REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE TO BE HELD BY HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS THE PRINCE OF WALES, ON BEHALF OF HER MAJESTY, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command,

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levee, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to His Royal Highness.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented, must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, St. James's Palace, *before twelve o'clock*, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulations that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that an intimation from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, of his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command that no presentations shall be made at Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the

cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to His Royal Highness.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the first session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to abridge the holding of benefices in plurality, and to make better provision for the residence of the clergy," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the Bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, and the aggregate yearly value shall not exceed five hundred pounds, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such enquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to Her Majesty as herein-after directed, cause with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested, that he, she, or

“ they, may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such union ; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to Her Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only ; and it shall be lawful for Her Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant.”

And whereas the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a certificate in writing, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, in the words following, that is to say :—

“ To the QUEEN’s Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

“ We the undersigned Edward White Archbishop of the province of Canterbury Primate of all England and Metropolitan do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council.

“ That the Honourable and Right Reverend John Thomas Lord Bishop of Norwich having represented unto us that the consolidated rectories of Saint Mary and All Saints in Barton Bendish and the rectory of Barton St. Andrew both in the county of Norfolk and diocese of Norwich being contiguous to each other and of which the aggregate population does not exceed four hundred and thirty-seven persons might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice. We enquired into the circumstances of the case.

“ That on such enquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent and that Sir Henry Hanson Berney Baronet being the patron or person entitled to present to the said consolidated rectories of St. Mary and All Saints in Barton Bendish if the same were now vacant and the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain being the patron or person entitled on behalf of Your Majesty to present to the said rectory of Barton St. Andrew the same being now vacant have respectively signified their consent in writing to the union of the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes.

“ That six weeks and upwards before certifying such enquiry and consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed on the principal outer door of the parish churches of St. Mary and St. Andrew and in a public and conspicuous place near the site of the parish church of All Saints the said church having been a long time a ruin with notice to any person or persons interested that he she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against such union and no such cause has been shown.

“ The representation and scheme of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich our enquiry into the circumstances of the case the statement of circumstances in reply thereto the consents in writing

of the patrons and the copies of the representation and notice before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

“ And we the said Archbishop do hereby certify the enquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only and for declaring the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present to the said benefices after the same shall be united into one benefice from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows that is to say : the patronage of and right of presentation to the said benefices when so united shall be alternate in the said Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain and his successors on behalf of Your Most Gracious Majesty and the said Sir Henry Hanson Berney Baronet his heirs and assigns and the first turn or right of presentation to the said united benefice when vacant shall belong to the Lord Chancellor for the time being in right of the Crown.

“ As witness our hand this twenty-ninth day of April one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Now therefore Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated rectories of Saint Mary and All Saints in Barton Bendish, situate in the county of Norfolk and diocese of Norwich, and the rectory of Barton Saint Andrew, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And Her Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased to direct that the patronage of such united benefice shall be exercised by the respective patrons in an alternate course or succession, and that the first turn of presentation to the said united benefice shall belong to and be exercised by the Lord Chancellor for the time being in right of the Crown.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty’s reign, intituled “ An Act further to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England,” it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit :

And whereas Orders in Council have been made directing the discontinuance of burials in the churchyards hereinafter mentioned from the time specified in such Orders ; and whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the time for discontinuing burials in the said churchyards be postponed :

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time for the discontinuance of burials in such churchyards be postponed as follows, viz.:

In the parish churchyard of Alwalton, in the county of Huntingdon, to the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the churchyard of Aberystwith, in the county of Monmouth, to the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the churchyard of Oughtibridge, in the parish of Ecclesfield, in the county of York, to the thirty-first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

In the parish churchyard of Burnham, in the county of Somerset, to the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-six.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. The Area described in the Schedule to this Order is hereby declared to be an Area infected with swine-fever.

2. This Order shall take effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

An Area in the borough of Southport, in the county of Lancaster, comprising the No. 2 Polling Districts of West and Craven Wards in the said borough.

EARL GRANVILLE, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Serajevo, in which he reports that Police Regulations relating to Passports have been issued by the Government of Bosnia and Herzegovina, dated the 17th of April, under which every foreigner residing or travelling in those provinces is required to be provided with a passport from the authorities of his native country, with the necessary visas attached thereto. These regulations, which were to come into force on the 1st of May, were published at Serajevo on the 4th instant.

A translation of the sections which especially concern foreigners is annexed. The other paragraphs refer only to the natives of the provinces.

TRANSLATION of Sections 5-10 of Police Regulation of the 17th of April, 1885, regarding Passports, published at Serajevo, May 4, 1885.

Section 5. Every foreigner staying in the country must be provided with a passport in due form from the authorities of his own country, which must be visé there by an Austrian representative

or consular official, or, in the event of the individual having previously resided in the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy, and having not therefore obtained such a visa, he must procure the visa of the administrative authorities of his last place of residence in the Monarchy.

Foreign passports without the prescribed visa will be considered invalid.

Section 6. Every foreigner is required, as soon as he passes the frontier of the province, personally to show his passport to the nearest administrative authority and to furnish any required information regarding the object, destination, and duration of his journey or residence in the country. The administrative authority must thereupon convince itself of the authenticity of the document and see that the conditions of section 5 have been complied with.

If the foreigner contemplates remaining more than twenty-four hours in the place, his passport must be deposited with the authorities until he quits. Should he pursue his journey further, his passport will be returned to him with the visa of the authorities.

Section 7. Foreigners not entering these provinces direct from a foreign country but who come from any part of the Austro-Hungarian Monarchy, as well as all Austrian subjects, are not obliged to present themselves to the administrative authorities immediately on passing the frontier, but must report themselves to the Prefecture (in Serajevo to the Commissary of Police) of the district where they first break their journey, even if only making a temporary stay.

Section 8. Strangers arriving without a passport, or whose papers do not comply with Sections 5, 6, and 7 of this regulation, if they appear suspicious, will be taken into custody until their identity has been proved, punished according to Section 10, and if they cannot eventually justify their stay in the country will, at the expiration of their punishment be sent across the frontier.

Section 9. Also strangers whose conduct is suspicious, or whose stay in the country appears dangerous to the public peace, can be expelled the country by the district authorities, or by the Commissary of Police of the town of Serajevo, and if necessary sent forcibly across the frontier.

The cause of expulsion must be in any case communicated to the person in writing.

Section 10. Persons disregarding the above regulations will be punished by a fine of 2-500 florins, and with imprisonment for not more than thirty days.

Special General Order.

1. ORDERS have been received to break up

the Suâkin Field Force, and General Lord Wolseley, Commanding-in-Chief in Egypt and the Soudan, in his Special General Order of this date, addressed to the Army, of which this force is a portion, has expressed his approbation in terms which will always be remembered with gratification.

2. I desire, before relinquishing the command which I have had the honour to hold, to convey to all ranks my high appreciation of the soldierlike spirit, gallantry in action, and cheerful endurance of hardship which they have uniformly shown.

3. During the early days of the campaign the work thrown upon officers and men, in every rank and in every department, was severe and unceasing. It was necessary to prepare for the active operations required to overcome the power of a brave and fanatical foe, so as to clear the country for the special objects of the expedition. This work was performed under the harassing conditions of incessant night attacks by a cunning and resolute adversary, entailing constant vigilance and readiness on the part of the whole force.

4. Whether engaged with the enemy or labouring under a burning sun in the deep sand of the desert, often with but a scanty supply of water, the Suâkin Field Force has displayed the true qualities of good soldiers.

5. In the action at Hasheen the enemy was dislodged from his position on the flank of the line of advance, and in the subsequent fight at the zeriba his sudden and deperate onslaught, made with fanatical determination, was repulsed with heavy loss, by the coolness and discipline of British and Indian troops. By the march and operations at Tamai, the main position of Osman Digna was occupied and destroyed, and it was shown to him and to the tribes that he was unable to offer any further serious resistance to our advance.

6. Throughout these operations nothing could have been more admirable than the courage and endurance of the troops.

7. Since then the energies of the force have been employed in the advance to Handoub, Otao, and Tambuk, and in preparing the way for the railway. The bush has been cleared, roads and defences made, and permanent posts formed, while large working parties have been given to the railway, which reached Otao in a little over three weeks after the operations at Tamai had allowed it to be pushed on.

8. Frequent and successful reconnaissances have been made into the enemy's country, and on the 6th instant, in the attack on Takool, Muhammed Adam Sardoun, Osman Digna's chief leader, was surprised and driven from the position he and his followers had taken up.

9. Throughout the campaign the work of the British and Native cavalry has been incessant, and whether in action, in scouting and reconnaissances, or in the protection of convoys, their important duties have been performed in the most admirable manner.

10. The Royal Artillery have added to the reputation of their distinguished regiment, and have adapted themselves quickly and well to the special organization and work required in this country.

11. The Royal Engineers and Queen's Own Madras Sappers and Miners have executed most useful and laborious work in all the many engineering operations required in a land which offers no resources, while they have again shown their value as soldiers in the field.

12. The Infantry, whether British or Native, has

been foremost in fighting and in hard work; and the presence of Her Majesty's Guards has brought out a spirit of generous emulation, which is always conducive to efficiency.

13. The Brigade of Guards has taken its full share of the hard work and fighting. During the period of the railway construction, two battalions of the Guards, with the New South Wales Contingent, were always in the front, and to them fell the heavy duties of cutting through the bush by day and warding off attacks by night.

14. The Guards, Infantry, and Royal Marines have also furnished men to the Mounted Infantry and Camel Corps, both of which have attained remarkable efficiency in a short time, and have proved of the greatest value.

15. The Royal Marines and Royal Marine Artillery, who for so long a time have manfully endured the enervating climate of the Soudan, showed by their conduct in action in the recent operations that they had preserved the characteristics which have always so greatly distinguished these fine corps.

16. The New South Wales Contingent has furnished a bright example of the martial qualities of the Anglo-Saxon race, and has shown to all the latent military strength of the Empire. The soldierlike spirit which has pervaded all ranks of the Contingent is the theme of universal admiration, and it will be a valued remembrance to all who served in the Suâkin Field Force, to recall this, the first time when their fellow countrymen from the colonies served and shared with them the fortunes of a campaign.

17. The Indian Contingent came to the Soudan admirably equipped and organized, and has fully justified all that was expected of such a force, and whether in fighting, in marching, or in camp, it could not be surpassed in conduct and appearance, or in discipline and efficiency.

18. My best thanks are due to the Staff Officers of the force for their able assistance and for the self-devotion with which they have worked in this trying climate.

19. The administrative departments of the Army, the Commissariat, Transport, and Ordnance, upon which the mobility and effective condition of an army so greatly depend, have been everything that could be desired. The sick and wounded have been well attended to at all times by the Medical Department, and have been supplied with every comfort. The Corps of Army Signallers have proved of the highest value. The Chaplains have been unremitting in attention to their duties. The Pay and Veterinary Departments have been well managed and have given satisfaction.

20. To the Royal Navy we owe a debt of gratitude for heavy and unceasing labour in aid of the land operations, and their gallantry, ever conspicuous.

21. In the force which I have had the honour to command, the highest discipline has been maintained, crime has been practically unknown, and the labour of command has been thereby greatly lightened. Amidst the regrets I feel at laying down the command of this splendid force, there is the feeling that I shall ever recollect with pride my association with such a body of troops.

In now bidding it farewell, I thank every officer, non-commissioned officer and man, for loyal help, and I wish to one and all success and fortune in following the path of duty to our Queen and country.

Now, therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in exercise and execution of the power or authority in that behalf contained in the Act of the eighth and ninth years of Her present Majesty, chapter seventy, and in the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said Majesty, chapter fifty-five, and of all other powers or authorities in anywise enabling us in the same behalf, do, by this instrument under our common seal, with the consents (testified as hereinafter mentioned) of the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, and of the said Thomas Carpenter, hereby declare that the said new church of Saint Paul, situate within the said new parish of Adlington, and duly consecrated as aforesaid shall be, and the same is hereby, substituted for the said old parish church (dedicated by the name of Christ Church as aforesaid) of the same new parish, and that such new church shall henceforth be the parish church of the said new parish of Adlington, in lieu of the said old parish church called Christ Church, as fully in all respects as if the said new church of Saint Paul so hereby substituted, had been originally the parish church of the same new parish.

And we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in further pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities aforesaid, and with such consents as aforesaid (testified as hereinafter mentioned), do hereby transfer all the endowments, emoluments, and rights of or belonging to the said old parish church (dedicated by the name of Christ Church as aforesaid) of the said new parish of Adlington, or of or belonging to the Vicar or Incumbent thereof to the said new church of Saint Paul (now being by virtue of these presents, the parish church of the said new parish of Adlington), and to the Vicar or Incumbent thereof, and his successors for ever.

In witness whereof to these presents we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have set our common seal, and the said James, Bishop of the said diocese of Manchester, has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal, and the said Thomas Carpenter has set his hand and affixed his seal this seventh day of May, in the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Should these particulars furnished by the applicant not agree with the facts recorded on the War Office documents relating to the deceased soldier, the applicant will be so informed; but should they agree therewith, then within three calendar months the Secretary of State will furnish the applicant with the usual requirements needed for the proof of the alleged relationship.

The application must be authenticated by the signature of the applicant, and his name should be affixed in the presence of the clergyman, or one of the churchwardens of the parish, or a Justice of the Peace; the applicant's address, with the name of the post town, must also be clearly stated. No personal application can receive attention.

Further lists will from time to time be published, and therefore it will facilitate the applicant's inquiries to give the number and date of the notice in which the deceased soldier's name appeared.
