THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Ambassador at Berlin, who reports with reference to the outbreak of cholera in France, that:—The precautions to be taken at German ports are to be in accordance with the circular instructions to the Local Authorities of July 5, 1883, and the special measures to be adopted; in the case of persons entering Germany from France by land are to be confined to a medical examination at the frontier railway stations, which is to take place in the railway carriages, and not in a room or building set apart for that purpose.

Persons presenting suspicious symptoms will not be permitted to continue their journey, but will be detained for treatment in a suitable building, and the carriages in which they have travelled will be stopped and disinfected before being again used.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Note from the Ambassador of Austria-Hungary, intimating that in Austria-Hungary vessels, persons, and their effects, coming from Italy are subjected to a severe medical inspection before being admitted to free pratique. The attention of sanitary officers has been specially directed to travellers from France, and to soiled linen as a principal vehicle of infection.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Representative at Lisbon, who reports as follows, under date of 19th instant:—The Official Gazette of to-day contains two further Decrees respecting quarantine. The first, dated 17th instant, lays down that no vessel which during the voyage has had a case of cholera on board will, under present circumstances, be allowed to land passengers or cargo. This Decree applies to all ports, whether suspected or clean.

The second Decree is dated yesterday, and declares German ports to be suspected of cholera since the 16th ultimo.
