The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by the Army Act, 1881, it is enacted, amongst other things, that in case of great emergency, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council by Proclamation (the occasion being first communicated to Parliament if Parliament be then sitting, or declared in Council, and notified by the Proclamation, if Parliament be not sitting) to direct that all or any persons who would otherwise be entitled, in pursuance of the terms of their enlistment, to be transferred to the Reserve, shall continue in Army Service, and such persons shall accordingly continue to serve in Army Service for the same period for which they might be required to serve if they had been transferred to the Reserve and called out for permanent service by a Proclamation of Her Majesty under the enactments relating to the Reserve:

And whereas the present state of public affairs in the Soudan and the necessity in connection therewith of taking steps for the defence of Egypt and for the protection of the interests of the Empire, have, in Our opinion, constituted a case of great emergency within the meaning of the said Act:

Now, Our will and pleasure therefore is, and We do hereby, in pursuance of the said Act, order the Right Honourable Spencer Compton Cavendish, commonly called Marquis of Har-

tington, one of Our Principal Secretaries of State, with all convenient speed, to draw out and embody at such place or places, as he shall judge most convenient, the Militia of the United Kingdom, or such a portion of the same as he may from time to time direct under his hand; and that he do cause the same to be held in every respect ready to march, as occasion shall require, to such part, or parts, within Our United Kingdom as he shall judge proper.

A DESPATCH, of which the following is a copy, has been received from General Lord Wolseley by the Secretary of State for War:—

My Lord, Camp, Korti, January 26, 1885.

I FORWARD herewith the copy of a Despatch from Brigadier-General Sir Herbert Stewart, K.C.B., in which he describes the action he fought on the 17th instant at Abu Klea.

I am now awaiting reports from him as to his further proceedings subsequent to that battle, and I reserve comments upon his operations until I am in receipt of them.

At present, I shall content myself with remarking that all he has done proves him to be a real leader of men, and an able General. All ranks under his command have displayed that discipline, and those high fighting qualities for which Her Majesty's Army has always been renowned.

I deeply deplore our loss, which was considerable in proportion to the numbers engaged; but this must generally be the case where we have to contend with a brave and determined enemy, five or more times our strength, and who invariably comes to close quarters and hand-to-hand fighting.

From Brigadier-General Sir H. Stewart to the Chief of the Staff.

SIR, *Abu Klea Wells, January 18, 1885.*

IN continuation of my Report of the 14th instant, I have the honour to inform you that the force under my command has made the following movements in carrying out your orders.

On the 14th instant the force left Gakdul at 2 P.M., and marching until dark bivouacked for the night some 10 miles on the road to Matammeh.

On the 15th instant a distance of 24 miles was accomplished, and a bivouac formed among the hills marked Gebel Es Sergain on the map.

On the 16th instant the force left camp at 5 A.M., and halted for breakfast at 11.30 A.M. at the spot marked in the map by the 840th kilometre.

Whilst halted a report was received from Lieut.-Colonel Barrow, 19th Hussars, who had been sent forward with his squadron to reconnoitre the neighbourhood of the Abu Klea Wells, informing me that he had seen about 50 of the enemy standing in groups on the hills about four miles north-east of Abu Klea.

Shortly afterwards the whole force was advanced—the Guards Camel Regiment, Heavy Camel Regiment, and Mounted Infantry Camel Regiment, moving on a broad front in line of columns at half-distance, the ground being favourable.

It soon became manifest that the enemy was in force, and looking to the hour (2 P.M.) it did not seem desirable to attempt to attack until the following morning. Another bivouac was therefore selected, protected from the enemy's fire so far as the ground would permit, and various small works were constructed.

During the night a continuous light fire at long ranges was kept up by the enemy, doing little damage.

Upon the 17th instant it was plain that the enemy was in force. During the night they had constructed works on our right flank, from which a distant but well aimed fire was maintained. In our front the manœuvring of their troops in line and in column was apparent, and everything pointed to the probability of an attack upon our position being made. Under these circumstances no particular hurry to advance was made in the hope that our apparent dilatoriness might induce the enemy to push home. The camp having been suitably strengthened to admit of its being held by a comparatively small garrison—viz., 40 Mounted Infantry, 125 Sussex and details; and the enemy still hesitating to attack, an advance was made to seize the Abu Klea Well.

The force moved on foot in a square, which was formed as follows:—Left front face, two companies Mounted Infantry; right front face, two companies Guards, with the three guns Royal Artillery in the centre. Left face, two companies Mounted Infantry, one company Heavy Camel Regiment. Right face, two companies Guards, detachment Royal Sussex. Rear face, four companies Heavy Camel Regiment, with

Naval Brigade and one Gardner gun in the centre.

The advance at once attracted a fairly aimed fire from the enemy in front and on both flanks, which, in order to enable the square to continue moving, it was absolutely necessary to hold in check by the fire of skirmishers.

The enemy's main position was soon apparent, and by passing that position well clear of its left flank, it was manifest that he must attack or be enfiladed. As the square was nearly abreast of the position the enemy delivered his attack in the shape of a singularly well organised charge commencing with a wheel to the left.

A withering fire was at once brought to bear upon the enemy, especially from the more advanced portion of the left front face of the square. The rear portion of this face taking a moment or two to close up, was not in such a favourable position to receive the enemy's attack, and I regret to say that the square was penetrated at this point by the sheer weight of the enemy's numbers.

The steadiness of the troops enabled the hand to hand conflict to be maintained, whilst severe punishment was still being meted out to those of the enemy continuing to advance, with the result that a general retreat of the enemy under a heavy artillery and rifle fire soon took place.

After reforming the square, the 19th Hussars, who had been acting in difficult ground supporting our left flank, were pushed on to seize the Abu Klea Wells, and at 5 P.M. those wells were completely in our possession.

Detachments of the corps then returned to the bivouac of the 16th instant to bring up the camel and impedimenta left there, thus completing the force here this morning at 8 A.M.

The strength of the enemy is variously estimated from 8,000 to 14,000 men. My opinion is that not less than 2,000 of the enemy operated on our right flank, 3,000 in the main attack, and 5,000 in various other positions; but it is difficult to estimate their numbers with any exactness.

Their losses have been very heavy, not less than 800 lay dead on the open ground flanking our square, and their wounded during the entire day's fighting are reported by themselves as quite exceptional. Many are submitting.

I deeply regret that the necessity of obtaining water delays my immediate advance on Matammeh, but I trust this may be overcome in a few hours.

I cannot too deeply lament the loss of the many gallant officers and men that the force has suffered; but looking to the numbers of the enemy, their bravery, their discipline and the accuracy of fire of those possessing rifles, I trust that this loss, sad as it is, may be considered as in some measure inevitable.

In conclusion, I would add that it has been my duty to command a force from which exceptional work, exceptional hardships, and it may be added, exceptional fighting has been asked. It would be impossible for me adequately to describe the admirable support that has been given to me by every officer and man of the force.

A return of casualties is attached. Every possible care is being taken of the wounded. Tents have been pitched, and a strong post established over the Wells, garrisoned by a detachment of the Sussex Regiment.

Intelligence Report.

Wells of Abu Klea, January 18, 1885.

THE force opposed to Sir H. Stewart on the 17th consisted, as far as can be ascertained, of 2,000 Ababdeh, Bisharin, and other Arabs from Berber, under Abdul-Majid, nephew of the Emir of Berber, who was wounded in the arm and retired towards Berber.

60 soldiers of the old Egyptian Army from Berber, under Mohamed Effendi Wahabi and Beshir Agha.

The men from Berber arrived at the wells on the 12th January.

2,000 men, Arabs and others from Matammeh, under Ali-wad-Saad, the Emir who was killed; these men arrived on the 14th January.

1,000 men of the Mahdi's army, 400 with rifles, and from 4,000 to 6,000 Arabs, of various tribes from Kordofan, arrived on the morning of the action. Sheikh Musa, the Emir of the Hamr Arabs, was killed.

Total from 9,000 to 11,000 men; the principal attack was delivered by the men from Omdurman.

Prisoners captured report that the fort of Omdurman has been taken by the Mahdi's troops; and a portion of his army is thus set free for operations northwards.

The steamers under Kashm-el-Mûs are at Shabluka, and visit Matammeh occasionally. There are at Matammeh two and at Shendy one, guns in position against the steamers on the river bank; they were brought up from Berber.

Prisoners differ as to probability of resistance at Matammeh; they say that the force at the wells was confident of victory, and that the defeat inflicted on the enemy was very severe; they do not think those who fought yesterday will again offer a serious resistance.

The Berber force, which had a contingent of about 250 horsemen, retreated towards Berber, but many of the Arabs are still assembled to the north of the roads, probably watching the force.

From the numerous papers addressed to El-Zain, which were found on the field, it would appear that he was present. The other letters found, including one from the Mahdi and several from the Emir of Berber, relate chiefly to supplies, to an attempt to enlist Kashm-el-Mûs in the Mahdi's cause, and the best way of attacking him and his steamers.

The Omdurman force retired, partly with the men from Matammeh, towards that place, and partly towards Omdurman.

As far as can be ascertained from the prisoners, the Mahdi intends to offer a stubborn resistance

to the British advance on Khartoum, but the effect of the defeat of his troops yesterday had not then been felt.

Intelligence of the advance from Jakdul was given to the enemy by scouts, whose tracks were seen to the side of the road on the 1st.

This alteration, if approved, will be made by the insertion in lieu of paragraphs *a. b. and c.* of Clause 8 of the existing Statute 16 of the Brasenose College Statutes of the following paragraphs namely:—

8. (*a.*) The Principal and Fellows may if they think fit, by loan or accumulation, or by the other means hereinafter mentioned, raise a sum or sums not exceeding in the whole £24,000 for the erection of new buildings in connection with the College or the enlargement or improvement of the existing College buildings.

(*b.*) They shall appropriate to this purpose the accumulations from Fellowships, the election to which has been suspended by writing under seal of the University of Oxford Commissioners previous to the approval of these Statutes by Her Majesty in Council.

Any monies which with the consent of the Copyhold Commissioners might under the Universities and College Estates Amendment Act 1880 be applied to this purpose, shall with such consent be applicable to it and shall be reckoned as part of the total sum of £24,000 which the College is authorized to raise.

(*c.*) The sum to be appropriated out of corporate revenue to such accumulation or to the repayment with interest of money so borrowed shall not in any year exceed £1,500.

To all to whom these presents shall come the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and the Right Honourable and Most Reverend William, Archbishop of York, send greeting:

WHEREAS a church has lately been built within the limits of the parish of Sulcoates, in the town and county of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull, in the diocese of York, by and at the expense of certain well disposed persons, who have, with the approbation of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and of the said William, Archbishop of York, secured to the said new church an endowment and a repair fund, in accordance with the provisions of the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or of some of them, and particularly of the

Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her present Majesty, chapter ninety-seven.

And whereas under the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts or of some of them, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York, by an instrument bearing date on or about the eleventh day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, declared that the perpetual right of patronage of, and of nominating a minister to serve, the said new church from time to time and at all times whenever it should be requisite to nominate a minister to serve the same should, from and after the consecration of such church, be vested in, and be exercised by, and belong to the Reverend Henry William Kemp, Clerk in Holy Orders, Master of the Charter House in the town of Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, the Reverend Joseph McCormick, now Vicar or Incumbent of the vicarage of the parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, in the town and county of the town of Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Robert Jackson, of Albion-street, Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Esquire, John Briggs, of Clyde-terrace, Anlaby-road, Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Esquire, and Joseph Armitage Wade, of Hornsea, near Kingston-upon-Hull aforesaid, Esquire, their heirs and assigns, as trustees.

And whereas the said church has since been consecrated, and is called "The Church of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull."

And whereas the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England deem it expedient that a particular district, to comprise a portion of the said parish of Sulcoates, a portion of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, and certain extra-parochial territory called or known as Charter House, in the same town, county, and diocese, should be assigned to the said church of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull, and also that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church.

Now know ye, that the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the powers or authorities for this purpose contained in the several Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts" as aforesaid, or in some of them, and particularly in the Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby, with the consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified by his being a party to and executing these presents), assign to the said church of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull, as a particular district, all those portions of the said parish of Sulcoates, and of the said parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, and all that extra-parochial territory called or known as the Charter House as aforesaid, which are described in the schedule hereunder written, and are delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto appended, and do direct that the same shall be called "The Particular District of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull."

And the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners

for England, with the like consent of the said William, Archbishop of York (testified as aforesaid), in further exercise and execution of the powers or authorities contained in the said Acts of Parliament called "The Church Building Acts," or in some of them, and particularly in the said Act of the first and second years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter thirty-eight, in the Act of the third and fourth years of Her present Majesty, chapter sixty, in the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-six (such two lastly-mentioned Acts being also two of "The Church Building Acts" before named), in the said Act of the fourteenth and fifteenth years of Her said Majesty, chapter ninety-seven, and in the said Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling them in this behalf, do hereby determine and declare that banns of matrimony shall be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be solemnized or performed at the church of the said particular district of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull, and do hereby order and direct that all the fees, dues, offerings, or other emoluments to be received in respect of such publication of banns of matrimony, and of such solemnization or performance of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials at the same church shall, from and after the next avoidance of the two cures aforesaid, namely, the parish of Sculcoates and the parish of the Holy Trinity, Kingston-upon-Hull, as each such avoidance shall occur, belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said particular district of Saint Philip, Kingston-upon-Hull: Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

In witness whereof, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have hereunto affixed their common seal, and the said William, Archbishop of York, has hereunto set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal, this fifth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.
