**A**T the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 23rd day of July, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

To all the Local Authorities in Scotland, under the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867, within whose District there is a Port or Harbour;—

To the Medical Officers of Health of such Local Authorities;—

To all Officers of Customs;—

To all Masters of Ships;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

**W**HEREAS Cholera is now prevalent at Marseilles and Toulon, in the Republic of France, and it is expedient, in order to prevent the spread of the disease, that rules and regulations should be made with reference to Ships having on board bales of Rags exported from either of those places and consigned to this country:

Now therefore, in exercise of the powers conferred upon them by Section 6 of the Act passed in the sixth year of His Majesty King George the Fourth, chapter seventy-eight, intituled "An Act to Repeal the several Laws relating to Quarantine, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof," and every other power enabling them in this behalf, the Lords of the Council do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

**ARTICLE 1.** In this Order—

The term "Ship" includes vessel or boat;

The term "Officer of Customs" includes any person acting under the authority of the Commissioners of Customs;

The term "Master" includes the officer or person for the time being in charge or command of a ship.

**ARTICLE 2.** From and after the date of this Order, no rags exported from Marseilles or Toulon shall be landed at any place in Scotland.

**ARTICLE 3.** No master of a ship having such rags on board, and no consignee of or other person having any control over such rags shall permit the same to be landed in contravention of this Order.

**ARTICLE 4.** If, in contravention of this Order, any such rags are landed it shall be the duty of the Local Authority to take proceedings against the

persons who may be responsible for such landing; and, unless the rags are immediately re-shipped, to cause the same to be destroyed, with such precautions as may be recommended by the Medical Officer of Health of the said Authority.

Board of Trade, Whitehall Gardens,

THE Board of Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Christiania, stating that the Norwegian import duty on unbleached linen, hemp, and jute tissues, weighing less than 110 grammes per half metre square, has been reduced from 13 öre per kilo. (7s. 4d. per cwt.) to 7 öre per kilo. (3s. 11½d. per cwt.) The Despatch is accompanied by a detailed statement of certain other alterations which have been made in the Norwegian customs tariff, the duties affected being those on spirit and other varnish and polish and drying oils; flax, hemp, and jute yarn; barbed fencing wire; molasses and syrup; drawing instruments; and tobacco stalks.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Vice-Consul at Sulina, who reports that:—The Roumanian Government have issued instructions to the Director of the Sanitary Service at Sulina, that the entry into that port, as well as the other ports of Roumania, is prohibited to arrivals from French ports that shall not have submitted to a quarantine before entering the Dardanelles.
