THE FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1885.

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 15th day of June, 1885.

By Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

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THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 and 1884, and of every other power enabling them in

this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

- Short Title.*
1. This Order may be cited as THE FOREIGN ANIMALS ORDER OF 1885.
- Extent.*
2. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland only.
- Commencement.*
3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Interpretation.

4. In this Order—

The Act of 1878 means The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878:

Cattle means bulls, cows, oxen, heifers, and calves:

Animals means, except where it is otherwise expressed, cattle, sheep, and goats, and all other ruminating animals, and swine:

Foreign, applied to animals and things, means brought to England or Wales or Scotland from a foreign country:

Customs means Her Majesty's Customs:

Admiralty Wharf means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Privy Council as a Foreign Animals Wharf for Naval purposes only:

Superintendent includes a foreman or wharfinger or other person at the time being in charge of a Foreign Animals Wharf:

Reception-lair means a lair or other proper place adjacent or near to the landing-stage, pier, quay or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf where animals are landed, and set apart for the reception of animals immediately after landing:

Lairage-men means men specially appointed by the occupiers of a Foreign Animals Wharf for the purpose of landing animals at such Wharf and feeding and watering and tending them in a reception-lair:

Reshipment Station means a part of a port defined by Special Order of the Privy Council as a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station for the landing and quarantining of foreign animals intended for reshipment to a foreign country:

Landing-Place means any dock, quay, wharf, or other place approved by the Privy Council for the landing, and includes any lands, buildings, or premises so approved for the lairage, of foreign animals not subject to slaughter or quarantine:

Disease includes, with the diseases specified in the Act of 1878 (that is, cattle-plague, contagious pleuro-pneumonia of cattle, foot-and-mouth disease, sheep-pox, or sheep-scab), glanders, farcy, and swine-fever:

Carcase means the carcase of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, and part of such a carcase, and the meat, flesh, bones, hide, skin, hoofs, horns, offal, or other part, of an animal, horse, ass, or mule, separately or otherwise, or any portion thereof:

Fodder means hay or other substance commonly used for food of animals:

Litter means straw or other substance commonly used for bedding or otherwise for or about animals:

Master includes a person having the charge or command of a vessel:

Chapter, Article means Chapter, Article of this Order:

Schedule means, except where it is otherwise expressed, Schedule to this Order:

Other terms, unless it is otherwise expressed, have the same meaning and scope as in the Act of 1878.

CHAPTER I.—PROHIBITION.

Prohibited Countries.

5.—(1.) Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, animals brought from any of the countries comprised in Part I of the First Schedule shall not be landed.

(2.) Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, by Special Order relating to Schleswig

or to Holstein, or by any other Special Order, or by any General Order, cattle brought from either of the countries comprised in Part II of the First Schedule, and cattle, sheep, or goats being or having been on board a vessel at the same time with cattle so brought, shall not be landed.

CHAPTER II.—FOREIGN ANIMALS SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER.

Ports having Foreign Animals Wharves.

6. The following are the ports at which parts are at the date of this Order, by Special Orders of the Privy Council, defined as Foreign Animals Wharves:

Barrow-in-Furness.	Liverpool.
Bristol.	London.

Hull.	

Conditions of Landing.

7.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within one month before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the First Schedule, or any cattle exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Belgium or the German Empire or any cattle, sheep, or goats being or having been on board a vessel at the same time with cattle so brought.

Second. That the vessel has not within one month before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered any port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the First Schedule.

Third. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any of the countries mentioned in Part I of the First Schedule, or any cattle exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Belgium or the German Empire, or any cattle, sheep, or goats being or having been on board a vessel at the same time with cattle so brought.

Fourth. And in the case of sheep, goats, and swine, that the vessel has not within one week before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the sheep, goats, or swine imported, entered any port or place from which the landing of sheep, goats, or swine is for the time being prohibited.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf unless and until the master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein delivered to the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, a declaration made and signed that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Exception in favour of Admiralty Wharves.

8. The provisions of the following Articles of this Chapter shall not extend to an Admiralty Wharf, namely, Article 9 (*Regulations applying to Landing-Stage*) Article 10 (*Charge of Animals on Landing*) Article 11 (*Disposal of Animals on Landing*) Article 12 (*Regulations applying to Reception-Lair*) Article 13 (*Regulations applying*

to all Parts of Foreign Animals Wharf (other than Reception-Lair) on Detection of Disease) Article 14 (Feeding and Watering) Article 15 (Time for Slaughter) Article 16 (Movement of Carcasses, Manure, &c.) Article 17 (Disinfection of Foreign Animals Wharf) and Article 18 (Restriction on Use of Foreign Animals Wharf): (provision for Admiralty Wharves being made by The Admiralty Foreign Animals Wharves Order of 1884).

Regulations applying to Landing-Stage.

9.—(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs and lairage-men and the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Privy Council, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by the Inspector of the Privy Council, shall during the time of the landing of the animals be admitted to the landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf at which the animals are landed, nor until such landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Wharf has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Inspector of the Privy Council.

(2.) All persons before leaving such landing-stage, pier, quay, or other part of the Wharf shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease, by washing and disinfecting themselves, and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Privy Council may direct or require.

Charge of Animals on Landing.

10. Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, when landed, be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Privy Council; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Disposal of Animals on Landing.

11. Animals when landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be driven by lairage-men to a reception-lair there to await the examination of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

Regulations applying to Reception-Lair.

12.—(1.) No person, except the officers of Customs and lairage-men and the Superintendent of the Foreign Animals Wharf and an Inspector of the Privy Council, and such other persons as may be specially authorized by the Inspector of the Privy Council, shall be admitted to the reception-lair.

(2.) All persons before leaving the reception-lair shall take such means for preventing the spreading of disease, by washing and disinfecting themselves, and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Privy Council may direct or require.

(3.) The animals shall be examined in the reception-lair by an Inspector of the Privy Council during daylight.

(4.) If on such examination all the animals are found free from disease, the Inspector of the Privy Council may permit the animals to be moved out of the reception-lair and into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of the Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Privy Council direct or permit.

(5.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals is or are found to be affected with disease, all the diseased animals being affected with one and the same disease, then the Rules set forth in Part I of the Third Schedule shall have effect in relation to the reception-lair and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(6.) If on such examination any two or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) cattle-plague, (b) pleuro-pneumonia, (c) foot-and-mouth

disease, (d) sheep-pox, (e) sheep-scab, and (f) swine-fever are found to exist then the Rules set forth in Part II of the Third Schedule shall have effect in relation to the reception-lair and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(7.) The slaughter of animals under the Rules of the Third Schedule shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Privy Council in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Regulations applying to all Parts of Foreign Animals Wharf (other than Reception-Lair) on Detection of Disease.

13.—(1.) Where it appears to an Inspector of the Privy Council that disease exists or has lately existed in any one or more animals in any particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf (other than a reception-lair), all the diseased or suspected animals being affected with one and the same disease, then the Rules set forth in Part I of the Third Schedule shall have effect in relation to that particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the wharf and to any other part or parts of the wharf in which, in the opinion of the Inspector of the Privy Council, there is or has been an animal diseased or suspected of being diseased, and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

(2.) If it appears to the Inspector of the Privy Council that any two or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) cattle-plague, (b) pleuro-pneumonia, (c) foot-and-mouth disease, (d) sheep-pox, (e) sheep-scab, and (f) swine-fever exist or have lately existed in any particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of a Foreign Animals Wharf (other than a reception-lair) then the Rules set forth in Part II of the Third Schedule shall have effect in relation to that particular building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the wharf and to any other part or parts of the wharf in which, in the opinion of the Inspector of the Privy Council, there are or have been animals diseased or suspected of being diseased, and to the animals to which such Rules are applicable for the time being therein.

Feeding and Watering.

14.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, until they are taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf or the person in charge thereof with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water, and the expenses incurred by them in respect thereof shall be defrayed by the owners or consignees of the animals, and may be recovered by such occupiers or person from the owners or consignees by proceedings in any court of competent jurisdiction.

(2.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, after they have been taken charge of by the owners or consignees, be supplied by the owners or consignees with a proper and sufficient supply of food and water.

(3.) The food supplied to sucking-calves in accordance with this Article shall be gruel or milk or other proper food.

(4.) If an animal remains without a proper and sufficient supply of food or water in contravention of the provisions of this Article, the occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and the owner and the consignee and the person in charge of the animal, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878; and it shall lie on the person liable to supply food and water

to the animal when charged to prove the proper and sufficient supply of food or water or both and the time when the same was so supplied.

Time for Slaughter.

15.—(1.) Animals landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be slaughtered within ten days after the landing thereof, exclusive of the day of landing.

(2.) The slaughter of the animals may be commenced at any time after the landing thereof, with the permission of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(3.) The slaughter of the animals shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Privy Council in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Movement of Carcases, Manure, &c.

16.—(1.) No carcase, offal, fodder, litter, or dung or manure shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(2.) All offal (except such parts as are intended for human food) before being so removed from the Wharf, shall be treated as follows :

- (i.) Either such offal shall be boiled or scalded :
- (ii.) Or such offal may, with a Licence from the Privy Council, but not otherwise, be washed in the following solution, namely :—Carbolic acid or chloride of lime one part ; and water forty parts :

in either case such treatment to be to the satisfaction of the Inspector of the Privy Council.

(3.) All dung and manure shall, before being so removed from a Foreign Animals Wharf, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(4.) If the Inspector of the Privy Council is of opinion that any such carcase or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions from time to time given by the Privy Council.

Disinfection of Foreign Animals Wharf.

17. Where an animal in a Foreign Animals Wharf is affected with disease, the portion of the Wharf where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Privy Council.

Restriction on Use of Foreign Animals Wharf.

18.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter, or animals moved into a Foreign Animals Wharf under the provisions of this Order, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Wharf.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Wharf shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the Regulations relating to the Wharf shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Wharf shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Act of 1878 or by Order of Council under the said Act in relation thereto.

CHAPTER III.—QUARANTINE.

Port having Quarantine Stations.

19.—(1.) The following is the only port at which any part is at the date of this Order, by Special Order of the Privy Council, defined as a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station :

Southampton.

(2.) The animals landed at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station must be intended for reship-

ment to a foreign country, or for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes, to be in each case approved by the Privy Council on special application through the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Reshipment to a Foreign Country.

20. The landing of foreign animals intended for reshipment to a foreign country is subject to the following conditions :

First. The animals must be landed at a Reshipment Station.

Second. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent declaring that each animal is intended for reshipment to a foreign country.

Third. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief each animal is not affected with contagious or infectious disease.

Fourth. The animals shall not be moved alive out of the Reshipment Station except into a vessel for exportation to a foreign country, and until reshipped shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Animals intended for Purposes of Exhibition, or for other Exceptional Purposes (other than Reshipment).

21.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals intended for purposes of exhibition, or for other exceptional purposes (other than reshipment) at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is subject to the following conditions :

First. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent, declaring the purposes for which each animal is intended.

Second. The animals must be accompanied by a declaration of the owner or consignee or his agent declaring that to the best of his knowledge and belief each animal is not affected with contagious or infectious disease.

Third. The animals when landed shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Privy Council ; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

Fourth. The animals when landed shall be detained in the Station for such period as the Privy Council in each case according to the circumstances direct.

Fifth. When moved thereout they shall be accompanied by—

(a.) A Certificate of an Inspector of the Privy Council certifying that they are free from disease.

(b.) A Licence of an Inspector of the Privy Council specifying the place to which and the person to whom they are to be taken.

Sixth. The Inspector of the Privy Council giving the Licence shall send a copy of his Licence to the Local Authority for the place to which the animals are to be taken.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any person to take them to any other place or person.

Movement of Carcases.

22.—(1.) No carcase shall be removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Privy Council is of opinion that any such carcase as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instruc-

tions from time to time given by the Privy Council.

Disinfection of Dung and Manure.

23. Dung and manure shall, before being removed from a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, be disinfected to the satisfaction of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

Disinfection of Quarantine Station.

24. Where an animal in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station is affected with disease, the portion of the Station where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Privy Council.

Restriction on Use of Quarantine Station.

25.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter, shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station.

(2.) Any animal being in a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the Regulations relating to the Station shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Foreign Animals Quarantine Station shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Act of 1878 or by Order of Council under the said Act in relation thereto.

CHAPTER IV.—FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE.

Free Countries.

26.—(1.) Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, animals brought from any of the countries comprised in Part I of the Second Schedule are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine.

(2.) Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, animals (except swine) brought from either of the countries comprised in Part II of the Second Schedule are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine.

Landing-Place.

27.—(1.) Foreign animals under the provisions of this Chapter shall not be landed at any place except at a Landing-Place.

(2.) The following are the ports at which parts are at the date of this Order approved by the Privy Council as Landing-Places:

Bristol.	Leith.
Glasgow.	Liverpool.
Granton.	London.
Hartlepool.	Newcastle-upon-Tyne.
Harwich.	Southampton.
Hull.	Weymouth.
Kirkwall.	

(3.) Those foreign animals shall be landed in such manner, at such times, subject to such supervision and control, and under such Regulations, as the Commissioners of Customs, from time to time, direct.

(4.) When landed they shall be placed under the charge of an Inspector of the Privy Council; and, until his arrival, they shall remain under the charge of the Commissioners of Customs.

(5.) No part of a Landing-Place shall be declared to be an Infected Place or part of an Infected Place except by the Privy Council.

Conditions of Landing.

28.—(1.) The landing of foreign animals at a Landing-Place under the provisions of this Chapter is subject to the following conditions:

First. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within one month before taking them on board, had on board any animal exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in any country other than in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or in Norway, or in Iceland, or in the Channel Islands, or in the Isle of Man, or (subject to the second condition of this Article) in Denmark or in Sweden.

Second. That the vessel in which they are imported has not, within one month before taking them on board, had on board any swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Denmark or in Sweden.

Third. That the vessel has not within one month before taking them on board or at any time since taking on board the animals imported, entered any port or place in any country other than in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or in Norway, or in Iceland, or in the Channel Islands, or in the Isle of Man, or in Denmark, or in Sweden.

Fourth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel, been in contact with any animal exported or carried coastwise from any port or place in any country other than in Her Majesty's Possessions in North America, or in Norway, or in Iceland, or in the Channel Islands, or in the Isle of Man, or (subject to the fifth condition of this Article) in Denmark or in Sweden.

Fifth. That the animals imported have not, while on board the vessel been in contact with any swine exported or carried coastwise from a port or place in Denmark or in Sweden.

(2.) And the animals imported shall not be landed at a Landing-Place unless and until—

(a.) The owner or charterer of the vessel in which they are imported, or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, has entered into a bond to Her Majesty the Queen, in a sum not exceeding one thousand pounds, with or without a surety or sureties, to the satisfaction of the Commissioners of Customs, conditioned for the observance of the foregoing conditions; and

(b.) The master of the vessel has on each occasion of importation of foreign animals therein satisfied the Commissioners of Customs or their proper officer, by declaration made and signed or otherwise, that all the animals then imported therein are properly imported according to the provisions of this Article.

Twelve Hours Detention.

29. Foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall be detained in the Landing-Place for at least twelve hours reckoned from the time of the landing of the last animal of the cargo, whether the whole cargo is landed continuously without intermission at one place, or part thereof is landed at one place and part at another place, or parts thereof are landed at different times at the same place.

Examination and Consequences.

30.—(1.) Foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall not be moved from the Landing-Place, or be allowed to come in contact with any other animals, until they have been examined by an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(2.) The animals shall be examined by the Inspector of the Privy Council during daylight, and such examination shall take place after the expiration of the twelve hours detention mentioned in the last preceding Article.

(3.) If on such examination all the animals landed from the same vessel are found free from disease, they may be moved from the Landing-Place and shall thereupon cease to be deemed foreign animals (except for the purpose of paragraph (7.) of Section thirty of the Act of 1878).

(4.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals landed from a vessel is or are found affected with cattle-plague or foot-and-mouth disease, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall detain all the animals that are within the Landing-Place and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Clerk of the Council. The Inspector of the Privy Council shall cause all the animals within the Landing-Place so detained to be slaughtered.

(5.) If on such examination any one or more of the animals landed from a vessel is or are found affected with pleuro-pneumonia or sheep-pox or sheep-scab or swine-fever, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall detain all the animals of the same kind as the diseased animals which were brought in the same vessel with the diseased animal or animals (that is, all the cattle or all the sheep or all the goats or all the swine) amongst which the disease is found and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Clerk of the Council. The Inspector of the Privy Council shall cause all the animals of the particular kind so detained to be slaughtered.

(6.) The slaughter of the animals under (4) and (5) shall be commenced at such time after the landing thereof as the Privy Council in any case direct, and when commenced shall be completed as soon as practicable.

Continuance of One Cargo.

31.—(1.) For the purposes of this Chapter all animals brought at the same time in the same vessel shall be deemed to continue and be one cargo during the time of the twelve hours or other period of detention, whether they are all landed continuously without intermission at one place, or some of them are landed at one place and some at another place, or some of them are landed at one time and some at another time at the same place.

(2.) Where an animal forming part of one cargo of foreign animals under this Chapter has not been kept separate from an animal forming part of another cargo of foreign animals, all the animals forming those two cargoes shall be dealt with as if they formed one cargo.

Detention of Suspected Animals.

32. An Inspector of the Privy Council may detain, for any period that he thinks necessary or proper, any foreign animal under this Chapter which he has reason to suspect is diseased or may introduce disease.

Movement of Animals, Carcases, Manure, &c.

33.—(1.) No animal, carcase, fodder, litter, or dung or manure shall be removed from a Landing-Place or from any lair or other place therein, except with the permission of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Privy Council is of opinion that any such animal or thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be slaughtered, destroyed, or otherwise dealt with, in accordance with instructions from time to time given by the Privy Council.

Disinfection of Landing-Place.

34. Where an animal in a Landing-Place is affected with disease, the portion of the Landing-Place where the diseased animal is or has been, shall not be used for animals unless and until that portion has been cleansed and disinfected to the satisfaction of the Privy Council.

Restriction on Use of Landing-Place.

35.—(1.) No animals other than foreign animals landed under the provisions of this Chapter shall be at any time landed at or moved into or kept in a Landing-Place.

(2.) Any animal being in a Landing-Place shall, without prejudice to the recovery of any penalty for the infringement of this Article, be deemed to be a foreign animal, and the Regulations relating to the Landing-Place shall apply to such animal.

(3.) A Landing-Place shall not be used for any purpose other than those authorized by the Act of 1878 or by Order of Council under the said Act in relation thereto.

Landing of other Foreign Animals.

36. Nothing in this Chapter shall prevent the landing of any foreign animal at a Foreign Animals Wharf if the owner of the animal or his agent in England or Wales or Scotland, or the consignee thereof, so desires.

CHAPTER V.—CHANNEL ISLANDS.

37. Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, animals brought from the Channel Islands shall be subject to the provisions of Chapter IV (FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE).

CHAPTER VI.—ISLE OF MAN.

38. Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, animals brought from the Isle of Man are allowed to be landed without being subject under the Fifth Schedule to the Act of 1878, or under this Order, to slaughter or to quarantine, or to the provisions of Chapter IV (FOREIGN ANIMALS NOT SUBJECT TO SLAUGHTER OR QUARANTINE).

CHAPTER VII.—SHIP'S COWS AND GOATS.

39. Unless and until the Privy Council otherwise order, a cow or goat taken on board a vessel in England or Wales or Scotland for the purpose of supplying the passengers or crew of the vessel with milk on a voyage shall not on being landed in England or Wales or Scotland at the end of the voyage be deemed to be a foreign animal, if the Commissioners of Customs are, before the same is landed, satisfied that it has been taken from England or Wales or Scotland, and has not been landed in a foreign country, and has not been in contact with, or on board the same vessel with, any diseased foreign animal.

CHAPTER VIII.—LANDING AND DISPOSAL OF DUNG, FODDER, LITTER, UTENSILS, AND OTHER THINGS.

40. Except in the case of fodder or litter landed from a vessel bringing foreign animals that have been or are intended to be landed at a Foreign Animals Wharf, all partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to, and all litter that has been used for or about foreign animals shall, when landed from the vessel, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

41.—(1.) The provisions of this Article extend only to the dung of animals, and to fodder, litter, utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings used for or about foreign animals that have been or are intended to be landed from a vessel at a Foreign Animals Wharf; and to such other fodder or litter

as may be brought in the same vessel with such animals.

(2.) All dung of such animals, and all fodder, litter, utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings used for or about such animals, and all other fodder or litter brought in the same vessel with such animals, shall, if landed, be landed in such manner, at such times, at such places, and subject to such supervision and control, as the Commissioners of Customs from time to time direct.

(3.) No dung of such animals, and no partly consumed or broken fodder that has been supplied to such animals, and no litter that has been used for or about such animals, shall be landed at a place, other than a Foreign Animals Wharf or a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or a Landing-Place, without the previous consent in writing of the Local Authority, and shall, when landed, be forthwith well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

(4.) All other fodder and litter brought in the same vessel with such animals, and all utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings used for or about such animals that have been landed at a place other than a Foreign Animals Wharf or a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or a Landing-Place shall, when landed from the vessel, remain under the charge of an Officer of Customs, and such fodder and litter, and those utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings shall not be removed from the place where landed, except with the permission in writing of an Officer of Customs.

Removal from Wharf or Station or Landing-Place.

42.—(1.) No utensils, pens, hurdles, or fittings that have been used for or about animals and have been landed from a vessel at a Foreign Animals Wharf or at a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or at a Landing-Place shall be removed from the Wharf or Station or Landing-Place except with the permission of an Inspector of the Privy Council.

(2.) If the Inspector of the Privy Council is of opinion that any such thing as aforesaid may introduce disease, the same shall be destroyed or otherwise dealt with in accordance with instructions from time to time given by the Privy Council.

CHAPTER IX.—DISINFECTION.

Vessels.

43.—(1.) A vessel used for carrying foreign animals shall, after the landing of animals therefrom, and before the taking on board of any other animal or other cargo, be cleansed and disinfected as follows:

- (i.) All parts of the vessel with which animals or their droppings have come in contact shall be scraped and swept: then
- (ii.) The same parts of the vessel shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water: then
- (iii.) The same parts of the vessel shall have applied to them a coating of lime-wash: except that
- (iv.) The application of lime-wash shall not be compulsory as regards such parts of the vessel as are used for passengers or crew.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the vessel shall not be landed unless and until they have been well mixed with quicklime.

Moveable Gangways and other Apparatus.

44.—(1.) A moveable gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus, used or intended for the loading or unloading of foreign animals on or from a vessel, or otherwise used in connexion with

the transit of foreign animals shall, as soon as practicable after being so used, be cleansed as follows:

- (i.) The gangway or apparatus shall be scraped and swept, and all dung, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom: then
 - (ii.) The gangway or apparatus shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings of the gangway or apparatus, and all dung, litter, and other matter removed therefrom shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with animals.

Substitution in existing Orders.

45. For the explanation and amendment of certain Orders of Council, the following provisions shall have effect:

(i.) In Article 4 of each of the following Orders (providing for the transshipment of foreign animals) namely:

(a.) 5 February, 1884.—Port of Glasgow.

(b.) 5 February, 1884.—Port of Hull.

(c.) 5 February, 1884.—Port of Liverpool No. 2.

(d.) 5 February, 1884.—Port of London.

(e.) 5 February, 1884.—Port of Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

Article 43 of this Order shall be deemed to be referred to (as providing for the manner in which landing-vessels are to be cleansed and disinfected) instead of Article 41 of The Foreign Animals Order of 1884.

(ii.) In paragraph (2) of Article 1 and in Article 9 of the following Order, namely:

12 May, 1884.—The Admiralty Foreign Animals Wharves Order of 1884.

this Order shall be deemed to be referred to instead of The Foreign Animals Order of 1884.

(iii.) In Article 3 of the following Order, namely:

15 June, 1885.—The Schleswig-Holstein Order of 1885.

this Order shall be deemed to be referred to instead of The Foreign Animals Order of 1884.

CHAPTER X.—REGULATIONS AS TO VESSELS CARRYING ANIMALS.

Fittings of Vessels.

46.—(1.) Every place used for animals on board a vessel shall be divided into pens by substantial divisions.

(2.) Each pen shall not exceed nine feet in breadth, or fifteen feet in length.

(3.) The floor of each pen shall, in order to prevent slipping, be strewn with a proper quantity of litter or sand or other proper substance, or be fitted with battens or other proper foot-holds.

(4.) Every such place, if inclosed, shall be ventilated by means of separate inlet and outlet openings, of such size and position as will secure a proper supply of air to the place in all states of weather.

Shorn Sheep.

47. Between each first day of November and the next following thirtieth day of April (both days inclusive) shorn sheep shall not be carried on the deck of a vessel, except where they were last shorn more than sixty days before being so carried.

Gangways for Sheep-Pens.

48. Where sheep are carried on the deck of a vessel, proper gangways shall be provided either between or above the pens in which they are carried.

Detention.

49. Animals landed from a vessel shall, on a certificate of an Inspector of the Privy Council, certifying to the effect that the provisions of this Chapter, or some or one of them, have not or has not been observed in the vessel, be detained, at the place of landing, or in lairs adjacent thereto, until the Privy Council otherwise direct.

CHAPTER XI.—MISCELLANEOUS.

Water.

50. At every Foreign Animals Wharf, Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, and Landing-Place provision shall be made, to the satisfaction of the Privy Council, for a supply of water for animals; and water shall be supplied there, gratuitously, on request of any person having charge of any animal.

Food.

51. At every Foreign Animals Wharf, Foreign Animals Quarantine Station, and Landing-Place provision shall be made, to the satisfaction of the Privy Council, for the speedy and convenient unshipment of animals, and for a supply of food for them; and food shall be supplied there, on request of any person having charge of any animal, at such price as the Privy Council from time to time approve.

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes.

52.—(1.) An Inspector of the Privy Council, or the person in charge of a Foreign Animals Wharf or of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before entering that Wharf or Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(2.) An Inspector of the Privy Council, or the person in charge of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place, is hereby empowered to affix at or near the entrance thereof a notice to the effect that persons before leaving that Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(3.) An Inspector of the Privy Council is hereby empowered to affix a notice at or near the entrance of any particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion of a Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or of a Landing-Place to the effect that persons before leaving that particular building, lair, landing-stage, pier, quay, or other portion of the Station or Landing-Place will be required to disinfect themselves and their clothes, and thereupon every person shall on being requested comply with the terms of that notice.

(4.) Any person failing on request as aforesaid to comply with the terms of any such notice shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

Foreign Animals injured on Voyage.

53. Notwithstanding anything in this Order where a vessel comes into port having on board foreign animals maimed or injured on the voyage, the owner, consignee, or other person in charge thereof, or the master of the vessel, shall, if directed by an Inspector of the Privy Council, or may if he thinks fit, slaughter those animals or any of them immediately on their being landed; but the carcase of any such animal is not to be removed from the place of landing or some lair or slaughter-house adjacent thereto approved by the Privy

Council without a certificate of the Inspector of the Privy Council certifying that it is not likely to introduce disease.

Carcases of Animals Dying on Voyage.

54.—(1.) If a vessel arriving has on board the carcase of a foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule which was taken on board for the purpose of importation, but has died on the voyage, the master of the vessel shall, immediately on arrival, report the fact to the Principal Officer of Customs at the port.

(2.) The carcase shall not be landed or discharged from the vessel without the permission in writing of the Principal Officer.

General Power of Detention.

55. Where it appears to the Principal Officer of Customs with respect to any foreign animal, horse, ass, or mule, or any fodder or other article, brought by sea, that disease may be thereby conveyed to animals, horses, asses, or mules, he may seize and detain the same; and he shall forthwith report the facts to the Commissioners of Customs, who may give such directions as they think fit, either for the slaughter or destruction or the further detention thereof or for the restoration thereof to the owner on such conditions, if any, (including payment by the owner of expenses incurred by them in respect of detention thereof,) as they think fit.

Duties of Local Authorities and Police.

56. Where any Regulation relating to foreign animals is in operation, the Local Authority and all constables and police officers shall assist the Inspector of the Privy Council to carry the same into effect and to enforce the same, and shall do or cause to be done all things from time to time necessary for the effectual execution of the same.

CHAPTER XII.—OFFENCES.

57.—(1.) If the slaughter of animals is not commenced at the time directed by the Privy Council under this Order, or completed in accordance with the provisions of this Order, the person failing to cause such slaughter to be so commenced or completed shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(2.) If any dung of animals, or any fodder, litter, utensils, pens, hurdles, fittings, or other thing is landed or removed in contravention of this Order, the owner thereof, and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the place of landing or other place where or from which such dung or other thing is landed or removed, and also in the case of the landing thereof, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which the same is landed, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(3.) If any person fails to carry out or observe any direction as regards cleansing or disinfection, which he is by this Order required to carry out or observe, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(4.) If anything is done or omitted to be done as regards cleansing or disinfection in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel in or in respect of which,—and the owner of the gangway or passage-way, cage, or other apparatus in respect of which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of the Foreign Animals Wharf or Foreign Animals Quarantine Station or Landing-Place in which,—and the owner and the lessee and the occupier of any other place or thing in respect of which,—(as the case may be,) the same is done or omitted, shall, each according to

and in respect of his own acts or omissions, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

(5.) If an animal or a carcase or any manure is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal or of the carcase or of the manure, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal or carcase or manure, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts or defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878.

THE THIRD SCHEDULE.

Rules for Foreign Animals Wharf.

PART I.

(Rule A.—Cattle-Plague.)

(i.) If the disease is cattle-plague, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that cattle-plague exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Privy Council shall detain all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Clerk of the Council.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Privy Council is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased animals or who has in any way come in contact or been with such animals to take such means for preventing the spreading of cattle-plague, before leaving such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and dis-

infecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Privy Council shall direct

(Rule B.—Pleuro-Pneumonia.)

If the disease is pleuro-pneumonia, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall cause the diseased cattle and all cattle that are then within the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be dealt with as follows:

(a.) The diseased cattle shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(b.) The cattle not diseased may with the permission of the Inspector of the Privy Council be taken charge of by the owners or consignees, or by their drovers or servants, and those cattle may be moved into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of such Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Privy Council direct or permit.

(Rule C.—Foot-and-Mouth Disease.)

(i.) If the disease is foot-and-mouth disease, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that foot-and-mouth disease exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Privy Council shall detain all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Clerk of the Council.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Privy Council is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased animals or who has in any way come in contact or been with such animals to take such means for preventing the spreading of foot-and-mouth disease, before leaving the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Privy Council shall direct.

(iv.) The occupiers of the Foreign Animals Wharf shall provide proper and suitable suits of overall clothes for the use of the lairage-men and other persons entering such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf. Such overall clothes are to be put on upon entering, taken off on leaving, and left in, the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall from time to time be properly disinfected with a solution of carbolic acid as directed by the Inspector of the Privy Council.

(v.) The Inspector of the Privy Council shall cause all the animals that are then within the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, to be forthwith slaughtered.

(Rule D.—Sheep-Pox.)

(i.) If the disease is sheep-pox, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall forthwith affix a notice at or near the entrance of the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of

the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to the effect that sheep-pox exists therein and forbidding persons to enter therein without his permission.

(ii.) The Inspector of the Privy Council shall detain all the sheep that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and shall immediately transmit the information by telegraph or other rapid means to the Clerk of the Council.

(iii.) The Inspector of the Privy Council is hereby empowered to require and shall require every person being or having been in such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, with the diseased sheep or who has in any way come in contact or been with such sheep to take such means for preventing the spreading of sheep-pox, before leaving the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Wharf, or before leaving the Foreign Animals Wharf, as the case may be, by washing and disinfecting themselves and by changing or disinfecting their clothes, or otherwise, as the Inspector of the Privy Council shall direct.

(Rule E.—Sheep-Scab.)

If the disease is sheep-scab, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall cause the diseased sheep and all sheep then in the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be dealt with as follows :

(a.) The diseased sheep shall be forthwith slaughtered.

(b.) The sheep not diseased may with the permission of the Inspector of the Privy Council be taken charge of by the owners or consignees, or by their drovers or servants, and those sheep may be moved into such other parts of the Foreign Animals Wharf as the occupiers of such Wharf or their officers or the Inspector of the Privy Council direct or permit.

(Rule F.—Swine-Fever.)

If the disease is swine-fever, the Inspector of the Privy Council shall cause all the swine then in the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf to which this Rule applies, to be forthwith slaughtered.

PART II.

(Rule G.—Cattle - Plague and Pleuro - Pneumonia or Foot-and-Mouth Disease or Sheep-Pox or Sheep-Scab or Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are cattle-plague and any one or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) pleuro-pneumonia, (b) foot-and-mouth disease, (c) sheep-pox, (d) sheep-scab, and (e) swine-fever, the provisions of Rule A of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and to all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(Rule H.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-pox, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule J.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-scab, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule K.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and swine-fever, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

Rule L.—Foot-and-Mouth Disease and Pleuro-Pneumonia or Sheep-Pox or Sheep-Scab or Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are foot-and-mouth disease and any one or more of the following diseases (namely) (a) pleuro-pneumonia, (b) sheep-pox, (c) sheep-scab, and (d) swine-fever, the provisions of Rule C of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, and to all the animals that are then within such reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf.

(Rule M.—Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and sheep-scab, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with that Rule.

(Rule N.—Sheep-Pox and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule O.—Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-scab and swine-fever, the sheep shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule E, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule P.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-pox and sheep-scab, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, and the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule Q.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Pox and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-pox and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the cattle being dealt with in accordance with Rule B, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule R.—Pleuro-Pneumonia and Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are pleuro-pneumonia and sheep-scab and swine-fever, the cattle shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule B, the sheep shall be

dealt with in accordance with Rule E, and the swine shall be dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

(Rule S.—Sheep-Pox and Sheep-Scab and Swine-Fever.)

If the diseases are sheep-pox and sheep-scab and swine-fever, the provisions of Rule D of Part I of this Schedule shall apply to the reception-lair, or building, lair, slaughter-house or other part of the Foreign Animals Wharf, the sheep being dealt with in accordance with Rule D, and the swine being dealt with in accordance with Rule F, of Part I of this Schedule.

THE SCHLESWIG-HOLSTEIN ORDER OF 1885.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts, 1878 and 1884, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

1. This Order may be cited as The Schleswig-Holstein Order of 1885.

2. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland only.

3. In this Order terms have the same meaning as in The Foreign Animals Order of 1884.

4. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the twenty-first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five ; and shall cease to have effect from and immediately after the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, without prejudice to the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed on or before that day.

5. Cattle brought from a port or place in either of the parts of the German Empire respectively known as Schleswig and as Holstein, (in this Order referred to as Schleswig-Holstein cattle,) and sheep and goats brought from Schleswig or Holstein in the same vessel with Schleswig-Holstein cattle, may be landed for slaughter in a Foreign Animals Wharf, but not elsewhere.

6. The landing of Schleswig-Holstein cattle in a Foreign Animals Wharf shall be subject to the condition that they are accompanied by a Declaration and Certificates, such as are indicated in the forms in the Schedule to this Order, or to the like effect.

7. If the Declaration accompanying any cattle imported under this Order is untrue in any particular, as regards any one of the cattle to which it relates, the master of the vessel shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1878 with respect to all the cattle to which the Declaration relates, unless he shows to the satisfaction of the Justices before whom he is charged, that he did not know of the same being so untrue, and that he could not with reasonable diligence have obtained that knowledge.

THE DAIRIES, COW-SHEDS, AND MILK-SHOPS ORDER OF 1885.

AT the Council Chamber, Whitehall, the 15th day of June, 1885.

THE Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :

Short Title.

1. This Order may be cited as The Dairies, Cow-Sheds, and Milk-Shops Order of 1885.

Extent.

2. This Order extends to England and Wales and Scotland only.

Commencement.

3. This Order shall commence and take effect from and immediately after the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five.

Interpretation.

4. In this Order—

The Act of 1878 means The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1878.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1878.

Revocation of former Order.

5. The Dairies, Cow-Sheds, and Milk-Shops Order of July, 1879, is hereby revoked: Provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to revive any Order of Council thereby revoked or to invalidate or make unlawful anything done before the commencement of this Order, or interfere with the institution or prosecution of any proceeding in respect of any offence committed against, or any penalty incurred under, the said Order hereby revoked.

Registration of Dairymen and others.

6.—(1.) It shall not be lawful for any person to carry on in the District of any Local Authority the trade of cow-keeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk unless he is registered as such therein in accordance with this Article.

(2.) Every Local Authority shall keep a Register of persons from time to time carrying on in their District the trade of cow-keepers, dairymen, or purveyors of milk, and shall from time to time revise and correct the Register.

(3.) The Local Authority shall register every such person, but the fact of such registration shall not be deemed to authorize such person to occupy as a dairy or cow-shed any particular building or in any way preclude any proceedings being taken against such person for non-compliance with or infringement of any of the provisions of this Order or any Regulation made thereunder.

(4.) The Local Authority shall from time to time give public notice by advertisement in a newspaper circulating in their District and, if they think fit by placards, hand-bills, or otherwise, of registration being required, and of the mode of registration.

(5.) A person who carries on the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman for the purpose only of making and selling butter or cheese or both, and who does not carry on the trade of purveyor of milk, shall not, for the purposes of registration, be deemed to be a person carrying on the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman, and need not be registered.

(6.) A person who sells milk of his own cows in small quantities to his workmen or neighbours, for their accommodation, shall not, for the purposes of registration, be deemed, by reason only of such selling, to be a person carrying on the trade of cow-keeper, dairyman, or purveyor of milk, and need not, by reason thereof, be registered.

Construction and Water-Supply of New Dairies and Cow-Sheds.

7.—(1.) It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman to begin to occupy as a dairy or cow-shed any building not so occupied at the commencement of this Order, unless and until he first makes provision, to the reasonable satisfaction of the Local Authority, for the lighting, and the ventilation including air-space, and the cleansing, drainage, and water-supply, of the same, while occupied as a dairy or cow-shed.

(2.) It shall not be lawful for any such person to begin so to occupy any such building without

first giving one month's notice in writing to the Local Authority of his intention so to do.

Sanitary State of all Dairies and Cow-Sheds.

8. It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman to occupy as a dairy or cow-shed any building, whether so occupied at the commencement of this Order or not, if and as long as the lighting, and the ventilation including air-space, and the cleansing, drainage, and water-supply, thereof are not such as are necessary or proper—

(a.) for the health and good condition of the cattle therein; and

(b.) for the cleanliness of milk-vessels used therein for containing milk for sale; and

(c.) for the protection of the milk therein against infection or contamination.

Contamination of Milk.

9. It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman or purveyor of milk, or being the occupier of a milk-store or milk-shop—

(a.) to allow any person suffering from a dangerous infectious disorder, or having recently been in contact with a person so suffering, to milk cows or to handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part or assist in the conduct of the trade or business of the cow-keeper or dairyman, purveyor of milk, or occupier of a milk-store or milk-shop, so far as regards the production, distribution, or storage of milk; or

(b.) if himself so suffering or having recently been in contact as aforesaid, to milk cows, or handle vessels used for containing milk for sale, or in any way to take part in the conduct of his trade or business, as far as regards the production, distribution, or storage of milk—until in each case all danger therefrom of the communication of infection to the milk or of its contamination has ceased.

10. It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman or purveyor of milk, or being the occupier of a milk-store or milk-shop, after the receipt of notice of not less than one month from the Local Authority calling attention to the provisions of this Article, to permit any water-closet, earth-closet, privy, cesspool, or urinal to be within, communicate directly with, or ventilate into, any dairy or any room used as a milk-store or milk-shop.

11. It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman or purveyor of milk, or being the occupier of a milk-store or milk-shop to use a milk-store or milk-shop in his occupation, or permit the same to be used, as a sleeping apartment, or for any purpose incompatible with the proper preservation of the cleanliness of the milk-store or milk-shop, and of the milk-vessels and milk therein, or in any manner likely to cause contamination of the milk therein.

12. It shall not be lawful for any person following the trade of cow-keeper or dairyman or purveyor of milk to keep any swine in any cow-shed or other building used by him for keeping cows, or in any milk-store or other place used by him for keeping milk for sale.

Regulations of Local Authority.

13. A Local Authority may from time to time make Regulations for the following purposes, or any of them:

(a.) For the inspection of cattle in dairies.

(b.) For prescribing and regulating the lighting, ventilation, cleansing, drainage, and

water-supply of dairies and cow-sheds in the occupation of persons following the trade of cow-keepers or dairymen.

- (c.) For securing the cleanliness of milk-stores, milk-shops, and of milk-vessels used for containing milk for sale by such persons.
- (d.) For prescribing precautions to be taken by purveyors of milk and persons selling milk by retail against infection or contamination.

Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

14. The following provisions shall apply to Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order :

- (1.) Every Regulation shall be published by advertisement in a newspaper circulating in the District of the Local Authority.
- (2.) The Local Authority shall send to the Privy Council a copy of every Regulation made by them not less than one month before the date named in such Regulation for the same to come into force.
- (3.) If at any time the Privy Council are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Regulation, that the same is of too restrictive a character, or otherwise objectionable, and direct the revocation thereof, the same shall not come into operation, or shall thereupon cease to operate, as the case may be.

Existence of Disease among Cattle.

15. If at any time disease exists among the cattle in a dairy or cow-shed, or other building or place, the milk of a diseased cow therein—

- (a.) shall not be mixed with other milk ; and
- (b.) shall not be sold or used for human food ; and
- (c.) shall not be sold or used for food of swine, or other animals, unless and until it has been boiled.

Acts of Local Authorities.

16.—(1.) All orders and Regulations made by a Local Authority under The Dairies, Cow-Sheds, and Milk-Shops Order of July, 1879, or any Order revoked thereby, and in force at the making of this Order shall, as far as the same are not varied by or inconsistent with this Order, remain in force until altered or revoked by the Local Authority.

(2.) Forms of Registers and other forms which have been before the making of this Order prepared for use by a Local Authority under The Dairies, Cow-Sheds, and Milk-Shops Order of July, 1879, or any Order revoked thereby, may be used, as far as they are suitable, for the purposes of this Order.

Scotland.

17. Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to interfere with the operation of The Cattle Sheds in Burghs (Scotland) Act, 1866.

Cholera in Spain.

Under the powers vested in him by the "Quarantine Ordinance, 1879," and in consequence of the outbreak of cholera in Spain, his Excellency the High Commissioner is pleased to direct that—

1. All vessels arriving in any port or part of Cyprus, except Larnaca, from any part of the Mediterranean shore of Spain, without having performed quarantine at an intermediate port, shall be repelled.

2. All arrivals at Larnaca from any part of the Mediterranean shore of Spain shall undergo a quarantine of ten clear days.

3. Passengers' baggage and merchandize must be landed in quarantine, to undergo the disinfection considered necessary. Rags are to be repelled; non-susceptible merchandize shall not be liable to quarantine.

4. Mails arriving direct therefrom will be landed in quarantine, disinfected, and delivered to the postal authorities with the greatest possible despatch.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS a Convention has been lately entered into between the Postmaster-General of the United Kingdom and the Postal Administration of Egypt with the approval of their respective Governments for the establishment of a Parcel Post between those countries, and it is expedient for the due carrying out of the same that the rates of postage and other sums to be charged in respect of Parcels posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Egypt should be fixed as hereinafter appears, and that such Parcels, and parcels posted in Egypt addressed to the United Kingdom, should be posted, forwarded, conveyed

and delivered subject to the regulations, conditions, prohibitions, and restrictions hereinafter appearing:

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the Acts relating to Her Majesty's Post Office, and in exercise of all powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant made on the representation of Her Majesty's Postmaster-General (testified by his signing the same), and under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, order, direct, and declare as follows:—

Interpretation Clause.

1.—(1.) The expressions "Parcels" and "Parcel" in this Warrant respectively mean any postal packet, which is posted or tendered for transmission by post as a parcel, in accordance with the provisions of this Warrant, or any Warrant amending the same, in the United Kingdom, addressed to Egypt, or posted or tendered for transmission by post as aforesaid in Egypt addressed to the United Kingdom.

(2.) The expression "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

(3.) The expression "Lord-Lieutenant" means the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland for the time being.

(4.) The expression "arms" includes any cannon, gun, revolver, pistol, and any description of fire-arms, also any sword, cutlass, pike, and bayonet, also any part of any arms as so defined.

(5.) The expression "ammunition" includes bullets, gunpowder, nitro-glycerine, dynamite, gun cotton, and every other explosive substance whether fitted for use with any arms or otherwise.

(6.) The expression "prohibited district in Ireland" means any place in Ireland in respect of which the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council in Ireland, may have made or may make orders for prohibiting or regulating therein the sale or importation of arms and ammunition.

Maximum Dimensions and Weight.

2. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post under this Warrant from the United Kingdom any Parcel the dimensions of which shall exceed in length three feet six inches, or in length and girth measured together six feet (such girth being measured round the thickest part of such Parcel), or which shall exceed in weight seven pounds.

Rates of Postage.

3. On all Parcels transmitted by post from the United Kingdom under this Warrant there shall be charged and paid the following rates of postage (that is to say):—

On every Parcel not exceeding two pounds in weight, one shilling and three pence.

On every Parcel exceeding two pounds and not exceeding seven pounds in weight for the first two pounds, one shilling and three pence; and for every additional pound or fraction of a pound in weight, seven pence halfpenny.

Prepayment.

4. The postage on Parcels posted in the United Kingdom shall in all cases (except as otherwise provided in this Warrant) be prepaid at the time of posting, by means of adhesive postage stamps.

Times of Posting.

5. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post may, in the United Kingdom, be posted on any day of the week except Sunday, but shall not be posted on Sundays, or in England or Ireland, on Christmas Day or Good Friday, and in

Scotland on either of the two Sacramental Fast Days, except in the cases next hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :—

Where the delivery of Parcels on Sundays or any of the other days aforesaid, at certain Post Offices, to addressees calling for the same, may hereafter be specially authorized by the Postmaster-General, the posting of Parcels on Sundays, or such other days as aforesaid, at such offices respectively, shall also be permitted within such times and in such manner as may be directed by the Postmaster-General.

Mode of Posting.

6. Except as otherwise provided in this Warrant, all Parcels shall, in the United Kingdom, be posted by being handed in at a Post Office in the manner hereinafter provided, within the hours during which such office shall be open to the public for the posting of Parcels.

Posting at Post Offices.

7. The following provisions shall apply to the posting of Parcels at any Post Office in the United Kingdom, that is to say :—

- (1.) It shall be the duty of the person bringing a Parcel to hand it to an officer on duty at the counter in such office.
- (2.) Such Parcel must be accompanied by or have affixed to it a declaration of such kind, and stating the contents of the Parcel in such manner and form and with such other particulars as the Commissioners of Customs and the Postmaster-General may prescribe.
- (3.) Such Parcel shall be measured and weighed by such officer and (if such Parcel do not exceed the limits of measurement or weight hereinbefore mentioned) the postage thereof according to the rates hereinbefore mentioned shall be paid by means of postage stamps affixed to such Parcel, and shall be verified by such officer, and no such Parcel shall be forwarded by the post without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration, and until such Parcel has been so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon shall have been properly paid : and if any such Parcel shall be left at a Post Office without being accompanied by or having affixed thereto such declaration and without being so measured and weighed and the postage chargeable thereon properly paid as aforesaid, such Parcel shall, except as hereinafter mentioned, be detained and may be returned or given up to the sender thereof or otherwise dealt with or disposed of in any manner authorized by this Warrant.

8. Any packet transmissible by Parcel Post from the United Kingdom which from any words or marks thereon, or other external evidence, appears to have been intended for transmission as a Parcel, but which has not been tendered for transmission as a Parcel, but has been posted in a Post Office Letter-box or otherwise than according to the manner hereinbefore prescribed for the posting of Parcels, may, in the discretion of the Postmaster-General, either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say :—

- (1.) If the said Packet is fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage and otherwise conforms to the Regulations as to the Letter or Book Post, the same may be forwarded as a Letter or Book Packet (as the case may be).
- (2.) If the said Packet is not fully prepaid with the Letter or Book Packet rate of postage, the same may be forwarded to its

destination as a Parcel charged with the sum of 3*d.* in addition to all other postage payable upon such Packet as a Parcel.

Collection of Parcels.

9. The Postmaster-General may if he think fit from time to time authorize such of his officers as he may direct, to receive Parcels for the Post under such regulations and conditions as he may from time to time prescribe.

Retention of Parcels at Postes Restantes.

10. Any Parcel addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom "to be called for" shall if not called for, remain in such office for a period of one week after the date of the arrival of such Parcel thereat, and shall then be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels for Places beyond limits of free Delivery.

11. If the place of address in the United Kingdom of any Parcel be beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district to which the same may be forwarded by post, such Parcel shall be detained at the nearest Post Office until an opportunity of delivering the same shall occur, or in default of any such opportunity until a period of one week shall have elapsed from the time of the receipt of the Parcel at such Post Office. Upon the expiration of such period without such Parcel having been called for such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Parcels addressed to Ships.

12. Any Parcel addressed to a ship at any port in the United Kingdom shall if from any cause such Parcel cannot be delivered at such ship, be detained at the Post Office at such port for a period of one calendar month, and if not delivered at the expiration of that time such Parcel shall be dealt with as provided in this Warrant.

Return and Disposal of Undelivered Parcels.

13. With regard to

- (a.) Parcels which are addressed to a Post Office in the United Kingdom to be called for, or to a place in the United Kingdom beyond the limits of the free postal delivery of any town or district, or to a ship at any port of the United Kingdom, and which are not called for or delivered within the respective times in this Warrant specified in that behalf ; and
- (b.) Parcels which cannot be delivered in the United Kingdom for want of a true direction, or by reason that the addressee is dead, or cannot be found, or has refused the same, or has refused to pay any charges thereon, or for any other sufficient reason.

The following provisions shall apply, that is to say :—

- (1.) The Parcel shall, as the Postmaster-General may from time to time direct, be retained at or forthwith forwarded to such place as the Postmaster-General may from time to time appoint, and may, if necessary, be there opened and examined.
- (2.) Where the name and address of the sender can be ascertained from the Parcel or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be given to the sender by the Post Office of Egypt that the Parcel will in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, be given up to the sender's agent upon personal application at such place as aforesaid, or at the request of the sender will be returned to him by post in either case upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned.
- (3.) Where the name and address of the sender

cannot be ascertained from the Parcel or the Declaration accompanying the same, notice shall be publicly given (by affixing the same at such place or places, or in such other manner as the Postmaster-General may direct) and notice shall be given to the Post Office of Egypt that the Parcel will in default of any claim on the part of the addressee, and upon payment of such charges as are hereinafter mentioned, be given up upon the personal application of the sender's agent, or be returned to the sender by post.

- (4.) In any case the notice shall state that in default of the receipt by the Postmaster-General of an application for the Parcel during a period to be specified in such notice from some person who in the Postmaster-General's judgment is entitled to receive the Parcel, it will be disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.
- (5.) The Postmaster-General may, in his discretion, specify in any such notice, or otherwise, the periods during which Parcels may be returned to the senders thereof, and in so doing may have regard to the nature and contents of Parcels.
- (6.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender except upon payment by him of any charge for redirection or other charge to which the Parcel has become liable under the provisions of this Warrant, or of any such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."
- (7.) A Parcel shall not be given up or returned by post to the sender or his agent except upon payment by him of the sum of one penny in respect of every day or part of a day during which the Parcel remains at the place appointed as aforesaid after the expiration of three calendar months from the day on which the Parcel has arrived at such place.
- (8.) Where the sender requests a Parcel to be returned to him by post, such Parcel shall not be returned to the sender except upon payment by him of a new and distinct rate of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and all other charges to which the Parcel has become liable.
- (9.) The Postmaster-General may require proof to his satisfaction that an applicant for a Parcel is entitled to receive the same.
- (10.) Where no application is made for a Parcel within the period specified in any such notice as aforesaid, or an applicant fails to prove to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that he is entitled to receive the Parcel, or refuses or fails to pay the charges to which the Parcel has become liable under this Warrant, the Parcel may be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.
- (11.) If at any time while a Parcel remains in the possession of the Postmaster-General it becomes offensive or injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or other person, or to other Parcels, it may forthwith be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize, notwithstanding that the provisions of this Warrant as to the return of such Parcel, have not been or have only partially been complied with.

Re-direction of Parcels.

14. Any Parcel may be re-directed from its original address, or any substituted address, within

the United Kingdom; to any other address within the United Kingdom, and in every case of such re-direction there shall be charged on such Parcel in respect of each such re-direction, and paid by the addressee thereof in money upon the delivery of such Parcel, a new and distinct rate of postage, equal in amount to the rate of postage which would have been originally chargeable on such Parcel as an Inland Parcel.

Remission of Re-direction Rates.

15. The Postmaster-General may wholly remit the rate of postage for re-direction on any Parcel addressed to the United Kingdom which may, on the request of the addressee thereof, be re-directed by an Officer of the Post Office and again forwarded by post to the same person at any address within the limits of the same free postal delivery, as the address from which such Parcel was so re-directed.

Prohibitions.

16. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or containing any indecent or obscene picture, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, print, book, or card, or any indecent or obscene article or thing of any other kind, or any Parcel having thereon, or on the cover thereof, any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character, and if any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which *prima facie* appears to be, or which any Officer of the Post Office may have reasonable cause to suspect to be a Parcel within the description aforesaid, the same shall be detained, opened, and examined, and if on such examination it be found to infringe this or any other of the Regulations contained in this or any other Treasury Warrant relating to the Post Office, it may be dealt with and disposed of in any manner which may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

17. There shall not be conveyed or tendered for conveyance by post:—

- (1.) Any Parcel the value of which shall exceed the sum of £50.
- (2.) Any Parcel containing any substance, material, article, or thing of any kind whatsoever, which might, in the course of transmission through the post, be or become, or be rendered injurious to any officer of the Post Office, or any other person who may deal with such Parcel, or to any bag, basket, box, or other receptacle in or by which such parcel may be conveyed by post, or to any other Parcel or other contents of any such receptacle.
- (3.) Any Parcel consisting of or enclosing any bladder or other membranous substance containing a liquid of any kind, or anything perishable.
- (4.) Any Parcel containing a live animal of any kind whatsoever.
- (5.) Any Parcel which either from the nature of the contents thereof, or from the absence of proper packing or covering, is, in the opinion of the Postmaster-General or his officers, likely to injure any person in the course of the conveyance of the Parcel through the post, or any receptacle in or by which such Parcel may be conveyed by post, or any other Parcel or any other contents of such receptacle.

Any such Parcel, if posted or tendered for conveyance by post, may be detained, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof or dealt with or disposed of in such other manner as may be authorized by the Postmaster-General.

18. There shall not be posted any Parcel containing any letter or any communication in the nature of a letter written on any part of the Parcel or the cover thereof, or which shall contain any separate letter or communication in the nature of a letter, not being a circular transmissible by book post, and if any such parcel shall be posted the same may in the discretion of the Postmaster-General either be detained and returned or given up to the sender, or be dealt with as follows, that is to say:—

(1.) If such Parcel contain any separate letter or communication in the nature of a letter not being a circular transmissible by book post, such letter or communication may be taken out and forwarded to the address on the Parcel and shall be charged on delivery with the postage to which a letter of the same weight would have been liable if the postage thereof had been prepaid at the place at which the Parcel was posted, and the residue of the Parcel shall be forwarded to its address without additional charge by reason of such enclosure.

(2.) If such Parcel contain any letter or any communication in the nature of a letter written on any part of the Parcel or the cover thereof such Parcel may be forwarded to its destination charged with the sum of two pence halfpenny in addition to all other postage payable thereupon.

19. There shall not be posted or tendered for conveyance by post any Parcel consisting of or containing more than one Parcel or other Postal Packet, where any one of such Packets is intended for delivery to a person other than the addressee of such Parcel, and if any such Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post the contents thereof, so far as the same consist of Parcels, may be forwarded to the addressees of such Parcels charged with new and distinct rates of postage, according to the rates fixed by this Warrant, and so far as the same consist of other Postal Packets, may be treated and charged as unpaid Postal Packets, or such Parcel may be otherwise dealt with or disposed of as the Postmaster-General may authorize.

20. There shall not be conveyed or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post in or to any prohibited district in Ireland, any Parcel containing arms or ammunition, and any such Parcel, if posted or tendered or delivered for conveyance by post as aforesaid, may be detained and opened and returned to the sender thereof, or otherwise dealt with according to law.

Non-compliance with Regulations.

21. In any case not hereinbefore expressly provided for, where any Parcel shall be posted or tendered for conveyance by post which in any respect infringes or fails to comply with the regulations in this Warrant contained, or any of them, such Parcel may, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be dealt with as in this Warrant provided, with reference to Parcels which cannot be delivered, or be dealt with or disposed of in such manner as the Postmaster-General may in his discretion direct or authorize.

Provision for safety of Parcels.

22. In any case where any officer of the Post Office may find it necessary or expedient for the safety or protection of Parcels that any Parcel should be forwarded or delivered by some later despatch or delivery than that for which the same was posted or despatched, or intended to be posted or despatched respectively, he may delay the despatch or delivery of such Parcel, or make such

other and special arrangements as to the despatch or delivery thereof, not, however, involving a greater delay than 24 hours in the whole, as may be deemed by such officer necessary or expedient in the circumstances of the case.

Parcels not to interfere with Letter Post.

23. Where the despatch or delivery from a Post Office in the United Kingdom of letters would be delayed by the despatch or delivery therefrom at the same time of Parcels, such Parcels, or any of them, may be detained in the Post Office until the despatch or delivery next following that by which they would ordinarily be despatched or delivered.

Postmaster-General not liable for Loss or Damage.

24. Nothing contained in or done under or in pursuance of this Warrant shall render the Postmaster-General liable, either personally or in his official capacity, to any action or other legal proceeding in respect or in consequence of any loss of or damage to any Parcel, whether such loss or damage be occasioned by or arise from any act or neglect of any officer of the Post Office or any other person.

Customs Regulations.

25. Parcels intended to be transmitted by post under the provisions of this Warrant shall not be posted, forwarded, conveyed, or delivered, except subject to such Regulations as are referred to in section 14 of the "Post Office (Parcels) Act, 1882."

Remission of Postage.

26. The Postmaster-General may, in any case in which he may consider it just or reasonable so to do, remit any postage or any sum made payable under this Warrant.

Commencement of Warrant.

27. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of July, 1885.

ORDER of the Local Government Board under the District Auditors Act, 1879: Assignment of District and Duties:—

Durham Audit District.

To Charles Luxmoore Hockin, of Dartmouth, in the county of Devon, District Auditor;—

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions named in the Schedule to this Order;—

To the Overseers of the Poor of the several Parishes comprised within the said Unions respectively;—

To the other Authorities referred to in Article 2 (Nos. 3 and 4) of this Order;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Section 4 of "The District Auditors Act, 1879," We, the Local Government Board, are empowered to assign to District Auditors their Duties, and the Districts in which they are respectively to act;

And whereas the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin is a District Auditor duly appointed under the provisions of the Statutes in that behalf:

Now, therefore, We hereby certify the appointment of the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin

accordingly, and hereby Order and Prescribe as follows:—

ARTICLE 1.—The District in which the said Charles Luxmoore Hockin shall in future act as Auditor, and which We hereby assign to him, shall, until We otherwise prescribe, comprise the area for the time being included in the several Unions named in the Schedule to this Order, and shall be termed “The Durham Audit District.”

ARTICLE 2.—It shall be the duty of the said District Auditor to audit the Accounts of the following Authorities and their Officers; namely,—

- (1.) The Guardians of the Poor of the said several Unions.
- (2.) The Overseers of the Poor of the several Parishes comprised in the said Unions.
- (3.) The other Authorities whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction now are or hereafter may be wholly situated within the said Audit District and whose Accounts are or may become subject to be audited by a District Auditor.
- (4.) Such other Authorities whose Accounts are or may become subject to be so audited, and whose Districts or the areas of whose jurisdiction are for the time being partly situated within the said Audit District, as We may by Order under Seal hereafter prescribe.

ARTICLE 3.—The said District Auditor shall audit the said Accounts according to the provisions of the several Statutes and of the Orders issued by competent authority, in force for the time being in that behalf, and shall perform all such duties and exercise all such powers in connection with the audit of such Accounts as are prescribed and conferred by the said Statutes and Orders.

ARTICLE 4.—In this Order—

The term “Parish” includes any place for which a separate Poor Rate is or can be made or for which a separate Overseer is or can be appointed.

The term “Overseers of the Poor” includes Churchwardens and Assistant Overseers.

INCOME TAX.
