The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the fourth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas in order that the payment of Naval and Greenwich Hospital Pensions, Gratuities, and Allowances, shall be administered by us, it has been enacted, by an Act passed in the 47th and 48th years of Your Majesty's reign, entitled the ‘Naval Pension Act 1884,’ that any reference in the ‘Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act 1865,’ the ‘Navy and Marines (Property of Deceased) Act 1865,’ or the ‘Admiralty (Powers, &c.) Act, 1865’ to a pension or to money payable by the Admiralty shall be construed to include a Naval Pension, and a Greenwich Hospital Pension, Gratuity, or Allowance, or any sum due on account thereof.

“And whereas by the aforesaid ‘Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act 1865’ it was enacted that all pensions, grants, or other allowances in the nature thereof shall be paid in such manner and subject to such conditions as might from time to time be directed by Your Majesty's Order in Council.

“And whereas having had under our consideration the question of the best mode of effecting the payment of the said Naval and Greenwich Hospital Pensions we are of opinion that it would be advisable that they should be paid by means of Money Orders issued by us, or in such other manner as may from time to time be found advisable.

“We do therefore most humbly submit that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to direct that from the first day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, any sums due on account of any Naval or Greenwich Hospital Pensions, Gratuities, or Allowances to any persons resident in

Your Majesty's United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland or elsewhere shall be paid by means of Post Office Money Orders issued by us under such regulations as may be found necessary, or in such other manner as may be considered by us advisable for the interests of Your Majesty's Service, and that the audit of such payments shall also be effected by us.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have given their assent to this proposal.”

Her Majesty having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled “An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy,” after reciting that “Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may in some instances with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes,” it is, amongst other things, enacted, “That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the Archbishop that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place, or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be

“annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous
 “or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes: and the said Archbishop or
 “Bishop shall draw up a scheme in writing (the
 “scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the
 “said Archbishop for his consideration) describing
 “the mode in which it appears to him that the
 “alteration may best be effected, and how the
 “changes consequent on such alteration in respect
 “to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes,
 “rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates,
 “and payments, and in respect to patronage and
 “rights to pews, may be made with justice to all
 “parties interested: and if the patron or patrons
 “of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such
 “alteration shall consent in writing under his or
 “their hands to such scheme, or to such modification
 “thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full
 “consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any
 “such scheme or modification thereof, and shall
 “certify the same and such consent as aforesaid,
 “by his report to Her Majesty in Council, it
 “shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to
 “make an Order for carrying such scheme, or
 “modification thereof, as the case may be, into
 “effect.

And whereas William, Lord Archbishop of York, hath pursuant to the enactment aforesaid made a report, dated the twenty-third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, to Her Majesty in Council in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“To the QUEEN’s Most Excellent Majesty
 in Council.

“The undersigned William Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan in pursuance of the sixth and twenty-sixth section of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Your Majesty’s reign chapter 106 hereby reports to Your Majesty in Council.

“That there is in the city of York in the diocese of York a certain place district and civil parish known as the parish of St. Nicholas the boundaries whereof are well-known and defined.

“That there is in the said city of York the vicarage and parish of St. Lawrence.

“That the said place district or parish of St. Nicholas immediately adjoins the said parish of St. Lawrence in the said city of York.

“That the said parish of St. Nicholas was formerly a benefice and parish but at the time of the siege of York in the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred and forty-four the church of the said parish and ancient benefice became ruined and is now demolished since which time the parishioners of St. Nicholas aforesaid have resorted to the church in the parish of St. Lawrence aforesaid as their parish church.

“That no union ever took place with the said parish of St. Lawrence but marriages and other offices of the church have for many years past been celebrated for the inhabitants of such place district or parish in the church of the said parish of St. Lawrence, York.

“That according to the last census the population of the said parish of St. Lawrence was six thousand seven hundred and thirty-three and that of the said parish of St. Nicholas was one thousand six hundred and seventeen.

“That there is no endowment whatever belonging to the said place district or parish of St. Nicholas.

“That the net annual value of the said vicarage of St. Lawrence is three hundred pounds.

“That the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. Peter at York are the patrons of the said vicarage of St. Lawrence and the Venerable Robert Jarratt Crosthwaite, Archdeacon of the Archdeaconry of York is the vicar of the same vicarage and they are consenting parties to the annexation hereinafter proposed.

“That it appears to the said Archbishop that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament passed in the session holden in the first and second years of Your Majesty’s reign chapter 106 the said place district and parish of St. Nicholas may be advantageously annexed to and united with for ecclesiastical purposes the said parish of St. Lawrence as by this means the parochial system would be extended to the inhabitants of the said place district or parish of St. Nicholas who are at present deprived of its advantages.

“That pursuant to the directions contained in the before-mentioned Act the said Archbishop has prepared a scheme in writing appended to this report describing the mode in which it appears to him that the said union and consolidation may be best effected with justice to all parties and how the changes consequent thereupon may be made with justice to all parties interested and the said Archbishop being on full consideration and enquiry satisfied with such scheme he doth by this report to Your Majesty in Council certify the same to Your Majesty together with the consents in writing to the said scheme of the patrons and the incumbent of the benefice to be affected to the intent that Your Majesty in Council in case it may be thought expedient and proper so to do may make an Order for carrying such scheme into effect.

“As witness the hand of the said Archbishop this twenty-third day of February one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five. “*W. Ebor.*”

And whereas the scheme and consents referred to in the said Archbishop’s report are in the words following:—

“The SCHEME.

“That the parish of St. Nicholas in the city of York shall be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of St. Lawrence in the same city.

“That the said parish of St. Nicholas shall be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish and vicarage of St. Lawrence and the incumbent of such vicarage shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

“That all fees and payments arising from baptisms, churchings, marriages, and all other ecclesiastical offices solemnized and performed in respect of the said parish of St. Nicholas and all such other ecclesiastical dues offerings and emoluments usually payable to the incumbent of a parish or benefice as shall arise in or in respect of the said parish of St. Nicholas shall henceforth belong to and be received by the incumbent of the said vicarage of St. Lawrence.

“That no alteration shall be made as to the patronage of the said vicarage of St. Lawrence and the said parish of St. Nicholas.

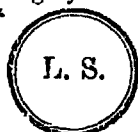
“CONSENTS.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such enquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give direc-

tions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the sixth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend George Lord Bishop of Salisbury as Bishop of the diocese within which are situate the vicarage of Coombe Bissett in the county of Wilts and the vicarage of Homington in the same county having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed one thousand five hundred persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that the said Lord Bishop is the patron or person entitled to present or collate to the vicarage of Coombe Bissett the same being now vacant and the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Sarum are the patrons or persons entitled to present to the said vicarage of Homington the same being also now vacant and that they respectively consent to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of each of the said benefices with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to us the said Archbishop against such union and no sufficient cause has in our opinion been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury our inquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes and for declaring that the patronage of such united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the Lord Bishop of Salisbury his successors and assigns and the Dean and Chapter of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Sarum their successors and assigns in an alternate course or succession and that the first turn of presentation to the said united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the said Dean and Chapter.

"As witness our hand this sixth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five. "*Edw. Cantuar.*"

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and

with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the vicarage of Coombe Bissett, situate in the county of Wilts, and diocese of Salisbury, and the vicarage of Homington, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to direct that the patronage of such united benefice shall be exercised by the respective patrons in an alternate course or succession, and that the first turn of presentation shall belong to and be exercised by the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Sarum, as patrons of the said vicarage of Homington.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of the Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," after reciting that, "Whereas from the increase of population, or from other circumstances, it may be expedient that two or more benefices which have been heretofore united or which may be hereafter united under the provisions of this Act should be disunited," it is amongst other things enacted, "That when two or more benefices shall have been united, or may be hereafter united into one benefice, and with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop of the Province, that one or more of the benefices within his diocese, of which such united benefice shall consist, may be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion, the said Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully dissolved, so far as respects such benefice or benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before certifying such inquiry to Her Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement, in writing, of the facts, and in all other cases a copy, in writing, of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church or in some public and conspicuous place in each of the benefices forming part of the united benefice, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may within such six weeks show cause, in writing, under his, her, or their hands to the said Archbishop against any such disunion; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent, when the patron's consent is necessary, to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty to issue an Order for separating such last-mentioned benefice or benefices from such united benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage of the several patrons, if there be more than one patron, and such Order shall be registered in the registry of the diocese to which such united benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar of such diocese, immediately on the receipt thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, and thereupon immediately if such united benefice

"shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such union shall be ipso facto dissolved, so far only as regards such benefice or benefices so proposed to be separated from such united benefice, but in all other respects shall remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward such last-mentioned benefice or benefices shall be and be deemed and taken to be a separate and distinct benefice or benefices to all intents and purposes whatever as if no such union had taken place, and the patron or patrons thereof shall and may according to the terms of such Order present or nominate thereto respectively, and so from time to time upon each and every avoidance of the same: Provided always, that no benefices which have been united for more than sixty years before the passing of this Act shall be disunited without the consent in writing of the patron or patrons thereof."

And whereas it is also enacted that "It shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council, on the recommendation of the Archbishop of the Province, with the consent of the patron or patrons of such benefices respectively (such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons) to assign and attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges, or other endowments or emoluments belonging to or arising or accruing within the limits of such united benefice to each of such benefices respectively, as to Her Majesty in Council should seem fit, notwithstanding such proportion of glebe land, tithes, rent-charges, moduses, or other endowments or emoluments, or any part thereof, might not arise or accrue within the limits of the benefice to which the same should be so assigned and attached as aforesaid, or might not have belonged thereto, and also to divide and apportion between such benefices all such charges and outgoings as before the disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole united benefice."

And whereas on the sixteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln made a representation to His Grace Edward White, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, in the words following that is to say:—

"To the Most Reverend Edward White Lord Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury.

"I Christopher Lord Bishop of Lincoln do hereby represent to Your Grace that it appears to me that the disunion of the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Hatcliffe and the perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale in the county and diocese of Lincoln by the separation of the perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale from the rectory of Hatcliffe may be made with advantage to the interests of religion.

"Witness my hand this sixteenth day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four.

And whereas on the thirty-first day of October one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four the Lord Archbishop enquired into the circumstances of the case.

And whereas on the fifth day of March one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five the said Lord Archbishop of Canterbury certified to Her Majesty in Council as follows that is to say:—

"To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

"We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

"That the Right Reverend Christopher late Lord Bishop of Lincoln as Bishop of the diocese within which is situate the united benefice consisting of the rectory of Hatcliffe and the perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale in the county of Lincoln having represented unto us that the disunion of the said united benefice by the separation of the perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale from the rectory of Hatcliffe may be made with advantage to the interests of religion we enquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully dissolved and that the Right Reverend James Lord Bishop of Manchester being in right of his bishoprick the patron or person entitled to present to the said united benefice if the same were now vacant consents to the proposed disunion.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish church of Hatcliffe and in a public and conspicuous place in the parish of West Ravendale (the parish church being in ruins) with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such disunion and no such cause has been shown.

"The representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln our enquiry into the circumstances of the case, the reply thereto the consent in writing of the patron and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the enquiry and consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for separating the said perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale from the said rectory of Hatcliffe and in accordance with the consent in writing of the patron above referred to we recommend that each benefice shall retain its own original endowments and emoluments and bear its own charges and outgoings.

"As witness our hand this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five. *Edw. Cantuar.*"

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council by and with the advice of Her said Council is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said united benefice, consisting of the rectory of Hatcliffe and the perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale shall be disunited by separating the said perpetual curacy or vicarage of West Ravendale from the said rectory of Hatcliffe.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, to assign and attach to each of such benefices respectively its own original endowments and emoluments, and to direct that each benefice shall bear its own original charges and outgoings. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of

Her Majesty, chapter fifty, and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England in pursuance of the Act of the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Your Majesty chapter fifty and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Your Majesty chapter one hundred and twenty-four have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of two benefices in the diocese of Saint Asaph namely, the benefice (being a rectory) of Llandyssil, in the county of Montgomery, and the benefice (being a rectory) of Erbistock, in the counties of Denbigh and Flint, by way of exchange for the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of two benefices in the diocese of Llandaff, namely, the benefice (being a vicarage) of Llanblethian, with the chapels of Cowbridge and Welsh St. Donat annexed, in the county of Glamorgan, and the benefice (being a vicarage) of Llantrisant in the said county of Glamorgan.

"Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said two benefices of Llandyssil and Erbistock and each of them is vested in the Bishop of the diocese of Llandaff and his successors.

"And whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said two benefices of Llanblethian (with Cowbridge and Welsh Saint Donat) and Llantrisant, is vested in the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Gloucester and their successors.

"And whereas the Right Reverend Richard, now Bishop of the said diocese of Llandaff, and the Very Reverend Edward Henry Bickersteth, now Dean of the said Cathedral Church of Gloucester, and the Chapter of the same church, have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said four benefices and of the churches thereof respectively may be assigned and transferred by way of exchange in manner hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due enquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative values of the said benefices and patronage and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty that the circumstances and present values of the said benefices respectively are as set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

and Erbistock, and the churches thereof respectively now vested in the said Richard Bishop of Llandaff and his successors as aforesaid, shall be assigned and transferred from him the said Bishop and from his successors and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Gloucester and their successors for ever, and that in exchange for the same, the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to each of the said two benefices of Llanblethian (with Cowbridge and Welsh Saint Donat) and Llantrisant, and the churches thereof respectively, now vested as aforesaid in

the said Dean and Chapter of the said Cathedral Church of Gloucester and their successors shall thereupon and thenceforth be assigned and transferred from them the said Dean and Chapter and from their successors, and shall be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Richard Bishop of the diocese of Llandaff and his successors for ever.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of either of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

within any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial; shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided always, that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered; provided also, that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas the Right Honourable Sir William Vernon Harcourt, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the parish hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial ground should be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous consent of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with certain modifications :

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-seventh day of January last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the twelfth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, and such Order has been published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed, as required by the said Act :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no new burial ground shall be opened in the undermentioned parish without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials in the said parish shall be discontinued, except as herein otherwise directed, as follows, viz. :—

RICHMOND.—Forthwith and wholly in the parish church of Richmond, in the county of York ; and also in the churchyard after the first November, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, except as follows :—

(a) In such partly walled graves as are now existing in the churchyard, provided that the earth above them can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

(b.) In such earthen graves now existing in the churchyard as can be opened to the depth of five feet without exposing coffins or disturbing human remains, burials may be allowed of so many of the relations of those interred therein at the date of this Order as can be buried at or below that depth.

Wycombe Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Wycombe Union, in the counties of Buckingham and Oxford ;—

ART. 114.—Subject to the regulations in force for the time being, prescribing "attendance" at Workhouse Schools for the purpose of the First Schedule to the Elementary Education Act, 1876, the children who have attained the age of five years shall be instructed during at least eighteen hours in every week in reading, writing, and arithmetic, and the principles of the Christian religion, and such other instruction shall be imparted to them as may fit them for service and train them to habits of usefulness, industry, and virtue.

Provided, that if the Guardians shall so direct, any child above the age of thirteen years who is in good health, and has been duly certified to have reached the Fourth Standard, or any other Standard which may hereafter be required for a certificate of proficiency for the purpose of employment under the regulations of the Education Department in force for the time being, or who has been out to service and has returned to the School, may be employed upon works of industry for not more than seven hours in each week day. Any such child shall, however, be required to attend the classes for intellectual instruction during three half-days in each week, with a view of ensuring that the proficiency which the child has reached is maintained.

WHEREAS by the Metropolis Management Amendment Act, 1862, Section 41, it is enacted: that "When at any time upon any account taken of the population by the authority of Parliament any of the parishes within the Metropolis not now divided into wards for the purpose of electing vestrymen shall be found to contain more than two thousand rated householders, it shall be lawful for the Metropolitan Board of Works, upon the application in writing of the vestry or of not less than five hundred rated householders of the parish, to divide such parish into wards, and to determine, and set out the number, extent, limits, and boundary lines of such wards, but so nevertheless that no ward shall contain less than five hundred rated householders; and that the whole number of wards shall not exceed eight, and the Metropolitan Board shall apportion among the several wards the number of vestrymen to be elected for such parish, and shall, in assigning the number of vestrymen to each ward, have regard as far as in their judgment is practicable, as well to the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in each ward, as to the aggregate amount of the sums at which all such persons are rated, and the number of vestrymen assigned to each ward shall be a number divisible by three."

And whereas the parish of St. Leonard Bromley is within the limits of the Metropolis as defined by the Metropolis Management Act, 1855, and

is one of the parishes in Part I of Schedule B of that Act, and at the passing of the same Act the parish was not divided into wards.

And whereas not less than five hundred rated householders of the parish of St. Leonard Bromley have applied to us, the Metropolitan Board of Works, to divide the said parish into wards pursuant to the provisions of the said 41st section of the Metropolis Management Amendment Act, 1862.

And whereas it appears from the last account taken of the population by the authority of Parliament that the said parish contains eight thousand one hundred and ten rated householders, and that the number of inhabited houses in the parish is returned at eight thousand two hundred and forty-one, and the rateable annual value of property at two hundred and three thousand six hundred and eighty pounds. Now the Metropolitan Board of Works, having considered the said application, and having ascertained from the said last account taken of the population by the authority of Parliament as contained in the census return for the year 1881, that the number of rated householders for the parish of St. Leonard Bromley is eight thousand one hundred and ten, and having taken into consideration the number of persons rated to the relief of the poor in the same parish, and the aggregate amount of the sums at which all such persons are rated, and all the circumstances connected with such application, doth hereby order that the said parish of St. Leonard Bromley be divided into three wards to be distinguished by the names mentioned in the first column of the undermentioned schedule, that the extent, limits, and boundary lines of such wards shall be those described in the second column of the said schedule, and that the number of vestrymen to be elected for each of the said wards shall be the number mentioned in the third column of the said schedule.

ARTICLE I.—So much of the said Act as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk shall forthwith be applied to and be put in force within the said Parish of Saint Peter's, and the provisions contained in Articles II., III., IV., and V. of this Order shall apply to the Vestry Clerk, for the time being, appointed for that Parish.

ARTICLE II.—The duties of the Vestry Clerk shall be such only of the duties prescribed by Section 7 of the said Act as are specified in the herein-before recited Resolution.

ARTICLE V.—Such remuneration, in the case of an annual salary, shall be considered as accruing from day to day, and be apportionable in respect of time accordingly, in pursuance of the provisions of "The Apportionment Act, 1870," and shall be paid quarterly on the usual Quarter Days in each year, namely, Lady Day, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, and Christmas Day.

ARTICLE VI.—A copy of this Order shall be published in the London Gazette by the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said Parish.
