The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Ladies who propose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing Room, at Buckingham Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Lady who is to make the presentation, of her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Drawing Room, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them.

It is not expected that Gentlemen will present themselves at the Drawing Rooms, except in attendance on the Ladies of their families.

HER Majesty, having been pleased to deliver the custody of the Privy Seal to the Right Honourable Archibald Philip, Earl of Rosebery, the Oaths of the Keeper of the Privy Seal were this day administered to him, and his Lordship took his place at the Board accordingly.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council made on the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three under and by virtue of the provisions of an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of Benefices in Plurality, and to make better provision for the Residence of the Clergy," it was ordered that the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Weeford and the perpetual curacy of Hints, both situated in the county of Stafford, and diocese of Lichfield, should be disunited by separating the said rectory of Weeford from the said perpetual curacy of Hints; and such Order assigned and attached to each of the said benefices its own original endowments and emoluments; and directed that each benefice should bear its own original charges and outgoings, and also that all principal and interest moneys then due and owing to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty on security of the said benefices, under and by virtue of an indenture of mortgage dated eighth November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one should, from and after the disunion of the said benefices, be exclusively charged upon the said rectory of Weeford and the endowments and emoluments thereof, in exoneration of the said perpetual curacy of Hints and the endowments and emoluments thereof.

And whereas the hereinbefore mentioned Order in Council came into full operation on the ninth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four on the first avoidance, after the said Order in Council, of the said united benefice.

And whereas by section 27 of the aforesaid Act of Parliament it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, at any time within five years after an Order in Council for disuniting benefices shall come into full operation, if occasion shall arise, to make a Supplemental Order for removing doubts and settling disputes, not foreseen at the time when such Order may have been made, respecting ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, patronage, right to pews, and the definition of local boundaries; and that every such Supplemental Order shall have the same force and effect as if it had formed part of the original Order.

And whereas doubts, not foreseen at the time when the Order aforesaid for disuniting the benefices aforesaid was made, respecting the tithe rent-charge, glebe land, and ecclesiastical pay-

ments hereinafter mentioned have been raised by the changes effected by the said Order.

And whereas William Dalrymple, Lord Bishop of Lichfield, on the twelfth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, made a representation to the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury Primate of All England and Metropolitan.

"We William Dalrymple by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Lichfield, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"That Her Majesty by Order in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three under the provision of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria chapter 106 ordered that the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Weeford and the perpetual curacy of Hints in the county of Stafford within our diocese of Lichfield should be disunited by separating the said rectory of Weeford from the said perpetual curacy of Hints and assigned and attached to each of such benefices its own original endowments and directed that each benefice should bear its own original charges and outgoings. That since the date of the hereinbefore-recited Order in Council doubts have arisen respecting the specific endowments which under the provisions of the said Order in Council would belong to each of the said benefices respectively and that it is desirable that such doubts should be removed. That in the scheme for disuniting the said benefices of Weeford and Hints it was intended that the endowments hereinafter mentioned should be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints such endowments being as follows:—

"1. A sum of £80 18s. 5d. per annum commuted tithe rent-charge arising out of land in the parish of Hints.

"2. A sum of £25 per annum payable out of the Hints estate by James Chadwick Esquire.

"3. Glebe land at Lichfield realizing £12 per annum. This land comprises 'the Turnpike Piece' containing two acres near to Beacon-street-end in the parish of Saint Chad Lichfield purchased in 1798 with a sum of £200 granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a piece of land containing two acres three roods and thirty-seven perches situate in the parish of Saint Michael's Lichfield purchased in 1806 with a sum of £200 granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a sum of £100 given by the Reverend John Chappel Woodhouse.

"4. A sum of £6 10s. per annum being the interest on a grant of £200 from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty.

"That it is desirable that such intention should be effectually carried out and that under and by virtue of the powers contained in the said Act of Parliament hereinbefore referred to the endowments hereinbefore specifically mentioned should be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints and further that all the endowments and emoluments formerly belonging to the united benefice of Weeford with Hints other than the several endowments and emoluments hereinbefore specified and hereby assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints should remain and exclusively belong to the rectory of Weeford.

"That we submit the above particulars together with our consent in writing as patron or person entitled in right of our said See to collate to the said rectory of Weeford and to the said perpetual curacy of Hints in case they or either of them were now vacant to the intent that your

Grace may recommend by your Report to Her Majesty in Council that a Supplemental Order be granted for removing such doubts and for effectually carrying out the said Order in Council.

"Given under our hand this twelfth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas the consent referred to in the said representation is as follows:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of Canterbury.

"We, William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of Lichfield being the patron or person entitled to collate to the rectory of Weeford and the perpetual curacy of Hints in the county of Stafford within our diocese of Lichfield in your Grace's province in case the same or either of them were now vacant do by this writing under our hand signify to your Grace our consent that the following endowments namely:—

"1. A sum of £80 18s. 5d. per annum commuted tithe-rent charge arising out of land in the parish of Hints.

"2. A sum of £25 per annum payable out of the Hints estate by James Chadwick Esquire.

"3. Glebe land at Lichfield realizing £12 per annum. This land comprises the 'Turnpike Piece' containing two acres near to Beacon-street-end in the parish of Saint Chad Lichfield purchased in 1793 with a sum of £200 granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a piece of land containing two acres three roods and thirty-seven perches situate in the parish of Saint Michael Lichfield purchased in 1806 with a sum of £200 granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a sum of £100 given by the Reverend John Chappel Woodhouse.

"4. A sum of £6 10s. per annum being the interest on a grant of £200 from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty should be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints and that all the endowments and emoluments formerly belonging to the united benefice of Weeford with Hints other than the several endowments and emoluments hereinbefore specified should remain and exclusively belong to the rectory of Weeford.

"Given under our hand at Lichfield this twelfth day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas on the twenty-second day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, certified to Her Majesty in Council as follows:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby state to Your Majesty in Council that by an Order of Your Majesty in Council bearing date the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three made under the authority of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign chapter 106 it was ordered that the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Weeford and the perpetual curacy of Hints in the county of Stafford and diocese of Lichfield should be disunited by separating the said rectory of Weeford from the said perpetual curacy of Hints. And by the said Order Your Majesty in Council was pleased on the recommendation of us the said Archbishop and with the consent in writing of the patron to assign

and attach to each of such benefices its own original endowments and to direct that each benefice should bear its own original charges and outgoings. And also that all principal and interest moneys then due and owing to the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty on security of the said benefices under and by virtue of an indenture of mortgage dated the eighth day of November one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one should from and after the disunion of the said benefices be exclusively charged upon the said rectory of Weeford and the endowments and emoluments thereof in exoneration of the said perpetual curacy of Hints and the endowments and emoluments thereof. And we further state that by the twenty-seventh section of the before-mentioned Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Your Majesty's reign after reciting that the changes effected by virtue of the provisions thereinbefore contained for uniting or disuniting benefices and for altering the contents of parishes might when the Orders for those purposes respectively came into operation raise doubts and create disputes not foreseen at the time when such Orders may have been made respecting ecclesiastical jurisdiction glebe lands tithes rent-charges and other ecclesiastical dues rates and payments patronage right to pews and the definition of local boundaries it is enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty in Council at any time within five years after such Orders respectively shall come into full operation, if occasion should arise to make a Supplemental Order for removing such doubts and settling such disputes and every such Supplemental Order should have the same force and effect as if it had formed part of the original Order made under the provisions of the said Act. And we further state that the before-recited Order in Council came into full operation on the ninth day of August one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four by reason of the resignation by the Reverend Frederick Comings Beaumont the incumbent of the said united benefice of the said perpetual curacy of Hints.

"Now we the said Archbishop do hereby certify Your Majesty in Council that the Right Reverend William Dalrymple Lord Bishop of Lichfield has by writing under his hand bearing date the twelfth day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four which writing is hereto annexed represented unto us the said Archbishop that doubts have arisen respecting the specific endowments which under the provisions of the said Order in Council would belong to each of the said benefices respectively and that it is desirable that such doubts should be removed and the said Lord Bishop has further represented to us that in the scheme for disuniting the said benefices of Weeford and Hints it was intended that the endowments hereinafter mentioned should be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints such endowments being as follows:—

"1. A sum of eighty pounds eighteen shillings and five pence per annum commuted tithe rent-charge arising out of land in the parish of Hints.

"2. A sum of twenty-five pounds per annum payable out of the Hints estate by James Chadwick Esquire.

"3. Glebe land at Lichfield realizing twelve pounds per annum. This land comprises 'the Turnpike Piece' containing two acres near to Beacon-street-end in the parish of Saint Chad Lichfield purchased in one thousand seven hundred and ninety-three with a sum of two hundred pounds granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a piece of land containing two acres

three roods and thirty-seven perches situate in the parish of Saint Michael Lichfield purchased in one thousand eight hundred and six with a sum of two hundred pounds granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a sum of one hundred pounds given by the Reverend John Chappel Woodhouse.

"4. A sum of six pounds ten shillings per annum being the interest on a grant of two hundred pounds from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty.

"And the said Lord Bishop has further represented that it is desirable that such intention should be effectually carried out and that the endowments hereinbefore specifically mentioned should be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints and further that all the endowments and emoluments formerly belonging to the united benefice of Weeford with Hints other than the several endowments and emoluments specified and so proposed to be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints should remain and exclusively belong to the rectory of Weeford. And we further certify Your Majesty in Council that the said Lord Bishop of Lichfield being the patron or person entitled to collate to the said rectory of Weeford and to the said perpetual curacy of Hints in case the same or either of them were now vacant has by writing under his hand which writing is hereunto annexed signified his consent that the endowments above specified should be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints and that all the endowments and emoluments formerly belonging to the united benefice of Weeford with Hints other than the several endowments and emoluments hereinbefore specified should remain and exclusively belong to the rectory of Weeford.

"Now therefore we the said Edward White Archbishop of Canterbury as the Archbishop of the Province in which the said rectory of Weeford and the said perpetual curacy of Hints are respectively situate do hereby pursuant to the before-mentioned Act of Parliament recommend to Your Majesty in Council that Your Majesty in Council do assign and attach to the said perpetual curacy of Hints the endowments following namely:—

"1. A sum of eighty pounds eighteen shillings and five pence per annum commuted tithe rent-charge arising out of land in the parish of Hints.

"2. A sum of twenty-five pounds per annum payable out of the Hints estate by James Chadwick Esquire.

"3. Glebe land at Lichfield realizing twelve pounds per annum. This land comprises 'the Turnpike Piece' containing two acres near to Beacon-street-end in the parish of Saint Chad Lichfield purchased in one thousand seven hundred and ninety-three with a sum of two hundred pounds granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a piece of land containing two acres three roods and thirty-seven perches situate in the parish of Saint Michael Lichfield purchased in one thousand eight hundred and six with a sum of two hundred pounds granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty and a sum of one hundred pounds given by the Reverend John Chappel Woodhouse.

"4. A sum of six pounds ten shillings per annum being the interest on a grant of two hundred pounds from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty.

"And that Your Majesty in Council do assign and attach to the rectory of Weeford all the endowments and emoluments formerly belonging to the united benefice of Weeford with Hints other

than the several endowments and emoluments hereinbefore specified.

"Given under our hand this twenty-second day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.
"Edw. Cantuar."

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to make a Supplemental Order for removing the doubts which have arisen as aforesaid, and doth order, as it is hereby ordered, that there shall be assigned and attached to the said perpetual curacy of Hints the endowments following namely:—

(i.) A sum of £80 18s. 5d. per annum commuted tithe rent-charge arising out of land in the parish of Hints.

(ii.) A sum of £25 per annum payable out of the Hints estate by James Chadwick, Esq.

(iii.) Glebe land at Lichfield realizing £12 per annum, which said land comprises "the Turnpike Piece," containing 2 acres, situate near to Beacon-street End in the parish of St. Chad, Lichfield, and purchased in the year 1793 with a sum of £200 granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, and a piece of land containing 2 acres 2 roods and 37 perches, situate in the parish of St. Michael Lichfield, and purchased in the year 1806 with a sum of £200 granted by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, and a sum of £100 given by the Reverend John Chappel Woodhouse.

(iv.) A sum of £6 10s. per annum, being the interest on a grant of £200 from the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty.

And also that all endowments and emoluments formerly belonging to the united benefice of Weeford with Hints, other than the several endowments and emoluments hereinbefore specified shall remain and exclusively belong to the rectory of Weeford.

And this Order shall be deemed to be, and construed as, part of the said Order in Council of the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of Her Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the nineteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following; that is to say:—

"We the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third chapter one hundred and thirty-four, of the Act of the second and third years of Your Majesty chapter forty-nine, and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty-five have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following representation as to the assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Augustin situate in the parish of Tynemouth in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Augustin situate in the parish of Tynemouth as aforesaid.

"Now therefore with the consent of the Right Reverend Ernest Rowland, Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle (testified by his having signed and sealed this representation) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Tynemouth which is described in the schedule hereunder written, all which part together with the boundaries thereof is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed should be assigned as a district chapelry to the said church of Saint Augustin situate in such parish as aforesaid and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Augustin Tynemouth.'

"And with the like consent of the said Ernest Rowland Bishop of the said diocese of Newcastle (testified as aforesaid) we the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published and that marriages baptisms churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said church of Saint Augustin situate in the parish of Tynemouth as aforesaid and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being: Provided always that so long as the Reverend Thomas Brutton Clerk in Holy Orders the present vicar or incumbent of the vicarage of the said parish of Tynemouth shall continue to be such vicar or incumbent all the fees which may be received in respect of such publication solemnization or performance at the said church of Saint Augustin situate in the said parish of Tynemouth as aforesaid shall be paid over by the minister thereof to the said Thomas Brutton, and provided also that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said office of baptism or for the registration thereof.

"We therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal consideration and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of Saint Augustin Tynemouth being:—

"All that part of the parish of Tynemouth in the county of Northumberland and in the diocese of Newcastle wherein the present incumbent of such parish still possesses the exclusive cure of souls which is bounded on the east by the new parish of Tynemouth Priory in the said county and diocese and upon all other sides that is to say upon the south-east upon the west and upon the north-west by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said new parish of Tynemouth Priory from the parish of Tynemouth aforesaid crosses the line of the Tynemouth Branch of the North-Eastern Railway at which point the said branch line of railway passes over the course of Spital Dean Burn and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the same branch line of railway for a distance of seventeen chains or thereabouts to a point, at the north-eastern end of the railway

tunnel, in the middle of Hudson-street and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the said street for a distance of four and a-half chains or thereabouts to its junction with George-street and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of twelve chains or thereabouts to its junction with Upper Pearson-street and continuing thence in the same direction along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of five and a-half chains or thereabouts to its junction with Stephenson-street and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the last-named street for a distance of nine and a-half chains or thereabouts to the point where it joins Tynemouth-road and Albion-street and extending thence that is from the said point of junction in a northerly direction and in a straight line for a distance of twenty-seven chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge or culvert which carries Preston-avenue over the stream called or known as Preston Water-course, and extending thence in a direction due north-east and in a straight line for a distance of thirty chains or thereabouts to a point in the Spital Dean Burn aforesaid distant seventeen and a-half chains (measured along the said burn) to the north-west of Spital Dean Bridge the said last-mentioned point being upon the boundary which divides the said parish of Tynemouth from the new parish of Tynemouth Priory aforesaid."

And whereas the said representation has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Newcastle.

THE Board of Trade have received through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Legation at Berne, enclosing a Decree of the Swiss Federal

Council in regard to the control and warranty of manufactured articles of gold and silver. This Decree provides that the standard designations marked at the Swiss Assay Offices on gold and silver work are to indicate in decimal fractions the degree of fineness of the metal as shown in the Decree. For gold, however, there may be admitted the following carat marks:—

18 "karats," or $\frac{18}{24}$ k., for the standard 0.750.

14 "karats," or $\frac{14}{24}$ k., for the standard 0.583.

To facilitate the introduction in Switzerland of the decimal or millesimal marking, existing marks are also to be allowed until the 30th of June, 1885.

Copies of the marks may be seen at the Harbour Department of the Board of Trade on any week day between the hours of twelve and four.

No. 1633.

Circular from the Imperial Royal Maritime Government to all Officials and Functionaries stationed in the Harbour and Maritime Sanitation Departments.

By an Order from the Ministry of Commerce, dated this day, the Maritime Government decrees:

The observation during five days, ordered by the Government Circular of the 15th of December, 1884, No. 12,007, for vessels arriving with a clean bill of health, and under normal conditions, from the ports of Algeria, Tunis, Italy, and Spain, as well as the medical inspection of arrivals from the ports of France, ordered by the Government Circular of the 18th of January of this year, No. 724, and also the observation of twenty-four hours ordered by the Government Circular of the 8th instant, No. 1,406, for arrivals from the East Indies, when the voyage has been under normal circumstances and with a clean bill of health, are all repealed.

The present regulation will come into force with regard to all vessels of the above-named nations which now undergo a quarantine of five days.
