of any rural deanery or rural deaneries which in the same schedule respectively appear so that as from the day aforesaid the Archdeaconry of Northumberland shall comprise and consist of the several rural deaneries which are in that behalf set out and named in the said schedule to this scheme annexed, and every rural deanery within the same archdeaconry shall comprise and consist of the several parishes or other cures which are in that behalf set out and named in the same schedule.

schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Hilda situate at Lucker as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Hilda Lucker.'

"And with the like consent of the said Ernest Roland Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Hilda situate at Lucker as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Hilda, Lucker, being:

All that part of the parish or parochial chapelry of Bamburgh in the county of Northumberland and in the Diocese of Newcastle which is comprised within and is co-extensive with the limits of the township and ancient chapelry of Lucker and of the several townships of Adderstone, Hoppen, Mousen, Newham, Newstead, Ratchwood, Warenford and Warenton."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act further to amend the laws concerning "the burial of the dead in England," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council was made

on the nineteenth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one, directing the discontinuance of burials in, amongst other places, the parish church and churchyard of Coningsby, in the county of Lincoln :

And whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the said Order be varied as regards burials in the said churchyard by substituting for the directions therein contained with respect to said church and churchyard the directions hereinafter set forth :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows, viz. :

That burials be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the parish church of Coningsby, in the county of Lincoln : and also in the said churchyard except as follows :

(a.) In such vaults and wholly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard burials may be allowed on condition that every coffin buried therein be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(b.) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those already interred therein as can be buried at or below that depth.

(c.) In such earthen graves in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains burials may be allowed of so many of the following relations of those already interred therein, viz., widows and widowers resident in the parish at the time of death, as can be buried at or below that depth.

THE following Statutes, passed on the 5th day of June, 1884, by the Governing Body of the Queen's College, Oxford, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877 :—

WHEREAS by the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1877 Clause 54 it is provided, that a Statute made by the Commissioners for a College may after the cesser of the power of the Commissioners be subject to alteration from time to time by Statutes made by the College under the said Act and not otherwise. And whereas the Governing Body of the Queen's College in the University of Oxford did, at a General Meeting specially summoned for the purpose, unanimously make the following Statutes, altering some of the Statutes made by the Commissioners as is herein-after set forth. And whereas it is provided by the aforesaid Act Clause 55, that Statutes so made shall be submitted to the Queen in Council, and proceeded on as is by the aforesaid Act provided.

Now we the Provost and Scholars of the said College, being the Governing Body thereof, humbly submit the following Statutes to the Queen in Council, to be proceeded on as is in the aforesaid Act provided :—

THE STATUTES.

To add to Stat. XXII. :—

THE Statute concerning a Fellowship in the Queen's College, Oxford, held by the Senior Bursar
No. 25372.

C

thereof, and approved by the Queen in Council the sixth of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty, shall be henceforth repealed, but such repeal shall be without prejudice to any right acquired liability incurred or act done thereunder, and shall not affect the conditions of tenure of any emolument held at any time by virtue of any such right.

In place of II. 19 :—

It shall be lawful for such three Official Fellows, or if one of these three be also holding office as Senior Bursar, for such four Official Fellows as shall have held office for the longest time, the length of tenure of office being computed in the manner and according to the conditions hereinafter prescribed to acquire the right (hereinafter called "the aforesaid right") to hold their Fellowships, although they be married, so long as they remain in the service of the College as Tutor, Lecturer, or Bursar :

And no Official Fellow, who by reason of length of tenure of office has acquired the aforesaid right, shall under any circumstances be held to have lost the aforesaid right :

Provided always that the number of Official Fellows, who by reason of length of tenure of office have acquired the aforesaid right, shall never at any one time exceed four.

If at any time the Senior Bursar, being an Official Fellow, shall not be one of the Official Fellows who by reason of length of tenure of office have acquired the aforesaid right, it shall nevertheless be lawful for him to retain his Fellowship, although he be married, so long as he remains in the service of the College as Senior Bursar.

In computing the length of tenure of office of Official Fellows every term shall be counted once during which any Official Fellow shall have served the College in one or more of the following offices, namely Tutor, Lecturer, or Occasional Lecturer, being at the time a Fellow of the College.

If at any time in computing the length of tenure of office of Official Fellows two or more Official Fellows shall be equally qualified in respect of length of tenure of office to acquire the aforesaid right, then that right shall be acquired among such equally qualified Official Fellows, according to their position on the list of Fellows.

IN STAT. IX.

At the end of Cl. 1 to add :—

THE Provost and Fellows may from time to time add to the Tutorial Committee such College Lecturers, being Fellows of the College as they shall think fit.

And in Cl. 4 for "The Provost and Tutors" (bis) to read "The Tutorial Committee."

Twenty days of rigorous quarantine if during the passage they have had cases of cholera or the least suspicion of that disease amongst those on board.

ART. 2. Vessels which have left other ports of the French coast of the Mediterranean after the 20th instant, will, on their arrival in the kingdom, be subjected to the following treatment:—

Five days of observation if they have had a clean passage of more than ten days.

Seven days of observation if they have had a clean passage of less than ten days.

Twenty days of rigorous quarantine if during the passage they have had cases of cholera or the least suspicion of that disease amongst those on board.

ART. 3. Vessels coming from the port of Toulon, besides being subjected to quarantine of observation, may be sent to a lazaret to undergo the same, in cases where the port of arrival has no safe anchorage in a perfectly isolated place.

Vessels subjected to rigorous quarantine must be immediately sent to a lazaret.

ART. 4. In cases of quarantine of observation the hygienic measures of disinfection indicated by Art. 133 of the Ministerial Instructions of the 26th December, 1871, must be taken; and, in cases of rigorous quarantine, the disembarkation at the lazaret of susceptible goods of the 1st Class and their disinfection will be obligatory.

Until further orders the importation by sea or land from France of rags or unwashed old clothes is forbidden.
