THE following scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the existing Corporation of Wokingham and of the Local Board of the Local Government District of Wokingham, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in pursuance of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882.

"Whereas by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, it is enacted that where a petition for a charter of incorporation is referred to the Committee of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council and it is proposed by the charter to extend the Municipal Corporations Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter, the said Committee of Council may settle a scheme for the purposes in the said Act named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Act particularised:

"And whereas certain inhabitant householders of the Local Government District of Wokingham, in the county of Berks, have petitioned Her Majesty the Queen praying for the grant of a charter of incorporation:

"And whereas the said petition for a charter has been referred to the Committee of Council, and it is proposed to create the said district a municipal borough and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and by the charter to extend the

Municipal Corporations Acts to the municipal borough to be created by the charter:

"And whereas the existing town of Wokingham (which is included in the said Local Government District) is a place named in the schedule to the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, and the area of the said town is not co-extensive with the area of the municipal borough proposed to be created by the said charter:

"And whereas by the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, it is enacted that nothing in that Act shall prevent the application to any place of any charter applying the Municipal Corporation Acts which Her Majesty may be pleased to grant, or affect anything done in pursuance of those Acts or any scheme thereunder, and shall not affect the operation of any such charter, thing, or scheme, save that nothing in the said Acts or scheme shall authorize the establishment or continuance of any court for the trial of civil actions, and that nothing in that Act shall affect the right to the benefit of any charity, or shall alter or confer any power of altering the defined charitable purposes (if any) to which any property was by law applicable at the passing of that Act:

"And whereas the Local Board of the said District (herein referred to as the Local Board) and the Aldermen and Burgesses of the Town of Wokingham are local authorities within the meaning of Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882:

"And whereas the said Aldermen and Burgesses are a body corporate under and by virtue of certain royal or other charters:

"And whereas it is expedient, right, and just that a Scheme should be settled pursuant to Part XI of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, containing the provisions hereinafter contained:

"Now, therefore, the said Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby order and declare as follows:—

"1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Wokingham Scheme, 1885.

"2. This Scheme shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the charter above referred to or at the date of its confirmation by Parliament or Order in Council whichever is later. This date is herein mentioned as the 'commencement of this Scheme.'

"3. The Aldermen and Burgesses of the Town of Wokingham are herein referred to as the 'Old

Corporation.' The corporation of the municipal borough created by the charter above-mentioned is herein referred to as the 'New Corporation.' The Local Board of the said Local Government District of Wokingham is herein referred to as the "Local Board."

"4. The municipal borough created by the charter above referred to shall be and is hereby placed immediately on, from, and after the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough aforesaid within the jurisdiction of the Council of the said municipal borough as the

Sanitary Authority.

"5. Immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme, the Old Corporation shall be and the same is hereby abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist, together with all the franchises, rights, privileges, powers, jurisdiction, authority, and exemptions of the said Old Corporation, and its members and officers as such of what kind soever they may be which have no pecuniary value.

"6. Immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Local Board shall be and the same is hereby abolished, and shall thenceforth be dissolved and cease to exist, together with all its jurisdiction, powers, and authority whatso-

ever.

"7. All property of any kind whatsoever possessed by or vested in the Old Corporation, or any person or body in trust for it, or any of its members as such, or applicable for the benefit or under the direction of the Old Corporation, or any of its members as such, which property is within the meaning of the second sub-section of section 4 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, applicable to charity or applicable to defined charitable purposes at the passing of that Act, shall immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme vest in persons to be designated the Trustees of Municipal Charities in the Borough of Wokingham, the first of whom shall be William Goodchild of Waterloo, Wokingham, Gentleman; Thomas Manley Wescott, of East Heath, Wokingham, Gentleman; Tyndale William Heelas, of Wokingham, Draper; William Moorcock, of Wokingham, Gentleman, and Henry Kemp, of Wokingham, Gentleman, jointly to be by them applied in the manner in which and for the purposes for which such property, or the income thereof, was before and at the passing of that Act applicable.

"6 8. All property other than that in paragraph 7 hereof referred to, possessed by, or vested in the Old Corporation, or any person or body in trust for it, or any of its members as such, or applicable for the benefit or under the direction of the Old Corporation, or any of its members as such, shall vest in the New Corporation, and (save as is hereinafter expressly directed) shall by the New Corporation be held and applied exclusively for the municipal purposes of the municipal borough created as aforesaid, and the public benefit of the inhabitants of the said borough.

"9. All market property possessed by or vested in the Old Corporation, and all liabilities attaching to the Old Corporation in respect of the same shall immediately from and after the commencement of this Scheme, vest in and attach to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said Municipal Borough acting by the Council as the

Sanitary Authority.

"10. All liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the Old Corporation, or the property thereof, shall attach to and be enforceable against the New Corporation so far only as the property vested in it under paragraph 8 may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

"11. Any investigation, legal proceeding, or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty, or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the Old Corporation before the commencement of this Scheme may be continued, prosecuted, or enforced by the New Corporation or against the New Corporation so far only as the property vested in it under paragraph 8 may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

"12. All debts, arrears of rates, or other sums, which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme were due or owing to or by the Local Board, may be recovered, levied, and enforced, by or against the New Corporation, as nearly as may be as they could have been recovered, levied, or

enforced by or against the Local Board.

"13. The term property in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common or commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books, and documents, all rights, all claims to relief, and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.

"14. The term market property in this Scheme means and includes rights to market tolls and all franchises, privileges, and rights relating to markets, and all lands and premises used for the purpose of markets."

from time to time remain unpaid, six of which

instalments now remain unpaid.

"And whereas it is equitable and expedient that the liability to repay the sum of £3 4s.  $4\frac{1}{4}d$ ., in respect of each of the said yearly instalments, with a like proportion of the interest on such balance of the principal money as shall from time to time remain unpaid, which sum and interest the said parish would have been liable to contribute in each year to the highway board in respect of the said instalments, if the charter had not been granted and this Scheme had not been made, and all other liabilities and property attaching to or vested in the said highway board, so far as the same relate to the parish of Llanfyllin, should be transferred from the highway board to the New Corporation in manner hereinafter provided.

### TREASURY WARRANI.

WHEREAS by our Warrant bearing even date herewith, provisions have been made for the conveyance by post of parcels between the United Kingdom as therein defined, and British India as therein also defined. We, the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers conferred on us by the 14th section of the Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, made on the recommendation of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs and of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by their respectively signing the same), order, direct, and declare as follows :-

1. Every parcel posted in British India and intended to be delivered at any place in the United Kingdom, and every parcel posted in the United Kingdom and intended to be delivered in British India, shall be accompanied by, or have affixed to it, a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the parcel in such manner and form, and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-

General may prescribe.

2. Every parcel shall either at the port of departure from or arrival in the United Kingdom as the case may be or at such other place as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General shall direct, be produced by an officer appointed in that behalf by the Postmaster-General to the proper officer of Customs, and if the officer of Customs require it shall thereupon be opened by the officer of the Post Office who is hereby empowered and authorized to open the same for Customs examination; and in any case where the contents of a parcel are found not to agree with the declaration which accompanies or is affixed to it, such parcel and all its contents shall be deemed to be goods dealt with contrary to the Customs Acts, and shall be sent to the Queen's Warehouse at the Custom House, London, or to such other place as the Commissioners of Customs may appoint for that purpose.

3. The officer aforesaid of the Post Office shall deliver to the proper officer of the Customs such entries of the contents, or such other documents as the Commissioners of Customs shall prescribe.

4. If the addressee of a parcel addressed to the United Kingdom refuses to pay any duty payable under the Customs Acts in respect of the goods

contained in such parcel, the Postmaster-General may retain the parcel, and may either pay to the Commissioners of Customs the duty payable, and recover the same from the addressee or other person liable to pay the same, in the same manner as if such duty were a rate of postage, or may, at the expiration of seven days from the day on which such parcel was presented at the place of address, send the parcel to the Queen's Warehouse at the Custom House, London, or to such other place as the Commissioners of Customs shall appoint for that purpose.

5. Any parcel sent by the Postmaster-General to the Queen's Warehouse or other place appointed as aforesaid, under the provisions of this Warrant together with all goods contained therein, shall be treated as goods dealt with contrary to the

Customs Acts.

6. The duties payable on goods contained in any parcel to which this Warrant applies, and which may not be sent to the Queen's Warehouse or other appointed place as aforesaid, shall be paid over by the Postmaster-General to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officers, or shall be transferred to the account of the said Commissioners at the Bank of England, at such times and in such manner as shall be from time to time agreed upon between the two departments.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on

the 1st day of July, 1885.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WE, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant made on the representation of Her Majesty's Posmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners order, direct, and declare as follows :-

Interpretation Clause.

1.—(1.) The expressions "Parcels" and "Parcel" in this Warrant respectively mean any postal packet, which is posted or tendered for transmission by post as a parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same, in the United Kingdom, addressed to British India, or posted or tendered for tranmission by post as aforesaid in British India addressed to the United Kingdom.
(2.) The expression "British India" includes

Aden, the whole Continent of India and British

Burmah.

(3.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

(4.) The expression "Lord Lieutenant" means the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being.

(5.) The expression "arms" includes any cannon, gun, revolver, pistol, and any description of fire-arms, also any sword, cutlass, pike, and bayonet, also any part of any arms as so defined. (6.) The expression "ammunition" includes bullets, gunpowder, nitro-glycerine, dynamite, gun cotton, and every other explosive substance whether fitted for use with any arms or otherwise.

(7.) The expression "prohibited district in Ireland" means any place in Ireland in respect of which the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council in Ireland, may have made or may make orders for prohibiting or regulating therein the sale or importation of arms and ammunition.

#### Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

2. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant any parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight seven pounds.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post under this Warrant there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage (that is to say):—

In the United Kingdom-

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight, one shilling.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding seven pounds in weight for the first pound, one shilling; and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight, one shilling.

In British India-

On every Parcel not exceeding one pound in

weight, eight annas.

On every Parcel exceeding one pound and not exceeding seven pounds in weight, for the first pound eight annas; and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight, eight annas.

Prepayment.

4. The postage on Parcels shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, and such repayment shall in the United Kingdom be effected by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.

5. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland, on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by Postmaster-General

by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

6. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall, in the United Kingdom, be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

7. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say:—

(1.) It shall be the duty of the person bringing

a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.

(2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.

- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall be paid by means of postage stamps affixed to such Parcel, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon shall have been properly paid: and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration and without being so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon properly paid as aforesaid, such Parcel shall, except as hereinafter mentioned, be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.
- 8. Any packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say:—

(1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as

the case may be).

(2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, the same may be forwarded to its destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of 3d. in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may, if he think fit, from time to time authorize such of his officers as he may direct, to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Retention of Parcels at Postes Restantes.

10. Any Parcel addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom "to be called for" shall if not called for, remain in such office for a period of one week after the date of the arrival of such Parcel thereat, and shall then be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels for Places beyond limits of free Delivery.

11. If the place of address in the United Kingdom of any Parcel be beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district to which the same may be forwarded by post, such Parcel shall be detained at the nearest Post Office until an opportunity of delivering the same shall

occur, or in default of any such opportunity until a period of one week shall have elapsed from the time of the receipt of the Parcel at such Post Upon the expiration of such period without such Parcel having been called for such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels addressed to Ships.

12. Any Parcel addressed to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom shall if from any cause such Parcel cannot be delivered at such ship, be detained at the Post Office at such port for a period of one calendar month, and if not delivered at the expiration of that time such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

13. With regard to

(a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place beyond the limits of free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port of the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within the respective times in this Warrant specified in that behalf; and

(b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or

for any other sufficient reason.

The following provisions shall apply, that is to

(1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may if necessary

be there opened and examined.

(2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given to the sender by the Post Office of the country in which the Parcel was posted, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender's agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be returned to him by post, in either case upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.

(3.) Where the name and address of the sender cannot be ascertained from the Parcel, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct), and notice shall be given to the Post Office of the country in which the Parcel was posted, that the Parcel will, in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender's agent, or be returned to the sender by post.

(4.) In any case the notice shall state, that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who, in the Postmaster-General's judgment, is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

(5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.

- (6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act,
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender or his agent except upon payment by him of the sum of one penny in respect of every day or part of a day during which the Parcel remains at the place appointed as aforesaid after the expiration of three calendar months from the day on which the Parcel has arrived at such place.

(8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and all other charges to which

the Parcel has become liable.

(9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.

- (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.
- (11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within the United Kingdom, to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

15. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery, as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

#### Prohibitions.

. 16. There shall not be conveyed or tendered be returned to the senders thereof, and in so I for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of

or containing any indecent or obscene picture, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, print, book, or card, or any indecent or obscene article or thing of any other kind, or any Parcel having thereon, or on the cover thereof, any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which prima facie appears to be, or which any Officer of the Post Office may have reasonable cause to suspect to be a Parcel within the description aforesaid, the same shall be detained, opened, and examined, and if on such examination it be found to infringe this or any other of the Regulations contained in this or any other Treasury Warrant relating to the Post Office, it may be dealt with and disposed of in any manner which may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

17. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post:—

(1.) Any Parcel the value of which shall amount to the sum of £50.

- (2.) Any Parcel containing any substance, material, article, or thing of any kind whatsoever, which might in the course of transmission through the post, be or become, or be rendered injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or any other person who may deal with such Parcel, or to any bag, basket, box, or other receptacle in or by which such parcel may be conveyed by post, or to any other Parcel or other contents of any such receptacle.
- (3.) Any Parcel consisting of or enclosing any bladder or other membraneous substance containing a liquid of any kind, or any thing perishable.

(4.) Any Parcel containing a live animal of

any kind whatsoever.

(5.) Any Parcel which either from the nature of the contents thereof, or from the absence of proper packing or covering, is, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General or his officers, likely to injure any person in the course of the conveyance of the Parcel through the post, or any receptacle in or by which such Parcel may be conveyed by post, or any other Parcel or any other contents of such receptacle.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

18: There shall not be posted or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or containing more than one Parcel or other Postal Packet, where any one of such Packets is intended for delivery to a person other than the addressee of such Parcel, and if any such Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels, may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets, may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of, as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

19. There shall not be conveyed or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post in or to any prohibited district in Ireland, any Parcel containing arms or amunition, and any such Parcel if posted or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post as aforesaid, may be detained and opened and

returned to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with according to law.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

20. In any case not hereinbefore expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for safety of Parcels.

21. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

22. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that hy which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.

23. Nothing contained in or done under, or in pursuance of, this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss of or damage to any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

24. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

25. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

26. This Warrant shall come into operation the 1st day of July, 1885.

GENERAL ORDER of the Local Government Board: (Altering General Accounts Order): Appointment of Stocktaker:—

#### Boston Union.

To the Guardians of the Poor of the Boston Union, in the County of Lincoln;—And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by General Orders of the Poor Law Board, dated respectively the 14th day of January, 1867, and the 16th day of February, 1869, addressed (among others) to the Guardians of the Poor of the said Boston Union, it is required that certain Accounts relating to the provisions, clothing, and other stores in the Workhouse, when made up and balanced, shall be submitted to the Visiting Committee or to some Member thereof, who shall enter a memorandum at the foot of such Accounts, certifying to the same having been submitted, and to the correctness, or otherwise, of such Accounts as regards the stock remaining in store;

And whereas it is expedient to empower the said Guardians to appoint a competent person or persons to examine the stores at the Workhouse belonging to the said Union, and to perform the other duties hereinafter set forth;

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

ARTICLE I.—The Guardians of the Poor of the said Boston Union may, as and when they shall think fit to do so, appoint a competent person or persons to perform the duties of a Stocktaker as hereinafter set forth.

ARTICLE II.—Every such appointment shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Regulations as to the appointment of Officers in force in the said Union for the time being.

ARTICLE III.—The Guardians shall pay to the person or persons appointed under this Order such salary or remuneration as We may from time to time direct or approve.

ARTICLE IV.—Every person appointed under this Order shall hold office until he shall die, or resign, or be dismissed by the Guardians, subject to Our consent, or be removed by Us, or be proved to be insane by evidence which We may deem sufficient; and the said Guardians shall give notice to Us of every such death or resignation, and state the cause of such resignation, so far as it may be known to them.

Provided nevertheless, that the Guardians may, if they think fit, with Our assent appoint a person or persons to discharge the duties hereby prescribed for the Stocktaker, for a limited period

only.

ARTICLE V.—The Stocktaker shall, on the day next after the termination of each quarter, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stores at the Workhouse and compare the same with the quantities of stock remaining in store as shown by the entries in the proper columns in the accounts termed respectively the "Quarterly Balance of the Provisions Account" and the "Quarterly Balance of the Necessaries and Miscellaneous Account."

He shall also, on the day next after the termination of each half-year, and at any other time when required by the Guardians to do so, examine the stock of clothing at the Workhouse and compare the same with the balance appearing in the Accounts termed respectively the "Clothing Materials Receipt and Conversion Account" and the "Clothing Receipt and Expenditure Account."

ARTICLE VI.—After making the examination

ARTICLE VI.—After making the examination and comparison referred to in Article V, the Stocktaker, if he find the stock to be correct, shall sign a certificate at the foot of each of the aforesaid Accounts in the following form:—

"Submitted to me this day of 188, and found to be correct as regards the quantities of stock remaining in store.

" (Signed) "Stocktaker."

If he find the stock to be in any respect incorrect, he shall make such addition to the said certificate as he may deem necessary, specifying the particulars in which he finds the quantities of stock to be incorrectly stated.

ARTICLE VII.—The Master of the Workhouse shall, when required by the Stocktaker to do so, on the days and at the times referred to in Article V, submit to him the Stores and Accounts therein mentioned, and render to him such assistance as may be necessary for the purpose of such examination and comparison as aforesaid.

ARTICLE VIII.—The Master of the Workhouse shall lay each of the said Accounts before the Guardians at their next meeting after the date of the entry therein of any such certificate as aforesaid.

ARTICLE IX.—So long as a Stocktaker is appointed it shall not be necessary for the Visiting Committee to examine the stores or to enter in any Account the memorandum required by the above-cited Order dated the fourteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1883, it is enacted that on and after the 25th day of March, 1886, or such later day not after the 29th day of September, 1886, as Her Majesty in Council may in the case of any place or places appoint the following provisions shall apply to each of the places mentioned in the Schedules to that Act to which Her Majesty may not be pleased before the said day to grant a new Charter; that is to say,-

" (a.) The place shall not be a corporate town " or borough, and any municipal or other "corporation thereof existing under any "charter or grant or prescription shall be

ARTICLE III. All liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the Corporation or the property thereof, shall attach to and be enforceable against the Local Board so far only as the property vested in it under Article II may extend to satisfy such liabilities, and no further.

ARTICLE IV. Any investigation, legal proceedings, or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty, or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the Corporation before the commencement of this Scheme may be continued, prosecuted, or enforced by or against the Local Board so far only as the property vested in it under Article II may extend and no further.

ARTICLE V. The term "property" in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common or commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges, and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books, and documents, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in any property so defined.

ARTICLE VI. Nothing contained in, or done under, any of the provisions of this Scheme shall prejudice or injuriously affect the rights and interests of the Crown in the foreshore below

Dalton-in-Furness Electric Lighting.

(Power to the Local Board for the District of Dalton-in-Furness, in the county palatine of Lancaster, to produce, supply, and store Electricity for lighting and other purposes. Power to break up streets and to erect, lay down, provide, and maintain wires and other apparatus and works, acquire lands and other rights, and supply lamps, meters, and fittings. Power to enter into agreements and to demand and recover rents, rates, and charges, &c., and to make regulations as to fittings, &c.)

OTICE is hereby given, that on the 28th day of March, 1885, application was made to the Board of Trade in pursuance of the provisions of the Electric Lighting Act, 1882, for a license to authorise the Local Board for the District of Dalton-in-Furness, in the county palatine of Lancaster (hereinafter called the Local Board). To enable the Local Board to purchase, hold, acquire, or take on lease any lands, or interests, or easements in land, and to utilise in any way that may be deemed expedient any lands or works in the possession of the Local Board or which they are already authorised to purchase or acquire, and to erect, maintain, use, and work upon any such lands all necessary stations, together with all storehouses, engines, engine houses, buildings, machinery, apparatus, works, and appliances for the production, generating, storage, and distribution of electricity.

To authorise the Local Board to manufacture, hire, sell, and let all necessary machines, lamps, accumulators, fittings, plant, machinery, and other matters or things of whatever description required for the purposes aforesaid.

To authorise the Local Board to enter upon any houses, buildings, lands, and premises supplied by them for any purpose relative to such supply.

To authorise the Local Board to take, demand, collect, and recover rates, rents, and charges, and to prescribe the same, and to provide for the revision thereof from time to time.

To authorise the Local Board to purchase, take, hold, work, and use, exclusively or otherwise, patent rights, licenses, and authorities, under letters patent, for themselves or any person or

company licensed or supplied by them, for the use of any inventions, patented or protected processes, inventions, machinery, apparatus, methods, materials, and other things.
