Venice, March 18.

The Letters from *C. Fabius* confirm, That the Serasquier of the *Minea* (who was sent for to Court by the new Visier *Kapurlu*) had in his march, with 3 or 400 men, towards *Adriople*, been surpris'd by the Bulgarians, and most of his men cut in pieces, he himself escaping with great difficulty. The Turks have put some little Succor into *Napoli di Malvasia*, the Garison whereof was before reduced to great necessity, and without a fresh supply they will not, as our last Advices assure us, be able to hold out above a fortnight or 3 weeks longer. By a Vessel come from *Dalmatia* we are inform'd, that the Proveditore-General *Molino* was gone from *Zara* towards *Spalato*, where he had ordered his Troops, and the Morlaques, to Rendezvous, in order to their entring upon Action. The great Convoy will sail from hence with the first fair Wind for the *Levant*; and with it will be sent 70000 Zequins for the payment of our Forces. This week was published here the Pope's Bull for the suppressing the *Abby-Deile Carceri*, which is to be sold, and the Money arising thereby apply'd to the War against the Turks.

Rome, March 25. The French Ambassador had again Audience of the Pope on Tuesday last, and afterwards a Conference with several Cardinals, which being ended, he dispatched away an Express to *France*. The Pope has granted the King of *Spain* half of the Revenues of the Knights of *Calatrava*, *Cantara*, *St. Jacob*, and *Montesia*, within his Dominions, for five Years, to be employ'd in the War against the *Moms* in *Africa*. Don *Livio Olescachi*, Nephew of the late Pope, parted from hence this week for *Milan*, from whence he intends to go to *Vienna*.

Milan, April 1. On Friday last our Governor named six new Captains of Foot, and as many of Dragoons; who are to raise their Companies and Troops by the end of this Month, the first to consist of 70, and the other of 50 Men each. Our *Mestre de Camp General* is gone by his Excellency's Order to *Com*, to take a review of some new-raised Troops that are lately come thither. We hear, that *Monsieur de Catinat*, who is to command the French Forces in *Italy*, is arriv'd at *Pignerol*.

Vienna, April 6. The Bassa-Aga of *Canisa* had the 31st past Audience of the Count *de Staremberg* Vice-President of the Council of War; and on the 3d Instant he was sent back with the Emperor's Ratification of the Articles of Capitulation; in which there had been made some little alteration. The Turks are to march out of *Canisa* with their Arms and Baggage, but without Cannon, or Drums beating, or Colours flying; They are to be conducted to the *Sava* with a convenient number of Wagons, and

from thence by Water to the nearest Turkish Garison. All Prisoners are to be released, and before they march out, they are to discover the Mines, and give an account of the Magazines, &c. The Lieutenant-General *Marquis de Negrelli* is gone to the Blockade of *Great Waradin*, to give Orders for the closer freighting of that place, which in all probability will be quickly necessitated to follow the Example of *Canisa*. We have an account by Letters of the 17th past from *Nissa*, that the Turks were again gathering together in great numbers between *Brod* and *Bagnaluca* in *Bosnia*; and there was a report, that 6000 of the Tatars, who lately retired towards *Budzack*, were coming back to join them, in order to some important design before our Army takes the Field. The Prince of *Esterhazy* Palatine of *Hungary*, who arriv'd here this week, has had several Conferences with the Ministers of this Court about the Affairs of that Kingdom. They write from *Froy Churches*, that on the 18th past 264 Turks, after having abjur'd their Errors, were Christian'd by the Bishop of *Sirmia*.

Coigne, Apr. 14. The two *Brandenburg* Battalions, now in Garison here, have received Orders from Lieutenant-General *Spain* to march the next week, in order to their joining with the rest of his Electoral Highness's Forces quarter'd in the Country of *Juliers*, which are to advance towards the *Moselle*. We are told from *Frankfurt*, that the Duke of *Lorraine* was expected there in few days, to assist at a Council of War, which is to be held with the Imperial and Confederate Generals; and that the Forces which are to act under his Highness's Command this Summer, are to be at the General Rendezvous by the beginning of the next Month.

Hamburg, April 14. This City is very much pleas'd to publish the Imperial Avocatoia, commanding them (as a Member of the Empire) to interdict all Trade with *France*, and to oblige the French Resident to depart this place; and the 27th of this Month is the ultimate time allowed them for the doing of it; which it's not doubted but they will comply with. There is a Conference held at *Torgow*, for the adjusting the Matter concerning the Succession of *Saxe-Lauenburg*. In the mean time we hear, that the Elector of *Saxony* has absolutely reject'd the Proposal of putting the Administration of that Duchy into the hands of the Directors of the Circle of the *Lower Saxony*, and (among these) of the Princes of *Lauenburg*, till such time as this Difference can be finally accommodated; and that he intends to be without farther delay put into possession of those Lands.

Brussels, April 16. Our Troops, which were drawn together, are upon the news of the Enemy's being retir'd, gone back to their Garisons. The loss the French sustain'd in the late Engagement at *Foress*, is greater than was at first reported, for the Letters from *Dinant* say, that upon a Muster taken after the Action, there were found above 500 Men missing. The Confederate Forces are going to form a Camp of 20000 Men near the *Moselle*.

Paris, April 17. We have an account by an Express, That the French Squadron, under the command of the *Marquis d'Anpreville*, return'd to *Brust* on the 9th Instant, with 5000 Irish commanded by Lieutenant-General *Macarty*. That the Count *d'Artois*, Lieutenant-General *Rose*, the Count *de Goffe*, and several other French Officers, are come back from *Ireland* with this opportunity

unity. And that one of the French Men of War, called the *Firme*, ran ashore as she was entering into the Port. The King has declared, that the Dauphin shall command his Army in *Germany*, and under him the *Marschal de Forge*, having for Lieutenant-Generals the Count de *Choiseul*, the Count d' *Auvergne*, the Marquis de *Touffes*, the Duke de *Villeroy*, the Prince de *Soubise*, the Marquis de *Tilladet*, the Sieur *Rofs*, (who, upon the Death of the Baron de *Mencler*, is made *Master de Camp General* of the Light Horse,) the Duke de *Endojme*, and the Marquis de *La Feuillie*. The Army in *Flanders* is to be commanded by the *Marschal Duke of Luxembourg*, and under him by the Count de *Munier*, the Count de *Calvo*, the Duke de *Choiseul*, the Marquis de *Genis*, the Chevalier de *Tilladet*, the Marquis de *Gourna*, and the Marquis d' *Auger*, as Lieutenant-Generals. The Marquis de *Broffers* is to command a Body of 12 or 14000 Men on the *Moselle*, and the Marquis de *Rubantel*, and the Sieur de *St. Ruth*, are to be his Lieutenant-Generals. The Duke de *Bonelles* is to command in *Rouffillon*, having the Marquis de *Blonde*, and the Marquis de *Languetier*, for Lieutenant-Generals. And the Sieur de *Castinat* Lieutenant-General is to command the French Forces towards *Italy*. The Marquis de *Lani* *Marschal de Camp* is to command in *Bresse*, and the Marquis de *Reul* in the Country of *Aunis*. The *Mulquetiers* have Orders to march the 21 Instant towards *Nancy*, where they are to expect the Dauphin, whose Baggage is ordered to be ready to part from hence towards the end of *May*; and the Regiments of Guards are to march to *Valenciennes*. We have advice from *Flanders*, that *Montieur de Batterville* having advanced to *Florefse* with 3500 Horse and Foot, he attack'd, and took a little Fort the Spaniards had built there to guard the passage of the *Sambre*, but that a Detachment of the Garison of *Namur* coming presently after up with him, they Charged and routed our Troops, and killed a great many Officers and Soldiers, besides those who in their precipitate Retreat were drowned in the *Sambre*. The Orders for raising the *Arrier-ban* are executed every where with great rigour, the Gentlemen being all obliged to march themselves, or to pay great Fines, which occasions a general mourning among them. On the first Instant, the Clergy of this Province met, to choose Deputies for the General Assembly appointed to be held here the next Month; and the Archbishop of *Paris* was chosen for the first Order, and the Abbot *Rofs* for the second. We have an account, that a Party of Imperialists advancing to seize some Cattel under the Cannon of *Brisac*, part of the Garison fall'd out and charged them, but were beaten by the Germans, and the Major of the place, with divers others killed. The Dauphiness continues in a condition that leaves us little hopes of her Recovery.

Hague, Apr 18. The Ministers of the Allies continue their Conference, and we are assured, that the Envoy of *Sweden* has acquainted them, that the King his Master will send 6000 Men towards the *Rhine*, to join the Imperial Forces under the Command of the Duke of *Lorraine*. The States of *Holland* meet again to-morrow. The two French Prizes, taken at the *Cape of Good Hope*, have been sold in *Zeland* for 120000 *l. Sterling*. The States-General have given new and strict Orders for the hindering the Exportation of Horses out of their Provinces.

Winnich, April 8. This morning Their Majesties Ship the *Swallow* sail'd from hence with divers Vessels under her Convey for *Wales*.

Osber, April 9. On the 6th Instant above 30 Sail of Privateers arrived with their Convey in *Highlake*. This day came in a Vessel that parted from *Carrickfergus* on Sunday last, but brings no News. The Ships with Colonel *Croft's* Regiment, the Carriages, &c. are, it's not doubted, now on their Voyage to *Belfast*, the Wind being fair.

Bristol, April 10. By a Ship arrived here from *New-England* we have an account, that the Lieutenant-Governor of *Barbadoes* did in *November* last send to that Colony, to acquaint them, that he had armed two of the biggest Ships at *Barbadoes*, two wit, the *Hewson*, Captain *Richards*, and the *St. Indis* Merchant, Captain *Sherley*, Commanders, and had mounted 40 Guns in each, and well Manned them, to cruise off of the Island till the Squadron arrived from *England*.

Portsmouth, April 10. On Monday last about 30 Sail of small Vessels sail'd from hence for the Downs, but the Wind coming Easterly, they were forced back the next day: When their Majesties Ship the *Tork* sail'd to cruise to the westward.

Whitehall, April 10. His Majesty was this day graciously pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood upon *Pury Cust* of *Stamford* Esq; in consideration of his Loyalty and early Services to His Majesty and his Country.

Whitehall, April 13. The 10th Instant the Count de *Congesec* Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, had his Audience of Leave of the King; and this day he had likewise Audience of the Queen, and of the Queen Dowager, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Corwell*.
