THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The provisions of Chapter II (SPECIAL REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE METROPOLIS) of The Foot-and-Mouth Disease Temporary Order of 1884, together with all other provisions of that Order so far as the same relate to the provisions of that Chapter, are hereby revoked: Provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under any of those provisions before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed thereunder before the commencement of this Order.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the sixteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

**THE FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE
ORDER OF NOVEMBER, 1884.**

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 13th day of November, 1884.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

PRESENT :

Lord President.
Mr. Trevelyan.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Revocation of Former Order and Regulations.

1.—(1.) The Foot-and-Mouth Disease No. 2 Temporary Order of 1884 is hereby revoked.

(2.) All Regulations made by a Local Authority under The Foot-and-Mouth Disease No. 2 Temporary Order of 1884 and in force are hereby revoked.

(3.) Nothing in this Article shall be deemed to invalidate or make unlawful anything done under the said Order or any of such Regulations before the date of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order or Regulations hereby revoked before the date of this Order.

Additional Rules for Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place.

2. In addition to the Rules contained in the Fourth Schedule to the Act of 1878, the Additional Rules set forth in the Schedule to this Order shall have effect in relation to a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place.

Extent.

3. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland only.

Interpretation.

4. Terms in this Order have the same meaning as in The Animals Order of 1884.

Short Title.

5. This Order may be cited as THE FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE ORDER OF NOVEMBER, 1884. C. L. Peel.

SCHEDULE.

Additional Rules for Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place.

Rule 1. No person (except the owner or person in charge of the animal) shall enter any cow-shed, field or other place situate within a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place in which an animal affected with foot-and-mouth disease is kept, except with the permission of the Local Authority.

Rule 2. The owner or the person in charge of an animal affected with foot-and-mouth disease shall forthwith inform the Local Authority of the name or names of the person or persons whom he desires may be permitted to tend such animal and any other animals that may be in the cow-shed, field or other place situate within a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place in which the diseased animal is kept, and any person or persons

tending such animal or animals shall not tend any other animal except with the further permission of the Local Authority.

Rule 3. The Local Authority shall provide proper and suitable suits of Overall Clothes for the use of persons tending animals in a cow-shed, field or other place situate within a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place in which an animal affected with foot-and-mouth disease is kept. Such Overall Clothes are to be put on upon entering, taken off on leaving, and left in, such cow-shed, field or other place, and, previous to being removed therefrom, shall be properly disinfected with a solution of carbolic acid.

Rule 4. Every person upon leaving a cow-shed, field or other place situate within a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place in which an animal affected with foot-and-mouth disease is kept, shall thoroughly wash his hands with soap and water, and shall wash his boots with a solution of carbolic acid.

Rule 5. The Local Authority shall cause all utensils, substances and things which have been in contact with or used for or about animals in a cow-shed or other place situate within a Foot-and-Mouth Disease Infected Place in which an animal affected with foot-and-mouth disease has been kept to be disinfected with a solution of carbolic acid.

(ANIMALS) ACT, 1878.**

- (5.) All those Lairs, known as Laycock's Cattle Lairs, situate in Liverpool Road, Islington, in the occupation of Nicholls and Son.
- (6.) All those Lairs, known as the Copenhagen Yard Cattle Lairs, situate in York Road, adjoining the Metropolitan Cattle Market, Islington, in the occupation of W. Mawer.

From this day forth the preventive regulations contained in Ordinance No. 19 of September 2nd last for vessels arriving at Pianosa, Gorgona, and Tremiti, coming from clean ports of the Italian Continent, shall cease to have force in those islands.

1884. ORDINANCE OF MARITIME HEALTH, No. 33.

Information having arrived of the complete cessation of cholera in the town of Marseilles;

The Minister of the Interior decrees:

ART. 1. The quarantine established by Ordinance No. 31, of the 29th October last, is taken off as regards vessels leaving the port of Marseilles from and after the 2nd instant on their arrival at the shores of the Italian continent. If they have a clean bill, and have no sickness on board, they shall receive pratique after medical inspection.

ART. 2. No change is made in the preventive treatment of ships from Marseilles arriving at the Italian islands, nor in the prohibition of any importation from that city of rags, tatters, old unwashed clothes, used bedding, selvages, and lint, which prohibition is continued for the whole kingdom until new orders.

The Schedule before referred to.

BYE-LAWS and REGULATIONS made by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of

Over Darwen, as the Local Authority, under section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870.

1. For the purpose of these Bye-laws and Regulations the term "car" shall mean any engine or carriage using any tramway laid down within the said borough, and the terms "driver" and "conductor" shall respectively mean the driver and conductor or other person having charge of an engine or car.

2. The driver of every car shall cause the same to be driven at a speed of not less than four miles an hour on the average, and not exceeding eight miles an hour.

3. The driver of every car shall so drive the same that it shall not follow a preceding car at a less distance than fifty yards.

4. Subject to the requirements of Bye-laws Nos. 3 and 5 the driver or conductor of a car shall stop the same for the purpose of setting down or taking up passengers when required by any passenger desiring to leave the car, or by any person desirous of travelling by the car for whom there is room, and to whose admission no valid objection can be made: Provided, that nothing in this Bye-law shall require a car to be stopped on any gradient steeper than one in twenty-five.

5. Except at a passing-place or terminus, no car shall be stopped at the intersection or junction of two or more streets or roads, nor within ten yards of a car on an adjoining line of rails.

6. The driver of a car on coming in sight of a vehicle standing or travelling on any part of the road so as not to leave sufficient space for the car to pass shall sound his whistle or bell as a warning to the person in charge of such vehicle, and that person shall, with reasonable despatch, cause such vehicle to be removed so as not to obstruct the car.

7. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on the tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

8. Every driver, conductor, or other person offending against any of these Bye-laws and Regulations shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings for each offence, and not exceeding for any continuing offence ten shillings for every day during which the offence continues.

9. These Bye-laws shall come into force on the 10th day of January, 1885.
