SWINE-FEVER (INFECTED CIRCLES) ORDER OF 1884.

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 29th day of July, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT :

Lord President.

Mr. Dodson.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as THE SWINE-FEVER (INFECTED CIRCLES) ORDER OF 1884.

Extent.

2.—(1.) This Order extends only to such Districts as provided by this Article.

(2.) Where the Privy Council, on the application of a Local Authority of any District, by Special Order direct that this Order shall be in force in such District, the provisions of this Order shall from the date mentioned in such Special Order apply and extend to such District: Provided that the provisions of this Order shall not apply to any part of the District of any adjoining Local Authority to which this Order does not for the time being extend.

Interpretation.

3. Terms in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1884.

Formation of Swine-Fever Infected Circle.

4.—(1.) Where under the provisions of the Act of 1878 and the Orders of Council thereunder any pig-sty, shed, or other place has, upon service of notice of declaration by an Inspector of the Local Authority, become a Swine-Fever Infected Place, the whole space lying within a distance of half a mile from any part of such Infected Place shall

forthwith become and be for the purposes of this Order a Swine-Fever Infected Circle.

(2.) The Inspector shall forthwith serve or cause to be served a notice of his declaration, signed by him, unless in the circumstances this appears to him not to be expedient, on the occupiers of all lands and buildings any part whereof in his judgment is situate within half a mile from such Swine-Fever Infected Place.

(3.) The Inspector shall, with all practicable speed, inform the Local Authority of every District within which any part of the Infected Circle is situate of his declaration and notice, and shall send his declaration and a copy of his notice to each of such Local Authorities.

(4.) A Local Authority may at any time, and from time to time, by order reduce the limits of a Swine-Fever Infected Circle within their District, or of so much as is within their District, and, where an Infected Circle has been reduced as aforesaid, they may reduce, extend, or otherwise alter the limits thereof or of so much as is within their District, provided that no lands or buildings shall be included within an Infected Circle that are not situate within half a mile of a Swine-Fever Infected Place, and any Infected Circle so reduced, extended, or altered shall thenceforth be the Infected Circle for the purposes of this Order.

(5.) A Local Authority may at any time by order dissolve a Swine-Fever Infected Circle within their District, or such part as is within their District, and thereupon such Infected Circle or such part, as the case may be, shall cease to exist.

(6.) Where under the Act of 1878 and the Orders of Council thereunder the pig-sty, shed, or other place in respect of which a Swine-Fever Infected Circle has been constituted under the provisions of this Order ceases to be a Swine-Fever Infected Place, such Infected Circle shall cease to exist.

(7.) Where the Privy Council at any time by Order declare a Swine-Fever Infected Area and any part of such Area is at the date of the Order situate within a Swine-Fever Infected Circle, such part shall thereupon cease to be part of an Infected Circle.

(8.) The Local Authority of every District in which a Swine-Fever Infected Circle or part of a Swine-Fever Infected Circle under this Order is situate shall give such notice of the existence of the Infected Circle or of that part by placards or otherwise in and about the Infected Circle, or in such other manner as the Local Authority consider best fitted to insure publicity for the same, and shall give notice of the existence of such Swine-Fever Infected Circle or such part to every Railway Company having a railway or railway station in the same.

(9.) The Privy Council may by Order dissolve a Swine-Fever Infected Circle or any part thereof, and thereupon such Infected Circle or such part as the case may be shall cease to exist.

Power to Local Authority to make Regulations.

5. A Local Authority may from time to time make such general or special Regulations as they think fit for prohibiting or regulating the movement of swine in or into or out of Swine-Fever Infected Circles.

Movement in or into or out of Swine-Fever Infected Circle.

6.—(1.) No pig shall be moved in or into or out of a Swine-Fever Infected Circle otherwise than in accordance with Regulations made by the Local Authority under this Order for the time being in force.

(2.) Where two or more Swine-Fever Infected Circles adjoin, overlap, or extend beyond the limits of each other, the whole of such Infected Circles shall, for the purposes of movement of swine under this Order, be deemed to be one Swine-Fever Infected Circle.

Limitation on Provisions respecting Movement in connexion with Swine-Fever Infected Circle.

7. Nothing in this Order or in any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order shall be deemed to apply to or affect the movement of—

- (a.) Swine in a Swine-Fever Infected Circle in any case unless the movement is intended to be, wholly or partly, along or across a highway or thoroughfare, or by railway, canal, river, or inland navigation; or
- (b.) Swine in or into or out of a Cattle-Plague Infected Place; or
- (c.) Swine in or into or out of a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place or Circle or Area; or
- (d.) Swine in or into or out of a Swine-Fever Infected Place or Area; or
- (e.) Swine affected with swine-fever; or
- (f.) Swine in or into or out of a Foreign Animals Wharf or a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or a Landing-Place for foreign animals.

Exception of Railways from Swine-Fever Infected Circle.

8. Where a Swine-Fever Infected Circle has been constituted under this Order, there shall be deemed to be excepted from that Circle the lines of railway within that Circle, so far as those lines are used or required for the transit of swine through that Circle, without untrucking, and nothing in any Regulation of a Local Authority respecting movement of swine in or into or out of such Circle shall be deemed to interfere with that transit.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

9.—(1.) Every person in charge of swine being moved, where, under any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order, a movement licence may be necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a Constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the movement licence, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or Constable, or Inspector or other officer.

Offences.

10.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, or of a Regulation of a Local Authority made under this Order, or of any licence under any such Regulation, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If a person in charge of swine being moved, where under a Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order a movement licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a

false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Callao, transmitting the following translation of a Decree issued by the Peruvian Government with respect to Bills of Health, viz. :—

By the Ministry of War the following Decree has been issued :—

In view of the foregoing question, and considering—

1st. That the entrance of vessels in the ports of the Republic without the corresponding Bill of Health is a fault of more or less consequence to the country, according to circumstances.

2nd. That these form intimate relations with the sanitary state of the places from which they arrive, with the tonnage, with the crew, and with the class of the vessels ; and

3rd. That neither in the Regulations of Commerce, nor in those of the Captains of Ports, nor in those of the Supreme Sanitary Board, is stated the fine which should be applied for the omission mentioned. It is resolved,

That the captain of the port, or whoever represents him, shall impose the fines to which they may be subject on all vessels which present themselves without a Bill of Health, in conformity with the following rules :—

1st. If it is a steamer, and of less than 200 tons register, 50 soles ; and if more than 200 tons, 100 soles.

2nd. If the vessel is a sailing ship, and of less than 200 tons, 30 soles ; and if more than 200 tons, 60 soles.

When proceeding from a port where an epidemic exists :—

1st. If a steamer, of less than 200 tons, 200 soles.

2nd. If only one single case of epidemic disease has presented itself without probability of propagation, and the steamer is less than 200 tons, 300 soles ; and if of more than 200 tons, 600 soles.

3rd. If there has been more than one case, and the steamer is of less than 200 tons, 1,000 soles, and

4th. On sailing vessels there will be imposed just the half of what is determined in the above-mentioned cases.

POST OFFICE (MONEY ORDERS) ACTS
1848 to 1883.REGULATIONS MADE UNDER THE POST OFFICE
(MONEY ORDERS) ACTS, 1848 TO 1883.

WHEREAS the Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880, provides that subject to the Post Office Regulations, the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Treasury, may for the purpose of the transmission of small sums through the Post Office authorize his officers or any of them to issue Orders (hereinafter referred to as Postal Orders) in the form set forth in the Schedule to that Act, subject nevertheless to the provisos contained in the said Act.

And whereas by the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 and 1880, the Postmaster-General is authorized with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to make Post Office Regulations relating to Money Orders and to the persons by or to whom Money Orders shall be paid, and to the times at which and the mode in which the same shall be paid.

And whereas by the Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1883, certain alterations in the form of Postal Orders as set forth in the schedule to the Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880, are sanctioned, and the Postmaster-General is empowered, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to prescribe by Post Office Regulations further modifications of the form of Postal Orders and the several amounts (not exceeding twenty shillings) of such Orders, and the sums of poundage (not exceeding two pence) to be taken in respect of such Orders, and it was amongst other things provided that where an arrangement is made with the Government of any British Possession for the transmission of small sums through the Post Offices of the United Kingdom, and such British Possession by means of Money Orders of a like character to those issued under the Post Office (Money Orders) Act, 1880, as amended by that Act the said Act as amended by that Act should so far as is consistent with the tenour thereof and subject to the prescribed modifications, apply in like manner as if an Order issued in pursuance of such arrangement, whether by an officer of the Post Office or of such British Possession, was an Order under the said Act as amended by that Act and that such portions of the said Act as enact punishment should apply accordingly.

And whereas an arrangement has been made with the Government of Hong Kong for the issue at Hong Kong, or at any port or place at which the Post Office of Hong Kong maintains a Post Office, and for the payment in the United Kingdom and in Gibraltar and Constantinople of Postal Orders in the form and subject to the Regulations hereinafter mentioned.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Henry Fawcett, Her Majesty's Postmaster-General, in pursuance of the said Acts, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby order as follows:—

1. These Regulations shall come into operation on the 1st day of October, 1884.

2. Subject to the provisions of these Regulations Postal Orders issued at any Post Office in Hong Kong, or any port or place at which the Hong Kong Post Office maintains a Post Office, may be paid in the United Kingdom, Gibraltar, and Constantinople by any officer or person for the time being there authorized to pay Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom.

3. Every Postal Order issued in Hong Kong, or any port or place at which the Hong Kong

Post Office maintains a Post Office as aforesaid, shall be in the form and of one of the amounts specified in the Regulations made under the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 to 1883, and dated the 28th day of January, 1884, or any other Regulations for the time being in force with reference to Postal Orders issued in the United Kingdom, and all the provisions of the said Regulations shall apply to Orders issued in Hong Kong, or any port or place at which the Hong Kong Post Office maintains a Post Office as aforesaid so far as the nature of the case admits.
